#### ODOT ENGINEERS TO REVIEW SIMILAR BRIDGES FOLLOWING MINNEAPOLIS DISASTER

COLUMBUS-In wake of the tragic collapse of the I-35W Bridge in Minneapolis, Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Director James Beasley has asked ODOT's bridge engineers to review inspection reports on state-controlled bridges designed similarly to the failed Minnesota bridge.

Following a request by U.S. Secretary of Transportation Mary Peters for states to immediately inspect any steel under-deck truss bridges similar to the I-35W Bride, Director Beasley has also offered to work with Ohio's county and city officials who have jurisdiction over the majority of these similarlydesigned bridges, to assist in their inspection efforts where needed.

There are more than 42,000 bridges in Ohio. A review of the state's inventory showed that 181 bridges share in the steel under-deck truss bridge design. Of those 181, 12 are under ODOT's authority.

Per ODOT's aggressive bridge inspection program, trained inspectors have examined all 12 of those bridges within the last year. ODOT has already begun to review the most recent inspections on those 12 bridges. It's important to note that two of those bridges along I-90W/ I-90E in Lake County are already under reconstruction; two others (along I-71N/I-71S in Warren County) are in design for replacement.

Although federal regulations only require bridges to be inspected every two years, Ohio law mandates that every bridge be inspected every year. ODOT Director Beasley has said the Department will take any additional measures to inspect those 12 bridges, as directed by the Transportation Secretary.

For the 2008 fiscal year, ODOT has \$239 million budgeted to the repair, replacement and maintenance of bridges under ODOT's authority. The Department has also devoted \$91 million to assist Ohio's counties and cities on their bridges projects.

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
be available for pick-up and students will be able to pay their program fees. All students new to Vantage and their parents should attend this meeting.



### RICHARD KEES SPEAKS ABOUT MISSIONS TO CAM-BODIA

In 2006 Richard Kees (home builder and minister) traveled to Cambodia for a special mission. Having heard of a mission work sponsored by American Rehabilitation Ministry (A.R.M.) called Rapha House; Mr. Kees decided to assist in this important ministry. He was one of a team of three who made this

Rapha means healing and a brief description is described in the following paragraphs:

Cambodia is a poor nation in Southeast Asia where many families survive on less than one dollar per day. In order to survive, some sell their daughters to "business men," who promise lucrative jobs in far away places. Usually the "places" end up being brothels, where the girls are forced to work as sex slaves.

Though sex trafficking is technically illegal, police can easily be bribed to turn a blind eye. Many villages have a local sex trafficker who stalks young girls who might be potential candidates for prostitution.

This sexual exploitation of children is nasty business. Little girls are kidnapped or purchased, then beaten, raped, starved, or threatened into submission. The price of a girl is determined by her age, appearance and virginity. Due to the high rate of AIDS in Cambodia, virgins are in high demand.

Few girls are able to escape this cycle of slavery but, for those who do, there is A.R.M.'s Rapha House in Battamburg, Cambodia, over-

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seen by a Cambodian staff of Christian workers. Girls as young as 11 and 12 are routinely brought to the Rapha House. Here they find counseling, education, food, safety and shelter.

Pedophiles the world over come to Cambodia seeking to have sex with a child, knowing they will not be arrested. This is why Rapha House not only provides a safe haven for girls, but also has Trafficking Prevention Programs that promote awareness of sex traders among families in poor villages. This was recently revealed to us in the publicity of the pedophile, John Mark Karr, the selfconfessed killer of JonBenet Ramsey, who was in Thailand where most of the girls from Cambodia end up.

While in Cambodia, Mr. Kees participated in teaching the staff of 25 people and 55 resident girls. The main theme was to teach that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God, as the Gospel of John teaches. Over 90 percent of Cambodia worships Buddha, a dead idol. After hearing about the living God and His resurrected Son, whom He gave for all creation, 33 members of staff and resident girls were baptized for the remission of their sins and to receive the gift of the Holy

#### **GILLMOR INTRODUCES CREDIT REPORT "FILE** FREEZE" BILL TO PREVENT **IDENTITY THEFT**

WASHINGTON, DC-Today, Congressman Paul Gillmor (R-Tiffin) introduced bipartisan legislation to allow Americans to freeze their credit reports. Gillmor's bill, would allow people to freeze access to their credit reports and prevent identity thieves from fraudulently opening new lines of credit. Gillmor, the Ranking Member of the Financial Institutions Subcommittee, introduced his bill with Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney (D-NY), the Democrat Chair of his Subcommittee. "In Ohio and elsewhere,

identity theft is no longer an abstract threat. When used wisely, a file freeze is the most powerful way to prevent fraudulent access to credit. This bill will provide all Americans with a significant weapon to protect themselves from con artists and thieves," Gillmor said. "Just one month ago, a tape containing the social security numbers of close to one million Ohioans was stolen from the car of an intern in the Governor's Office of Management and Budget. Thankfully most data breaches do not end with sensitive financial information being compromised, but the threat remains very real," Gillmor continued.

Consumers in 39 states and the District of Columbia currently have the ability to "freeze" access to their credit reports, but there is no tool available in Ohio. Gillmor's legislation would provide all Ohioans the right to freeze access to their credit reports and creates a central source for interacting with the three national credit bureaus. Similar to work done by Congressman Gillmor during the creation of www.annualcreditreport.com, this website will allow consumers a onestop-shop for placing a freeze on their file.

Among other provisions, Gillmor's "file freeze" bill would:

—Allow consumers to temporarily thaw and remove their freeze within 15-minutes using the phone or the

—Provide a free file freeze option to victims of identity theft and those that have received a notice of a data breach. This would be paid for by the party responsible for the breach.

—Give consumers the power to thaw and remove their file freeze for free.

In June, a data tape containing the Social Security numbers of 859,852 Ohioans was stolen from the car of an intern to which it had been entrusted from the Governor's Office of Management and Budget. The data tape also included tax identification numbers, bank account information and other sensitive data for 258,529 business, vendors, school districts, and

of the biggest worries for consumers in the digital age. Several years ago, the Congress gave every American the right to have access to a free copy of their credit report each year. Now, it is time to give every American the power to limit access to their sensitive infor-

The Paulding County Hospital's board of trustees approved a renovation plan to improve facilities for patients staying in the hospital. The low bid of \$259,343 was submitted by Duerk Construction and includes floor removal from Allied Environmental Services. 'Renovations include ad-

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
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ANTWERP HISTORY

This Saturday is the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Day in the Park, so our column this week is about "The Park".

On January 5, 1886, Mayor Frank Song appointed three men, P.R. Doering, Henry Harris and Jacob Saylor to negotiate with Judge O.S. Latty for the purchase of "The Grove" east of town. I assume it was successfully carried out although I never saw where it was finalized anywhere in the records. From what I can find out is it has been a park for Antwerp for 119 years. I hope for many more generations.

In the record of February 7, 1936, it mentions the purchase of "The Island", that gives us a northern entrance to the Grove. This action constitutes the only addition to Riverside Park since the purchase in 1888. So this tells me that the city "bought" The Grove from Judge Latty in 1888. Sometime after that it was named Riverside Park. Nobody "gave" the park to the

At that same point in time, the council was negotiating to purchase the 40 acres from Geo. Coffelt that is know known as the Maumee Cemetery. That opened a can of worms that must have been a five gallon bucket. At the next council meeting, 127 irate citizens went to the meeting

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and said "No, way are you going to bury my parents in this cemetery at the east edge of town and bury me a half a mile away!" You can make "The Grove" into a cemetery and bury me there. Tempers ran high for weeks about making the park into a cemetery. Amid all the abuse and hatred the Mayor and City Council stood fast and saved "The Grove" for a city park. The Coffelt's 40 acres became the new cemetery. I am now going to copy

some lines from "A Century of Progress" written by Otto and Dale Ehrhart back in

"This Grove is now the beautiful natural park that we are celebrating our 100th anniversary, Riverside Park.

'These men did not have the time but yet the remarkable foresight to vision the wonderful benefits that could be and have been derived from this park with its tall towering oaks that never could be built by man and to pass along to us and the present day citizens and for all the posterity."

This was written by O. E. Ehrhart 66 years ago and those words hold today. I sit in our park and look around and about burst with pride and emotion!

I knew Mr. Ehrhart and his boys and liked everyone of them. Their contribution to Antwerp's History cannot be measured, only talked about. Nearly every facet of our park was touched by the Ehrhart's.

For instance, this photo of Riverside Park was taken by Otto in 1941 and loaned to us today by his great-grandson, Cord, and we deeply appreciate it. This picture was taken in 1941 for the booklet called "A Century of Progress". Now I want you to get your magnifying glass out and we will talk.

You see those white cement posts here in the lower right of the picture? That tells us

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Mr. Ehrhart was standing on the north road and pointing south. If you look close you can see the swings standing there. Now looking there today, the V.F.W. Pavilion would be in the line of sight. In the 1934's or 1935's, the U.P.A., a work program started by President Roosevelt to make employment, cleaned out the dead trees, built those cement tables and the steps down to the river and those little white posts around most of the park so cars would not drive inside and you can see, they painted the trees up about 8 feet.

They also put up the swings, the slide and maypole, the teeter-totter and the horseshoe courts. They were paid 32 cents an hour. But don't forget, they were working and bringing home a pay check and doing a lot good

US 24 was already laid out and being paved.

Lucile Horn Seslar told me that in 1931 and 1932 Budd Schilb had a restaurant, The Green Pantry across from now Hunt's Repair Shop. She said the workers from the road gang would eat their lunch with them and she is sure of the date. She and Dorthy Zuber Ehrhart worked there.

At that time, in the southwest corner of the park was two clay tennis courts. I think they were official and met regulations. I didn't know much about tennis at that time and still don't. Then the courts were moved uptown by the City Hall where they are today, with pretty good use.

Across US 24 at the very east end of Matt Hormann's lot was a path leading from the park going south over the railroad over to past Stone Street. That was a short cut to the park from the east end of town. This path went through Hobo Jungle, but it never seemed to bother anyone.

Joe Vail tells me that he and Bill Ross used to hide out in the Jungle and smoke cigarettes, not corn silk. When times were tough, the hobo's put up some tin roofing and siding and had some shelter there on top of that knoll. I never heard of them causing any trouble. When work improved they were gone.

Our family reunion is held here, the last week of August. Also, the Bank's Reunion and the Stevenson Reunion. I am proud to have people come visit our park. For years Walt Womack kept it spotless. I think that Don Pierce takes care of the park.

Many times Pauline and I the world speed by.

We are very proud of our park, our new school, our sports complex and all the fine people we have in this

Today, Congress is working to correct the mistakes of poor judgment by immigration officials and give Manuel the chance to begin anew," Gillmor said. "I have met with Manuel on several occasions and what I am most struck by is that he remains in great spirits. Manuel has maintained a very positive attitude during this time in his life and he has grown stronger for it."

"It has been 20 months now since Manuel Bartsch was first detained by our immigration officials. Manuel's step-grandfather brought him to America only to abandon him years later, an immigrant in the only country he called home. He has become the symbol for a broken immigration system where our sheriffs cannot get federal authorities to take custody of violent alien criminals because they are busy detaining harmless children," Gillmor said. "What the Judiciary Committee did today was give immigration officials time to fix this situation while allowing Manuel to attend Heidelberg College and be the regular American that he only knows how to be."

In addition to the private relief bill, Rep. Gillmor has been active on the immigration front this year, most notably by pushing his five principles for a comprehensive immigration plan: strengthening border security, enforcing laws against hiring illegal immigrants, enhancing a limited temporary worker program, opposing amnesty, and prioritizing the entry of highly skilled immigrants.

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



Gillmor has fashioned his five principles into a resolution (H. Res. 440) and is encouraging his House colleagues to use them as a framework when considering comprehensive immigration bills.

In addition, Rep. Gillmor introduced the EARN Act (H.R. 1221) which would provide legal status to young people who were brought to the United States as undocumented children. Under Gillmor's EARN Act; a person with good moral character who has earned a GED or high school diploma and is working towards a Bachelor's degree or honorable service in the U.S. military may qualify for legal status to remain in the United States.

The Private relief bill for Manuel Bartsch (H.R. 738) now awaits consideration before the House Judiciary Committee. If the bill passes the Committee, it would then be headed for the House floor and must be passed by both the House and the Senate before it could be signed into law. While Gillmor noted that passage of private bills are rare (less than eight percent have been signed into law in the past dozen years), because a committee report was taken out today by the House Judiciary Committee, a deportation of Manuel Bartsch has been effectively stayed until March 15, 2009.

—December 23, 2005Congressman Gillmor first learned of Manuel Bartsch's detention and his office contacted U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services as well as ICE in Cleveland and Washington, D.C.

—December 29, 2005 - Manuel Bartsch signs a waiver allowing Congressman Gillmor to speak publicly about his case.

—January 4, 2006 – Rep. Gillmor calls John P. Clark, Assistant Secretary of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), to personally appeal for Manuel's release.

—January 5, 2006 – The Department of Homeland Security reversed their decision and ordered the release of Manual Bartsch while his case was being adjudicated.


