Sylvan Learning Center Tips for helping your children when they are struggling to get good grades

It's that time of the school year again – report card time. While many students will come home with good grades, others would rather stuff their report cards deep into their backpacks than show them to their parents. As parents, you want your child to do well in school, so what do you do when your child's report card isn't as good as it should be?

Children get frustrated and upset when their report cards show they are doing poorly. Understanding your child's ability and determining if your expectations are too high will allow both you and your child to set appropriate goals for each class before

report cards are distributed. It will also help establish an environment in which your child is not apprehensive about sharing his/her report card with you.

Sylvan offers the following tips for parents on how to deal with a poor report card:

1. Set expectations. Not every child will earn all A's, but that doesn't mean your child should strive for less. Talk with your child before the school year starts and explain that you won't be upset if he doesn't bring home all A's—but that you will be upset if he doesn't try his hardest and doesn't ask for help.

2. Communicate with your child. Don't wait until report cards are issued to talk with your child about school and grades. Talk with her every night and every week about homework. Ask how she is doing in school and what subjects she finds challenging.

3. Discuss your child's performance with his teacher and/or guidance counselor. Your child's teacher and/or guidance counselor is the best source for information about your child's scholastic performance. Your child's teacher can recommend ways to help your child or point out difficulties he is having. His guidance counselor can provide progress reports between reports cards or help set up additional parent-teacher conferences when necessary.

4. Set goals for improvement with your child. If your child is currently a C student -- then setting a goal of getting all A's may not be reasonable. However, creating an improvement goal for each subject will help her work toward an attainable level for each class.

5. Establish a study plan with your child. Your child should keep a schedule of all classes, assignments and key dates (e.g., project deadlines, big exams, etc). As part of that schedule, she should include specific time for studying, projects and extracurricular activities. The more comprehensive the schedule, the more efficient your child will be in completing her homework and the better she'll do in school.

6. Seek outside help. Some children may need additional attention that can't be provided in school. Speak with your child's teacher about tutoring or supplemental education providers to help your child work toward better grades in school.


7. Praise your child's successes. Praise your child for what he is doing well, whether it's a specific academic subject or an extracurricular activity. If your child is not doing well in English, but loves to read the latest Harry Potter book, show him the connection between the two.



TREE CUTTING FOR U.S. 24 PROJECT TO BEGIN

LIMA - Tree cutting along a three-mile stretch of U.S. 24 west of Defiance in preparation for the first of the Fort to Port projects which will expand U.S. 24 is expected to begin this week said Norman R. Redick, Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) District 1 deputy director.

The trees will be cut within right of way purchased by ODOT for construction of the first section of U.S. 24 which will be built between Ohio 424 and Ohio 15 west of Defiance. The contractor for the tree-cutting project, D.C. Cunningham of Waterford, is required to have all trees cut down in the right of way by April 15 to comply with environmental requirements.

The majority of the felled trees and stumps will be left until construction of the roadway begins to limit the disruption to the soil and reduce erosion. Trees cut near private residences will be removed but the stumps will remain until construction begins. All material resulting from the cutting is the property of the contractor, said Redick.

The \$35 million project to construct the roadway will be placed out for contractor bid on March 8. Construction will begin in the spring and is expected to be completed fall of 2008. "We're excited to be part of this historic time for transportation in Ohio as the first project to expand U.S. 24 in our region begins," said Redick.

The project between Ohio 424 and Ohio 15 will include the construction of two additional lanes in the westbound direction to expand the route to four lanes, the upgrade of the Ohio 15/18 interchange to a three-lane structure, construction of an overpass to carry U.S. 24 over West High Street/Switzer Road, construction of a connector road between Ohio 15/18 (Ralston Avenue) and West High Street, and replacement of the Maumee and Tiffin River bridges.

Traffic on U.S. 24 will be maintained at all times during construction. West High Street/Switzer Road will be closed for approximately one month during the third year of construction while work to realign the roads is completed.

The project is the first of four to be constructed within Paulding, Defiance and Henry counties which will expand the route to a four-lane, limited access highway. The second project to be constructed will add two additional lanes on U.S. 24 between Defiance and Napoleon. That project is set to be placed out for contractor bid in October. ANTWERP HISTORY

By: Stan Jordan

Back in the late 1930's, the Ohio national Guard had an infantry company that held its meetings once a month in the Armory in Paulding. The men came from all over Paulding County and quite a number from Antwerp. Captain Henry Donnell was the commanding officer.

I remember back in 1938 or '39 they were called to Toledo to help handle the problems that arose from a labor strike. Those strikers got down right unruly and one lad of Antwerp, Ralph Laisure, was wounded in the head by some sort of shrapnel.

By 1940 there was already war in Europe and war clouds were forming all over the world. Japan was at war in Asia and flexing here muscles all over the far East.

The news came out that the Ohio National Guard was going to mobilize and go to Mississippi for a year. Some more boys signed up for the year of training. This was in September of 1940. These troops all got on the train at Cecil to make the trip south. Lots of people went to see their boys off, an event that happened many times in a few months. Some of these boys, never returned. Some came from Hicksville and other towns and counties.

Robert Wycoff was born in Hicksville in 1922. He joined the Guards because they were told they would be back in a year. He said there was 15-20 boys from Antwerp when he went with Co."A". Most of them was about his age 18-20 years of age.

The train took them to

Camp Shelby for their infantry training and they never had a clue of the things to come

This column is about Bob Wycoff because he is the only soldier remaining alive that left from Antwerp with Co. "A". At the same time this is in honor and memoriam of all our boys who got on that train on that day.

They entrained in Shelby and the war clouds were getting thicker, so the government extended their one year enlistment to the duration of the war and six months

When December 7 came they already were headed for Indian Tour Gap, PA for further training. They were there for more extensive training and were fully equipped with all new winter clothing and again put on a troop train. Three days later they detrained at San Francisco. In a few days they were all on a transport troop ship. After about a week they turned in all their winter clothes and we were issued lighter uniforms.

They landed in the South Pacific in the Fiji Islands in a town called Suba. They were there for quite a few months getting used to the heat and a lot of jungle training. Here they got some new men, but still not at full strength.

The Marines had taken Quadacanal and the entire 37th Division was sent there to help mop up and to guard a huge supply dump and Henderson Field. There was a lot of Japs lift here and they needed the supplies, this carried on for a few days with a lot of close in-fighting.

Bob's memory gets a little hazy about here because it was over 60 years ago. He says they were in the Solomon Islands and some other places, a lot of action in New Georgia.

My brother, Jim Jordan, was the heavy weapons platoon sergeant and over the years I talked to him a number of times about the war in the South Pacific. He told me more than once that Bob was a good soldier. In the Army you cannot pay a better compliment to a soldier. That means he can and will do his job and you can rely on him. When they moved forward on a jungle trail, he always put Bob as rear guard. That position was just as important as the man in front guard. On more than one occasion Bob killed some Japs trying to infiltrate the rear of the column Bob told me that his father, John B. Wycoff volunteered into the Navy in the early 1940's and served as a Master Barber, as

that was his trade. Bob was telling me that types of crawly things, heat, rain and if nature called, that too

In 1944, on New Georgia Bob took a rifle bullet through the middle part of his left arm and tendered it useless. So after a few medical depots he was flown to a New Zealand hospital for about a month and then on to McCluskey General Hospital in the states. After weeks of therapy on his arm he was sent to a hospital in Waco, Texas. While he was there getting his arm back in shape, he helped train recruits for overseas duty, using the experience that he had picked up over there.

Bob's arm was giving him some trouble and was ordered to go to a medical unit. They looked up his service record and he had way over 120 discharge points and all only needed 85, so they sent him home with an Honorable Discharge in the spring of 1945. His Army life as a Tech Sergent was over, but friends, we just covered 5 years of his life.

Back in Co. "A' they were fighting in the Philippines and it was very rough going. Another Antwerp soldier who helped with Co. "A" was Max Seslar. He was killed by a mortar round while fighting in the streets of Manila.

By now most of the original men who left with the Co. "A" were either wounded or sent home with enough discharge points by mid-1945.

One other soldier from Antwerp is Art Kraley, he lives in southern Michigan and I didn't get to interview him.

Henry Donnell was Co. "A" Captain when they left for duty. He was promoted a few times and left "A" Co. He became a full Col. And served as liaison officer for the 148th regiment.

I know there are some more veterans of "A" Co. who are still alive in Paulding County.

These few pages are dedicated in their honor.

Thank you, fellows from another veteran who didn't have it as hard as you did.



The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, January 9, 2006 and Wednesday, January 11, 2006.

Three officers of the Paulding County Senior Fair Board met with the Commissioners during the January 9 session. In attendance were Carolyn Berry, Randy Goyings and Tony Zartman, the new Chairman. Zartman presented information on plans for the Fair and the Fairgrounds. He shared with the Commissioners that the Fair Board has been successful signing a contract with an amusement ride company starting with the 2006 Fair. Commissioner Marty Harmon indicated that he "appreciated the time the three Fair Board members took out of their day to attend the meeting and report on plans and progress. Their enthusiasm is encouraging," concluded Harmon.

At the same meeting the Commissioners elected Marty Harmon as the Chairman for 2006. Harmon takes on the new role from Commissioner Tony Burkley. Burkley has served as Chairman for several years. Harmon commented that he "would like to thank Tony Burkley for his years of service as an excellent leader for the Board of Commissioners. I plan to maintain the same quality of

During the afternoon of January 9 the Paulding County Records Commission held its semi-annual meeting. The Records Commission members are Commissioner Chairman Marty Harmon, County Prosecutor Joe Burkard, County Auditor Bill Bolenbaugh, County Recorder Susie Thrasher and County Clerk Ann Waldman. The Records Commission reviews all requests to dispose of obsolete records. Original historical documents are preserved. The Commission looks at the requests and ensures that the records to be disposed meet the standards for records retention established in Ohio statute.

The Commissioners attended the open house for the new Economic Development office late on Tuesday afternoon. The newly renovated offices, located in the building that held Moore's Clothing, now houses Paulding County Economic Development, the Paulding County Area Foundation and the Marshall Memorial Supporting Foundation.

The Wednesday, January 11, 2006 meeting included the annual discussion with Don Foltz, the local insurance agent for the County vehicle, building and liability insurance, and John Brownlee, representing the County Risk Sharing Authority (CORSA.) Small counties in Ohio, including Paulding County, are joined together to purchase the insurance. The size of the group allows for far more advantageous rates than each county purchasing independently. Annually the Commissioners meet with the agents to review claims and any actions that can be taken to keep claims low. Brownlee reported that the county has very good experience with far better claims history than the average for other counties.

The Commissioners meet in regular session from 8:00 a.m. to the close of business on Mondays and Wednesdays. County offices will be closed on Monday, January 16 for the recognition of Martin Luther King's birthday.

Always make sure you are wearing your eye wear to protect your eyes. They have different types of eye wear so you will not get "raccoon eyes".


