CARRYALL TOWNSHIP FLAG PRESENTED



The 5th flag in my series is the Carryall Township flag, which was adopted in the spring of 2006 by trustees Greg Hughes, Joseph Barker, John Benny Wyckoff, and fiscal officer Deb Altic; who graciously allowed us to display it at the 2006 Paulding County Fair in the Junior Fair Building.

Designed by Antwerp Art Teacher, Lisa Girlie Jordan, the flag features the organization date of 1829 and proudly displays the Carryall Township name. The most detailed of all the township flags, it is divided into four sections, separated side-to-side by the Wabash Railroad, and top-to-bottom by a highway (representing Rte. 24 and Rte 49). A canal boat represents the Wabash & Erie Canal in one corner, while another contains trees and wildlife, so prevalent during the Black Swamp era. Another corner displays farm machinery to honor the agricultural in the community, while the final corner contains the "Carryall Rock".

Situated in the Northwest corner of Paulding County, Carryall Township abuts the Indiana border, with Defiance County to its North. For many years the most flourishing and populated, it was the 2nd township to organize. Its name is derived from a rock in the Maumee River, west of the village of Antwerp, which was shaped like a boat used by French voyagers to navigate rivers called "carryalls"!

1827 marked the beginnings of settlement with James Hinton settling as a squatter in the spring, and with David Applegate building the first log cabin in the fall, earning him the title of "first actual settler". Soon following were: Wilson Snook, Sr. and William Snook from Warren County. Wilson Snook served as county commissioner for 9 years and as an Ohio State Legislator for one term. He also erected the first frame barn in the township, and planted an orchard with seeds provided by Johnny Appleseed! Not long after the settlers came, the first white child was born (William Banks), on December 28, 1828. The Honorable H.N. Curtis (a chapter of the D.A.R. formed in Paulding County is named in his honor) performed the first marriage between David Murphy and Nancy Runyan. A widow in 1834 when David died, Nancy waited 37 years and then married Dr. B.B. Woodcock. The Maumee River is prominent Carryall in Township and is the principal waterway, although

other waterways include the Marie-De-Larme and the Six-Mile Creek.

A Reservoir to feed the Wabash & Erie Canal (see Caroline Zimmerman's article in a recent edition of West Bend News) was situated mostly in the township and abandoned in 1888, and caused the "Reservoir War".

Due to the River and the canal traffic, many businesses were booming, among them a stone quarry, flour and saw mills. Teacher William Roberts instructed 15 students in the first select school formed in 1833, located on the north bank of the River and about 2 miles northeast of Antwerp, near where the first post office was operated. The U.B. Church members organized in 1846, in a log school house near "Clarks" Corners", with David Landis spearheading the drive. Population remained somewhat steady for a decade with 1880 census showing 2,506 residents, and the 1890 census revealing a growth to 2,638 persons.

The foregoing is taken from the 1892 Paulding County Atlas, available at any library in the county and at all county school libraries. Copies may be purchased at the John Paulding Historical Museum on Fairground Drive on Tuesdays from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. and on the first Saturday of each month (10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.)



The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, January 17 and Monday, January 22, 2007.

During the Wednesday, January 17th session the Commissioners dealt with routine county business such as reviewing and approving bills, answering correspondence and comparing calendars for various evening committee meeting responsibilities.

Ed Straley reported on his first meeting as a member of the Northwest Ohio Community Action Commission (NOCAC). The meeting was held during the evening of Thursday, January 11 in Defiance County. NOCAC operates programs such as Head Start, services to senior citizens and the Farmers Market each summer.

Jane Gray, Superintendent of the Paulding County MRDD program met with the Commissioners during the Monday, January 22 session. Gray reported on updated automatic fire alarm systems at both the workshop and the Parc Lane building. The updated equipment includes an automatic system to notify the dispatch office in the Sheriff's Office of a problem in either building. Gray also noted the new officers for the MRDD board. Bill Priest is President, Jim Henriott is Vice President and Shirley Cramer is the Secretary.

During the January 22

traveled to the County Engineer's operations facility to inspect damaged, obsolete and surplus office equipment. The Engineer's office has provided a dry storage area for the old equipment until enough was accumulated for auction or disposal. The Commissioners agreed to save certain items for possible use at the new jail facility. Other items, such as an older non-functional calculator and broken furniture were declared to have no value for auction.

At the conclusion of the January 22 session the Commissioners attended the regular construction meeting at the new jail site. At the construction meeting the Commissioners heard the latest progress reports from each contractor and a representative of the architect's office.

The Paulding County Commissioners meet in regular session from 8:00 a.m. to the close of business on Mondays and Wednesdays.



ANTWERP HISTORY

In last week's column we talked about Dr. Caine and a letter from one of his granddaughters.

After we go on north on North Main Street from the Caine's house, the next house was the home of Harry Carr. He had married Florence West in the 1930's. They had two boys, Wayne and Lee. They also had a daughter, but she only lived to be five or six. Harry and his father, Everett, managed the gas station uptown that is now the drive thru. At that time it sold Johnson's Winged 70 gasoline and later on it became Hi-Speed by 1941.

The next house was home for the Ray Tracy family. He dealt in copper, aluminum and other metals. They had two daughters Martha and Sue and a son, Kelly.

That little corner house was not there at that time. It was built after WWII by George Clemmer. If you look close that is in a ravine. It comes from the west and in behind three houses and then across Oswalt Street and down to that large hallow and to the river. That was called the Lindenmuth Ravine because it starts on the west side of the street by the Lindenmuth house.

On the north side of Irwin Street is where Ab Guysinger lived. He and Bessie had two daughters, Rosetta and Phyllis. Rosetta married Robert Boesch and Phyliss married George McKeever.

I remember Phyliss was a fine athlete and a good basketball player. Mr. Guysinger was the manager of the Oasis Bar and Grill that had just been moved to the present location from over south where the Haver building now is.

The next house to the north was the home of Ray and Marsha Zuber. They had two daughters—Dorothy, who married Cloide Ehrhart and Zella, who married a man named Saldeen and lived in Twin Falls MN. Ray had a team of horses and a wagon and did dray work.

The next house is the house of Max and Hope Smith. It was built a little later. They are fine folks and were selected as "King and Queen" for last summer's "A Day in the Park". They are both over 90 new and doing pretty darn good. They had a daughter who married John Chilicote. She had a son named Rob.

The next house was home to Dr. Spreagems. I know they had one son named Terry. Doc had his office down what is called now the Neat & Clean Laundry. Doc was called away to the Army at the start of WWII. Then in the 1940's they moved to Cincinnati. He was a wellliked man. The next house was home to Tom and Phoebe Carr. They had Lyle, Maxine and Richard. Prof. Richard and his wife Marie Slusher still live in Antwerp. The brick house is next and Mr. and Mrs. Orlando Foust lived there. But before that, in the 1930's I think was the home of Mr. Hartwell. They had a couple of boys, I didn't know them very well, but I think they drilled wells for drinking water. The next house on the corner of Wilcox and North Main was where the Jenkins

family lived. He was a engineer on the Pennsy Railroad. They had a daughter, Sue, and a son, Rex. Mrs. Jenkins was a daughter of George Clemmer, Sr. They moved to Ft. Wayne and a number of other folks have lived there. A family named McCreery and later on Jack and Annie Taylor.

The next house where the Gale Jordan family lives, was built by and the home for Frank Hemenover. He was a construction man and built a number of houses here in town. Frank and Ida had two daughters, one lived in Bell-flower, IL. Bertha married Don Hallock and lived here in town. That whole family has always been a part of my life.

The next house was built by Bob Johnson in 1950 and wasn't here at that time. One summer there was a Putt-Putt Golf Course on that lot.

The next house is where John Hudson lived. He dealt in furs and hides. I remember he once gave me a quarter for a dead "a'possum". They had one son named Bud.

The fourth house north on the east side of SR 49 after you pass Wilcox Street was the home of Oliver and Cleo Reeb. I think Dick Shull lives there now.

Oliver Reeb was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Adam Reeb, They had Thomas, Oliver, Mondus and Hattie. Hattie married Russell Brown and lived on the River Road west for years. All three of these boys were a vital part of the big baseball era in Antwerp in the 1920's-1030's. Tom was an outfielder and a good hitter. Mondus was a good pitcher. Later on he served as Paulding County Treasurer. Then their family moved to Texas. Oliver was a veteran of WWI. After his return he pitched a lot of baseball and was called to play in the Appalachian League. One hot day the weather suddenly changed from hot to chilly, he didn't have a warm-up jacket and his shoulder stiffened up. He couldn't throw right after that.

Later he married Cleo Burroughs in 1924, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Emory Burroughs. Oliver became Rural Carrier on Rt. 1 out of Antwerp and Cleo became a school teacher. Mostly she taught in the one room school houses in Scipio Township. I think they closed that school called Center Scipio in 1950.

The Fett boys built that house in 1924. Óliver told me that 50 cents an hour was the wage at that time. They had a son, Maurice, born in 1934. Oliver and Cleo had a cottage up on Hamilton Lake in the Penn Park Area. That was good bass fishing all along that shoreline and we hit it pretty regular. Well, Pauline and I rented his cottage for a week one summer about 1950 and we took our bird along. We had a blue and white parakeet named Chippie. Chippie lived to be 13. (My friend, Lorsey, had a cockatiel that lived to be 29). Well, this bird could talk a little and he had a very sharp "wolf call" whistle. He had a routine of saying all his words and then three or four squawks and end up with a loud whistle that you could hear for a city block. We sat his cage out in the screened in porch and he would do his thing. The people in the next (Continued on Page 5)



On this day, Mrs. Kruse had on a light-weight colored jacket that went about halfway to her knees but perfectly acceptable for wear at the lake or beach. She was an attractive lady.

I picked up a couple of casting rods and started for the steps that led down to the lake because about 4:30 in the afternoon the bass would start hitting. She met me, I guess about the property line and said, "I have more clothes on under the smock. She showed me that she had on a ladies bathing suit like they wore at that time.

I nodded and she went back to her cottage and I just stood there. After a few seconds of bewilderment I went on down to the lake. In a minute or two I realized why she acted like that. She thought that I was whistling at her. She had heard our parakeet doing his thing! Well, I knew better than to try to tell her it was a bird that whistled at her and not I. Well, that lady went back to Fort Wayne and always thought, "that young whipper-snapper whistled at me"! I swear, I didn't do it. Well, it's like Ben Franklin said when he closed his first Five and Dime Store, "you win some and you lose some!" The Reebs had a boy, Maurice, born in 1934. As a teenager he chummed around with Terry Spraegems who was the son of Dr. Spraegems and a Perry boy whose father, Ralph, was with the Antwerp Furniture Co. After Maurice graduated

from high school, he attended a Barber College in Toledo and then went to barbering in Woodburn. He married Marilyn Garmen and they had two boys. Maurice passion was restoring old classic cars. Because many heart attacks occur in people who have unremarkable conventional risk factors, getting the right diagnostic tests can be critical.

Talk with your doctor about whether you are a candidate for a heart scan, a noninvasive procedure that shows the amount of calcified plaque in your coronary arteries.

Also ask about advanced blood testing, which can determine whether you have dangerous small, dense LDL and HDL cholesterol particles, elevated C-reactive protein (a marker for inflammation), and/or high homocysteine levels, another predictor of heart attack. Using the results of such advanced tests can help your doctor develop an aggressive preven-tion program that is right for you.

"The South Beach Heart Program" outlines all of these tests to help you understand their significance and develop an action plan with your doctor.

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



PUBLIC NOTICE ORDINANCE PROHIBITING SNOWMOBILES ON CITY PROPERTY AND PRIVATE PROPERTY



LEGISLATIVE INTERNSHIP **PROGRAM PROVIDES** VALUABLE EXPERIENCE IN **STATE GOVERNMENT**

During the course of a general assembly, members of the Ohio House and Senate have hundreds of bills and amendments to consider. Trying to understand the complex nature of some legislation can be a challenge, but one that is made easier thanks to the work of the Legislative Service Commission (LSC). This agency, created in 1953, provides a variety of technical and research services, including drafting and analyzing bills, research projects, estimates of state revenue and expenditures, amendment drafting, fiscal notes and general information about governmental fiscal issues.

In addition to all the work performed for members of the legislature, the Legislative Service Commission also operates an internship program designed to provide recent college graduates with experience working in state government. Each year, LSC sponsors 24 paid 13-month internships. The majority of these interns work closely with members of the House and Senate, often working in a member's office. Although their duties vary, interns often perform administrative duties, respond to constituent inquiries, and write speeches and press releases.

Other interns in the LSC Internship program work directly with LSC staff and assist in drafting legislation, perform legal or fiscal research, attend committee hearings,

and monitor sessions of the House and Senate. Additionally, two interns are placed with Ohio Government Telecommunications to work as production assistants. These interns help televise legislative sessions and assist in the production of public service communications.

The LSC Internship program begins the first week in December and ends December 31st of the following year. The only eligibility requirement is that all applicants must have completed a bachelor's degree program by December. The deadline to apply for a legislative internship is April 2nd and the application deadline for the telecommunications internships is May 31st. You can visit the Legislative Service Commission's Web site at www.lsc.state.oh.us for more information about the program or to download an application. You can also write to LSC at Internship Program Coordinators, 77 South High Street, 9th Floor, Columbus, OH 43215.

The program is not limited to those majoring in political science or other governmentrelated fields. Each year, interns come to the program with a variety of backgrounds and majors, and this year is no different. This year's class has graduated with degrees in geography, economics, finance, and journalism in addition to political science. The skills and relationships gained during the program are applicable in all fields, whether an intern remains working in government after the program ends or goes on to work in another field.

I am pleased to announce that one of the interns in the program is from right here in

the 75th District. Martin Mc-Conahay is a native of Ohio City in Van Wert County and attended The Ohio State University where he doublemajored in political science and psychology. Martin is currently working here in the House in the office of state Representative Jim Carmichael, who represents the 3rd House District. I hope Martin enjoys his time working in the Ohio House and wish him

every success. For more than 40 years, the LSC Internship Program has provided individuals interested in government and politics the opportunity to learn about the inner workings of public policy and the legislature first-hand. It is my hope that this experience will inspire many or all of the interns to remain active in government, whether they continue to work here in Ohio or elsewhere in our nation.
