### ODOT TO ACCEPT APPLICA-**TIONS FOR SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROJECTS**

Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Director Gordon Proctor today announced ODOT will begin accepting letters of interest of January 1, 2007 for the state's first round of funding through the Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program.

The program will provide approximately \$3 million in federal funding the first half of 2007, for projects that will make it safer and more appealing for children in kindergarten through eighth grade to walk or ride their bikes to school. The program will provide approximately \$5 million dollars of funding a year through 2009 for a variety of activities from educational, encouragement, planning activities and health projects to infrastructure projects such as sidewalks, pedestrian and bike paths, crosswalks, traffic calming or bike racks.

These projects are unique for ODOT," said Proctor. "They can not only help improve infrastructure, but also support programs that help make it safer and more appealing for children to walk or ride their bikes to school."

The program was created by the recent federal transportation bill, which specifies how states can spend federal gas tax dollars.

—The program is 100 percent federally funded through the Federal Highway Administration, which means there will be no required match from applicants.

-A minimum of 10 percent and a maximum of 30 percent of Ohio's allocation must be used for non-infrastructure related activities such as education, enforce-





### **CARL KOKER VISITS ANT-**WERP

Last week Carl and Rose visited their daughter and son-in-law, Lisa and Tim Derck. This time it wasn't a typical family get together. While enjoying family time, Carl and Rose had a number of interviews about the upcoming movie "We Are Marshall". It is about the Marshall University football team plane crash in 1970, where Carl was assistant coach at that time. All 75 people on board the plane were killed, which obliterated most of the football team. Carl, two other coaches and several players were not on the plane.

The crash has been called the "worst sports tragedy in history".

Warner Brothers went to Carl and Rose's house in the Spring of 2006 to talk about making a movie.

In August, Carl and Rose traveled to Atlanta where most of the movie was filmed. Carl met with the actors, got to know them and they got to know him which helped them greatly.

Carl says his not being on the plane was meant to be. His role as a coach also was extended as a listener. He listened to the boys and afterwards he listened to the parents and anyone who wanted to talk about the crash. He was there and saw how the crash affected everyone. Even to this day, people want to talk about it, to find a connection and they do this through Carl and the other ones not on the plane.

The movie, backed by Wal-

tington, West Virginia where Marshall College is. The college has a ceremony on the date of the crash to remember the ones who lost their lives.

tle things that are not in the movie.

He shared about four boys in the crash that had taken care of him after he broke his ankle. They set a room up in the dorm for him, made sure he ate, kept the room clean, did his laundry, etc.

He will remember the reunion in 2000 of everyone involved at that time. Rose has made a scrapbook about the crash and things pertaining to it. He and Rose were on the set when they made the movie and he was assigned a girl to follow him around and make sure he was where he was supposed to be as far as make-up and wardrobe. He told them he had the 1970 clothes in his closet. He acts as a reporter in the movie. You will see Rose in the stands watching the game.

The film mostly focuses on the happenings after the crash. What the new head coach was up against plus finding new players for the football team. At that time Freshman couldn't play football but the NCAA wavered that rule so Marshall could recruit a new team.



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### **CONGRESS RECOMMENDS DAILY VITAMIN**

Congress recently passed the Older Americans Act Amendments of 2006<sup>1</sup>. With this law, Congress officially acknowledged the benefits of a daily multivitamin and affirmed that good nutrition is vital to good health. It further stated that good nutrition may reduce the risk of chronic diseases, such as cardiovascular disease, osteoporosis, diabetes, macular degeneration, and cancer. Older adults can be particularly susceptible to nutrient deficiencies for a number of reasons, including a reduced capacity to absorb and utilize nutrients, difficulty chewing, loss of appetite and limitations resulting from living on a fixed income.

Evidence suggests the use of a single daily multivitamin-mineral supplement may effectively address nutritional gaps in the elderly population, especially the poor. Multivitamin-mineral supplements, Congress explains, may help fill a specific identified nutrient gap not being met by the individual's intake of food. The Amendments suggests "use of a single daily multivita-min-mineral supplement can be a safe and inexpensive strategy to help ensure the nutritional health of older adults.'

These are important determinations because, citing statistics from the NIH (National Institutes of Health), Congress stated that approximately 40 percent of older adults living in the community are malnourished. Estimates rise for those in home care (20 to 60 percent) and those in nursing homes (40 to 85 percent).

Specifically, Congress also suggests that nutrition services funded by the government consider supplying a single, daily multivitaminmineral supplement to help ensure the nutritional health of older adults. This appears to be the first time Congress has officially recognized the health benefits of a multivitamin-mineral supplement in this population.

While applauding Congress's foresight in recom-



### LEGISLATION WORKS TO PROVIDE TAX RELIEF TO SOLDIERS AND SENIORS

For every major conflict in which the United States has been involved, Ohioans have been there to answer the call to duty. These brave men and women come from all walks of life and all different parts of the state, but when their services are called upon, they have stood united under one goal-to defend this country's freedoms and protect its way of life. While we can never fully repay these people for the sacrifices they have made, I think we can all agree that everything possible should be done to make sure they are taken care of during and after their service.

Over the last several years, from scholarship programs to tax relief to protecting the families of those fighting overseas, the Ohio General Assembly has worked hard to provide needed benefits to our military personnel. In fact, just recently, the General Assembly passed legislation that looks to correct a longstanding unfairness in Ohio law that requires Ohio soldiers stationed outside Ohio to pay state and school district income taxes, despite the fact that they don't currently benefit from the government services those tax dollars support. The problem is that under current Ohio law, military pay is taxed for individuals who show Ohio as their last state of civilian residency.

While existing law does provide income tax exemptions to Ohio soldiers stationed in a combat zone, it does not extend this benefit to men and women stationed elsewhere.

House Bill 73, legislation sponsored by Representative James Trakas (R-Independence) extending this tax ben-



efit to all military personnel, ensuring that Ohio's servicemen and women aren't under a stricter residency standard for tax purposes than the rest of Ohioans who earn income outside the state. Specifically, the bill provides an income tax exemption for military pay and allowances received for active duty outside of Ohio. In addition, the measure would restrict the taxation of this income by school districts. Not only is this the right thing to do for our soldiers, it is a common-sense tax policy that will hopefully encourage many of our active duty military personnel to keep homes here without the fear that they will have to pay more in income taxes because of it. HB 73 also looks to dis-

courage the exodus of semiretired and retired Ohioans who live out of state for parts of the year. Most of us know an older resident in our communities-perhaps a neighbor, parent, grandparent, etc.who has chosen to spend a portion of their retirement in Florida or some other warm weather climate. It is difficult to blame these folks for wanting to escape the cold weather, unfortunately, many native Ohioans purposely spend more time out of the state than they normally would to avoid paying income taxes in Ohio. HB 73 loosens the time frames on residency requirements that require them to pay these taxes. The idea is that these changes will encourage individuals to spend more time with their families in Ohio, thereby contributing to local communities, charitable organizations, and the economy.

Throughout the 126th General Assembly, we have worked to move our state forward economically. Through tax reform and other incentives to attract businesses and create jobs, we have laid a foundation for success. House Bill 73 is another important piece of this economic recovery puzzle, because keeping people living and working in the here is what will help our communities prosper and grow.

# HINTS FOR HOMEOWNERS

### **Increase Comfort And Savings This Winter**

(NAPSA)—Don't let your heating bills leave you cold. While high fuel prices mean heating your home can take a bite out of your budget, you can reduce home heating costs and protect your property by following a few simple money-saving tips:

• Check your roof. Replace loose or missing shingles, and be sure the flashing around the chimney or vent pipe is watertight.

• Look for leaks around doors, windows and the entry points for pipes and ducts. Apply caulk, weather stripping, plastic or door sweeps as necessary to seal off leaks and prevent drafts.

• Visit a home improvement center to find out how much insulation is recommended for homes in your area, then check the insulation in your attic to be sure it's adequate.

• Prepare your home heating system by changing or cleaning your furnace filter, clearing debris away from intake and exhaust vents and making an appointment with a service technician to inspect your system.

• Minimize the use of ventilation fans, which can quickly suck heated air out of your house.

Check the temperature of your hot water heater to be certain it isn't set too high, and wrap your water heater in an insulated blanket to prevent heat loss.





### ANTWERP HISTORY

### By: Stan Jordan

The above picture is the centerfold of a booklet given to each of those students when they closed the Erter School on April 22, 1927. This picture was loaned to us by Leroy Slattery as he attended this school also. But we need to start a little earlier here in Leroy's case.

Leroy was born in 1917, son of Frank and Katheryn Slattery, there in the home place or as it was called. The Slattery's had lived there well over 100 years.

Leroy went to the Henpeck School for the first two grades. Neola Gordon was the teacher there. That school was closed in 1924 and all of the students were transferred to the Erter School. That was up on the corner of CR 230 and Road 53, about a mile and a half walk each way.

He went to the Erter School three years: 1925, 1926 and 1927. He relates



that at that time Wilber Hopkins bought a new 1927 Chevrolet School Bus and carried all these pupils to Antwerp Grade School. Leroy started in the second grade and Mrs. Secrist was the teacher.

You see on that list was Robert and Charles Dangler. They lived across from the school on Road 230 where Duane Gordon lives now. Years later, Robert Dangler was killed in a farm tractor accident. Charles lived most of his later life in the Bryan area. Herman Gordon graduated from Antwerp and settled down and was a farmer in the same area at the Erter School.

There was three Campton children: Lucille, Leonard and Howard-they moved to Van Wert about that time.

Marjorie Evans married Robert Armstrong and they lived in Defiance. One of their children is now Mayor of that city.

Ronald Miller, he was married and lived in the Edgerton area.

Alice Erter graduated and later on was married to Eli Knapp.

Lois Morhart married Eddie Reeb and for years lived east of Hicksville on SR 18. I understand she lives with her son Jim in the Ney area. Jim is a minister there.

Chester Franks is gone now but he lived northeast of Hicksville most of his life.

Leroy Slattery is next on the list, but we will talk more about him later.

Paul Evans graduated from Antwerp and went on to be an undertaker. He was in business in Hicksville and



Isabelle Hopkins later on married Harry Parent and moved to the New Haven area, he was a Chevrolet car dealer. One of their children is J. Rex Parent and he is the noted owner of Fort Wayne Opthalmology.

Ralph Morhart was a farmer and lived most of his life on the County Line Road. Later on they moved to Hicksville.

Gerald Miller was married to Ruth Tracy and lived in Hicksville. He was a pretty good Ford mechanic.

There was a Roy Johnson and a Goldie Johnson and I think they moved away in the summer of 1927.

Della Franks later on married Clarence Copsey and they lived for years at the east end of the "Henpeck Road".

Anna Franks was a sister to Chester and Della Franks, but I couldn't find out anything about her.

Eleanor Evans was a sister to Margery and Paul, she married Bob Zuber and lived in Defiance. They also had a sister, Nina. They were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Evans and lived where Neil Ramsier lives.

Gordon Erter married Lillian Wentworth and lived east of the Grange Hall about where Gilda Culler lives now. Later on they moved to the Hicksville area.

You can see that Gladys Boylan was the teacher for many years.

These country schools were under the supervision of the Antwerp School Board.

Sharold Ehrhart Jailor tells me that her mother lived in that area. She was born in 1923 and started

road and she was overbearing, on his back and bossing him all the time. The man was so "henpecked" that the neighbors called it "The Henpecked Road". I have always heard it referred to as that and it could be right.

woman who lived on that

Well, I wondered when the "Old One Room Schools" were closed, so I see it was not all at once. They closed 3 in this area in four years and some had been closed already for 9-10 years. So I guess it was all the way from 1919 to 1929.

In last week's article, there was a couple of errors. It should have read 1844, where it read 1944. In another place it mentioned "Luther" had four children. That should have read "Leota" had four children. Luther and Nina had a daughter, Charmaine, but she and her husband are gone now. (I apologize for the errors in Stan's article last week—Sue). But the big error in last week's article, I made. I wrote that Ruth Meely had two boys, well she had three boys, Bruce, Jerry and Jack. One is an undertaker in Ada, Ohio, one is a doctor and ophthalmologist in Fairborn and the other is an optometrist in Newark, Ohio. I get to visit with Ruth pretty often and I hope when I get to be 91 years of age that I will be as sharp and alert as she is.

Well, friends and readers, I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of you a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year's.

I have been writing this column for 16 months and I enjoy going back into the 1920's and 1930's. I have heard from a lot of old friends and a lot of new ones also. I keep all their letters and notes. Sometimes while I'm writing at the kitchen table the enjoyable nostalgia runs pretty deep.

P.S. A couple of weeks ago when we showed the 1908 picture of the Stinger School House it showed two students, Joe and Francis Cook and I stated that we couldn't find out anything about those two. Well, Elmer Woodcox tells me that they grew up and moved in Antwerp on East Canal Street. Then they opened a bakery, what is now the first building north of Antwerp Ford Sales. This was in the late 1920's. Later on this became Seeley's Bakery and after that Ralph Schooley operated the bakery until around WWII.

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at the Forder School. That was just across the road to the west from the Bethel Church. She said that school was closed in 1928 or 1929 after which her mother attended Antwerp School.

Leroy Slattlery married Francis Drexler in 1943. Francis graduated with me back in 1942. They have been married 63 years. They have two boys: Ronald and Lynn. Leroy retired last month at the age of 89. For the last 20 years he had been furnishing transportation for the Amish. That man has been exceedingly busy all his life.

He has spent all his live in that area, so I asked him how did the name "Henpeck Road" come about? He said there was an old man and

the fourth or fifth grade we had a Basil Cook in our class and he lived on West Canal street.

Elmer is a descendant of Isaac Woodcox, who was already settled here in 1833 on a farm northeast of town. Then in 1840 he moved to town and built a hotel at the south end of Main Street. He helped survey and plot the town out in 1841. He helped with about every important phase of setting Antwerp and to help move it ahead. Isaac Woodcox was born in 1803. In 1833 he already had a farm here. He died in 1868 at the age of 66. He is buried here in the old cemetery uptown with a huge marble monument.

Thanks, again, Elmer.

In early 2006, the Auglaize Township Trustees (Gene Weidenhamer, Bill Wiles, Mike Weible) adopted a flag to represent Auglaize Township.

Along with the Township Name and Year founded (1840), the design features Shadrack Hudson's log house (first house built in Paulding County in either 1822 or 1823), the stone aqueduct (the township contains two), a waterway representing the Auglaize River, a tractor, animals and grain (depicting the agricultural heritage of the township), the Aug. Twp. Fire Department seal, and a star surrounding "2006", the year adopted.

With only 22 sections, Auglaize Township is the smallest county township due to the top half of the section being given to Defiance

address, the president, as part of the Advanced Energy Initiative announced, "We'll also fund additional research in cutting-edge methods of producing ethanol, not just from corn, but from wood chips and stalks, or switchgrass."

But what is switchgrass? Switchgrass is a perennial prairie grass growing naturally throughout the country, except in the far Western states. Since it is a native plant, switchgrass is resistant to many pests and diseases and can produce high yields with very low applications of fertilizers.

Since switchgrass grows well under a wide range of conditions, it has one of the highest potentials for use as a biofuel crop in the United States. Though ethanol from switchgrass is produced from cellulose in the stalks, it is identical to the ethanol currently produced from corn and has properties making it more attractive than corn ethanol.

Recent technological developments are not only improving yields, but are also driving down production costs, bringing us nearer to the day when cellulosic ethanol could significantly add to U.S. transportation fuel supply.

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


