LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Poverty in America A few weekends ago I was fortunate enough to take my

first ever trip to Columbus,

OH. I was impressed how clean the city was and how much work they had done to make the buildings look vintage. I was able to visit the state capital building too. It was a massive and impressive building. As we got closer to the capital grounds, I noticed something disturbing. Homeless everywhere. None asked for handouts, they just lay around. One woman sported a rather interesting costume. She wore red wings, red glitter make-up, red boots, red sunglasses and red bows in her hair. As I got closer, I saw she was holding a sign. I stopped to read it. It said, "I'm tired of living on welfare. I need a job. I will be your company mascot." I felt saddened by this. Here is a person who wants off welfare and will go to the extreme of public humiliation to do what it takes to escape the system.

As we entered into the capital, it seemed as if the outside 'dirt' was forgotten. People in there went on with business as usual. I wondered if they knew these people were out there, or if they even cared.

Now, I grew up in the suburbs of St. Louis, MO and I know the homeless are everywhere. I guess as I get older I become more sensitive to those who are less fortunate than most. I really thought about the levels we used to have are no longer here: the upper class, the middle class and the lower class. The middle class is dwindling each year. I can remember when I lived comfortably in the middle class. Now my family struggles to stay afloat. This seems to be the norm within todav's workforce.

I have talked with a few young couples that are struggling severely. One couple has two young kids and is behind in their propane budget bill. They ran out of propane and have no hot water. The local propane dealer wouldn't help them. I believe they got help from somewhere. Another couple is dreading winter because they can't afford to fill their propane tank. What do we do?

Our government spends billions of taxpayer money on other countries. And I am not talking about humanitarian help. We can't even take care of our own people first. I would rather see my tax money go to help get the homeless off the streets and implement a program to get them back into the workforce.

The problem wit flation of the middle class is simple. Inflation has skyrocketed. Our pay raises have not kept up with inflation. 59% of economists believe the Federal Reserve's problem is inflation with 41% saying a slow economic growth is the main problem. This spells low growth and high inflation. So the old saying that the

rich get richer and the poor get poorer could have some truth to it. They also predict the housing market will bottom out in the fourth quarter of 2007 or the first quarter of

Interestingly enough, they don't think rising gas prices will affect the economy. So if gas prices soar to \$4.00 a gallon or higher, will it affect your budget?

There a several other problems I see with our inflation and the economy. One problem is higher health-care costs. Every year, my unionsponsored health-care program reports a profit. And they still take a chunk of my pay raise each year for health-

Another problem are taxes, as I talked about last week. The more I make, the more they take. I honestly believe our government wants us to be dependent of them. They have wiped out the middle class and have enslaved us with more tax, higher healthcare, slow economic growth and high inflation.

When will we say enough is enough? I urge each and every one

of you to contact our local and state government officials. Become aware of what is going on in this county, state and country. It is our responsibility to

make sure WE are in control of our country. These people work for US, paid with our tax money. Why not hold them accountable for what they do? "The government is us; we are the government, you and I." Theodore Roosevelt.



REP. GILLMOR: DEMO-CRATS' FARM BILL PUTS OHIO JOBS AT RISK

WASHINGTON, DC-Today, Congressman Paul Gillmor (R-Tiffin) supported the Farm Bill which had unanimously passed out of the House Agriculture Committee only to be disappointed that Democrats in Congress changed the bill and forced a different measure through the House. Gillmor ultimately voted for the first bill, which he called a "bipartisan compromise built on civility and trust," and rejected the Democrat's second bill, which he called "a back door attempt to raise taxes that will cost American jobs," which passed the House on a near party-line vote of 231 to

"Although I am not on the Agriculture Committee, I have been following the debate on the Farm Bill for sometime now and I was looking forward to voting for the bill which unanimously passed out of the Committee last week. Unfortunately, in only a week's time, the Democrat Leadership added a massive tax increase on companies which in-source jobs into America. These foreign-owned companies, such as Daimler Chrysler in Perrysburg which employs nearly 3,000 people, are vital to our economy. They should be applauded, not penalized," Gillmor said.

"The tax increase added by Democrats, as much as a 30 percent tax increase on some American businesses owned by foreign companies, could lead to companies closing and moving production outside of America. Because of the tax increase, the Farm Bill puts 5.1 million American jobs at risk. These tax increases, added out of public sight from the media or the rest of Congress, will hurt families all across America,"

Gillmor said. Foreign owned companies now employ 203,600 Ohioans at companies such as BASF, BP, Daimler Chrysler, Honda, Lafarge, Rexam, Shell Oil, Square D, Toyota, and Volvo among others. Ohio also ranks 8th in the United States in employees supported by U.S. subsidiaries and has 95,000 manufacturing jobs employed by U.S. subsidiar-

Among the provisions of the Farm Bill which Gillmor did support but failed to pass the House on a near partyline vote of 198 to 223 were:

-An investment of more than \$1.6 billion in priorities to strengthen and support the fruit and vegetable industry in the United States;

—Providing farmers participating in commodity programs with a choice between traditional price protection and new market-oriented revenue coverage payments;

—Investing in rural communities nationwide, including economic development programs and access to broadband telecommunication services;

—Making important new investments in renewable energy research, development and production in rural America.

"I hope the U.S. Senate will consider the original bill passed out of the House Agriculture Committee without the tax increases added after the debate was over. Our

HOUSE APPROVES GILL-MOR AMENDMENT FOR ADDITIONAL HOUSING COUNSELING

WASHINGTON, DC-Today, the U.S. House of Representatives unanimously approved an amendment co-authored by Congressman Paul Gillmor (R-Tiffin) to increase federal funding for housing counseling. Gillmor's amendment to the Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act increases federal housing counseling by \$6.76 million in the FY 2008 budget. Democrats in Congress were not seeking an increase in the \$41.58 million budget for housing counseling. The amendment was co-authored by Reps. Mike Turner (R-OH) and Judy Biggert (R-IL).

"I was pleased that the House approved my amendment today to provide additional funding for prospective homeowners to receive housing counseling. Every additional dollar the federal government spends towards helping homeowners receive the counseling they need to avoid foreclosure is a dollar well spent," Gillmor said.

As a senior member of the Financial Services Committee, where he serves as a congressional leader fighting the foreclosure crisis, Congressman Gillmor has been seriously concerned with the loosening of credit standards for several years. The Northwest Ohio Republican recently sponsored a bipartisan summit on Capitol Hill where he assembled most of Ohio's Congressional delegation with housing advocates and representatives of the mortgage industry to discuss the foreclosure crisis in Ohio. A strong consensus emerged during Gillmor's summit that there was a need for additional housing counseling prior to purchasing a home.

Just two weeks ago, Gillmor sponsored legislation with other leaders of the Financial Services Committee to crack down on predatory lending. Among the provisions authored by Gillmor in the Fair Mortgage Practices Act is \$100 million dollars annually for the next four years for housing counseling to low and moderate income borrowers, a more than doubling of the current federal budget for housing counseling.

"America enjoys the highest homeownership rate in our nation's history. Unfortunately, many people have accepted mortgages that were wrong for them. This has had devastating effects in states like Ohio which are now leading the nation in home foreclosures," Gillmor said. "My amendment today for an additional \$7 million will help many Americans by providing much needed counseling before realizing the dream of homeownership. I also hope that the Congress acts as quickly to pass my comprehensive predatory lending bill. The American people deserve this protection."

farmers deserve this relief and should not be caught in a game of party politics," Gillmor said.

The 2007 Farm Bill awaits debate in the U.S. Senate. However, President Bush has vocally opposed the bill and it likely faces his veto in its

current form.

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ANTWERP HISTORY

My nephew, Bill Jordan, is my brother Jack's boy. He lives between Sebring and Zolfo Springs in Hardee County in Florida. Bill is a good fisherman. He fished for years out of Biloxi, MS. Then he moved to Oregon and Washington. He fished a lot out there and I think he has even fished the mighty Columbia River. Anyhow, he was bringing his boat and coming to our lake on a Sunday AM.

He was there just after day light and put his boat in. He has a dandy boat, 14 or 15 foot square on both ends and he drives it from the front with two levers. We got all our gear loaded, Bill in front, me in the rear seat and Ray Gross in the

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middle on a lawn chair. We went about five miles down to the most southern part of the lake. Lots of irrigation down here as hundreds of acres of vegetables are just up over the hill from the lake. About eight varieties of lettuce, carrots, radishes, red beets and other items.

This end of the lake has acres of lily pads, some rice weeds and plenty of 'gators.

Bass like lily pads because of the shade. They like shade. But if you cast around lily pads you must be careful and good. If your hook gets caught in a stem of the thick part of the leaf you must go and cut your hook loose, but lots of times it is worth the chance.

Anyhow, we fished a couple hours then had a coffee and some goodies and watched a set of wood storks flying around. There is also a pair of fish eagles in this area. That's one thing about fishing in Lake Istokpoga, if the fish aren't hitting you can sure enjoy the wildlife.

We fished until noon and I think we had four or five. We had thrown them all back in because we belong to 'To the Catch and Release Program'.

Grace had a good dinner of two kinds of fish, fried potatoes, a good salad and dessert. We sat and talked a little

and helped her clean up the table and headed out about two o'clock. Well, things were good and not so good. A cold front was moving in from the north so the sun got covered up with clouds. The wind increased out of the North and cooled off and the water got

Now that is the bad part. The good part was the fish started to hit. Bass will hit in this case until the barometer starts going up, but nearly always it gets windy.

Well, I had left my hooded jacket on the seat before I went to lunch. Bill had a jacket under the seat, but Rav didn't, all he had was a white tee-shirt and the wind was cold. I asked Ray if he was cold, he said "No, my lips are always blue." Along about that time Bill

said, "I like to fish with you guys 'cause you're not always hollering to go in. I gave Ray my life jacket to put on, that did cover up his back, but his bare arms were getting cold. But the bass were hitting pretty good and that was the main thing. That morning coffee would have been pretty good at this time, but we didn't bring any.

We fished long and hard, 'course we knew that they wouldn't bite tomorrow because the front would be here. The barometer would be rising and with a 'robin egg blue sky' and they won't hit on a day like that. We hit 'em pretty good and Bill kept enough for a mess and we returned all the rest back into the lake.

The next day was a 'Wal-Mart Day'. When it's too cold or windy or raining you can't fish, so you go to town to Wal-Mart. We generally go to the sporting goods and look for a new bait we heard about or pick up some hooks, sinkers or line that we probably got enough of anyhow.

After a couple days we went out again and my sister, Grace, went along. She likes to fish and she is pretty good. She uses spinning rods and reels, generally a Mitchell 300A. She can hit a bushel basket at 40 feet or even farther, but that is a long enough cast. She sits in the middle seat and does a good job. It's always good to have her in the

But I'm getting ahead of myself, I forgot to tell you about this character. On one of our past trips to Florida, Ray and I got into camp and carried our gear into the trailer and then walked down to the little store where the office is. A fellow walked up and put out his hand and in a southern drawl said, "Ahm from LA." He could see the perplexed look on our faces 'cause we knew that didn't add up. Then he said, "LA means lower Alabama". After a good laugh that started a good friendship that got better as the years went on.

This man's name was Stu Bishop and he didn't come from LA. He and his wife came from northern Alabama up closer to the Huntsville area.

I'm jumping around a little in time here but the four of us fished around 13 years together.

On this day, Grace, and Ray went west from the dock and Stu and I went over behind the Big Island. We met a man in a float boat who wanted to talk, so we coasted over to his boat. I think he was a French Canadian. He was hard to un-

derstand, till he pointed to a huge bass laying on the deck of his boat. He was smiles all over and gestured that he had thrown a big one back, didn't need him.

He was on his way to his fish camp which was just west of the town of Lorida on US 98. I have a feeling that he had to go back to Canada because he told us just where he got Well, Stu and I got some good hits and some nice fish

and we were at least seven miles from camp. Stu and I had more luck that day, more than anyone else in camp. That little old fellow told us Well, the next morning we told Grace and Ray to follow

us up north behind the Big Island. Well, they did and a couple more boats came later. Stu and I went back to the same area we were in yesterday and Grace and Ray went to the west a couple hundred

Well, luck was with us, we had some good hits and a couple dandies in the lot that we had. Along about 9:30 I said, "I think that's Ray's boat over towards that point over there. Let's run over and have a break. The coffee and goodies was in Ray's boat in the five gallon bucket. We headed over that way and could soon see they were headed towards

We slowly met and threw a rope around the oar lock. Then Ray said, "Before we have our coffee, I want to show you something." At this time, Grace looked up from under her big straw hat with a huge grin on her face. At this same time, Ray, lifted the stringer out of the water and it contained one big fish, a huge wall hanger, a large mouth bass.

That fellow was a hog. We all remarked he would go 10 pounds. "No," Ray said, "He would only go 9 pounds 10 ounces and besides that Grace caught it." Well, good for her. After a few rounds of congratulations we had our coffee and weighed it on a hand held de-liar scaler and he still only went 9 pounds 10 ounces. Grace had missed her 10 pound by six ounces.

We sat and giggled and drank our coffee and told about the luck we had. It had been a dandy morning all in the area that old French Canadian told us about.

The other two boats from Mossy Cove Fish Camp slowly came up to us to shoot the bull and lie about what we caught. We didn't have to stretch it, we had proof. The one boat was Jack and Iva Mallahan from West Virginia by the way of 30 years at Goodyear in Akron, Ohio. I don't remember the other boat, but Stu asked Jack, "Do you want some fish?" Jack said, "Yes, he could use a couple." Stu said, "Open your live well." Stu gave him all our catch, he kept tossing them in his live well to the tune of seven large mouth bass. That was more

than he wanted, but he got 'em. They averaged about four pounds each. We had a good morning.

Lake Istopoga is eight miles at the bottom and about 10 miles south to north. Anvhow, we were about one mile from the north end, which is up against US 98. A highway which runs from US 27 over past the Sebring Race Track and then turns south through Lorida and heads for Okeechobee City.

But those two days over on the north part of the lake was some of the best bass fishing that we ever had on Lake Istokoga. One afternoon, Ray and I went out about 3:30 and it is dark by 6:00 at this time of year. Grace had not retired yet so she wasn't along. We had a pretty good af-

ternoon and we had four that were at least two pounds each. Ray said, "Let's go in and clean these and have fish and fried potatoes for supper." So Ray took the fish to the cleaning shack and I went and got the pan and knives. Ray said later, "I will clean up this mess and you take this fish up there and stop at Ray Dishman's camper and see if they want a mess

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Dishman were smaller folks and hailed from Kentucky and had a camper unit on the back of a pick up truck. I had eight good size pieces of bass in a pan. I knocked on the door of his camper and asked Mr. Dishman if he wanted some fish. He said, "Oh, boy, we like Florida bass, thank you." He brought back the empty pan and thanked me again.

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When Ray got to the trailer, I told him Mr. Dishman took all the fish. Ray said, "Well, we won't have fish tonight but we got plenty of stuff in the fridge. So Ray made some hot corn bread with a touch of sugar and it was good. That's what we had, corn bread, lots of butter, cold ham and a lot of County Line Cheese. A meal fit for a couple tired fishermen.

There wasn't much of a mess in the kitchen so we took our lawn chairs and went down to the bonfire and talked with the other folks.

If you have enjoyed these two true fishing tales, in a couple of weeks there will be one more. Next week will be one more. Next week will be a little history on Veteran's Memorial Park. This is in conjunction with A Day in the Park on Saturday August 11.

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




The Big AuGlaize River needs to be dredged out first. It is full of slit and top soil from rivers and streams from five counties.

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
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SPOTTING MOTO

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

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

OHIO: A LEADER IN HIGH-WAY SAFETY

COLUMBUS—The U.S. Department of Transportation recently announced the lowest highway fatality rate ever recorded and the largest drop in total deaths for 2006. Through its aggressive highway safety program, Ohio was a major contributor to making roadways safer.

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) along with the Department of Public Safety have made significant improvements in highway safety over the past several years using expert analysis of crash data and patterns to target high crash and congested locations. In 2006, Ohio achieved several key benchmarks in the areas of highway and public safety, highlighted by the Ohio State Highway Patrol's partnered enforcement efforts with local law enforcement agencies that resulted in a record low traffic crash fatality rate and a historic 82% seat belt usage rate among Ohioans.

There were 42,642 traffic deaths in the United State in 2006. This is the lowest recorded total in five years, and the national fatality rate of 1.42 deaths per 100 million miles traveled was the lowest rate recorded by the Department of Transportation. Ohio's fatality rate is well below that national average at 1.1 deaths per 100 million miles traveled. Ohio's goal is to reduce fatalities to 1.0 per 100 million miles traveled by the end of 2008.

Last year, Ohio experienced a 7 percent reduction in crashes and fatalities. In 2005, Ohio had the 14th lowest fatality rate in the nation (the most recent year available from the federal government). These improvements saved 89 lives and decreased statewide crashes by more than 24,000.

"We're combining transimprovements, portation partnerships with law enforcement and public education to reduce deaths and injuries on our highways," said ODOT Director James Beasley. "But motorist behavior is critical to reducing fatalities even further."

In 2006, there were 334,089 crashes in Ohio — 1,237 people were killed and 83,261 people were injured. The vast
