#### **REP. GILLMOR INTRO-DUCES GIFTED EDUCATION** BILL

Congressman Paul Gillmor (R-Tiffin) introduced legislation yesterday to increase funding for gifted and talented education programs across America. Gillmor's legislation was passed by the House in 2006 as part of the Higher Education Act. Gillmor reintroduced his legislation this year after the U.S. Senate failed to act upon his bill in the 109th Congress.

"My bill makes existing grant monies available to improve education for gifted and talented students. As we work to continue bettering the American education system, it is important to provide the funding necessary to properly train teachers of gifted students and empower their scholastic excellence," Gillmor said.


According to the National Research Center on the Gifted and Talented, gifted students may already know as much as half of the course materials to be presented in class. Unfortunately, more than 60 percent of their teachers do not have training in teaching gifted and talented children.

Gillmor's bill, the Gifted and Talented Education Enhancement Act, opens a section of Title II of the Higher Education Act to provide grant monies for teacher education to increase the awareness of the special needs of gifted and talented students. The bill does not require any additional federal funding instead allowing current funds to be used for gifted and talented teacher education programs.

With our budget already stretched thin, I felt it was important not to create another federal handout but rather to open an existing pool of money for gifted and talented education.

I am a strong believer of improving the education system for every student. We need to ensure access to resources in the hope that teachers will be properly equipped with the expertise and tools required to educate





## THE JOSHUA PROJECT: A HOMELESS SHELTER FOR MEN

Sunday evening, January 14 the Antwerp Church of Christ hosted a special service conducted by Jay Stoner minister of The Church of Northwest Ohio - The Church Without Walls and Minister, Motivational Speaker Omar Jackson. Also included was the Church's Praise Band with Jason Stoner on piano, Ryan Stoner on guitar, David Peggs on bass guitar and Carol Peggs singing.

Ministers Stoner and Jackson came to share with the congregation their project, The Joshua Project, named for Joshua and Caleb, two of the spies who went to search out the promised land for the Israelites in Numbers 13. Omar is the founder and director of the project while Jay is the cofounder.

ed in West Unity, Ohio, is a homeless shelter for men. The shelter opened on the first of January.

Omar had a vision, a vision to help homeless men regain hope and self-esteem by reconstruction of their Spirit through the Word of God and to be accountable for choices made. It is believed that the homeless suffer from emotional and mental health dysfunctions contributing to the alcohol, drug and family problems that these men suffer. Omar and Jay are there to help mend families together, only then can the men be productive in society and become responsible.

Omar was himself in a counter-productive position growing up. One out of eight children, born in Atlanta, Georgia, his family moved to Ohio when he was four. He grew up lonely, searching for something he could fill the loneliness with. He turned to drugs, alcohol, became a Black Panther then joined the Black Muslims. The problem he had was that when the leaders of these groups died, he still felt lost, when they died his hope died with them. He has been

in and out of prison for drug trafficking and receiving stolen property. He has been many things from a college student to being in the Viet Nam War. Because of all his experiences and through the grace of God he has become what he is today and able to relate to all the things that the hopeless bring to him. He's been there. During all his religious searching no one ever told him about Jesus Christ. Only when that happened did the loneliness begin to fill. Omar then became involved with The Joshua Project in Lancaster where he sold donuts on the street to help with

Enter Jay Stoner, who received a brochure in the mail about the project and decided to act on it. He met with Omar and they decided to open a homeless shelter. Jay provides the spiritual needs, along with transportation to and from work, appointments and church along with others who want to be involved. Jay's wife keeps the books and also helps with transportation, while Omar provides what is needed physically through the shelter such as food and clothing—he will also help Jay with transporting. Omar has an apartment in the shelter so he can oversee things and be there for the men. He also speaks to groups about the shelter and enlists donations.

Future plans are to open homeless shelters all over the area. Jay and Omar also want to provide shelters for women and children.

The shelters "give a new taste on life", a life full of hope, mended families, and



At Vantage Career Center, nine different Trade and Industrial programs are offered to high school students. Here is a brief look at those programs.

In the Ag Diesel Mechanics program, students learn the techniques for the maintenance, service and repair of industrial diesel and agricultural equipment and engines. Students in Ag Diesel Mechanics belong to the Vantage FFA Chapter.

Auto Body students learn the basic skills of collision repair and refinishing, as well as auto body and shop management skills. Performing repairs to plastic and fiberglass components are unique skills of this trade.

The two-year Auto Technology program provides hands-on experience in the areas of hydraulic brake systems, automotive engines and suspension systems. Students learn the skills required to inspect, repair and adjust vehicles.

In the Precision Machining Technology program, students learn to operate and use lathes, grinders, mills and computer numerical controlled (CNC) machines to shape metal into useable tools and parts. Blueprint reading, computer aided drafting (CAD) and manufacturing processes are emphasized throughout the program.

The Vantage Welding program is a nationally recognized AWS (American Welding Society) training and testing facility. Students have the opportunity to earn industry certifications in plate and pipe welding. This program has earned National Exemplary the designation in career-technical education.



The "little house" was a three room, sort of cottage, that we lived in until my parents bought the two-story house from Fred Dunderman. I remember Dad saying they paid \$500.00 for it, plus the cost of moving it from Wentworth Rd. to our lot on Washington. I don't know what the cost of moving it was, but it was probably very little by today's standards. Then we rented a house from Hattie Bissell that sat where Richie Bauer's home is now. At that time, the Bauer's lived where Bob Johnson now lives. We stayed in Hattie's house until the house



was put on the foundation and electricity and water was installed. (excuse my trip down memory lane!) Now ... back to George.

As I said, George lived out by the little house and he grew, and was a good, tame "Red Fox".

One day we went out to feed him and he was gone. He'd been loose before, but he usually just came up to the back door and made yipping noises and we would tie him back up. But this time, he wasn't anywhere we cold find him. Larry and Dad put fliers around town and especially with the hunters to be on the lookout for George. I don't remember who called and said he thought he had shot our fox. They went to see and sure enough-it was George. The guy felt really bad about killing him, but he really wasn't to blame. It was open season for fox and George just happened to be in the wrong place.

He handed George over to Larry and they brought him home. He was pretty upset, and didn't want to just dig a hole and throw him in, and since he had taken a taxidermy course from somewhere that I don't remember, he skinned George out and stuffed him. He kept George for many years, and then we found him in Dad's attic when they were moving to Texas. Larry had decided that he would donate George to the Ehrhart Museum and to my knowledge, George is still on display there.

The "little house" is long gone now. Mom and Dad and Larry have passed on, but I will always have my beautiful childhood memories.

# CONGRESSIONAL ACTION ON IRAQ

#### The Congressional Report by: Congressman Paul Gillmor

Like many of my constituents, I watched President Bush's Iraq address on Wednesday to understand what changes lay ahead in the Global War on Terror. President Bush defined in very plain terms his benchmarks for the Iraqi government, the flaws in the current war strategy and gave a realistic picture of the conflict.

I appreciate President Bush's honesty, his willingness to openly engage international experts on the direction of this region, and his accepting of responsibility for past failures. President Bush also placed heavy demands on Iraqi Prime Minister Nuri al-Maliki which I believe are long overdue. Our military men and women have sacrificed greatly for the cause of freedom and while the Iraqi Security Forces have been rapidly assuming operational control of the battle, the United States must demand an even quicker transfer of control.

From the outset of this war. I have consistently said that I wanted U.S. troops home from Iraq as soon as we can leave a stable, democratic government in place. In his speech, President Bush committed more than 20,000 additional U.S. troops to stabilize Iraq. Personally, I do not know whether committing additional U.S. troops will aid Iraqi Security Forces in quickly assuming control. However, as Commanderin-Chief, it is the President's sole responsibility to direct our military operations.

In the coming weeks, I anticipate leaders of the Democratic Party putting forward non-binding resolutions regarding the troop surge. I expect the Democratic leadership will attempt to reject the President's decisions and may even bow to pressure from the extreme fringe of its party and allow a vote to reject additional funding for our troops in the field. If these tactics are employed, I will vote to continue providing funding for our troops. In addition, I do not believe Congress should use non-binding resolutions to attempt to run the Global War on Terror from the backseat.

I agree that failure in Iraq will be a disaster for the Middle East and for the United States of America. Swiftly transferring military control of Iraq to the Iraqi government is a goal that every person holds. While the costs of this war have been high, the stakes are even higher. 



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

After high school some students further their knowledge by learning to sew clothes for themselves and/or others. Sewing is a class that will benefit a student for life.

Well, friends and readers, I have some corrections to make about my column two weeks ago.

First, on Pat Harris' daughter, it was Ruth who married Mr. Medaugh and lived in Paulding and Dorothy married Jim Hooker and lived in Payne.

My good friend, Arlene Billman, called to remind me that Dr. James Lynch lived in the Frank Smith house on North Main Street. By golly, she's right. Dr. Lynch had his office downtown the next place south of K.D.'s Kitchen. When I was a boy that second building was Joe Yager's Restaurant.

Tom Seslar lives in Chicago and is a newspaper man. He reads the West bend News on Tuesday nights as he gets it off the Web Site. He called Martha Bender to tell her about my mistake. I said he had a sister, Linda, who lived in Ft. Wayne. Well, I think I was referring to Linda Schilb, Andy's daughter. Tom Seslar's sister's name is Diane and lives out in Oregon. She is a success story. She has a couple degrees and a Doctorate. She travels world-wide most of the time. She is married to Mark Svendsen and he travels a lot for BP Oil Co. He makes many trips to the Near East and part of his vocation has to do with irrigation. Plus, he is also a free lance writer.

Well, Tom, it was good to hear from you and to learn that you still enjoy hearing from the Old Home Town.

A good part of my childhood was walking by the Texaco Gas Station. Warren, Pearl, Delmar and Ruth Seslar always had time to stop and talk to a boy walking by going to school or doing an errand.

Our early settlers must have brought in a lot of fill dirt to raise those roads up as high as they are. In the early years, Antwerp had a number of deep ravines, some are still plenty noticeable.

The first house north is

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

I think the boy, Forest, worked for the telephone company. The Brown Family lived there for quite a spell. They had a nice family: Edgar, Barbara, Mary Ann and Bill.

The next house north was the home of Oran Frank Leinard, better known as "Jack". He and Marjorie had three children: Frank, Lyle and Carole. You all remember that Frank is a new heart recipient. He is doing well and is a whole bunch of history by himself. Lyle is retired now and gets in a lot of good fishing when he can. Carole married Mike Zedaker and lives in Van Wert. When I was mowing the cemeteries, Carole would take Marjorie for a ride through the cemetery on nice days and they would always be sure to wave at me. I was always glad to see them. They were two fine ladies. Marjorie lived to be 100 years old. She was good and sharp right up until she fell and broke her hip. Yes, the Leinard's are big in Antwerp History.

The next house north was the home of Pete and Lillie Schmuck. They had a nice family: Helen, Richard, Tom, Dorothy and Jim. Pete was manager at the West Elevator.

As I was sitting here thinking about Pete Schmuck and



the West Elevator, I thought about how long has the Elevator been here. Well, all I know about the East Elevator was that John Mosier owned it and Lawrence Sidenbender was the clerk and Harry Reeb and another man worked there. They were in business until after WWII and then it was taken over by the West Elevator.

All I could find out about that West Elevator was that it was already in business in 1886. Bruce Ely and C.A. Bissell bought it from somebody else and it was D.B.A. As Ely and Bissell Grain and Livestock. I remember the cattle pens and corrals were on up west by the railroad when I was a kid. But in 1900 this was sold again and became The People's Elevator Co. I cannot begin to tell you how much the Elevators have meant to this farming community. Maybe down the road I will do a column on it. "I'm fixin' to".

The next house north of Pete Schmunk's was the home of Chester Hawkins and his wife Caroline Snook. They lived in that big house on the corner. I guess after Mr. Hawkins died, she moved to the next house east and lived there a long time with a couple of daughters.

A number of people lived in that house later, I remember the Ryan Family lived there a long time.

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#### JACKSON TOWNSHIP PRESENTS THEIR FLAG



Continuing our series on "Township flags", Jackson township is the 3rd township to be discussed. In the spring of 2006, Trustees Rex Gray, Bill Strahley, Mark Holtsberry and fiscal officer Mary Howard accepted the final design done by Mrs. Jane Smiley.

Jackson Township's flag contained the requisite township name and year organized (1851). It features a blue band across it to represent the township's waterways, of which the Flat Rock Creek is the largest, flowing across the northern portion and Blue Creek, flowing across the southern portion of the township. Along with the waterways, the flag contains trees to denote the "Black Swamp" and a turkey (which are making a comeback), with opposite flag corners depicting the State and American flags. Also pictured is a headstone, with the printed names "John Moss" and "William Moss".

To pique your interest in this township, I'll tell you that John and William were brothers from England who purchased land from the government and built a cabin on the banks of the Blue Creek in Section 26 (known as the Keck District). Also of note is that the first sermon delivered by a United Brethren divine (clergyman) named Abraham Miller, was in 1840.

The settlers worshiped in homes until 1850 when they organized and met at the Anderson School during the winter and beneath the "umbrageous" (shady) forest trees in the summer, finally erecting the first frame township church on the bank of the Blue Creek in 1875. Elm Chapel was known to be the first township church; and was a log structure built on the south bank of the Flat Rock Creek. In 1888, a church was built in Hedges.

Population in 1880, per the census, was 976; however, by 1890, the population was recorded as 2,266, an increase of 132% during the decade.

All the foregoing data is taken from the 1892 Paulding County Atlas, which is available for reading at all Paulding County libraries, and, for students and teachers, at all Paulding County School libraries. It can be purchased at the John Paulding Historical Society (across from the Paulding Fairgrounds) during Museum hours on Tuesdays from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. and also the first Saturday of each month from 10:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.

The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, January 3 and Monday, January 8.

The January 3rd meeting was the first for Ed Straley, newly elected to the office at the November general election.

Travis McGarvey, Paulding County Engineer met with the Commissioners on January 3 to provide his regular monthly update. Mc-Garvey reported on plans for roadwork during 2007. He estimates approximately 25 miles of paving work for the new year, all county roads. Another 30-35 miles on additional roads will receive the chip seal process that extends the life of the road surface. McGarvey also noted that during the winter, yet before snowfall, his staff is working on cutting brush along county road right-of-way. Other crews are tackling a list of drainage related concerns that have been reported to the Engineer's Office.

At the same meeting the Commissioners learned that the President of the County Commissioners Association of Ohio (CCAO) has requested Marty Harmon to serve a one-year term on the CCAO Board of Trustees. In this role Harmon will represent Paulding County as the statewide organization considers policies for legislative consideration.




