CONGRESSMAN PAUL GILLMOR UNEXPECTEDLY DIES AT HIS HOUSE IN ARLINGTON, VA



WASHINGTON, DC-The Office of Congressman Paul E. Gillmor (R-Ohio), released the following state-

"It is with great sadness and a heavy heart that we announce the passing of Congressman Paul Gillmor. Congressman Gillmor's death comes as a great shock to us all. Representative Gillmor served the people of Ohio with every ounce of his soul and today he passed on doing the job he loved. Congressman Gillmor was our boss, our mentor, and our friend. Our thoughts and prayers are with Paul's wife, Karen, their daughters Linda and Julie and their sons Paul Michael, Adam

and Connor."

Biography of Congressman Paul Gillmor

Congressman Paul E. Gillmor (R-Tiffin) was sworn in to United States House of Representatives to represent the people of the Fifth Congressional District in Ohio in January 1989. Ohio's Fifth District includes all of Crawford, Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Huron, Paulding, Putnam, Sandusky, Seneca, Van Wert, Williams and Wood counties, and parts of Ashland, Lucas, Mercer and Wyandot counties.

Recently, Mr. Gillmor served on the House Committee on Financial Services, which is responsible for banking issues, insurance, international monetary policy, capital markets and investment, government sponsored enterprises, and public and private housing. On the Financial Services Committee, Mr. Gillmor was the Ranking Member of the Subcommittee on Financial Institutions and Consumer Credit which has jurisdiction over banks, thrifts, and credit unions

ANTWERP COMMUNITY BAND **CELEBRATES 15 YEARS**

It's September and the Antwerp Community Band turns 15 years old this month.

The band was formed when Cindy Sabo, Cheryl Bradford and Kay Bromagem started making several hundred phone calls which resulted in a band to play at the 1992 high school football homecoming game. The band has continued since that time. Kim Moyer Durre, the school music director at the time was the first A.C.B. director.

In the summer of 1993 the band found itself without a director so Jim Hahn was approached and he joined the band in July of that same year. The first performance under Hahn was a concert to close Antwerp Days, 1993.

The band continued after the death of Jim Hahn on May 24, 2004. The conductor's baton was then picked up by Hahn's son, Steven, and he continues to direct the band today.

In a letter received from Hahn in December of 1994 the following paragraph was included as quoted,

"Communities that are interested in preserving their values, culture and history must get about the business of establishing traditions; traditions that are meaningful and that enhance our way of life and indeed our civilization. It appears to me that the Antwerp Community Band is on it's way toward establishing some traditions of value and merit. These things do not happen by themselves. It takes careful planting, fertilization, cultivation and occasional weeding to nurture a successful tradition. I applaud these efforts and although it must be realized that we have only just begun, I am pleased with our beginnings and look forward to what might be possible in the future.

While Jim Hahn is no longer with us, he would be pleased with the Antwerp Community Band today.

Since those beginnings the band members' numbers has been between 25 and 30. People come and people go, but those who have been members since the beginning and continue to play are Max Zuber, Sharon Colley, Doug Dunakin, Julie Bradley, and Don Leckrone.





(Continued from Page 1) while providing oversight over financial regulators, such as the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and the Federal Reserve, all matters pertaining to consumer credit including the Consumer Credit Protection Act and access to financial services, as well as the safety and soundness of the banking system. Mr. Gillmor was also assigned to the Subcommittee on Capital Markets, Insurance and Government Sponsored Enterprises and the Subcommittee on Housing and Community Opportunity.

Mr. Gillmor was unanimously elected in 2006 by representatives of the 26 NATO countries to serve as Vice President of the NATO Parliamentary Assembly. Mr. Gillmor served as a

Deputy Minority Whip for the current Congress and was in his eighth term as a member of the Republican Whip team. Previously, he was elected a regional representative for four states to the House Republican Policy Committee. He served as a member of a bipartisan reform task force on ethics and congressional mailing practices. In 1994, Mr. Gillmor authored an article for the Harvard Journal on Legislation on "Reconstruction of Federalism: A Constitutional Amendment to Prohibit Unfunded Mandates."

Prior to his election to Congress, Mr. Gillmor served in the Ohio Senate for twenty-two years. As a State Senator, he was unanimously elected Republican leader five times, and he served as President of the Senate for three General As-

Throughout his career in public service, Mr. Gillmor received numerous awards for his accomplishments

from groups representing businesses, veterans, senior citizens, educators, prosecuting attorneys, civil service employees, and environmental concerns. Most recently, he was honored by the Toledo Regional Chamber of Commerce for his efforts to successfully prevent the Toledo Air National Guard Base from closing while saving more than 1,000 jobs. In addition, Mr. Gillmor was selected as one of the ten most outstanding legislators in the United States by the National Republican Legislators Asso-

Congressman Gillmor received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Ohio Wesleyan University and his law degree from the University of Michigan Law School. He was a graduate of Old Fort High School in Seneca County. Mr. Gillmor also held honorary degrees from Heidelberg College, Defiance College, Ohio University, Tiffin University, and Rio Grande College.

As a United States Air Force veteran, Mr. Gillmor attained the rank of Captain while on active duty. As an Air Force Judge Advocate, Mr. Gillmor served during the Vietnam Conflict from 1965-1966.

Congressman Gillmor survived by his wife Karen Gillmor, Ph.D., who currently serves as Vice Chairman of the State Employment Relations Board (SERB) in Ohio. Also a former State Senator, Dr. Gillmor was selected in 1995 as the Outstanding Freshman Legislator in the country by the National Republican Legislators Association. Congressman Gillmor is survived by his two daughters, Linda and Julie, and three sons, Paul Michael, and twins, Connor and Adam.

REPRESENTATIVE WA-CHTMANN APPOINTED TO COMMITTEE

COLUMBUS-State Representative Lynn Wachtmann (R- Napoleon) recently announced Speaker of the House Jon Husted (R- Kettering) appointed him to the Sewage Treatment System Technical Advisory Committee (TAC).

"I am tremendously pleased for such an opportunity to serve not only those in Northwest Ohio, but all Ohioans," Wachtmann said. "My colleagues and I on the committee will be responsible for improving our waste systems across Ohio in an effort to improve our environment while making the system more efficient.3

Non-legislative members of the committee are appointed by the director of health. The TAC consists of 10 members representing academia, the wastewater industry, contractors, public health professionals, soil scientists, engineers and the director's designee from the Ohio Department of Health (ODH).

The role of the TAC is to assist ODH with the development of standards and guidelines for use by the director in approving or disapproving systems or components that differ in design or function from those established in the sewage treatment system rules. The TAC provides recommendations to the director on the approval or disapproval of systems or components reviewed under this process.

In January, new household sewage rules went into effect and Wachtmann had been extremely outspoken and critical of the newly enacted rules. During the budget process, Wachtmann had been instrumental in the rescission of the rules and in the creation of

He was born in Huntington, Indiana in 1976. He went to school at the Harlan Christian Elementary School. He grew up in Grabill, IN. Most of his later schooling was at Woodlan, where he graduated in 1995.

He worked in Grabill for the Courier Printing Co. They published The Woodburn Booster and The Cedar Creek Courier. After a few years they merged in the 1980's and become The East Allen Courier. Bryce worked at all the jobs and positions there for 11 years and all this time he was dreaming of owning his own printing shop.

In 2005 that dream came true as they (he and his wife Angel), formed a corporation with Steve and Sue Knapp, and they formed what is now The West Bend News.

He married Angel Springer, a lady from the Leo area. She is a big help at the shop because she can do most any of the jobs. But that is the criteria of one small operation—everybody pitches in and does his part, and sometimes has to do another's job

because of sickness or other reasons.

Bryce and Angel have four children, Joshua in the fifth grade, Jarrison in the third grade, Joel is in the first grade, and Julia is in kindergarten. All of them are at Antwerp Elementary.

At the West Bend News, the paper is put "to bed" on Monday night. It is sent to KPC in Kendallville and it is printed there. On Tuesday morning, Steve goes there and picks it up-about 10,000 copies. He then goes to all the post offices in Paulding County—a copy for each patron at no charge. The paper should be delivered on Wednesdays.

Steve delivers about 1,000 copies to Defiance to be given to the patrons on the south east corner of Defiance. He also delivers about 400 to the Hicksville area closest to Antwerp. He also leaves copies at various markets and stores.

They do a lot of job printings for small businesses. They can and will do about any job of printing. All the way from business cards to wedding invitations.

I have been affiliated with The West Bend News for a little over two years now and I find these people to be hard working and sincere and big Antwerp Boosters.



SESSION TO RESUME, LEGISLATURE POISED TO TACKLE CORE ISSUES

Following the Labor Day Holiday, legislators will return to Columbus to continue our work on legislation designed to help better our state. Although we have not met for several weeks, members of the Ohio House have been busy over the summer speaking to interested groups and gathering information that will be used to help craft several important pieces of legislation for the fall. The rising cost of health

care is a concern for many, and my colleagues and I are working to ensure that quality, affordable health care services are available to all Ohioans. We included in the budget measures that increase the number of children and seniors eligible for certain health care programs and during the summer, members of the House Healthcare Access and Affordability Committee held hearings across the state to collect input on how to best provide insurance coverage to more Ohioans. As a result of these hearings, legislation will be introduced later this fall that will deal with wellness and prevention, information technology, and how to cover more of the uninsured.

Members of the Healthcare Access and Affordability Committee, including myself, have been studying the state's health care situation since the beginning of the year. I look forward to discussing the results of these hearings with my fellow committee members and beginning work on a proposal that will improve access to important health care programs and keep Ohioans

We will also begin to examine the governor's proposed energy plan, which was unveiled this past week. This plan seeks to ensure affordable and stable energy prices for Ohioans while also modernizing our energy infrastructure and increasing our usage of advanced energy technologies, such as wind and solar power.

When Ohio passed legislation in 1999 that deregulated electricity, it was believed that a competitive market would emerge and help keep prices low for consumers. Unfortunately, that has not happened and the rate stabilization plan that has been keeping prices stable for the last several years is set to expire at the end of 2008. By acting on this issue now, government officials and utility companies hope to avoid large increases in electricity prices similar to those experienced in other states that deregulated electricity. I will be sure to keep you updated on the progress of this plan as it works its way through the Legislature.

ODOT TO SUPPORT LOCAL SCENIC AND HISTORIC TRANSPORTATION PROJ-**ECTS**

COLUMBUS (September 6, 2007)—In partnership with local communities across the state, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) is awarding more than \$7.3 million in federal funds to several projects that highlight Ohio's rich transportation history and revitalize the scenic streetscapes of our state's smaller towns.

In Van Wert, funding was awarded for a streetscape project along Main Street from Fountain Park (Jefferson Street) to North Market Street (Historic Lincoln Highway). The project includes decorative sidewalks featuring brick pavers, embossed asphalt crosswalks, benches, trash receptacles, period street lighting and planters.

The village of Antwerp was awarded funding for the restoration of the historic Antwerp Norfolk & Western depot located at 503 W. River ST. The project will include complete exterior and interior renovation. Site work will include a paved parking area, exterior lighting, landscaping and signage. The depot is being proposed by the village to be used as a welcome center and museum.

Also among the list of 13 projects to receive funding for the 2010-11 budget cycle is the Iron Triangle Visitor's Center in Fostoria, where a 5-acre brownfield site will transformed into a viewing area and pavilion to watch the more than 100 trains that pass by each day. ODOT will also partner with the City of Cambridge to improve the streetscape along US Route 40/National Road with decorative lighting, bike racks near the library and courthouse, and new pedestrian crossings.

These federal dollars are part of ODOT's Transportation Enhancement Program, which annually provides approximately \$21 million for projects that enhance the transportation experience

by improving the cultural, historic, aesthetic and environmental aspects of transportation infrastructure. This also includes dollars for projects aimed at pedestrian and bicycle trails, which will be awarded later this month.

In larger cities, these funds are distributed by regional Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO). 



"FROM THE VANTAGE POINT": RESIDENTIAL AND INDUSTRIAL ELECTRICITY

The Vantage electricity program provides entry-level training ranging from residential wiring to industrial electrical applications. Students learn how to install, maintain and troubleshoot a variety of electrical systems, including the installation of coaxial or fiber optic cable for computers and other telecommunications equipment. Throughout the school year, students sometimes have the opportunity to perform tasks they've learned at actual worksites. This year is no exception. Vantage senior electricity students are currently assisting with electrical repairs at the Van Wert Innovation Center on Fox Road.

In the Wildfire Manufacturing portion of the facility, some of the repairs include troubleshooting lighting circuits, adding additional fluorescent lighting, making new receptacle drops for equipment and preparing electrical

service for a paint booth that will be installed in the near future. Students also installed electrical service to a new garage door opener in the warehouse portion of the facility.

Each year, Mr. Mel White and his senior electricity class have been available for minor repairs and installations at the Innovation Center - to the benefit of both the students and the new businesses.

"Having the opportunity to take the students to realworld work sites lets them see how what they're learning in the lab and the classroom is applied in real situations. This year's class is very knowledgeable, has good work habits and work well as a team" said instructor, Mel White.

The senior electricity class will also be involved in the installation of the electrical service, including rough-in and finishing, at the Vantage Carpentry house. The class will also be assisting with the electrical service at the Building and Grounds Renovation house.
