"FROM THE VANTAGE POINT: **SENIOR CAPSTONE PROJECTS**

Why are students waiting outside classrooms with lumber, computers, engines, binders, charts, and posters? On Wednesday, April 26, the hallways at Vantage were filled with excitement, apprehension, and finally, relief. Why? The Vantage seniors were presenting their Senior Capstone Projects to teachers, staff and community members.

. The Senior Capstone Project is a part of the student's final year at Vantage. The project integrates the skills, concepts, and data from the student's program of study into one culminating project. This is a three-part process: a research paper, a project or product needed to be created outside of the normal school day, and a formal oral presentation in front of a panel of adult judges. Each student had the opportunity to demonstrate a significant personal and academic growth.

Emotions were running high—anxiety, eagerness and doubt—as the students reviewed their notes in the hallway just before the presentations began. Beth Evans, senior English teacher said, "Senior Capstone, required of all Vantage Career Center seniors, provides an opportunity for making these last two years of high school meaningful and practical. The Senior Capstone Presentation Day is the time when our seniors

proudly present their culminating Senior Capstone Project. As always, this day is filled with much excitement and anticipation. For most of our seniors, this day is a positive and memorable experience ... one they will never forget."

It was obvious that many had devoted a great deal of time to their projects and were very proud of them. Here are just a few examples of the projects that were pre-

Kyle Huston, a Precision Machining student from Van Wert, designed a cab console for ambulances. Kyle is currently on early placement at Braun Industries, and was given the opportunity to work with the Braun engineers. His CAD (Computer Aided Drafting) and blueprint reading skills, along with the metal working knowledge he learned in his program, really made the difference. Senior Auto Technology student, A.J. Miller from Van Wert, reconditioned cylinder heads for a Chevy 454 engine for

his Senior Project. Delphos Iefferson's Richelle Hahn, an Auto Body senior, has always been interested in Blacksmithing, so for her Capstone project, she made three different Colonial candleholders out of metal. "I was really interested in how the materials would react to the heat. It was fun – I learned a lot,

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esented at the **Huber Opera House and Civic Center** and I was surprised at how well they turned out."

Network Systems seniors Lucas Jewett, (Crestview), Kurt Fuerst (Kalida), Ion Anderson and Dustin Younker (both from Parkway), teamed up to design, create and program an animated video game using C++ programming. Jeff Feeney, a Paulding senior in the Industrial Mechanics program, designed and built a mini-chopper. Alicia Grimes, a Food Careers senior from Antwerp, designed, baked and decorated a "Cupcake Wedding Cake" - and the judges even got to sample it!

Josh Brueckner, a senior Interactive Media student from Crestview, performed and developed a music CD. Crestview classmate Justin Brown, a senior in the Electricity program, simulated a satellite dish by building a model miniature parabolic reflector. Brandon Rue, a Continental Carpentry senior, built a beautiful oak coffee table with design etched on the top. Dustin Miller, a Wayne Trace senior in the Carpentry program, built an octagonal, felt-lined game table.

Andrea Ellerbrock, a Kalida senior in the Early Childhood Education program, created a layout and design of a daycare facility based on state regulations. Matt Woodcox, an Industrial Mechanics senior from Antwerp designed and built a solar panel as an example of an alternative home heating system.

Four senior Cosmetology students - Kerri Geckle, (Kalida), Christine Fetzer, (Delphos Jefferson), Rebecca Terrell (Crestview) and Jessica Metzger (Delphos Jefferson), pooled their talents for their Senior Project Presentation to coordinate and produce a Style Show for the student body. They designed many of the outfits and did the hair, makeup and nails of their models.

Doug Eickholt, an Ag Diesel senior from Ottoville, removed an old engine from a Chevy truck and replaced it with a new engine. Kristy Tomlinson, a Van Wert Health Careers senior, chose to create a healthy menu and diet for someone with diabetes.

Juniors were able to observe the seniors during their presentations this year. All the seniors had the same piece of advice to the juniors, "Start early, don't procrastinate and choose a topic that you're interested in."

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LIVING LIKE CHRIST

This is our sixth week in this series of columns. We are working with a simple definition of discipleship crafted by Eugene Peterson. He writes that discipleship living like Christ—is all about developing "a trained attentiveness to God in prayer, in Scripture reading, and in spiritual direction." It is this "trained atten-

tiveness to God" that we are aiming for as we pursue Christ. How can we establish and then maintain our focus on Jesus? According to Peterson,

prayer, Scripture reading, and spiritual direction are the primary resources at our disposal to accomplish this goal. Of those three, "spiritual direction" is the least understood. This term can communicate two different ideas. One of those is the idea of a spiritual guide or mentor. The other idea is that of spiritual disciplines—holy habits that help us to stay in meaningful contact with God throughout the day.

The starting point in this process is a genuine desire to "practice the presence of God"—stay in closer contact with God—throughout the

I suggested last week that the key to this process for me is to reaffirm that desire in the evening, and if possible think through how I have done during that day. I go to bed with that singular desire for the following day.

When I awake, that is the first desire of my heart-to practice the presence of God. Morning devotions—a quiet time of prayer, Scripture reading, and reflection help me to firmly establish that personal relationship.

Then you begin your day's activities asking God to grant you the grace of continuing in His presence. As you walk through your day, "check in" with God to see how you are doing in your quest to stay connected with Him. Ideally, a short time of silence and solitude is the best way to ac-

complish this "reconnect". But there are other ways. That is where the spiritual disciplines come in. The


easiest and one of the most efficient means for me is to simply begin thanking God for all of His blessings in my

Ironically, the most important blessings are the ones we take for granted life, air, water, sunshine, rest, food, friends, health. . . a God who is personally interested and personally involved in my life. "Connecting the dots" connecting the gifts of life to the Giver of life is one of my favorite ways to develop a "trained attentiveness to God. Have a great day practicing His presence!

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
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

In response to the letter written about Hoops for Heart on May 3rd, I feel disappointed and shocked at what I read. As a senior at Antwerp High School, I have always looked forward to Hoops for Heart as a day to not only be able to support the American Heart Association but also to enjoy activities for all ages. In all the years that Hoops for Heart has gone on here at Antwerp, I have never heard a single complaint. To many people, ten dollars is a very small donation, and that would explain why many students turn in anywhere from ten dollars to two hundred dollars in donations. Over many years, I have asked numerous people for donation money and have never once been turned down. Students who do not want to sit in study hall for half a day could merely ask ten people (teachers, family members, or community members) for a one dollar donation. In my lifetime, I have lost

not only an uncle but also a cousin to heart disease, and because of that, I personally feel I will never be able to donate enough money to the American Heart Association because no amount of money will bring my relatives back. 



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
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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

That was because so many kids participate and it took that long for all the games to be completed. Each team has three players and from 8:00

a.m. until they are done, four basketball courts are in use. That means 24 kids are playing all at once and the teams just keep rotating until all have played. While this is going on, in the other gym contests of 3 point shooting and foul shots are being held.

It's a great day of fun and good sportsmanship. The kids have a ball and the teachers who give of their time to referee seem to enjoy the time spent with the kids outside the classroom. The kids who don't want to participate by donating or collecting \$10.00, remain in study hall. After all, there are rules and regulations to everything.

Besides being a lot of fun and a few hours out of the classroom, the kids are making a great contribution to a very worthwhile organiza-

Specifically, the Seniors Eye Care Program provides free eye care educational materials and facilitates access to eye care at no out-of-pocket

To be eligible for the program's services, you must be a U.S. citizen or legal resident, be age 65 or older, not have seen an ophthalmologist in three or more years and not belong to an HMO or the VA. Those eligible for a referral through the program receive a comprehensive, medical eye



The program's more than 7,500 volunteer ophthalmologists accept Medicare and/or other insurance reimbursement as payment in full and patients without insurance receive care at no charge.

In addition to the work being done by Eye Care America, the State of Ohio is an advocate of good eye health and safety. Founded in 1957, Prevent Blindness Ohio (PBO) is the only statewide, voluntary vision health and safety organization dedicated solely to the prevention of blindness and the preservation of sight. Serving all 88 counties with offices in Northeast, Northwest, and Southwest Ohio, PBO provides eye care services to over 600,000 Ohioans annually. In fact, in the past year through vision screenings, eye health and safety programs and other advocacy efforts, the Northwest Ohio office provided direct sight-saving services to more than 1,000 children and adults.
