

The typical vision eve chart used for preventive vision screenings in schools is designed to be placed at 20 feet away from the child. These screenings measure how well or poorly a child sees with each eye at that distance. According to Dr. Madeline Romeu, OD, FAAO, some of the problems that are not detected by this test include near vision, eye coordination and focusing ability.

Signs of possible vision problems in school-aged children include:

• Holds reading material closer than normal; loses place while reading; omits or confuses small words while reading

• Has short attention span

Ruth E. Deventer, age 82, of Antwerp, OH passed away Friday, Aug. 26



anymore." These words were spoken by Dorothy in "The Wizard of Oz". My family is saying, "We're not in Cincinnati, anymore." Yea, two months ago my family and I moved from the bustling, hectic pace of Cincinnati to the wonderful community of Antwerp.


story takes place prior to the previously mentioned stint on Superman. "Know that there are two things your average comic writer waits his or her entire career to hear: 'Can I have your autograph?' and 'We want you to work on Superman!'

The story begins with an editor from DC Comics offering Steven the job writing Superman. Here it is, a great break for his career, but Steven just can't conjure up a story because he just can't relate to Superman. Superman is perfect, just, powerful, and loving. Steven's reality is much different; he is living in a world where his girlfriend leaves him, his dad disappears, and his aunt is dving of Huntingtons, a rare hereditary disease that will more than likely strike him.

In an imperfect world with imperfect people, how is someone like Steven supposed to write about Superman? This sets up one of the most touching graphic novels I have ever read. You won't find big explosions or graphi-

cally-alluring fight scenes. What you will find is a story of a man struggling with his humanity, with his frailty. His feebleness is flawlessly framed by the backdrop of the perfection of Superman.



The United Methodist church was privileged to have her at their organ for over fifty years, most people can remember her playing either for a wedding or funeral for someone in their family or somehow otherwise know. She was the driving force behind the church choir as well as several ladies and mixed quartets and other such groups. She knows the value of practice, practice, and practice some more.

She kept on going when most others would have given up. Over the years she had had falls or automobile accidents that resulted in broken bones and stays in hospitals and nursing homes and she has outlived both of her sons. There were times when she was ready to give up, but she'd start all over, get herself together, and get on with the 'music of her life'. Her grandchildren and great-grand children and their families are main-stays in her live, but she credits her faith in God as her source of strength. Goldie is so modest, she didn't even tell her family about her being honored until the day before she was to appear.

Stanley Jordan is a name and face that anyone who has lived in Antwerp very long at all will know. Born and raised in Antwerp, he graduated high school there in 1942. He played on the famous Undefeated Football team in 1938 as well as the first Antwerp basketball team to win the county tournament. In 1944 he married Pauline (Powell), they have one son, three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. During World War II Stanley served int the Army for three years; in the 9th Armored Division eight months in Europe and the remainder of his time in Virginia and Georgia as a drill instructor. Following that time, he worked for thirty-six years for the US Postal Service, first as a clerk then as a mail carrier From 1946 until 1976 Stanley served as a volunteer Fireman on the Antwerp Department. He is proud of the fact that he helped get the new

fire hall built several years back at a cost of \$32,000.00. Being a very versatile fel-

low, Stanley has worn many different hats. There were many, many years he was the voice one heard commenting as the units paraded down the street during Antwerp Days and the Halloween Parades.
