## CUSTOMER FRIENDLY PAULDING COUNTY HOSPITAL BILLS NEAR COMPLETION

Hospital CEO Gary Adkins informed the PCH board of trustees that the new, more customer friendly bills will be in the mail by August. "With the help of a PCH-billing focus group, which included several community residents, the hospital has revised the format of its bills," Adkins said. "The goal is to make the bills as clear and easy to understand as possible."

The billing changes are part of an overall upgrade to the hospital's computer system. Other departments to be upgraded include pharmacy, payroll, medical records, accounts payable, and materials management. The changes and related employee training are anticipated to be completed by mid-July.

Adkins also told the board that Dr. Triplett is expected to return to his OB/ GYN clinic around mid-July to early August. "The hospital is very grateful to Dr. James Gray for filling in for Dr. Triplett during much of his absence."

Adkins presented the latest customer relations report

from Press Ganey to the board. He also presented the annual human resources report to the board

Finances continue to be a challenge for the hospital. Chief financial officer Rob Goshia reported a net loss of \$25,319 for April and a year to date net loss of \$153,744.

The board reviewed the first quarter quality improvement summary and the annual critical access program.

Chief operating officer Randy Ruge reported that:

He is negotiating for a new contract with the hospital's MRI provider in order to save \$21,000 annually.

-The Transitional Care/ Program Rehabilitation (swing bed) educational and promotional program is continuing.

-Oncology treatments increased in April.

-The human resources department is preparing to move to the medical office building to provide more space for outpatient surgeries. Since Dr. Strawter's arrival as Paulding County's

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



LIVING LIKE CHRIST

Last Week, we began

to look at the discipline of simplicity. Simplicity is all about the inward reality of single-hearted focus on God which results in an outward lifestyle that refuses to get overly involved in the excesses of the world around us. We choose to give our life to God's singular focus, God's best for each of us - God Himself - rather than becoming entangled in the many foci of our culture that would choke out the life of God in us. What would some of

those foci be? Money, possessions, popularity, position, power, physical appearance, competition, time, etc. Our world would have us chasing after any one or any combination of these (or some others that you might add to my list) rather than pursuing our personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Remember, our goal is "a trained attentiveness to God". Does God's Word speak

to this issue? Absolutely! Listen to Hebrews 12:1-3. "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders (the multiple foci of the world) and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and set down at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider Him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart."

Do these verses speak to a singular focus? Do these verses speak of discipline? Do these speak of perseverance? Yes, they speak clearly to all of these.

Listen to one other passage from the Old Testament, the first part of God's Word. Proverbs 4:23,25-27 expresses the same truth in this way. "Above all else, guard your heart, for it is the wellspring of life . . . Let your eyes look straight ahead, fix your gaze directly before you. Make level paths for your feet and take only ways that are firm. Do not swerve to the right or the left; keep your foot from

Once again, we are challenged to maintain a singular focus. We are called to an intentional, disciplined lifestyle. The discipline of simplicity calls us to this type of lifestyle. It also enables us to identify our potential enemies, potential competitors to our walk with God, and to keep those opponents in check. Next week we will think through a strategy for the second part of this equa-

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(Continued from Page 1) first full-time general surgeon, PCH's outpatient services have increased thus, creating a need for more patient rooms.

CEO Gary Adkins reported:

-He continues to work with the Ohio Hospital Association to establish a plan to work with the Federal government to alleviate the shortfalls resulting from changes in the supplemental upper payment limits. SUPL are part of Federal Medicaid payments that are administered through the State to offset Medicaid reimbursement shortfalls for public hospitals.

—The quality improvement team continues to work on reducing the time between when hospital tests are done and when the results are sent to the physicians who ordered them.

On May 12, the hospital finalized the purchase of the Oakwood Medical Center.

On May 16, board chair Tom Litzenberg and Adkins attended a meeting in Columbus regarding issues surrounding the Tax Expenditure Limitation (TEL) constitutional amendment and the Supplemental Upper Payment Limit shortages anticipated this year. Ohio's house of representatives has passed a bill which will allow the TEL initiative committee to withdraw the amendment from this fall's ballot. The state legislature has passed a law that applies the 3.5 percent limit proposed in the TEL amendment only to the state budget. It removes the limit restriction from local governments.



The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, May 31 and Monday, June 5, 2006.

The Commissioners discussed the possibility of a Honda plant locating in Van Wert County. They reviewed a letter they wrote to the Van Wert County Economic Development Office that stated the location of the plant in Van Wert County would benefit the entire region. The letter also offered any assistance that could be helpful.

The Monday session included a meeting with Corey Walker, Director of the Paulding County Job and Family Services (JFS.) Walker asked for and received approval for three contracts. One was for the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) program. The second one contracted a company to provide for the maintenance of computer software used in the Job and Family Services programs. The third contract was with OSU Extension to provide parenting classes. Walker also provided a brief update on Job and Family Services programs. Marty Harmon, Chairman of the County Commissioners, noted that Walker "has been very helpful in explaining the programs provided by his staff."

Paulding County Treasurer Betty Layman also met with the Commissioners during the Monday meeting. Layman presented her regular report on investments. Her investment strategy allows different maturity dates. These different dates allow her to obtain the best possible rates and to have funds available when needed. Layman reported that investment yields are helping the general fund balance. She noted that interest rates are still rising but that the rate of the increase is slowing.

The Commissioners also heard a report that several individuals have accepted an invitation to join a study committee to make recommendations about the future of the old jail.

At both meetings the Commissioners dealt with regular county business such as approving expenses for the county and responding to correspondence and telephone calls.

The Paulding County Commissioners meet in regular session from 8:00 a.m. to the close of business on Mondays and Wednesdays.

#### "WHAT IS A GOOD FA-THER?"

We come to that time of the year when we remember our fathers. Being a father is not an easy task. Fatherhood is more than merely having offspring. It involves providing, nurturing, setting an example, caring; it involves much time. One might ask, "What is a good father?" That question is really hard to answer because the finished product takes so long to see.

A good carpenter is seen by his finished product, a good artist is judged by his finished product. A good gardener is judged by the garden's lack of weeds and the amount of produce that is harvested from the garden. So it is with being a good father, the finished product must be seen.

There is more to consider when raising children than just the father, the mother must be considered along with the grandparents, the school, the church, the whole community. All of this must be considered in the finished product of raising children.



"I was very pleased to receive this honor from the American Water Works Association this year," Gillmor said. "As a Subcommittee Chairman, I have been fighting for clean water programs and improved technology to protect the waterways and drinking water across our nation. This award is very meaningful to me," Gillmor continued.

For the past six years, Congressman Gillmor has been chairman of the Subcommittee on Environment and Hazardous Materials on the Energy and Commerce Committee. Among the water related issues he has tackled are investigations into the effects of corroding lead pipes which carry drinking water into our homes and the effects of pumping water into Lake Pontchartrain from New Orleans following Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Gillmor actually held one of the first hearings about the environmental effects of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita in September of 2005.

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

#### **STATE PROVIDES HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE TO LOW-INCOME OHIOANS**



This past winter, as natural gas prices reached record highs and thousands of Ohio families struggled to pay their home heating bills, Governor Bob Taft, members of the Ohio General Assembly, and the Ohio Department of Development (ODOD) worked to provide heating assistance to needy families through Ohio's Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP). Specifically, to ensure that more low-income Ohioans received aid, the governor set aside \$75 million in federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) dollars to supplement the \$100 million in HEAP funds already available. In addition, income eligibility requirements for HEAP assistance were expanded from 150 percent to 175 percent the federal poverty line in order to reach more Ohio households. The state's efforts were a tremendous success; helping a record 510,185 Ohioans keep their heat.

While the HEAP assistance program provided millions of dollars to help offset heating costs this winter, as





er for their home. Ohio's HEAP, which is administered by the ODOD Office of Community Ser-

vice and funded through the U.S. Department of Health and Humans Services' Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), has two basic components designed to help eligible Ohioans cover their utility payments. The first component, or Regular HEAP, is designed exclusively to help Ohio residents meet the high costs of home heating by providing vouchers to those unable to pay their bills.

The second component, or Emergency HEAP, is available to focus on more urgent energy assistance issues and includes the HEAP Winter and Summer Crisis Programs. 

#### **NEEDLE DISPOSAL SAFETY**

Helen Gerschutz, housekeeping supervisor

The needle disposal program at Paulding County hospital has been improved to better meet your needs. Bring your used needles to the hospital to be disposed of in a safe manner. The lab office will take your container of needles and give you a safe sharps container to use in your home or, a smaller travel container, free of charge.

The workers who handle residential trash often are stuck by needles at the curbside. When it is compacted in the trucks the containers can break and the needles become loose. At the landfill, heavy machinery runs over the trash to compact it further collecting the needles in their wheel tracts. When the workers clean the tracts, they are again subject to a needle stick.

Even with the best intentions of how sharps are packaged for disposal, accidents can and do happen. The workers do not know with what disease they may have been infected so they need to be evaluated by a doctor and watched closely. Costly medical expenses and psychological effects occur to those who are unfortunate enough to be a victim of a needle stick from a dirty, diseased needle.

Here are some safety precaution regarding needles:

- Keep all needles out of reach of children.
- Do NOT recap, bend, break, or manipulate needles by hand.
- Needles, know as "sharps" in healthcare, should be placed in a regulated sharps container that is puncture resistant with a lid that can be locked or sealed shut with tape. Glass containers should NOT be used since they can break.
- Regular plastic bottles and cardboard boxes are not puncture resistant.
- Hard plastic or metal containers with screw on or

• Hummingbirds are attracted to bright orange, red and hot pink blossoms. Their long, narrow beaks can reach the nectar of long, tubular flowers such as the Balboa Sunset Trumpet Vine with its large scarlet blossoms, and the Goldflame Honeysuckle, which has vibrant yellow and red flowers. Other good choices are the Super Red Flowering Maple and the Navajo series of Salvia, available in many colors, including bright red, rose and salmon red.

 Not all hummingbirds feed at the same height, so plant an array of shrub sizes and climbing vines for food sources • Butterflies are attracted to

yellow, orange and red. They too are seeking nectar, but their mouths, or proboscises, are much smaller, so they prefer flatter flowers they can perch on while they feed. The no-fail plant for

butterflies is the Butterfly Bush, or Buddleja. However, since they can get too large for some gardens, consider the Petite series of Dwarf Butterfly Bushes. Petite

butterflies and hummingbirds.

Indigo has a profusion of lilac-blue flowers; Petite Plum sports reddish-purple blooms and the Petite Snow has pure white blossoms.

• Lilacs are favorites of butter

flies, but don't typically flower well in climates with warmer winters. The Blue Skies Lilac produces huge clusters of light lavender-blue flowers that don't require winter chilling. Butterflies love Coneflowers, such as the bright pink Pixie Meadowbrite. Asters are great because they bloom well into fall. The new Farmington Aster has a profusion of lilac bloom clusters

that butterflies flock to. • Supply a source of water. Hummingbirds enjoy flying through a fine mist, which cools them off. Butterflies like drinking from shallow puddles. Position some large flat rocks in a sunny spot, on which butterflies can sun themselves to warm their wings.

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
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## **PUBLIC NOTICE**

If the Village does not receive reimbursement for the said nuisance, a lien will be put on the property in the amount due.

Whoever fails to comply with the notice shall be fined not less that \$25.00 no more than \$100.00 plus court costs and each day the owner, occupant or other person having charge of the land fails to comply with notice shall constitute a separate offense.





#### ANTWERP HISTORY: "A VISIT WITH LARRY BRUICK"

The A & W Root Beer Stand is certainly part of Antwerp History. Larry Bruick is a sharp and successful businessman and I had the pleasure of talking to him the other afternoon in the picnic area of his establishment.

Larry was born in Monroeville, Indiana in October of 1942. He graduated from there in 1961. He started in the food business early, as he worked the last two years of his high school at the big Avery's store in Ft. Wayne on the Decatur Road.

He attended Purdue University in Ft. Wayne for awhile, but it was sort of dull so he went into the Army. After basic he served in Turkey for 13 months. This really excited me, because I had never talked with anyone who had been to Turkey. This was in 1963 and he was in a seaport town of IZMIER. It was sort of home base for the 7th Fleet. It was dirty and hot with no refrigeration. They were billeted up close to a Turkish Airfield where they were training with T-33's. On his off time he visited some biblical spots of interest.

After he returned home he farmed the home place in 1966, but when he was called to B.F. Goodrich, he left the farming to someone else.

He worked at different jobs at B.F. But his best thing he did there was to meet his wife, Margaret.

Margaret Campbell was born in Middlebury, Ohio. She went to school and graduated from Crestview in 1961. She and a couple other girls came through Monroeville and along with Larry, they car-pooled into the Goodrich plant. After awhile Larry and Margaret dated and got married about 1967.

Both kept working at Goodrich and they were talking about building a new home or buying one. One of his buddies had purchased an A & W business in Garrett and that interested Larry a lot. They journeyed to Antwerp and stopped at Joe Ross's Service Station and talked with him about the root beer stand at that time owned by Sam Mees. Linco Joe encouraged him to buy the A & W and by golly he did.

At that time, there was a house on the West end, what is now the picnic area. That is where Sam lived and there was another house on the East end, and at that time Elmer Jones lived there and later on, Luke Sparrow. That home was torn down and the garage remains as storage.

So they purchased that area from Sam Mees, the man who started the business. That was

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in 1969. Mr. Mees asked them to keep the two full time ladies. They were Ursie Delong and Peg Hunt Johnson. He recommended them highly. Sam then served a few terms as Antwerp's Mayor.

Margaret kept on at Goodrich and worked the day shift. She quit in 1970 to work full time at the business. Larry had bought the A & W at Van Wert, He operated that one for 3 years, he then let it go and spent full time in Antwerp. He left Goodrich in 1973.

In 1975, while they were away, their home burnt down and they bought the house he lives in now. After the house burned down he and Margaret had a planning meeting, he said they always discussed things together when they were making plans or chang-

That is when they made the picnic and play area. That was in 1977 and landscaped by Gary Mabis.

They have two daughters and five grandchildren.

Christie Williamson lives here in Antwerp and has 2 girls, Morgan and Rachel and one boy Sam. Nikki Zuber lives in Van Wert and has three girls, Madison, Brooke and Taylor.

When you talk to Larry about their lives and the past and the memories, his eyes twinkle, his grin gets bigger and his gray hair sparkles a little. He has always helped, and when he could, he contributed and helped to make the town better. He is very grateful for the good business, but especially all for the good friends he has made here.

To slow down a little bit, he sold the Pop & Brew to Mr. Slattery from Hicksville.

I asked about his sales and amounts of burgers and hot dogs. He remembers his biggest day was a few years back on the second Tuesday night after opening in the Spring (Tuesday's is Coney's Day). They sold 1,587 hot dogs that day. That was by far their biggest day and they were busy from opening until closing time that night.

Margaret passed away in 2005 after an extended illness. It was a very sad time for everybody.

I asked Larry if they've had any dignitaries stop in. He said Shirley Muldoon, she was a champion drag strip driver. Van Halen and his rock group and Heart has stopped in. He said there have been others, but these have been the most impressive.

Yes, the A & W is part of Antwerp's history. Larry has managed it for 36 years and we hope for many more. He puts in a lot of hours for 8 months during their open season. He then rests by taking a couple trips to Ft. Meyers Beach, Florida in the winter.
