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
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ANN'S BRIGHT BEGINNINGS PRE-SCHOOLERS ENJOY NEW SCHOOL

In the late 20's and early 30's Fred and John Hertal ran an ice cream parlor with a jewelry store and watch repair shop in the back where the Oasis now sits. After the store closed, Fred opened the watch repair shop across the The Antwerp Exchange

Bank, Billy Pate had a drug store (everyone knew Billy, he was a character always with a story to tell), J. H. Hadcock had a clothing store, A & P had a grocery store (after they closed, Kroger's then moved from the south side of town to the A & P location). and Graves and Doering had a mercantile with groceries in the front and clothing in the back. These stores sat where the Antwerp Pharmacy, Village Hardware, and Video Junction sits now. The Graves and Doering

store became Doering and Long. The second floor of the building held an auditorium. The high school held their plays their because the school had no auditorium in it at the time. It also housed the Odd Fellow Lodge and the Red Men Lodge. West on 24, Frank and An-

Rister Law Office and the laundromat. The hotel was torn down in the late 60's. A huge dwelling, housing

nie Lamb had a hotel between

Dr. Spragens sat where the laundromat sits now.

Walter Ross established a service station on 24W where Chuck's Tires is now.

Back to Main Street, Tom Foster had a clothing store—it was a two story building that extended out to Main Street where the West Bend Printing and Publishing sits. Between the WBPP and the Presbyterian Church was a house occupied by Gaylen and Jerry Cussen.

What is now Friend's Furniture Store used to be Shielb's. Harry Ely had a grocery store-butcher shop beside them. Then sat the Bee-Argus, then owned by D. C. and Ed Bickard. The Bickard's came from Ossian and bought the Bee-Argus from North Osborn. Gordon's Hardware sat beside the Bee-Argus. Ivan and Richard Gaisford bought Gordon's Hardware. In the late 30's it caught on fire and burnt down.

Ray Reeb had a grocery store after which the Bee-Argus bought the building where it still stands today and is still family owned and run by the Temple Family.

I want to thank everyone for the response to last week's article. We want to again remind everyone that this paper is not only about Antwerp but about all of Paulding County.



PAULDING COUNTY HOSPITAL BOARD **CONSIDERS 2006 PLANS**

At a strategic planning session, the Paulding County Hospital board of trustees reviewed the strategic plan for 2006. Hospital CEO Gary Adkins presented the plan, which had been developed with input from staff physicians, department managers, and the administrative staff.

The board also reviewed the 2006 budget, which was presented by Rob Goshia, chief financial officer. An operational profit of \$96,432 is budgeted. The proposed capital budget has two major expenses including \$175,000 for a new ultrasound system in the radiology department and \$265,000 for an information system upgrade.

Board members will make final decisions on the strategic plan and the budget at November's meeting.

In his monthly financial report, Goshia reported a net profit for August of \$28,083 and a year to date profit of \$193,940.

Prior to this board meeting, trustees had established a new committee to review, very closely, the hospital's larger capital purchases. Randy Brooks is chair of the Technology Committee; members are Tom Krick and Tom Litzenberg. The goal of the committee is to clearly understand why the hospital needs major purchases, how they operate, and what they bring to the hospital's mission ... to continually improve the health status of the residents in our area."

Adkins' CEO report included:

PCH —The website is in the process of being upgraded. Currently, new parents can give their family and friends an ID number so they can go to www.

paulding county hospital. com and see new babies' pictures at the On-Line Nursery. The website also has a new page that details the hospital's improved Financial Assistance Program. Future plans include a video tour of many of the hospital's departments.

—The new Healthy Workplace Program will be kicked off in-house on October 17. There are two goals for the program. The first is to improve employees' health, which in turn will lower the hospital's insurance costs making it possible to pass along any savings to customers. Second, when we have proven the effectiveness of the program in-house, we can make it available to area businesses.

—Adkins agreed to cochair next year's American Cancer Society Relay for

Chief operating officer Randy Ruge's report includ-

—Upgrades to the radiology department continue. The mammography processor room will be completed October 7. The new equipment and remodeled procedure rooms for fluoroscopy and general xray will be completed by the end of October and the end of November respectively. Ruge added that these completion dates are always subject to the time it takes the State to sign off on plans.

—The physical, occupational, and speech therapy department is expanding its office space. The additional space is necessitated by the increase in staff size that was required by the continuing increase in the department's patient load.



Q. How do I know if I have iron bacteria?

ASK THE WATER EXPERT

A: There are several things you can look for to indicate that you may have an iron bacteria problem. Water may have a yellow, red, or orange color. In the toilet tank you may notice a black slime forming. You may also notice this slime in your prefilter housing sump. In addition you may start to smell something resembling sulfur, first in the hot water then perhaps later through the whole house. The smell may also be more apparent in the morning or after extended periods of non-use.



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PREPARE IRON COOKWARE

Right now is the time to get your iron pans out and season them for winter, before it is too cold to open the windows.

Ever wonder why Greatgrandma never had a problem with food sticking to the pan? You use the same pan she did, but no matter it still sticks. She probably used lard or other type of pork grease for the oil, and you more than likely use vegetable oil.

Iron really is the best cookware especially if you have a gas stove. Why you ask? Because iron has the best heat dispersion and retention of any other metals used in cooking. It is also the original non-stick surface with a major advantage: you can use your metal spatulas and not have to worry about scratching or ruining the surface. Iron cookware can be passed down from generation to generation.

This all sounds good but if your iron still has food sticking it's not doing you much good. Your pans need seasoning and you'll have a "nonstick" surface again.

To make your food not stick like grandma used to you'll need to 1st clean our pan with hot water and then dry thoroughly with towel. Second, wipe down the pan with bacon grease or liquid vegetable oil. Vegetable oil may cause the finish to feel sticky, but other than that it will be okay. I do feel that the bacon grease will make a better seasoning. Third, put the pan upside down in the oven. Be sure to do the same with the lid and outside of pan. Put a drip tray or aluminum foil on the lowest tray in the oven to catch oil that may run form the iron surface. Fourth, turn the oven on to 350°F for about an hour and five minutes (if oven is pre-heated, then one hour is fine).

When the oven has finished let it cool, because of the heat retention of iron, it will be very hot to the touch for at least an hour.

To make a very good season, repeat steps 2-5 a couple more times. It is best, but not required, to cook bacon or sausage first on your newly seasoned pan. When you cook now put a light oil in the pan and it won't stick.

Washing your iron in soap and water will ruin the seasoning. The best thing is to wipe then with a paper towel when you are finished.

If you plan on storing your cookware it is a good idea to put a light coat of oil on all surfaces to keep from rust-

How often should you season? You should only need to once unless you wash it with soap and water or if you find surface rust on it.

Ironware is available at antique shops and garage sales, but your local hardware store may carry it also. New unseasoned iron will be a gray color and after its first seasoning will become a caramel color. If it is used a lot it will soon become black and this is normal.

Ironware is great because it is one thing that you can pass on to your children and grandchildren, that can be used daily and every time they say, "This was my grandmother's and every time I use it, it brings my memory of her back to me!'

Yet, the team lived on MRE's (meals-ready-to-eat) and one home cooked meal a day provided graciously by the hosting church. They also set up a field shower in the parking lot. The weather was extremely hot and humid, with daytime temperatures reaching into the upper 90's. Declared 11 year old Cadet Garrett Atkins, "I didn't know I could sweat that much. Our clothes were drenched by 7:30 a.m., but we didn't complain because we were working for the Lord." Although the conditions were deplorable, the group remained in good spirits, and continued to be a shining light in a dark place. Even though they had to leave a day early due to hurricane Rita's approach, causing them to become evacuees also, they were still able to serve 17 residences.



HOUSE PASSES BILL TO REDUCE GAS PRICES

Congressman Paul E. Gillmor (R- Old Fort) today voted for legislation to increase American fuel supply, promote conservation, and ban price gouging. The Gasoline for America's Security (GAS) Act passed the House by a vote of 212 to 210.

"With gasoline prices in America soaring, this bill is another step by the House to create the energy infrastructure our nation needs," Gillmor said. "This bill, along with the Energy Bill passed in July, will increase capacity and streamline our fuel supply, all in an effort to reduce the burden of high prices and the lack of available resources."

Among the provisions of the GAS Act are:

—Encouraging U.S. refineries to increase supply;

—Preventing price spikes by limiting the number of "boutique" fuels in America from 17 to 6;

—Promoting conservation through carpooling and fuel-efficiency;

—Banning price gouging;
—Requiring the FTC to

study processing fees from credit card companies and their impact on price inflation. "The GAS Act and the

Energy Bill have been two major policies produced by Congress this year to increase energy supply and ease prices. With 47 percent of our refining capacity in the Gulf states, Hurricanes Katrina and Rita have had devastating effects on our nation's energy supplies. This crisis will not go away on its own and has now become an issue of national security. I am hopeful that the U.S. Senate will pass the GAS Act soon so that we may provide the relief our citizens desperately need," Gillmor concluded.

The Gas Act awaits debate and passage in the U.S. Senate before it can be forwarded to the President for his signature.

the surrounding area including a teachers from Paulding and Bryan displaying their craftsmanship.


Everyone who attended was enlightened on the ways of our past culture and how far we've come in the way of technology and industry, but it still was a great reminiscent time to be had.

Getting Gardens Ready For Cool Weather

(NAPSA)—Cold weather doesn't have to mean the end of your garden. In fact, the mercury dipping below freezing can be a good excuse to use your garden in different ways. For instance, many people dry their garden herbs and use them in cooking or to make flavored vinegars. Others bring some favorite plants inside and enjoy their gardens year-round.

• Come In From The Cold— Gardens should be moved indoors when the temperature starts averaging about 40 degrees at night. Then use a rake to spread straw around the empty garden to help protect it from the elements. Try using a wheelbarrow to bring potted plants inside.

• Winterizing Is Wise—Not all

plants can be safely moved indoors, so it's important to learn the basics of outdoor winterizing. Start by using fallen leaves to make a compost pile for the plants as soon as the mercury drops to 40 degrees. This can help keep them moist and warm. • Protecting Herb Gardens-Herb gardens generally can't survive temperatures below 32 degrees. Instead of leaving herbs out in the elements, try drying them in an airtight container away from sunlight or hanging them upside down in a cool, dry room. You can also pick fresh herbs, then chop them up and freeze them in baggies. The herbs can be used in the kitchen to spice up salads, vinegars and sauces or to add kick to some classic cold-weather recipes. They can even be used to make potpourri.




