# PAULDING FFA ATTENDS STATE CONVENTION



Paulding County was well represented at the State FFA Convention held in Columbus, Ohio, the first weekend in May 2007, where five students of Paulding FFA Advisor, Sarah Noggle, were awarded their State FFA Degrees in an impressive ceremony in the Ohio Expo Center.

All five agreed that the rigorous requirements to achieve the State Degree are well worth doing as they all feel there is a definite future for agriculture in Ohio. Before the application process can be started, these hardworking students completed 360 hours of school instruction in ag education, as well as earning at least \$1,000, or working at least 300 hours in excess of scheduled class time (or a combination thereof) in a supervised agricultural experience program.

In addition, a speech presentation, participation in at least five different FFA activities above the chapter level, and maintaining an excellent scholastic record are among the requirements.

To have five students earn their State Degrees

speaks especially well of their advisor, Mrs. Noggle. She has been the FFA advisor at Paulding High School for seven years, and has the "right stuff" to motivate her students. It is clear they think highly of her and are inspired by her to do their best.

Amber Gebers includes serving on the finance committee and Jr. Fair Board, as well as singing with the State FFA Choir and helping run the kiddie tractor pull at the Fair some of her memorable activities in FFA. She also works on her family farm and grooms her grandmother's yard and garden. She intends to attend Ohio State in the Business Adm. program.

David Fickel has FFA "in his blood" as he is following in his father's footsteps by earning his State Degree. He raises market hogs, helps on his family's farm and works for a local turkey processor. His plans include college, working toward a medical degree.

Elizabeth Gottke's two terms as chapter secretary and performing with the All-Ohio FFA Band, as well as representing her chapter on the Jr. Fair Board have kept her very busy. She also raises turkeys to show at the County Fair. Her plans after high school are to attend the OH State Beauty Academy and possibly have her own business.

Jerrod Knodel knows machinery and uses them by plowing snow in the winter, mowing lawns, as well as spreading fertilizer and landscaping area yards. He's in his second term as chapter treasurer and participates in a variety of chapter activities. Studying criminal justice at Ohio State after high school is in his future plans.

Caleb Schlatter helps farm more than 1,000 acres with his dad, and helps care for some 2,000 hogs on the family farm along with raising dairy feeder calves for the Fair. He is very active in all aspects of his chapter, and is in his third term as a chapter officer. He's looking forward to majoring in ag business at Ohio State.

All five interviewees agree that without the assistance of their sponsors and family, they would not have been able to excel in their chosen field of endeavor.

He was preceded in death by his wife; three brothers: Gaylord, Arthur, and Rolland.





#### **PAULDING COUNTY COM-**MISSIONERS

The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, April 25 and Monday, April 30, 2007.

Suvar, Waste Becky Management Education & Awareness (WMEA), met with the Commissioners on Wednesday, April 25, to present her funding proposal for the carryover dollars from 2006 allocated to Paulding County by the Four County Joint Solid Waste District. Ms. Suvar recently learned of Paulding County's \$33,645.46 fund distribution from Tim Houck, Coordinator of Four County Joint Solid Waste District, serving Defiance, Fulton, Paulding, and Williams Counties. Her proposal included a summer litter crew, purchase a new recycle trailer, purchase 100 recycling totes for schools and new businesses, and purchase a larger recycling van. Ms. Suvar explained the Four County Joint Solid Waste District operates very efficiently, utilizing grant funds to manage and recycle

#### **PAULDING COUNTY COM-**MISSIONERS

The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, May 2, and Monday, May 7, 2007.

Monday afternoon, April 30, Paulding County hosted the Four County Solid Waste District meeting, which includes Paulding, Fulton, Williams, and Defiance Counties. The meeting was held at Paulding County Economic Development conference room. It was decided to distribute \$33,645.00 to each of the four counties' solid waste programs. This money was awarded as a one-time conservation grant to the Four County Solid Waste District.

Board of Election's representatives; Jan Commers, Brenda Crawford, and Tony Langham met with the Commissioners on Wednesday, May 2. Discussion focused on storage of the new electronic voting machines and the increasing costs incurred to insure fair and accurate elections. Mr. Langham serves on the Board of Directors and he commended both Commers and Crawford for their efforts in running efficient elections.

Travis McGarvey, Paulding County Engineer, also met with the Commissioners on Wednesday to discuss the progress on repairing CR 179, stating work had already begun. CR 179 had to be closed due to a sixty-five (65) feet long slide into the Auglaize River. The Commissioners had declared it an emergency to suspend the normal bidding protocol due to the urgency in repair efforts to maintain traffic. McGarvey reported on several projects scheduled to begin soon; including CR 209 (Eagle Ditch), the widening of CR 60, and the

Joint Township 2007 Sealing Project.

Wednesday's scheduled appointments concluded with Kevin Burns, Wells Fargo Insurance agent; and Karla Linville, Pro-Claim, Inc. representative. In an effort to help contain rising health insurance costs, the County Insurance Committee recently voted to change to a partially self-funded policy through Wells Fargo Insurance with Pro-Claim as the Third Party Administrator. Mr. Burns and Ms. Linville explained new billing and claims processing procedures. County employees have been given the opportunity to enroll, if eligible, for the new policy effective June 1, 2007. New insurance identification cards and benefit books will be distributed before the effective date.

Commissioners Martin Harmon and Edward Straley attended ODOT's District One Government Day at the Ford UAW building in Lima on Friday, May 4. District One encompasses eight counties in northwest Ohio. Mr. Tim Burkeypile is the District's Deputy Director. During the meeting, ODOT announced the US 24 project from the Indiana state line to US 127 had been awarded to Mosser-Beaver. Their bid came in at \$72.8 million. It is anticipated work will begin in June.

Monday, May 7, Ms. Merium Underwood and Mr. Ed Collins representing Experience Works, a nonprofit organization based out of Lima servicing eight area counties. Experience Works places senior citizens in non-profit organizations for job training. Most workers are placed in a 20-hour a week temporary position at \$6.85 per hour.

Business concluded on Monday by reviewing the county employee's health insurance benefit plan to mirror the county's current benefits. Wells Fargo Insurance representative, Mr. Kevin Burns, Pro-Claim, Inc. representative, Karla Linville, and Paulding County Treasurer, Lou Ann Wannemacher joined the meeting to share their input. The county employees will be making a change to a partially selffunded health insurance policy on June 1, 2007.

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
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

Ruth Brubaker, she graduated with us but moved to Fort Wayne soon after school. I never heard from her, but she was some relation to the Oliver Reeb family


Robert Smitley, he is not pictured here, as soon as the WWII started, he enlisted in the Navy. He served two hitches in the Navy and then







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VIEWS FROM THE OUTSIDE

Another interesting stat is the migration in and out of the county. Migration means people moving into or out of the county. From 1993 to 1997 the in-migrants and out-migrants were about even with just a few more moving out each year than in, but since 1998 the outmigrants have increased and the in-migrants decreased. There's an ever widening gap between them now that amounts to several hundred each year. A few hundred a year may not seem like a lot but year after year it adds up. Reading these stats convinces me that the county should be trying to do some things to keep the resident's we have, like lowering taxes, instead of worrying and talking about finding potential new ones.

Another interesting statistic is the employment numbers, in 2002 there were 5,233 employees covered under Ohio UC law but in the year 2003 the number had fallen to 4,937 a difference of 296 less employees county wide. The private sector employed 4,009 of these workers in 2002 but by 2003 private sector workers had fallen to 3,695 which is a loss of 314 overall. You can see the decline in both workers and privately employed workers for just this one year period, but now look at this interesting fact.

In the Government Employees in the County sector (which includes all government workers Federal, State and Local) in 2002 there were 1,224 government employees but by 2003 government employees had risen to 1,242. Federal government jobs went down from 57 in 2002 to 55 in 2003 a drop of two, and state workers went from 31 to 30, down one in the same years.

The numbers for local government employees for these two years are 1,193 for the year 2002, but for the year 2003 when both total number of employees county wide and private employees went down local government added employees and went up to 1,212. Remember this is during the same time period that the levy to build the jail was passed, new schools were being built and the taxes for them increased, and many county towns were in the process of or had already added income taxes, all a boon for local government employees, but with less people and less private sector jobs to pay for them in each instance.

These numbers are three years old but anyone driving around the county can see all the "House for Sale" signs so I feel safe in saying things aren't better today than 2003. When I took economics in school I was taught that you don't add government employees, raise taxes, and expect an economic situation to improve, especially when you have less privately employed people.

Remember, these numbers don't reflect the new county sheriff employees it takes to run the new jail, even though they were added six months ago to the county payroll in the anticipation of the jail finally getting done and opening.

On this whole jail matter the concept of paying someone to be trained for a job escapes me. Why not just hire trained help in the beginning? I guess I could be accused of letting my 35 years of being in private business and lack of government experience cloud my judgment.

I'm afraid we're stuck with a new jail building we can't afford to operate just the same as we're stuck with new school buildings we can't afford. Unfortunately there's not much of a resale market for used government buildings the size of the schools or jail in Paulding County.

I'm not the manager, but as a fan I don't think were headed in the right direction, and all the positive spin, the hope, the blaming the messenger, the excuses of no money from the state, won't change the stats. One thing any manager of a team should know is the opposing team's stats. They seldom lie.

Sometimes as a fan you have to live with the team you have until the owners change the players or management and you get the team you hope for. But I always root for the team even when the stands are empty of other fans.

One thing I found out a long time ago was when there's not many other fans at the game it's a lot easier to be heard by the owner way up there in his luxury sky box when I yell "Come on get us someone that can manage this team, what kind of a move was that, fire that bum and while you're at it try and find us some starting pitching too!!!"

#### TWO NEW SPECIALISTS JOIN PAULDING COUNTY HOSPITAL'S OUTPATIENT CLINIC

"Henry Gerad, M.D., has replaced Lisa Duhaime, M.D. in the hospital's oncology clinic," hospital CEO, Gary Adkins reported at the recent board of trustees meeting. "It was a seamless transition and we are very pleased to have Dr. Gerad provide this critical service to our patients." His clinic is held on Friday afternoons.

Adkins also informed the board that orthopedic surgeon, Robert W. Moore, D.O., from Bryan will be joining the outpatient clinic staff soon. "We are working toward scheduling a Monday afternoon clinic," Adkins reported.

Chief financial officer Rob Goshia reported a March net profit of \$11,687 and a year to date profit of \$67,485.

In other financial news, Adkins told the board that it is unlikely that any additional funds will be available from the Supplemental Medicaid Upper Payment Limits Program. The program is used to offset Medicaid reimbursement shortfalls for public hospitals.

More positively, it seems likely that reimbursements for Medicaid inpatient costs for all hospitals will be updated as proposed in Governor Strickland's budget. The current reimbursement levels have been frozen since 2003.

Chief operating officer Randy Ruge's reported that the Discharge Education System has been installed. "We're confident that the new system will enhance patients understanding of what they need to do to complete their recovery upon discharge," Ruge said.

The board also heard:

—The PCH Foundation held its annual dinner meeting. The PCHF now has approximately \$100,000 in the bank. The organization's goal since its inception in 2000 has been to have enough money saved so that its healthcare related programs can be funded from the interest earned.

—Use of PCH's Transitional Care and Rehabilitation Program (Swing Bed) continues to increase. "We are pleased that more of the community is learning about and using the excellent services we provide for patients that are ready to leave the hospital but not quite able to go home," Ruge said. "The favorable reimbursement

structures we offer are certainly a part of the program's increased usage."

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—Architects are scheduled to visit at the end of May to discuss the remodeling of patient rooms on the medical-surgical care unit. A top priority is to add restrooms to minimize the necessity for patients to share facilities.

-Remodeling of the ER department, which will add an additional room for patients, continues. It is anticipated that the additional room will reduce waiting time for Prime Care patients and other services.

—The smoke free campus policy will be effective June

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# **PUBLIC NOTICE: Tall Grass**

The Village of Antwerp will enforce Village Ordinance No. 98-10 pertaining to weeds. In this case no person in charge of land shall permit their grass or weeds to accumulate in excess of 8 inches in height. The Village will serve notice of the nuisance area giving said owner, occupant or any other person or entity having change of said land to cut and remove within 5 days after the service of said notice. 



#### HEIDI MCDOUGALL BE-COMES ANTWERP EMS'S FIRST PARAMEDIC

Heidi McDougall passed her final portion of her National Registry test Saturday, May 6 to become Antwerp's first and only Paramedic. Heidi has lived in Antwerp with her husband Matt since 1998 and has volunteered with Matt on the EMS since moving to town. Heidi is a 1994 graduate of Wayne Trace High School and the granddaughter of Wanda and the late George Hunt, daughter of Dave Hunt and Deb Wilkinson, her step father is Norm Thomas. Heidi and Matt share five children Harold 13, Samantha 12, Kenney 10, Abbey 8, and Andrew 6.

Heidi was given the opportunity to become a paramedic when Paulding County Hospital received a grant to send three EMTs (Emergency Medical Technician) from Paulding County to school to become Paramedics. Heidi and several other EMTs from the county put their names in a pool, three names were then drawn from the pool of candidates. Heidi is the first of the three to complete and pass her Paramedic classes and exams.

Heidi began her training in the fall of 2004, during this she and the others drove to Bowling Green State University every Saturday for 18 months for classroom training. After the classroom portion Heidi would travel to Toledo to work at different hospitals emergency and operating rooms to perfect her ability to perform the medical procedures she had learned. After Heidi served her 228 hours at the hospital she then had to serve on Defiance City Fire Department as a Paramedic demonstrating her abilities to perform the advanced procedures she had learned in an EMS position. All together she has taken nearly 800 hours of training to reach this goal.

Once all the training was completed Heidi took a written test given by the state and then had to perform 12 practical stations where she had to describe in detail the proper way to take care of a patient without actually having a patient to work on. This portion of the test is actually much harder than it sounds. To imagine what it entails try to explain 12 different parts of your job in exact detail, from start to finish without leaving out the smallest of details.

As a Paramedic she will be able to perform more advanced procedures on patients transported by EMS, thus giving the Antwerp EMS a higher ability to aid the residents of Antwerp Village and Carryall Township. Paulding County Hospital paid the nearly \$6,000 for the class with the Village of Antwerp paying for most of her other expenses.

Due to the exhausting amount of time required to complete the training and be a mother of five Heidi left her full-time job as a medical assistant for Dr. Larry Fishbaugh and took a part time position working for M&M Medi-Van of Defiance. Heidi will stay on at M&M to serve as a paramedic there as well as serve as a volunteer here in Antwerp.



#### BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS PASSED BY THE HOUSE

Earlier this week, the Ohio House of Representatives passed House Bill 119, the two-year operating budget for the state of Ohio. This bill contains \$52 billion in funding that is used for education, state-supported services, and the operations of various state agencies. Because the bill is hundreds of pages long and includes many changes to Ohio law, I thought I would take a moment to discuss some of the measures that are of interest to the people of Northwest Ohio.

Without question, the largest driver of our budget is Medicaid, with spending totaling more than \$17 billion over the biennium. In an effort to control spending and prevent Medicaid from eating up funding for other needed programs, members of the House instituted a series of controls that allow the state to continue to provide quality services for children, families, and seniors while saving money wherever possible. One of these controls was the creation of the Medicaid reserve fund, which will serve as a stop-gap measure for Medicaid spending while allowing money to be used if needed. These controls, combined with the responsible expansion of programs and spending cuts in other areas, allowed the Legislature to once again pass a fiscally responsible budget.

Although House members were concerned with the expansion of Medicaid services, providing elderly Ohioans with quality health care remained a priority. To that end, House Bill 119 includes an additional \$250,000 per year for the Alzheimer's Respite Care Program. This program provides temporary care for an Alzheimer's patient and allows regular caregivers a short break to revitalize so they are able to return to caring for the patient.

In addition, the House also included additional funding for home and community-based services such as PASSPORT and added 5,600 slots for the program over the biennium. The PASSPORT program allows older adults to receive needed care and assistance in their own home instead of having to move to a nursing care facility. Not only are these programs less costly than nursing homes, they allow seniors to choose health care options that are right for them while remaining in a familiar place with their family and friends close by. Members of the House also worked during the budget process to address abstinence and adoption education programs. The governor's budget proposal would have eliminated \$500,000 in funding each year for abstinence programs, which teach students that abstinence is the only 100 percent effective way to avoid sexually transmitted diseases and unwanted pregnancies. Members of the House restored this valuable funding and included an adoption focus as a safe, effective, and caring option. This funding also makes the state eligible for matching federal grants. House Bill 119 was passed by the House unanimously and is now in the Senate,

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where it will undergo several

more weeks of deliberations.

By law, the budget must be

signed by the governor by

June 30th. In the coming

weeks, this column will focus



#### FIRST PLACE WINNER OF VOICE OF DEMOCRACY SPEECH WRITING CONTEST

Freedom's Challenge December 27, 1776 Trenton, New Jersey 7:04 a.m.

By some miracle we have rekindled. Though all through this morning, I feared the death-icy gust of the Delaware would extinguish the men—at any moment I expected to watch their strength disintegrate like a wasted skeleton into the earth. And yet... we remained, with forfitude enough to subdue the British. For this, I can think nothing except praise toward God, who has favored us surely.

A cautious voice. "General Washington, Sir?" The great figure cradling the book and pen turned to the front flap of the tent. "Ah, yes, Captain Owens. How are the troops?" "Well enough, I suppose, Sir." When nothing more was said, Washington added quietly, "And how are you?" Owens nodded silently but persisted a few moments longer in muteness. When he spoke, he said, "Well enough." He sat. Then, deciding to be honest, he remarked, "But sometimes I wonder what we hope to be left with when this is behind us. Probably when I get back home, my daughter will be all grown up; maybe the beans will have died off... and why do I know this and stay here, when it might be for noth-

ing?' The General laid his book down. "Follow me." "Where to, Sir?" "Here." Owens exited the tent to find General Washington standing beside him, scarcely outside. "What do you see out there?" The General pointed to the West. The Captain squinted and then shook his head. "I don't see anything." Satisfied, Washington nodded. "That is why you stay here." Clearly mystified, Owens asked, "For nothing?" "No." The general took a slow breath. "Perhaps I should have inquired what you do not see." When there was still silence, he prompted, "Do you see a British flag in the wind?" Owens glanced aside. "No." Turning to face the Captain, Washington said, "You stay ... for the possibility of making all America like this piece. You could have your own bean field with your own flag stuck in the middle. Furthermore, you wish to create a society for your daughter which will value her existence and permit her to make choices. But unfortunately in this endeavor, you will win or lose everything—and there is no possible smaller risk." This excerpt of conversa-

tion between General Washington and Captain Owens exemplifies half of the challenge presented by freedom. In this instance, "half" refers to the two periods of time regarding American independence: the before and after. The anecdote illustrates that in the time up until and including the Revolution, the colonists' most significant struggle pertaining to freedom was its actual possession and the necessity to be willing to forfeit all else in order to obtain it. This was the "before".

However, as we currently possess independence, we exist in the "after". Therefore while we continue to experience challenges presented by freedom, they differ greatly from those of the colonists.

For example, a prosecutor massages his temple in a dim courtroom. Having returned from recess, the judge speaks. "The judgment of this court is that the defendant, in spite of all probability, may not be convicted due to the exclusionary rule." A sharp sound follows. Rising from his seat, the prosecutor is confronted by a former client. "Ya ain't gonna let this'n go, are ya, Jim?"

Becoming more excited, he added, "He's guilty 'n ever'body knows it! 'E's got ta be put away!" The attorney stared. Finally he said, "Look, Jorgenson, İ've done my job." Red in the face, the client shouted, "Well, don'tcha think no more of it 'n that?!?!" 'Sure. I think he's guilty just like you do." "W'then why don'tcha say nothin'? Heck, why don'tcha do nothin'?" The lawyer sighed. "Things like this happen, Pete. Doesn't mean it's the way it should be, but people move on. It's not a perfect world."

As exemplified by this paragraph, today we tend to encounter difficulty in integrating the fruits of independence-which are privileges such as the freedom to think, speak, and act-into our everyday lives. Ironically, these are the items which the founders who rallied for independence actually intended to yield us. It was their hope that these rights would not only become available to us, but that they would become comfortably and habitually ours, as a favorite pair of blue jeans. However, the effort involved in utilizing our rights is so immense and the penalty for neglecting it so obscure that we simply elect not to inconvenience ourselves. Therefore, I believe our greatest challenge with freedom is combating democratic complacency. The remedy to this is, I believe, yet another challenge. First, it is necessary for us to remember that democracy is the gift of a bean field from our fathersand secondly that their sacrifice in order to gain it requires us to keep planting seeds... with our flag standing in the middle.


