HELP IS AVAILABLE FOR FAM-ILIES IN FLOODED AREAS

During the past week, counties in northern Ohio damaged by flooding were visited by the governor, Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff and the head of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the first step in getting federal aid to affected areas. In the meantime, however, state assistance is available to individuals and families living in the nine counties covered by the governor's declaration of emergency.

Families living in Allen, Crawford, Hancock, Hardin, Putnam, Richland, Seneca, Van Wert and Wyandot Counties are eligible to receive disaster assistance benefits of up to \$1,500. Eligible elderly and disabled individuals may qualify for one-time cash assistance of up to \$750. Applications for assistance are being accepted at county departments of Job and Family Services.

WHAT THE WEST OHIO **FOOD BANK REALLY IS** AND WHO IT HELPS

The West Ohio Food Bank has gone through some changes over time, but its purpose and mission remain the same. The food bank was started 19 years ago on April 13, 1988 in the basement of the First United Methodist Church located at 201 S. Union Street in Lima, Ohio. Within just three years, the food bank outgrew the church's basement and moved to 117 S. Kenilworth in 1991. West Ohio Food Bank stayed at this location for six years, when it moved to 1380 E. Kibby St during July of 2005.

So, what is the food bank? West Ohio Food Bank is the largest food distribution system in West Ohio, accepting, storing, and providing truckloads of donated food to 200+ smaller, non-profit programs that directly feed over 365,000 hungry people each year who find themselves in temporary need of food assistance. As an affiliate of America's Second Harvest, The Nation's Food Bank Network, we receive offers for truckloads of donated product. We receive the prod-







—Remove mold from hard surfaces by using a solution of one cup bleach in one gallon of water. Scrub surfaces with a stiff brush and rinse them with clean water. Dry with clean cloths or let them air dry.

—Wash dishes, linens, and clothing that have been contaminated with flood water in hot water with detergent. Remember to run your dishwasher or washing machine empty through one full, hot-water cycle with a disinfectant or sanitizer before using them.

—You can disinfect children's toys that have been in contact with flood water with a mixture made with one cup of bleach and five gallons of water.

STATEMENT OF REP. **GILLMOR REGARDING RESIGNATION OF ATTOR-NEY GENERAL ALBERTO GONZALES**

WASHINGTON, DC-Congressman Paul Gillmor (R-Ohio) made the following statement today regarding Gonzales' resignation: "The resignation of At-

torney General Gonzales is good for the President and good for the country. The responsibilities of the U.S. Attorney General make it one of the most important positions in the federal government. For that reason, we need an Attorney General who will maintain the Justice Department with the confidence of the American people. I look forward to the President's appointment of a steward of justice who will administer the Constitution without prejudice and restore faith in the Department of Justice."

In March, Rep. Gillmor publicly called for the resignation of Attorney General Gonzales when he stated that "Attorney General Gonzales has become a lightning rod and has distracted from the mission of the Department of Justice. Given the totality of the circumstances, I think it would be better for the President and the Department if the Attorney General were to step down."

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

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

ANTWERP HISTORY

This is a photo of Antwerp's 1935 football team. But Paul Smith, the last man on the back row tells me it was taken the following spring. You can see that the new 1936 school was under construction. This picture was loaned to us by his daughter, Kathy Smith Wilson, of Paulding. Thank you very much. I know all of them but I had to call on Paul Smith for the names of three

The first man on the back row on the left end is John Putman. After graduation he married a Schuler girl and lived in Northeast Indiana most of his life.

The Putman's lived on the corner of East Daggett and North Erie Street. His brother, Gerald, played football also and his younger brother, Max, was center on the undefeated team of 1938. There was also two girls in the family, Kathryn and Marjorie.

The next man is Robert Carr. He taught school in Antwerp before WWII. After the war he married Esther Boylan and they lived most of the time around Detroit. I saw them a couple of years ago and they both looked pretty good.

The next man is Joe Mattingley. I know that he went away with "A" Co. of the National Guard back in 1940. He went through all of the campaigns in the South Pacific and came home in 1945. I think in civilian life he drove an 18 wheeler.

The next fellow is Orest Cole. He married Evelyn Seslar later on and lived around Indianapolis many years. Later on they lived around Atlanta. I think they had four children.

The next player is Lee Hook. They lived northwest of town at this time. I think they lived quite a few years out in California. I'm not sure if they moved back here

The next fellow is Howard Monroe. He married Dorthy Tolbolt and they had two boys. In later years, they lived in New Haven. Howard is gone now. I think Dorothy still lives in New Haven. I think Howard was in construction with Shambaugh and Sons, Co.

The next fellow is Gerald Kemerer. He was a good player. He was strong and agile. He worked most of his life as a butcher with his father, Oren Kemerer. He married Katie Bitler, one of our cheerleaders. They had two boys, Gary and Hal. Later on, Gerald was very good in wood working.


The next player is Budd Smith. After WWII he married a Hicksville girl and lived in that city. He was in business in Antwerp with his father and grandfather, L. Smith and Son.


The next player is Wayne Fleck. He served in the Navy in WWII as a pilot off a carrier. He was wounded in combat. In the mid 1940's, he played Major League Baseball with the White Sox. Later he pitched ball for City Light in Fort Wayne. He taught school in Antwerp for many years.

The coach, William Horney, is next. He was a good teacher and coach.

The next player is Virgil Stevenson. I don't know very much about him, I know he







The next man is Paul Smith. He served with "H" Co. of the Ohio National Guard 37th Division. He made all the action in the Pacific Theater from 1942 until 1945. He married an old school mate of mine, LaVon Bissel. They had a number of children. Maybe some more on Paul a little later.

The first man in the first row is Mr. Bell, one of the coaches. He was to become the Principal and later on the High School Superintendent. He was a good teacher and loved by everyone.

The first kneeling player is Bob Hartman. He was a good-sized boy and a good line man. I think he lived most of his later years in Michigan.

The next man is Wilford Hartman, most people called him 'Bill'. He made up his mind that he wanted to be a Commercial Pilot. He enrolled in a school in Northern Indiana. He didn't have a scholarship, so he had to work hard. When the WWII started the government moved that class to Wright-Patterson Field and made pilots out of them. Then those men became instructors in multi-engine planes during the war. Bill became a Senior Captain with United Air Lines. The man holding the football is Max Seslar, the team captain. Max went to war with "A" Co. Later on he became an officer and then became Co. Commander of "B" Co. of the 148th Bn. Max made all the campaigns, but his luck ran out on the streets of Manila. This ended the life and career of a fine officer.

Willard Friend is next, even back in those days they called him "Acey". I don't know why. Acey graduated in 1936. He learned the upholstery business at Johnson Furniture Company. He married Pauline Hargraves and had two children and always lived in the Antwerp area. He was on the Antwerp fire department for well over 30 years. His son, Ray, is now our Fire Chief. He worked for Ray in the furniture business for several years.

The last man in the first row, #32, is Richard Rhoad. Dick worked in the construction business for Shambaugh and Son for many years. He married Norma Smith and they had three girls. He was Antwerp's Water Superintendent for many years. He was Fire Chief for many years between Ralph Taylor and Ray Friend.

Now a little about Paul Smith. He is one of the few that are still alive. I talked with him the other day and he looks good and his memory is in top shape. He helped me with three of these boy's names. I knew them all, I names.

I'm really thankful to Paul for all his help and to his daughter, Kathy Smith Wilson, for this picture. I'm not going to say anymore about Paul because I'm a fixin' to do a column on him on down the road.

I tuned off SR 49 east on the River Road right to where Virgil Meyers is having his big auction sale. I found a parking place on the south side of the road and pulled in. Pauline wanted to walk around at the sale lot and to see some friends. My knees won't allow that, so I sat in our pick-up truck while she was gone. It was a beautiful day, with the windows down and a nice breeze going right through. I think I was asleep when Francis Coughlin came to the window and said, "They are going to sell the Old Parade Truck" that belonged to the Antwerp Fire Department and the Meyer's family said that however much the bell from the truck would bring, it would be donated back to the A.F.D., and it went for \$150.00. That's a fine donation and the department will appreciate it.

I have sat and pondered this situation and there is no way that I can let this bell and Old Parade Truck pass into any type of oblivion, without giving you some history and story of these two staunch parts of "The Antwerp Fire Department" for over "20 years" of service.

In the mid-1960's we discussed getting a "fun truck" to take to parades and events. McComb has one, Helena has one and we could use one. At the time we were very active in The Northwest Ohio Volunteer Firemen Association. Some of our Queen candidates had become Queen of that organization. We had

good fire equipment and a new fire house and we took part in everything. Yes, we needed a fun truck!

The late Lynn Bickhard, Jack Brown and I took a new battery, some new plugs and clean gas and oil and went to Harve Delong's pasture field.

Uncle Harve had purchased a new Ford farm truck back in 1935. Harve retired and the "old Ford truck" set out in the pasture for over 10 years. All those new parts were added to the truck and after a few tries, it started and after a warm up period, Lynn drove it back to the fire house. This was the beginning of our "fun truck". It had led one life as a farm truck and was starting a new life, working for the A.F.D.

Ralph Taylor, Rex Shaner, Dick Rhoads and some other fellows stripped the body off clear down to the chassis.

They put on a new floor, new sides, new seats, reupholstered the front seat and added that bell on the front bumper, with a pull rope back to the passengers seat. It also had an "Armstrong" siren! The faster you turned the handle, the louder it sounded!

In its hey day, the truck visited every town in the county, it made all the carnivals and parades. Two generations of boys and girls got to ride in that truck. On Firemen's Day, it worked hard as a taxi moving people from place to place. On many a Halloween night, judging contests, it served as a judging platform, and many times I was lucky enough to be the MC.

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

There are many misconceptions about what the food bank really is. Some think it is merely another pantry, soup kitchen, or shelter where individuals go to seek help. The fact is we are not a pantry, soup kitchen, or shelter. The food bank does not serve food to people; we serve the charities that serve food to people. We accept donated product and store it in our 35,000 sq. ft. facility. Most "pantries" do not have the space to store a truckload of potatoes, cereal, eggs, etc. With a freezer capacity of 5,000 sq. ft. and a refrigerated capacity of 2,000 sq. ft. we are able to accept larger donations than a local church pantry may be able to

Another misconception is the idea that those who are "hungry" are homeless. The truth is the food bank's network of 200+ smaller charity programs that feed the hungry are not feeding the homeless, generally, but the temporarily unemployed, the under-employed, the elderly, single parents, and children.

Some people may not think that any of this information pertains to them; hunger is only in the large, inner cities, right? Wrong! Between January 1, 2006 and December 31, 2006, Paulding County received over 5.6 truckloads of food that was distributed among six emergency pantries (an average truckload contains 30,000 lbs.). Hunger exists in your own backyard. 

The Paulding County Commissioners meet in regular session on Monday and Wednesday of each week. Lou Ann Wannemacher,

Paulding County Treasurer, recommended to the Commissioners consideration of a new format for the county property tax bills. The proposed format will provide the property owner with more information about the tax bill. The format would use regular size paper with a perforated bottom piece to be removed and returned with payment. A return envelope would also be included for those who prefer to pay by mail. The new format will be less expensive than the current procedure. Wannemacher will meet again with the Commissioners to consider the proposal.

Wannemacher also reported on her investment program. Her report included the distribution of funds in Paulding County banks and Star Ohio, a state sponsored investment plan. Investment revenue to date is meeting the estimates for the year.

Tony Langham, Paulding County Economic Development Director, presented his regular monthly report to the Commissioners at the Wednesday meeting. Langham reported on his contacts with individuals and businesses over the last period. Langham also noted that the unemployment rate of 5.3% for Paulding County continues to run below the Ohio rate of 6.1%. Paulding's rate is also lower than Defiance and Van Wert Counties and equal to Putnam County.

The monthly meeting of Elected Officials to review finances was held on Wednesday, August 22. Susan Simpson, County Auditor, and Lou Ann Wannemacher, County Treasurer, presented reports on sales tax revenue and total revenue and expenditures for the county general fund. Sales tax revenue continues to be a small amount ahead of the 2006 receipts but still run behind the sales tax revenue

received in 2005. Expenditures in the general fund are within the original plans for

Paulding County Engineer Travis McGarvey reported on probable costs and benefits for a proposed ditch along Township Road 195 in Brown Township. McGarvey's finding was that the cost to construct the ditch exceeded expected benefits. Upon the recommendation of the County Engineer the Commissioners voted to deny the petition submitted by Claude The Commissioners joined

STATE WORKS TO ASSIST HOMEOWNERS DEVASTED BY FORECLOSURE

Chances are good that you or someone you know has experienced the devastating effects of home foreclosure. A sobering report released earlier this month found that Ohio has the third largest number of homes in foreclosure in the nation, and the problem is only getting worse. In the first half of 2007, Ohio had more than 60,700 foreclosure filings, which is up 56 percent from the same time last year. While foreclosures have

stricken families of all backgrounds in cities and towns all over the country, sadly, the stories of those who reach this point are all too often the same. Tempted by the opportunity to buy their dream home or purchase a property for the first time, many buyers entered into adjustable rate mortgage agreements that, at the time, offered attractive interest rates. Now, with these rates increasing, some homeowners are unable to afford the jump in mortgage payments every month and, default on their loans leading to foreclosure.

Unfortunately, many foreclosures were a result of poor financial decision-making as borrows failed to read the fine print or entered into an agreement they could not afford. Thousands of other families have been victims of deceptive lending practices—loan officers, mortgage brokers or other non-bank lenders who manipulate buyers into signing mortgages they could not afford. New laws, which took effect on January 1, apply the Consumer Sales Practice Act (CSPA) to the mortgage lending industry, give the attorney general the authority to go after predatory lenders and give consumers greater legal remedies to recoup their losses in cases of deceptive lending. Hopefully, this legislation will prevent some unscrupulous lending practices.

However, whether a person was a victim of predatory lending, lost their job, or merely made some poor financial decisions, it is imperative that the state work to educate Ohioans about how to avoid foreclosure. Walking away from a mortgage does more than just harm an individual's credit record, it threatens the stability of families, puts a black eye on the community and hurts the overall health of our economy.

Recently, the legislature, the governor and other state agency leaders launched a statewide campaign to reduce the number of foreclosures in Ohio and keep more families in their homes. In March, Gov. Strickland announced the creation of the Foreclosure Prevention Task Force, a committee charged with compiling recommendations for improving outreach and education for homebuyers, adopting proactive intervention techniques to help homeowners facing foreclosure and providing financial resources and strategies to help keep Ohioans threatened by foreclosure in their homes. The Task Force, which includes representatives from local, state and federal governments, as well as lenders,

housing advocacy organiza-

tions and various other interested parties, has already held several meetings across the state and is expected to provide a final list of recommendations in the near future. After being reviewed by the governor, these recommendations will be given to the legislature for approval. In addition, on April 1, the

Ohio Housing Finance Authority (OHFA) unveiled the Opportunity Loan, a refinance program that provides a more affordable 30-year, fixed-rate financing alternative to borrowers who are up-to-date with their payments and feel their current home loan does not fit their financial situation. To qualify, borrowers need to have a good payment history. The program will be financed through the sale of taxable bonds.

Unfortunately, many experts forecast that Ohio's foreclosure problem has only just begun. While this is disheartening, the state has taken important steps recently to soften the blow. With efforts in place to help those in financial need and educate the public about steps they can take to avoid the devastating effects of foreclosure, I am confident that Ohio and its citizens will get through this tough financial time, and emerge stronger for it in the future. 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
