It's been a year, since you went away So much sadness and tears were shed that day. Living without you, makes us all feel blue, your one liners and jokes, we miss them too.









#### **LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

I am writing in support of the jail levy. When I first heard of a new tax for the jail I was initially against it. However, after I asked a few questions about how and why the new jail was built and why the levy was needed, I asked to be a member of the levy committee so I could help inform others of the situation at hand. The jail was built in 1876

( the same year as Custer's Last Stand) and was made to hold thirteen prisoners. The jail now averages about twenty-five with an average of five female prisoners. The old facility is not approved to hold female prisoners. It was also not possible to expand on the old jail because of public utilities in the alley and the general construction of the facility would not pass the Bureau of Adult Detention standards. This left only three choices.

1) Join with another county – Putnam was the only local county to join with and this option was voted down by public ballot.

2) Outsource all prisoners - Average price per prisoner per day is \$55.00 times average number of prisoners is 25 which equals \$1,375 per day times 365 equals \$501,875 per year. Plus the county would still need an emergency lock up manned 24/7/365 approved by Bureau of Adult Detention. Plus labor costs for transporting prisoners.

3) Create a new Facility - The commissioners secured a state grant that paid for about half of the new facility. Transforming the old electric building, instead of building from the ground up, saved the county roughly one million dollars. The new iail is in an excellent location with a large property, there is very little neighborhood disruption and it is approved by the Bureau of Adult Detention.

The levy asks for a renewal of a ¾ mil plus an additional ¾ mil. The current cost is equivalent to \$18.00 per year in property tax for a \$70,000 home. The new levy is the same cost for a total of \$36.00 per year in property tax for a \$70,000 home. (\$3 per month/10 cents per day).

The new levy is required because inflation over a ten year span eats up \$18.00 per year (imagine running your home on the same budget as a decade ago). And the Bureau of Adult Detention would not allow Paulding County to use the same people to dispatch the police and 911 calls. This forced the county to hire additional dispatchers.

The levy request of 1½ mils is expected to generate about \$440,000 a year. If this levy fails to pass the money to operate the jail or outsource the prisoners would have to come out of the general fund. This means money would have to be routed away from organizations that serve our communities, organizations that ourselves and our families rely on every day. I believe these services alone are worth an extra 10 cents a day.

You should probably also know that each and every citizen of Defiance County pays \$275.36 into their county general fund and here in Paulding County we pay \$215.91. That over 25% less here. It's okay to be antitax but let's not get the impression Paulding County is the bad guy. Far from it. If Gregg's letter is pointed at the new jail operating levy we should all understand it would be hard to find a better deal in the entire state of Ohio.

Paulding County people have always been proud and more than able to carry their own water. No one else was going to build our jail and operate it for us. Most of us expect that. The public is being asked to support this good project for a fairly modest cost. The levy will cost about an additional \$18.00 per year for a \$70,000.00 property. Since your general fund is so low I hope it is given strong consideration.





This picture is of the building of the present Maumee River Bridge. This was being built about 1951 or 1952. This was taken from the north end and shows the old 1912 bridge being used until the new one was finished.

The Ruckman and Hansen Construction Co., from Ft. Wayne did the steel work. I knew some of these boys. Bob, Russell and Charlie Thompson, Joe Powell, Roy Swing, Ross Knapp, Virgil Knapp and a number of men from Scipio Township. That bridge has served us 55 years and is in good shape.

On the old bridge, the road was curved, when coming from the north, from over about where the new bridge sits. You could not always see if a vehicle was coming from the south. Two farm trucks could pass on that bridge but usually your outside rear view mirror would get bent. But it got the job done.

In those years, in the 1930's, the south bank unside of town. Around 1960 the highway was moved west about ½ mile to the bypass downtown. Well, like any other city, all the businesses moved up on the bypass. Eight of the nine banks in that little town situated on the bypass, "old 27" is now Main Street. There are a lot of nice shops down there and a lot less hustle.

familiar with the Sebring Florida area said we could get a jet to land on that old abandoned air strip and have dad ready to go. I know that is illegal but it just might work and would be the best The other boy said he

knew a commercial pilot who flew a corporate jet. He would talk to him and explain the whole situation, but he may be out of town on a trip but it's worth a try.

Well, during the night and the next day they made all the plans over the phone. Dick's wife came down to the area where we were waiting for the news and told us how things were go-

A couple hundred vards north of that is the old abandoned airstrip with cement runways, long enough for four motored propeller planes because the old Constellations used to land there. But now it is off limits to everyone.

Then just north of that is The Sebring International Raceway. At certain times of the year that is quite busy but this being the first week in April, the big race is over.

Dick's wife said, "The jeep with she and Dick and a driver and one other man was to be at the corner off US 98 and the Race Track Road by 10:00 a.m., Wednesday. The pilot said he would be there at 10:15 and when he was landing they were to enter the airfield and wait for him to taxi up and stop. The two boys would help load Dick in the plane then his wife, with all his medicines and bandages in a bag, would get on the airplane. Then one of their grandsons would get off the plane with his toilet articles and a change of clothes and go into the jeep. He was to drive Dick's Pontiac automobile back to Ft. Wayne.

About 3:00 o'clock on Wednesday, Dick's wife called and said they were home and Dick was resting in his bed, but pretty well wore out. She said everything went off fine, just like

clock work. Well, boys, I just wanted you to know what you saw that morning was more of a journey of mercy than an illegal act.

I guess that is the only time I was ever into anything shady or cloak and dagger or clandestine. The only thing we done was—we knew all about it and we stood back and watched.

Now, I must tell you, that the only part of that tale that is true is when we started talking about Dick. I guess I had to make a story out of it. Looks like I have read too many Mike Hammer stories.

Well, that trip was the first week of April back in 2003. By the end of August most of Dick's organs stopped working and he passed away in his sleep.



#### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

#### **Village of Antwerp House Numbering**

The Village of Antwerp will enforce Village Ordinance No. 96-12 per taining to the display of house numbering. Each residence, commercial structure and outbuilding which has house numbers assigned by the Village house numbering system shall display the assigned number. Assigned numbers shall be displayed as follows: Color – shall be contrasting to the surface on which it is mounted. Location - Shall be mounted on the side of the building that faces the street for which the number is assigned. If a door is on the side of the building it shall be mounted over said door. The number shall be mounted in a manner so that it is easily visible from the street.

Whoever violates this ordinance shall on the first violation be given a written notice either via certified mail, return receipt requested, or by personal service notifying said individual of their failure to display the property number and giving them 30 days to come into compliance with the terms and conditions of this ordinance. If the violation continues and the individual fails to display the assigned house number in the manner required by law, they shall be fined not more than Twenty Five dollars and 00/100 (\$25.00) for each violation.
