THE END OF THE SPEAR: **OUT IN THEATERS JANU-ARY 20**

A major film, called End Of The Spear, will be launched January 20.

I believe God will use it in a big way. It depicts the effects of the grace of God in very powerful and spectacular ways.

The story begins in 1956, when five Christian missionaries (Jim Elliot was among them) gave their lives in an Ecuadorian jungle, attempting to bring the gospel to the Waodani people. At that time they were the most violent tribe on Earth—and yet they became the most loving and peaceful!

The missionaries made friendly contact, but something went terribly wrong. The Waodani speared them to death. A tragedy? Yes, but God turns everything to good, for the blessing of many and for His glory, and this was no exception.

He also used two women to complete the work of the five martyred missionaries, bringing the Waodani to himself. Beginning January 20, End Of The Spear will be shown in theaters across the United States. If it does well it will be accepted by many other theaters, but it must do well right from the start.

This is where you and I come in. We can make the film do well. Our prayers can make it prosper. We can work together to get at least 100,000 people to see the film on January 20. 

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"FROM THE VANTAGE POINT": SKILLS FOR TO-MORROW

At Vantage Career Center, there are nine different high school Trade and Industrial programs. Here is a brief look at those programs.

In the Ag Diesel Mechanics program, students learn the techniques for the maintenance, service and repair of industrial diesel and agricultural equipment and engines. Students in Ag Diesel Mechanics belong to the Vantage FFA Chapter.

Auto Body students learn the basic skills of collision repair and refinishing, as well as auto body and shop management skills. Performing repairs to plastic and fiberglass components are unique skills of this trade.

The two-year Auto Technology program provides hands-on experience in the areas of hydraulic brake systems, automotive engines and suspension systems. Students learn the skills required to inspect, repair and adjust vehicles.

In the Precision Machining Technology program, students learn to operate and use lathes, grinders, mills and computer numerical controlled (CNC) machines to shape metal into useable tools and parts. Blueprint reading, computer aided drafting (CAD) and manufacturing processes are emphasized throughout the program.

The Vantage Welding program is a nationally recognized AWS (American Welding Society) training and testing facility. Students have the opportunity to earn industry certifications in plate and pipe welding. This program has earned the National Exemplary designation in career-technical education.



Employees of the Department of Homeland Security work hard everyday to protect our borders and secure our country. Unfortunately, this lapse in judgment caused us all to doubt their effectiveness and judgment. After receiving a call from Manuel's lawyer, my office immediately began working on his behalf to ensure that officials used the discretion they were afforded. In all, my office placed more than 30 phone calls on Manuel's behalf including calls to five different agencies and the



LAUS DEO AND THE WASH-INGTION MONUMENT

One detail that is not mentioned in Washington, DC, is that there can never be a building of greater height than the Washington Monument.

With all the uproar about removing the ten commandments, etc . . . this is worth a moment or two of your time. I was not aware of this historical information.

On the aluminum cap, atop the Washington Monument in Washington DC, are displayed two words: Laus Deo. No one can see these words. In fact, most visitors to the monument are totally unaware they are even there and for that matter, probably couldn't care less.

Once you know Laus Deo's history, you will want to share this with everyone you know. But these words have been there for many years; they are 555 feet, 5.125 inches high, perched atop the monument, facing skyward to the Father of our nation, overlooking the 69 square miles which comprise the District of Columbia, capital of the United States of America.

Laus Deo! Two seemingly insignificant, un-noticed words. Out of sight and, one might think, out of mind, but very meaningfully placed at the highest point over what is the most powerful city in the most successful nation in the world.

So, what do those two words, in Latin, composed of just four syllables and only seven letters, possibly mean? Very simply, they say: "Praise be to God!'

Though construction of this giant obelisk began in 1848, when James Polk was President of the United States, it was not until 1888 that the monument was inaugurated and opened to the public. It took twenty-five years to finally cap the memorial with a tribute to the Father of our nation, Laus Deo . . . Praise be to God!"

From atop this magnificent granite and marble structure, visitors may take in the beautiful panoramic view of the city with it's division into four major segments. From that vantage point, one can also easily see the original plan of the designer, Pierre Charles l'Enfant . . . a perfect cross imposed upon the landscape, with the White House to the north. The Jefferson Memorial is to the south, the Capitol to the east and the Lincoln Memorial to the west.

A cross you ask ? Why a cross? What about separation

read on. How interesting and, no doubt, intended to carry a profound meaning for those who bother to notice.

Praise be to God! Within the monument itself are 898 steps and 50 landings. As one climbs the steps and pauses at the landings the memorial stones share a message. On the 12th Landing is a prayer offered by the City of Baltimore; on the 20th is a memorial presented by some Chinese Christians; on the 24th a presentation made by Sunday School children from New York and Philadelphia quoting Proverbs 10:7, Luke 18:16 and Proverbs 22:6.

Praise be to God!

When the cornerstone of the Washington Monument was laid on July 4th, 1848 deposited within it were many items including the Holy Bible presented by the Bible Society. Praise be to God! Such was the discipline, the moral direction, and the spiritual mood given by the founder and first President of our unique democracy "One Nation, Under God."

I am awed by Washington's prayer for America. Have you never read it?

Well, now is your unique opportunity, so read on!

"Almighty God; We make our earnest prayer that Thou wilt keep the United States in Thy holy protection; that Thou wilt incline the hearts of the citizens to cultivate a spirit of subordination and obedience to government; and entertain a brotherly affection and love for one another and for their fellow citizens of the United states at large." And finally that Thou wilt most graciously be pleased to dispose us all to do justice, to love mercy, and to demean ourselves with that charity, humility, and pacific temper of mind which were the characteristics of the Divine Author of our blessed religion, and without a humble imitation of whose example in these things we can never hope to be a happy nation. Grant our supplication, we beseech Thee, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Laus Deo!

When one stops to observe the inscriptions found in public places all over our nation's capitol, he or she will easily find the signature of God, as it is unmistakably inscribed everywhere you look.

You may forget the width and height of "Laus Deo", it's location, or the architects but no one who reads this will be able to forget it's meaning, or these words: "Unless the Lord builds the house its builders labor in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city. the watchmen stand guard in vain." (Psalm 127: 1)

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PAULDING COUNTY HOS-PITAL PATIENT VOLUME INCREASES

CEO Gary Adkins reported to the board at its recent meeting that PCH's patient volume increased eight percent in 2005. Patient volume has increased 24 percent over the last four years. "We are pleased that the community, which we exist to serve, continues to trust us with their healthcare needs. We are committed to maintaining that trust and continuing to improve the services we offer," said Adkins.

Chief financial officer Rob Goshia reported a net loss in November of \$8,772 and a year to date net profit of \$399,059.

Also, Goshia presented a capital expense request for a Universal Ring Retractor System costing \$12,425. The system will aid PCH's general surgeon, Dr. William Strawter, in major abdominal surgeries.

Chief operating officer Randy Ruge reported that the Ohio Department of Health surveyed the radiology department and everything went well.

Ruge also informed the board that surgery volumes were up significantly in October and November. There were 80 cases in November and a hospital record high of 91 in October.

Adkins' CEO report included: -The direct mail educa-

tional target-marketing project is on schedule to start in mid–January. Information on a variety of PCH healthcare services will be mailed to the population segments most affected. For example, January's topic is osteoporosis and postcards advising women of the importance of early detection will be mailed to female residents age 50 years and older.


-Another marketing initiative is on track to start February. First-time PCH users will be mailed information giving an overview of several hospital services.

-Adkins met with local hospital administrators regarding opportunities to improve our specialty clinics.

-The PCH Foundation's Bright Lights for a Bright Tomorrow project was successful; \$1295 was raised for the foundation.

-The hospital's holiday dinner to thank hospital supporters such as medical staff, elected officials, volunteer groups, etc. was held December 16.

-Adkins met with state Medicaid Managed Care officials regarding the impact it has on Paulding County. He will meet with PCH's medical staff soon to review the information.

To keep pace with the demands of changing times, the functions, duties and obligations of the township have changed over the years. Demands for increased or different services have prompted the state legislature to grant Ohio's 1309 townships the authority to fulfill these changing demands. The care and maintenance of the township road system is the largest function of townships today. Other responsibilities may include: fire protection, zoning, cemeteries, park and recreation, drainage, police protection, waste disposal, and various other public con-

cerns. Its officials understand the local problems and can devote more attention to individual concerns than the county, state or federal levels of governments.

The trustees and a fiscal officer, each elected for a four-year term, administer each of our townships today. Like any organization or unit of government, a township is what its residents make it. This requires personal involvement, which starts with getting to know those who serve the township in these offices. Fortunately, getting to know your local township officials is simple. They are your neighbors. They welcome your interest and encourage your questions and suggestions.

We encourage you to get in touch with your township officials. They are good people who are dedicated to looking after your community's best interests.



ANTWERP HISTORY

This week we will continue on about the Harrmann Tile Mill. The Mill made regular brick and then those double bricks. If you remember on the east side of the road there is a grainery made of their double bricks. On the corn crib sides they turned the open end of the brick toward the outside. This let the air come in and dry the ear corn. They turned the big brick sideways and made the overhead grain bins. That grainery has been standing there for nearly 100 years and is in very great condition.

A number of houses were made from Harrmann bricks. When you go west on U.S. 24 and cross the state line, the second house on the right side was a big house where Ira Hershberger lived. He had a gasoline station right across the road on the south side of 24 and you can still see the turn off there. The next place on west has a barn with the words 'Suits Us' on it. Well, that house has been remodeled. It used to be a two story house made of Harmann's bricks. Their name was Lindemuth and she was relation to Nickolas Harrmann. It was a nice looking brick farm house for many years.

Eddie Snyder tells me that the Lindemuths were relation to his father Nathan Snyder.

There was another house made of Harrmann's bricks on 204 1 ¹/₂ miles east of S. R. 49 on the left (north) side of the road. But it has been torn down. There are still some of those brick houses still standing today. For instance, there on the corner of Harrmann Road and East Canal Street, back in the 1930's Mr. & Mrs. Paul Chester lived there. He was a guard at the Ohio State Prison. Their children had to walk to and from school each day because that house was inside the Corporation Limits. Those girls walked to school on hundreds of blistering cold days. Now they could ride on a school bus. The way they run the buses is a lot better. Now children living inside the Corporation Limits can be picked up by a school bus at a designated area. If you go on south on the

Harrmann Road and turn left at the blinking light on to Cement Plant Road and go on east past the F.S.C. & E., on the right side you will see a silo and the remains of a home site. Back in the 30's that was one of Harrmann's farms. It had a huge barn and cattle building and a grainery and a nice house. The people who lived there were named Neidhart, Later Mark retired from the Antwerp School system as a janitor. They had a boy named Allen who graduated with me back in 1942. In later years he was in the grocery business in southern California.

Going back up to the tile mill site, there was a number of ponds, where they took out the clay for the tile, but only the biggest pond held water. Lots of people skated there in the winter and everyone had a good time and Mr. Harrmann didn't care, but no one bothered the pond in the summer. I think Nicholas Harrmann

started the tile mill business. Otho Harrmann was born in 1872 and probable was a big part in the operation. I know he was a very good farmer later on. He hated weeds, he always had clean fields and good crops.

Otha's wife was named Laura, I never seen or knew Nick's wife. I think she had already passed away. Otho died in 1964, and his wife in 1940. They had one son. Henry, who died in 1959.

The little bit that I have put down here does not do justice to the Harrmanns and to the scope of their enterprises at that time.

Well, I guess that is about all I can write about in this I've tried to put down what I've had to veer from that the times and situations. The next column will be some of Antwerp history and a lot of

While I do not have the authority to alter the decisions of an agency, I do urge officials that if a mistake has been made, it be corrected swiftly. In cases such as Manuel's, my job is to use the influence of my office to ensure he is treated in accordance with the laws of our land.

The United States remains a welcoming nation; however, Manuel Bartsch was caught up in the illegal immigration crisis spreading across our country. The U.S. will always be a target and must balance the needs of those good people wishing to share in the American dream against the threat of our enemies who would use our generosity to harm us. Because officials are now working to correct

the flow of illegal immigration which has come through our borders, good people like Manuel Bartsch, get mired in a bureaucratic nightmare.

The front door to our nation reads "give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breath free." While America has changed greatly since the days of Ellis Island, laws without compassion have no place in our society. Federal law did not mandate Manuel's arrest and my only hope is that through his release, a level of compassion and commonsense has been shown by the government, albeit overdue, and faith has not been lost in those good people who serve our nation as government servants. I am also hopeful that the Department of Homeland Security's review of this situation will help prevent similar injustices from happening in the future.

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
