BOOK REVIEW: THE SECRET LIFE OF BEES BY SUE MONK KIDD, PENGUIN BOOKS 2002

Lily thinks she killed her mother. She is a young girl coming into womanhood while living with a neglectful father and her black nanny, Rosaleen. Set in the south amongst the racial tension of the sixties, Lilie's life is full of turmoil. When Rosaleen gets arrested after a run-in with arrested after a run-in with
two town racists, Lily knows she must break her friend out or see her die. What results is a whimsical adventure which leads them to the doorstep of August, May and June-beekeeping sisters created with such colorful character that you believe they do exist somewhere in Tiburon, S.C. Here, the women ban together and teach Lily the meaning of empowerment and the regenerative quality of love.
This novel is written with fierce passion and insight and forces us to remember a time when equality was not for blacks and violence was comblacks and violence was com-
mon. In this compelling coming of age story we see Lily unlock a secret door to her past and discover her future. This is a spell-binding first novel by Kidd, who took some of the details directly from her own childhood. in Hicksville and Anita lives in Hicksville and Anita lives here in Antwerp.

Tom and Ruth Schilb lived in the next house for quite awhile. After Tom retired, they lived in Sebring, Florida for a good many years.

George Clemmer, Sr. lived in the next house, two of his boys were school teachers here.

The next house, in the late 1920's and early 30's was the home of the Richard Mooneys. I think they moved into Ft. Wayne and the Ed Durre family lived on that corner for quite awhile and later moved in the Hicksville later moved
area.
Across Madison Street on Across Madison Street on
the South side, was the home of Warren and Pearl Seslar. For as long as I can remember they operated the Texaco gas and oil dealership for the gas and oil dealership for the
Antwerp area. They had a son named Delmar and they were all fine people.

The second house on that side was the home of John Langham and family.

The next house was occupied by Hi Overmeyer and his wife. Another lady stayed with them named Gertie Hughes. I remember them so well because they all sat on the large cause they all sat on sumer
porch on those hot summer porch on those hot summer
days when I delivered the Ft. Wayne News-Sentinel. They were always glad to see me. I was 12 years old at that time.

The last house in that block was the home of Mandus Reeb. He worked in the County Court House-I think he was County Treasurer. In his younger days he was also a minor league baseball player. After he retired from the Courthouse, they moved the Court
to Texas.

UNCLAIMED FUNDS LIST AVAILABLE IN TREASURER'S OFFICE


Betty R. Layman, Paulding County Treasurer, along with Lou Ann Wannemacher, clerk and Republican Candidate for Treasurer review the complete unclaimed funds list which was mailed to their office. The list includes names of Paulding County residents, along with the dollar amounts of the unclaimed fund. If you have seen your name on the list for unclaimed funds you may call or come into the treasurer's office for the proper forms to fill out to claim them, or visit the website: www.com.,state.oh.us. Common sources of unclaimed funds include dormant savings and checking accounts, unpaid insurance policies, unreturned rent and utility deposits, forgotten layaway deposits, credit memos, unclaimed wages or commissions, securities,
undelivered and uncashed stock dividends, credit balance, uncashed checks or intangible contents of safe deposit boxes.

According to the Ohio Revised Code Chapter 169, accounts become unclaimed when, over a specific period of time, there has been no activity, and the holder of the funds cannot locate the owner. The time frame varies depending on the property but in most cases, it is three to five years. One exception is payroll checks, which are only held for one year. The funds are then turned over to the State, which acts as custodian of the funds until they can be returned to the rightful owner.

The list can be reviewed through the Treasurer's Office, or the web site can be searched free of charge.

 PITAL FACES FINANCIAL CHALLENGESPaulding County HosPaulding County Hos-
pital's board of trustees was updated on the efforts being made to address reimbursement shortfalls at its most recent meeting. Hospital CEO Gary Adkins is working with the Ohio Hospital Association (OHA) to minimize the negative financial impact.
"We have two basic strategies," Adkins told the board. "One is to establish a national coalition of states to work with the Federal government to increase reimbursement. The second is through OHA. The association is working with the consulting firm of Health Management Associates to develop plans to address the shortfall."
In addition, Adkins participated in a meeting of Ohio's 13 public hospitals with State Senator Lynn Wachtmann and State Representative Jim Hoops

The shortfall is a result of changes to two Federal Medicaid programs administered through the State-the Health Care Assurance Program (HCAP) and the Medicaid Supplemental Upper Payment Limit Program.
The Ohio legislature significantly reduced the Medicaid Supplemental Upper Payment Limit Program in next year's budget to accommodate for Medicaid managed care. The action also reduced income from HCAP. The changes to these two programs will result in a total loss to the hospital of around $\$ 329,000$ annually.

The negative impact was evidenced in CFO Goshia's financial report. He reported a net loss of $\$ 18,794$ for February and a year to date net loss of $\$ 13,209$.
In other hospital finances, the board approved two capital requests. One was for a replacement voice mail phone system costing $\$ 25,488$. The other was for a cardiac telem(heart monitor) station
