Community Relations Coordinator MaryJo Wilhelm and Jim Fisher, intern guidance counselor, presented the new Vantage website and the opportunities available on the Guidance page to the board. introduced Shirley May, the new Adult Education Health Coordinator, who provided the board with an overview of all the Vantage Health classes.

In new business, the board:

-Re-employed Robert Vennekotter, director and employed Richard Fry, custodian;

-Approved the NEOLA new, revised or replacement policies;

-Accepted the resignation of David Myers, guidance counselor, effective at the end of his 2005-2006 contract year; accepted the resignation of James B. Jones, ABLE instructor, effective January 31, 2006;

-Accepted with thanks a donation of a mobile home (valued at \$2000) from Conrad Family Limited Partnership for the use of educational training in our Fire Protection Program.

The board entered into Executive Session for the purpose of employment of personnel.

RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT MRDD

The Paulding Commissioners unanimously approved a resolution at their February 27 meeting supporting the Paulding County Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities (MRDD) operation. The resolution was in recognition of March being Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities Month.

The resolution notes that mental retardation and developmental disabilities affect more than six-million children and adults and their families, and that all citizens are asked to realize that individuals with disabilities should be afforded opportunities in the community including full access to housing, employment and recreational activities. The resolution concludes by noting that the Paulding County Commissioners support the concept of "Everyone Belongs" so that people with developmental disabilities may live successful lives in our community.

Tony Burkley, Paulding County Commissioner, presented the resolution to Jane Gray, Superintendent of the Paulding County Board of MRDD. Burkley noted that he is "pleased that the Paulding County MRDD is helping our friends, neighbors and relatives with disabilities to live and work in our community."

FOUR MEMBERS COMPETE **IN DISTRICT AG SALES** COMPETITION

On Thursday, February 9, the Paulding FFA Ag Sales team of Alex Straley, Clint Vance, Tyler Arend and Caleb Schlatter competed in the district competition at Wayne Trace High School. The team placed second overall. Alex Straley was the third place individual. This young team consisting of three freshmen and one sophomore completed a mock sale of an agricultural product, worked through a customer relations practicum and took a 25 question written test.

The marketing of agricultural products is key to profitability in today's competitive economy, and agricultural sales play a major role in the marketing process. Through this CDE, students will save the opportunity to demonstrate skills in sales by participating in a wide range of activities oriented around the total sales process. The team this year is selling popcorn. They have based their sale upon the local Wildcat Creek Popcorn Company. Students have taken extra time learning about the product by tasting different varieties, touring the production facilities and practicing selling to teachers and other businesses in the Paulding area.

The team will compete at the state level on Saturday, March 4 at Tolles Technology School in Plain City, Ohio.



WAS PETER THE FIRST POPE?

Peter was first and foremost in a lot of things in the Gospels and other books of the New Testament. He was the first called (Matt. 4:18-20). His was the first recorded sermon after Pentecost. He performed the first healing (Acts 4) recorded after Pentecost. He was the first with John to be arrested and imprisoned. He was the first to rebuke the Sandhedrin at his trial. He and John were the first to miraculously to escape from prison. Peter is the first apostle to raise the dead (Acts 9). He is the first to introduce the Gospel to the Gentiles (Acts 10). Peter authored two of our New Testament books.

Looking at his resume: as we mere mortals look at things, we could be tempted to grant to Peter a very great standing in our Master's Kingdom. Here, I would advise caution.

A few questions are in order at this point. Who has the authority to grant this great honor to Peter? I would answer only Christ the King who purchased the church with his own blood.

The next logical question to ask is, is there such an office as pope established by our King? The office is not mentioned at all in any part of the Bible. If we look at the power and position granted to pope of record, it seems, only our King has been granted that by our Heavenly Father (Matt. 28:18). Therefore, when we grant that kind of position and power to a man, we are in fact choosing a substitute for our King and Savior, Christ Jesus. The position that our King holds is eternal, never needing to be held by another ever again. He claims His right to that throne from God himself and through the lineage of King David. If we are to usurp this greatest of authority known to any creature, we would need to find a greater source of power and authority than God himself. Does such a power exist? No, but there is one who claims to have equal power and authority. Who might that be? The answer is easy for all of us to see. He is the great deceiver from the beginning, Satan, the adversary. To follow anything he says is to align ourselves in opposition to our King and Savior.

WORSHIP ANYONE?

This is our fifth week on the topic of worship. We have stated several times that worship is all about "worthship"-that is, recognizing and rehearsing the value or worth of God.

"Recognizing" or attitude must come ahead of and be of greater importance than "rehearsing" or activity/action as a general rule. There are times when one can stumble into or rush into a time of worship, but that "exception" should never become the norm.

For the very same reasons, preparation for worship should form an essential aspect of our worship. Again, there are always exceptions to most rules in our imperfect world, but your preparation for worship is one important indication of the value you place on worship, and in the ultimate analysis, the value you place on God. Would you rush into a meeting with someone important? Why, then, would we want to rush into the presence of God?

Last week, we looked at four "measuring sticks" for our worship experience. (1) Did you prepare yourself to meet with God? (2) Did you discover some aspect of God's character in a fresh, new way? (3) Are you more sensitive to sin's encroachment in your life? (4) What is the point of application or obedience is God towards which God is directing you this week. To love God is to obey God.

This week, I want to dispel any misunderstanding that worship takes place only in a 'worship service" or a private "worship time". In fact all of life is to be lived facing God and giving to God your very best . . . in an attitude of worship, gratitude and love.

Romans 12:1 explains this idea of "lifestyle worship" as well as any Bible verse that I know. "Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, (not His command) to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God-this is your spiritual act of worship.'

What a verse! What a concept! We wake up each morning, bring ourselves before God in prayer, Bible reading, devotional work or some combination of those elements (preparation) and then begin a day of worship-our day's activities offered to God.

Is that really possible? I Corinthians 10:31 says, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." It is possible. It is the way that the Christian life is meant to be lived-not an occasional act of worship, but a seamless life of worship!



What a good feeling to know that even though we were a variety of denominations we still had one goal in mind and that was to help bring the message of salvation to the teens in our communities.

Impact World Tour will be coming to the Van Wert and Paulding County areas the week of April 17 through the 22nd. Paulding County will be the host at the Wayne Trace High School the nights of the 21st and 22nd at 7:30

The Impact World Tour, a ministry of Youth With A Mission (YWAM), is a large group of Christian men and women who have taken on the challenge of trying to bring salvation to teenagers by drawing attention with a variety of different activities. Wayne Trace students and parents will be seeing Team Xtreme muscle men and GX-INT skateboarders. It is a fascinating show to watch. In Van Wert County the teens will also be watching Island Breeze Polynesian dancers and a rock band named "Death and Desire". One of the pastors said he had been in contact with one of the band members and he told him this story. He had been on a chat line with teens from our area and he already knows where he can buy drugs, marijuana and such and would even be taken to the buyer so he could meet them personally. He said what a surprise it would be for these teens to know that he is a Christian and he was testing to see just how much they know and how deep they are into drugs.

We have a problem growing in our small communities and we as parents, grandparents, church members and friends need to be on guard at

We are writing regarding the letter to the editor that appeared in last week's West Bend News. The letter addressed a number of issues including oxygen tents, the family member's role in providing care, and the timeliness of radiology reports.

While used in the past, experience has shown that oxygen tents create a risk for fire and an ideal environment for the growth and spread of bacteria. Paulding County Hospital prides itself in delivering safe and up to date care thus we do not routinely utilize oxygen tents.

The hospital frequently engages family members in the provision of care to quell the fear that children may have when enduring a health care experience that may be frightening to them. This practice benefits that patient and family member by providing for a more effective treatment and emotional reassurance.

In the last two years our hospital has invested more than \$1.5 million dollars into the radiology department to insure that the best diagnostic equip-

ment is available with around the clock access to radiologists. This investment enables the hospital to direct X-ray studies to radiologists that further specialize within their field thus bringing an unparalleled level of service to the community.

We are constantly striving to provide the county's residents the best possible medical care. This commitment has resulted in the addition of fine physicians including family physicians, internal medicine, a board certified surgeon, board certified OB/GYN, oncology/ chemotherapy services, and the area's first 16 slice CT scanner capable of doing vascular studies. While we strive to provide quality care to our patients we understand that there may sometimes be concerns. Please feel free to share any concerns that you might have with us so that we may address them in an adequate manner.



A NEW KIND OF BREAST CANCER: PAGET'S DISEASE OF THE NIPPLE

Paget's disease of the nipple is a rare form of breast cancer, and it is found on the outside of the breast, near the nipple and areola, which is the circular, darkened (pigmented) region of skin surrounding the nipple. More than 95 % of people with Paget's disease of the nipple have an underlying breast cancer and it accounts for 5% of all breast cancers. Most patients that are diagnosed with Paget's disease of the nipple are over age 50 but rare cases have been reported in patients as young as 20. The average age at diagnosis is 62.

Early signs of Paget's disease of the nipple include redness and mild scaling and flaking of the nipple skin. It can appear as a rash or a lesion with a crusty outer edge. It may itch and be sore and does not clear up with creams. Improvement in the skin may occur spontaneously but this should not be taken as a sign the disease has disappeared. As the disease advances symptoms may include tingling, itching, increased sensitivity, burning and pain. They may also be a discharge from the nipple and the nipple can appear flattened against the breast. In one half of patients, a lump or mass can be felt in the breast during a physical examination.

One lady's lesion started out as a pimple on the aureole. It did not particularly itch or was it sore. The scary thing with Paget's disease is that the symptoms appear relatively harmless. Early symptoms may cause only mild irritation and may not be enough to schedule a visit to the doctor. It is frequently thought to be an infection or skin inflammation. If your doctor suspects Paget's disease, he/she will need to have a biopsy performed to be certain.




