PAULDING UNITED METH-ODIST CHURCH TO HOLD ANNUAL TURKEY SUPPER

The Paulding United Methodist Church located at 321 North Williams St. will be hosting their annual Turkey Supper on Thursday November 10, serving begins at 4:30 in the afternoon in the church's Fellowship Hall. A menu of roast turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes, gravy, green beans, cranberry sauce and dessert will be served for a free-will donation.

This has been an annual event for the church for many years. According to church historian, Marilyn Ladd, way back in 1874 the MITE Society of the church held a social and charged twenty-five cents per meal. In 1898 the social, as it was called, served over four hundred people and proceeds went to help build the new church (the present building).

In the 1940's the women's mission group, WSCS, was in charge of the social. Some of the ladies working on the meal were Ida Endsley, Minnie Thomas. Annabelle Williamson, Elaine Schrimshaw, and Elma Troyer. From 1954 to 1973 the co-chairmen were Allie Parson and Ruby Johnson and of course they had a large committee to help. After that Luella Thomas, Marilyn Ladd and Maxine Davis were chairmen as well as Phyllis Smasenko, Donna Lane, and Sue Wannemacher to name a few.

Marilyn Ladd remembers that the late Rosco Waters often was responsible for putting up a huge sign at the church to advertise the event.

Over the years the supper has evolved. At first whole turkeys were roasted, sometimes donated by Cooper Farms, now turkey rolls of both light and dark meat are

used, still from Cooper's. The entire meal is prepared at the church with the exception of the pies which are mostly home made by various individuals of the church family and brought in.

This year as well as last, one of the adult church school classes is organizing the event. It is a huge undertaking considering that 400 plus meals are served, some of which are carry-out. Those from the past who have worked on this project have been a real blessing to the church and the community. The class is grateful for the leadership.

Funds received from the donations for the meal are used for many church sponsored events and ministries as well as day-to-day expenses. The church hopes to continue this tradition for generations







HISTORY OF DEPOT AND RAILROAD OF ANTWERP **CONTINUED . . . ISSUE 8**

After Tom Johnson was moved to Napoleon, a man named Al Hurd became in charge. I know he was here at least until WW2 started because his son Steve was in the Pacific in the Navy when Pearl Harbor was bombed. Everyone worried about no news from him for 2-3 weeks, but he was o.k. After the war, Steve worked for Haver Fur-

Some of the other men who worked at the Wabash Depot and also the Railway Express were, Buel Kline and Keller Fling until the Wabash was sold.

A man from Cecil with the last name of Hart was the last telegrapher in Antwerp. He was called Log Chain by the 'C.B.E.R.S." He was transferred to New Haven as a dis-

Another important job the railroad and the depot had for Antwerp was the mail service. In most of the later years, we had two mail trains. One at 10:20 PM westbound and one eastbound about 5:30 a.m.

The man who met the mail train was Crist Goshorn. He had a two wheel push cart that was kept in the west room of the Depot when not in use. He would load his bags of mail and packages on his cart and deliver them to the Post Office at opening time (7:00 a.m.).

Later on, the job was taken over by Warney Rumbaugh and during the time he was sick, I would do the job for him. He was a dandy old gentleman.

The official name of this mail line was Toledo-St-Louis Railway Post Office. We had 2 men work and retire from this job, Dewey Towe and Otho Fleck. I worked for the R.M.S. for a few months in 1948

The night train to St. Louis was an express, only stopping a few times at the bigger cities. The day train did all the local both ways, east and west

I made about a dozen runs into St. Louis. Then I was sent to a one man run on the AK & DEL R.P.O. That was from Delphos to Akron. It was a combination mail and express car tied on the back of a freight train. It took all day to make the trip as we stopped at every town and cross road. We stayed all night at Akron and came back the next day. Every other weekend I stayed over in Akron. Yes, I carried a stub nosed 32 caliber revolver, but I never used it, thank goodness, I never even fired it in practice.

I was in the Railway Mail Service until Jan. of 1949, that's when I got an appointment on Route 1 out of the Antwerp Post Office.

The Norfolk & Southern had taken over the Wabash for a few years and has had a couple of owners since then. It is now called the Maumee & Western, and hauls crushed stone, cement, and all types of grain from the Woodburn and Antwerp elevators.

If you go west on River Street where the Maumee River, U.S. 24, and the railroad are all the closest, that's where the water tanks stood by the tracks to furnish water for the steam engines. J. Floyd Harris lived near by and ran the pumps that took the water from the river up into the tank. The tanks, pumps, locomotives, and Depot are all part of history now.

HAIL TO THE VICTORS

At the University of Michigan, football is more than a game, but a tradition. The university started in 1817 founded by the state, but the first football game was not played until May 30, 1879 against Racine. The team won that game but lost their second and final game vs. Toronto. Only 500 people attended the Racine game, but 1,500 people attended the Toronto game on November 1, 1879. The starting lineup included rushers: Dave DeTarr, John Chase, Irving Pond, Jack Green, William Honnon, Frank Reid, Richard Depuy, and Tom Edwards. At halfbacks were Charles Campbell and Edmund Barmolre. The goal keeper there was Charles Mitchel. The football team had no coaches until 1891; there names were Murphy and Crawford. As you can see, football is an old, important tradition at Michigan.

In 1938, Fritz Crisler came to Michigan from Princeton with an idea for the football helmets. Then, Michigan had plain black helmets, and he thought it would be easier to see the receivers down field with a more colorful helmet. They used the famous maize and blue winged helmet that they still use today.

Michigan has one of the largest stadiums in college football. It was built in 1927 and cost \$950,000. It seated 72,000 people, but with the additions, it now seats 107,501 people. They played their fist game in it on October 1,1927. The Wolverines won that game, defeating Ohio Wesleyan 33-0. The stadium dedication game was played on October 22, 1927 with the Wolverines defeating Ohio State 21-0. When Michigan entered the 2000 season, they had possessed 327-101-15 won/lost record in its 443 Big House games.

Michigan has one of the greatest rivalries in college sports. It is with the Ohio State Buckeyes. The record dates back to 1897 with its first game. The Wolverines defeated the Buckeyes 34-0 and dominated the games until 1919. That year the buckeyes won 13-3. This game often decides the winner of

the Big Ten and who gets to

compete in the Rose Bowl.

The rivalry game week has

turned the game into more.

It has grown to be the annual

blood battle, which helps the

In 1909, Michigan wanted the jug back so they played again. Michigan won that game 15-6. They kept the jug for ten years until they lost. So now, every year

they play for the jug. Michigan is going to have a successful season with sophomore QB Chad Henne and sophomore RB Michael Hart returning. The Wolverines play four away games and seven home games this year. Their schedule is Northern Illinois, Notre Dame, Eastern Michigan, at Wisconsin, at Michigan State, Penn State, at Iowa, at Northwestern, Indiana, and Ohio State.

Michigan is a successful football team. Their all time record is 833-272-36. Their conference record is 436-159-18. The U of M has scored 28,322 points and given up 12,047 points. Michigan has 41 conference championships, 11 national championships, and 125 years of tradition.

The Michigan Wolverines are an outstanding football team, one with several important milestones and many traditions. Go Blue!!!





PAULDING COUNTY COM-MISSIONERS

The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, October 12 and Monday, October 17, 2005.

Recent cuts in the budget

for the Ohio Department of Natural Resources have resulted in reduced funding for the county's recycling program. However, as Tony Burkley, Chairman of the Commissioners noted, "the state has yet to reduce the expectations for recycling activities. This is another example of the state shifting the burden of funding programs to local governments." Burkley reported that a recent report by Becky Suvar, Paulding County Recycling Coordinator, pointed out the lowered funding to the Commissioners. Burkley believes that "this is an ongoing process of forcing local governments to find the funding necessary for priorities established by the state and even the federal government. This process greatly reduces the dollars available to locally elected officials to meet local needs." concluded Burkley.

At the Monday, October 17th meeting the Commissioners considered a regular report by Tony Langham, Paulding County Economic Development Director. Langham noted a list of recent meetings and the status of several projects including the "old" Antwerp School. Also referenced was a recent meeting of officials from all local governments to learn about water and sewer districts. The Commissioners complimented Langham on the work his office accomplished in helping to increase the awareness for the need to improve water services and sewage treatment.

In further business the Commissioners were happy to approve a resolution proclaiming the week of October 23, 2005 as Red Ribbon Week. The annual Red Ribbon program is designed to increase awareness of the dangers of the use of illegal substances. The Commissioners spoke with Sonya Herber of the Turning Point and agreed to approve the proclamation and also to allow decoration of the Courthouse Square in support of the Red Ribbon Week.

During the late morning of Monday, October 17 the Commissioners joined with the Defiance County Commissioners in Defiance to open bids on the Carryall Ditch project. (Note: information on the bid opening was not available to me as I wrote this release.)

Following the Defiance meeting the Paulding County Commissioners faced one more meeting. The county is one of five counties in the Solid Waste District and the meeting for this month was held in the Fulton County Commissioner's Office in Wauseon.

The Paulding County Commissioners meet from 8:00 A.M. to the close of business on Mondays and Wednesdays.





HOUSE OVER PASSES BILL TO PREVENT THE OVER-WEIGHT FROM SUING RESTAURANTS

Congressman Paul E. Gillmor (R- Old Fort) today voted for legislation to prevent personal injury lawyers from suing restaurants because their clients are overweight. Gillmor was a cosponsor of the Personal Responsibility in Food Consumption Act, commonly referred to as the "Cheeseburger Bill", which passed the House today by a vote of 306 to 120.

"The Cheeseburger Bill is commonsense legislation which protects American businesses—large and small—from over zealous lawyers out to make a quick buck. By suing restaurants, personal inju-

ry lawyers are raising the cost of doing business and threatening jobs," Gillmor said. "I was proud to cosponsor this bill because the people of the Fifth District understand the need for personal responsibility and are tired of our judicial system rewarding those who have been harmed by no one but themselves," Gillmor said.

The Cheeseburger Bill prohibits obesity claims against the food industry except in cases where federal or state law was broken, resulting in weight gain. Such cases include mislabeling of food to underestimate the number of calories or fat contained in a food. In addition, as the Cheeseburger Bill applies only to weight gain, lawsuits

based on negligence or food poisoning are not exempt. The U.S. Senate failed to act on this bill last year after it passed the House with two-thirds of the vote.

"The people of the Fifth District want their food decisions to be made by their appetites—not by their lawyers. It's time to put a stop to this reckless litigation and hold individuals accountable for their choices. The local pizzeria, bakery or school kitchen is not responsible for our dining choices and should not be held liable for our decisions," Gillmor concluded.

The Cheeseburger Bill awaits debate and passage in the U.S. Senate before it can be forwarded to the President for his signature.




