Fall related injuries are the leading cause of injury, death and disabilities among older adults according to the National Institutes of Health. It is estimated that one in four people over the age of 65 who live at home will fall during the next year. The most serious fall injury is hip fracture with one half of all older adults hospitalized for hip fractures never regaining their former level of function.

To call attention to risk factors involved in falls, especially during the winter months when weather and icy conditions can contribute to falls, Hawthorn Court skilled nursing center is sponsoring a month-long Fall Facts and Prevention educational series at its facility in Paulding. Hawthorn Court is making available to the public free brochures and information relating to improving balance and strategies for preventing falls. In addition, the facility is sponsoring a free seminar on February 8, 2007 where professionals will present exercises for improving balance and ideas for making the home environment

According to John Parsons, administrator at Hawthorn Court, effective fall prevention requires a multifaceted approach that encompasses improvement of strength and balance; home modifications to reduce hazards and medication as-

SIXTH TOWNSHIP FLAG IN A SERIES



Flag six in my series of township flags is for Paulding Township. Flag designer Ann Dysinger's finished product was adopted by Trustees Jay Dangler, Paul Hill, Mike Kauser and fiscal officer Jane Buchman.


St. Paul Lutheran Church dominates the center of the red flag, which also features a coat-of-arms, with ears of corn and two pheasants on each side, and a white banner across the top. The name of the township is centered between shafts of wheat, with the organizing year of 1851 shown at the flag's bottom.

The only local church owned by a Township, St.

Paul Lutheran Church is located on Twp Rd. 114, 4 miles SW of Paulding Village, and is only used for special occasions. The flag's pheasants represent a time long ago when they were so plentiful that our county for a time was the "hot spot" for pheasant hunting in the U.S.'s eastern portion. As most of Paulding Township was farmed, the wheat and corn depicted are to denote the flourishing agricultural community.

Occupying the center of Paulding County, this township was the most populated, being settled in 1842 on the Flatrock Creek by a squat-

ter named Michael Kimmell. His "squatter status" was not recognized, however, as worthy of being named the "first" settler, but rather that title went to John Fisher who built a cabin in 1843; and his child, Almira, became the first white child born in the new township. Named "Crooked Creek"

by the native Indians, the Flatrock Creek is the largest stream in Paulding Twp., and was the home of the first grist mill, built by Elias Shafer, in 1855, at the south end of what is now "Main Street" in Paulding Village. Other enterprises included: a steam flour mill built in 1876 by Eugene Linn (unsuccessful), a larger mill (successful) built in 1890 producing 100 barrels of flour per day, a saw mill built before the grist mill in 1852 by

Campbell & Forney, and stave and lumber companies.

Villages in Paulding Township were: Paulding, Latty, Briceton, Worstville and Holcombe. The present "courthouse yard" ĥoused the first school in 1853, but was preceded by the first post office in 1850. A U.B. Minister (John Shingledecker) preached the first sermon in 1848, but the church didn't organize until 5 years later. The census of 1880 listed the population of the township at a mere 1,065; however, by 1890, it had grown to 4,492.

All of the above information is taken from the "1892 Paulding Co. Atlas" available at all county libraries, branches and school libraries. Purchases may be made at the John Paulding Historical Society Museum on Fairground Drive, which is open each Tuesday from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. and the first Saturday of each month from 10:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.



(Continued from Page 1) sessment to identify and minimize any side effects that might contribute to loss of balance and subsequent

"Balance begins to deteriorate as most people age," says Kim Justinger, the program manager for rehabilitation services at Hawthorn Court. Balance, your body's ability to control and maintain its position as it moves through space, relies on three types of sensory information: visual, spatial orientation and inner ear function. Effective fall prevention addresses all three. According to Parsons,

those concerned with falls should have their eyes checked at least once a year to make sure they are wearing the proper prescription glasses and to rule out any conditions like glaucoma or cataracts that might limit vision. "As you get older, you need brighter lights to see well. Elders should consider improving the lighting in their homes and lightweight curtains or shades on windows will reduce glare while still allowing natural light in," says Parsons.

Strength and flexibility

are also key components of maintaining proper balance. Even if vision and inner ear function are normal, there can still be risk of falls if muscles are weak. Arthritis, osteoporosis and other musculoskeletal disorders often affect older people making them more afraid to participate in physical activity. Ironically, lack of activity fosters inflexibility, limited mobility and a general weakening of muscles - thus setting the stage for even greater risks of falls. To maintain strength and flexibility, a regular exercise program can help older adults feel stronger and more confident in their daily activities. According to Justinger, exercises that improve balance and coordination, such as Tai Chi, are most helpful.

Parsons further advises elders to consult with their family physicians or pharmacists to determine if there are drug interactions, including over the counter drugs, which might contribute to a lack of balance. Persons concerned about inner ear function, should alert their doctors.

Making the home environment safer is also critical since half of all falls happen at home.

Justinger suggests re moving things that can be tripped over from stairways and frequently walked areas of the house. Throw rugs should either be removed or taped down using double sided tape to keep them from slipping. Nonslip mats should be used in

the bath and shower. And persons should always wear shoes, preferably lace-up walking shoes, both indoors and out. Justinger says you should avoid going barefoot or wearing slippers.

sometimes not ward off a fall. When a fall or serious injury occurs it is critical to receive proper care as quickly as possible in order to restore optimal function. "If you fall and are experiencing even slight discomfort, it is better to have your physician examine you to determine the extent of your injury than to ignore it hoping it will get better," says Justinger. Immediate treatment can help reduce inflammation, assure proper care and thus produce a better outcome from any resulting therapy. According to Parsons,

physical therapy and rehabilitation are key services offered by Hawthorn Court. "The goal of our rehabilitation services is to restore an individual to an optimum level of function and return them to their normal living arrangements prior to their fall. We actually begin therapy discharge planning on the very first day."

Justinger cites an elderly woman of 91 with a hip fracture who underwent rehabilitation therapy at Hawthorn Court. When admitted she was unable to bear weight and was nonambulatory. She was in need of maximum assistance for dressing, personal care, meal preparation and other normal daily activities. She underwent physical and occupational therapy for a little over three months at Hawthorn Court and when her program was completed she returned home where she is able to move, prepare her own meals and enjoy a much higher level of independence and quality of life. "These are the outcomes that make my work so rewarding," says Justinger.

As part of a month-long focus on fall prevention, Hawthorn Court is offering the community free educational materials and clinics. Persons interested in learning more about how to prevent falls and improve balance can pick up free brochures at Hawthorn Court located at 1017 W. Wayne Street in Paulding any time between the hours of 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. weekdays during the month of Febru-

Hawthorn Court is also sponsoring a free seminar focusing on fall prevention and balance which is open to the public. This seminar will take place Thursday February 8 at 6:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Of course, even the utmost of prevention can

Paulding County Hospital's chief financial officer Rob Goshia presented his 2006 year-end financial report to the PCH board of trustees at their recent meeting. The hospital had a year to date net profit of \$340,876. "Profits came from three main areas, two of which

were year-end occurrences," said Goshia. "First, PCH is due a payment of around \$140,000 from the insurance it carries against being self-insured. Second, the Medicare cost report writeoffs were significantly decreased. And third, outpatient revenue for December was approximately \$84,000 more than expected." In other financial news,

two Capital Expenditure Requests were reviewed. The board approved a capital lease for an integrated chemistry and immunoassay instrument for the laboratory at a savings of \$35,000 per year. The instrument detects and measures chemicals.

electrolytes, and drugs in blood and plasma. \$15,000 was approved to purchase a used pick up truck for the maintenance department.

Gary Adkins, hospital CEO, proposed a scholarship for medical student Catherine Gray. After completing her schooling and residency, Gray will return to Paulding County and practice family medicine for a minimum of five years to compensate for the scholarship.

Adkins also reported to the board that the Benevolent Society contributed \$5,200 to purchase a multichanneled IV pump. "We deeply appreciate the Benevolent Society's continued financial support to help the hospital improve the health of Paulding County residents," he told the board.

Chief operating officer Randy Ruge informed the group that Lori Hockenberry, CRNA, started at the hospital in mid-January and is performing well. He also shared that lab manager Laura Roth is hard at work preparing for the upcoming Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations' survey.

PAULDING COUNTY COM-MISSIONERS

The Paulding County Commissioners met in regular session on Wednesday, January 24 and Monday, January 29, 2007.

At the January 24 meeting the Commissioners approved a recommendation from Travis McGarvey, Paulding County Engineer, to reduce the weight limit on a bridge. The bridge is Paulding Township on County Road 87, as it crosses the Flat Rock. This is the bridge close to the Paulding Township House. The load limit has been reduced from 35 to 20 tons due to structural deficiencies.

In conjunction with the weight limit action the Commissioners reviewed McGarvey's 2006 Bridge Inspection Report. The report provides information to the County Commissioners, a comparison of bridges from year to year to identify changes and to allow for future planning for maintenance or replacement. The comprehensive report notes that there are a total of 192 county and township bridges on the inventory in Paulding County. Of these only 25 are posted with reductions in weight limits. The report is available for inspection at the Commissioners' Office.

During the January 24th session the Commissioners met with the county insurance committee to discuss the possible advantages of partially self-funded health insurance. The Commissioners consult with the committee members for advice on the health insurance plan.

At the same session the Commissioners reported on recent meetings they attended. Marty Harmon, Chairman on the Board of Commissioners noted attendance at the quarterly meeting of the Association of Paulding County Trustees and Clerks. Harmon

also attended the Sunday, January 21 meeting of the Paulding County Historical

Dave Harrow, Paulding County Sheriff, talked with the Commissioners during the January 24th meeting about progress on the new jail. Harrow noted, "There is a lot more activity at the jail and progress on final details is more apparent. During the jail construction meeting last week, we were able to see the floors that have been completed, the new kitchen equipment installed and final painting of door and window frames," concluded Harrow.

The Monday, January 29 session featured a presentation by Bill Edwards of the Paulding County Health Department about the proposed no smoking rules being developed by the Ohio Health Department. Edwards shared a news release from the County Health Department that was intended to inform Paulding County citizens of the rule development process. Edwards also noted that the proposed rules would require businesses to post no smoking signs, remove ashtrays and prohibit smoking.

During Monday afternoon the Commissioners attended the quarterly Four County Solid Waste district meeting at the Williams County Commissioners' Office in Bryan. The Four County Solid Waste District operates two landfills and supports recycling activi-

REP. GILLMOR INTRODUC-ES BIPARTISAN BILL TO PROTECT CHILDREN FROM **SEX OFFENDERS ON THE** INTERNET

Congressman Paul Gillmor (R-Tiffin) recently introduced legislation to require sex offenders to register their e-mail and instant message addresses with the National Sex Offender Registry. Gillmor's KIDS Act, Keeping the Internet Devoid of Sexual Predators Act of 2007, was also introduced in the U.S. Senate by Senators John McCain (R-AZ) and Charles Schumer (D-NY). "Social networking web-

sites such as MySpace and Facebook as well as instant messaging like AOL and Google have become a chief means of communication for many children today. Unfortunately, the success of this new communication has also opened the door for predators wishing to lure our kids. We have all seen far too many television programs and newspaper articles with new stories everyday about sex offenders posing as children to bait our kids into the unthinkable," Gillmor said. "This bill today represents the perfect amount of coordination between the technology industry and the federal government to continue protecting our children," said Congressman Gillmor, who was a chief sponsor of the Dru Sjodin National Sex Offender Website last year.

According to the KIDS Act, once a sex offender has registered their e-mail and instant message addresses

fender Registry, the Department of Justice will make this information available to social networking sites upon request to compare with user profiles in order to protect children from online sexual predators. Offenders must update the registry before using any new identifiers or face fines or imprisonment of up to ten years. In addition, if the offender is on parole, providing false information or failing to register will result in mandatory revocation of supervised release. When a social network website requests information from the Department of Justice, it must provide appropriate contact information, the legal nature of the website, and a signed affirmation from the chief legal officer that the information will only be used to compare identifiers with the website's database.

In addition, Gillmor's KIDS Act makes it a crime, punishable with a prison term of up to 20 years, for anyone over the age of 18 to misrepresent their age with the intent to use the Internet to engage in criminal sexual conduct with a minor.

Bryce Steiner and I recently visited the Hickory House Studio, that is the dream home of Terry Bow-

Bryce and I walked into Terry's carving room/den, and it was sorta like being on the front of a beautiful Christmas Card with all the carved animals all around. I mean all around, on the window sill, on the deck, on the work bench and hanging from the ceiling. Some mounted birds, some carved birds and some unfinished

After we looked at everything and took a few pictures, then Terry started to explain everything to us. I saw this block of wood and I asked if that was a future duck? He explained that it was 45/x51/x17 inch block of Basswood. He uses that species of wood when he can, because the other good type is Tupelo and comes from the wetlands of Louisiana and is quite expensive. You draw the outline and measurements of your subject on the sides and top of the block. Then he uses the band saw, which is out in the work room and does the Sylvia'S Country Portraits



rough sawing. Then he sits down and starts carving.

His work bench is from his Grandpa Brueggemann who also was a good wood worker. Terry chisels, gouges and knives. He knives with straight blades, curved blades and boxes of these things. Some of his tools were handed down from his grandpa. He starts to carve the body, as the neck and head are separate.

He has made the head and neck and sanded it hundreds of times, they are glued into place with epoxy and modeling clay and then sanded some more. He buys the eyes from a supply house and they are an exact replica of that species real eyes. Then he puts some lead in the bottom of the bird to balance it. Now it goes to the painting table. Terry has a fine touch with the paint brush. He has a number of pictures of ducks, fish and birds. You can't sit in his den without getting the wildlife fever. Conservation is getting to be more important every year and Terry is big into it. His backyard is a beautiful hollow with big trees that go back a hundred

Doty Road in 1940. As you go west on the Doty Road iust before you come to the Milan Center Elevator on the north side of the road is a fine limestone ranch style house. Well, that house was built after WWII, but this is where Terry grew up.

Terry has a son, Tim, from his first marriage. He is a teacher out in Colorado and has a fine family of his

Terry married Cindy in 1972 and they moved to Antwerp and she started teaching in Antwerp Elementary School. When they came here they lived in a trailer out on ÚS 24 in Joe Vail's woods. In 1976, they bought the home of Eddie Shuherk on U.S. 24 East. As you remember, Eddie and Barbara

moved to Northern Indiana and operated a restaurant.

Terry sold the appliance store and worked as a book keeper for the school board. But for the most part he worked as a truck dispatcher for a trucking company that hauled for Phelps Dodge Copper Products. But while he was doing this he remodeled his house. What was the garage, he made into a family room. When he done this he found out that he was a good finish carpenter and he liked wood working. About this time he attended an art show and a carving show and thought he would

like to do that for a hobby. Over the years he has gotten better and better at carving. His west wall is covered with Blue Ribbons that he has won at shows. If you remember a few years ago, Antwerp had a contest on the making of a logo for the Village of Antwerp. Well, Terry entered one called The Diamond of Northwest Ohio spotted on a replica of the northwest part of the State of Ohio. Well, Terry's entry won and you can see it on the East Water Tower among other places.

Over the years, he has carved some out door pieces for people. He has carved things for inside the house for decorations. But he never has carved people or animals. He has entered the contest for the replica for the Duck Stamp, but never

won it. He has a fine collection of shore birds that he has carved. I'm not going to mention them all, there are just too many.

Cindy started teaching here in Antwerp in 1972. Along with all that teaching, she raised two daughters, Carolyn has three children and lives in Ft. Wayne. Leslie has one daughter and also lives in Ft. Wayne. All together they have 12 grandchildren and more would be welcome.

Cindy has taught the first grade here in Antwerp for over 30 years. She plans on retiring in May of 2008. Our school system will lose one of our first class teachers.

I could go on and on about the Bowers and their great input into our community but I know what they would say to all of us. If we want our grandchildren to enjoy all the wildlife and







I work for The Crescent-News out of Defiance, our only Paulding County daily paper to date, with approximately 3,000 current subscribers with estimated readers approximately 7,000 county wide. Have you ever wondered why we get virtually no information on the incident reports from the sheriff's offices that occur in Paulding County? Do you really believe The Crescent-News doesn't bother to ask? You can plainly see the reports from the other counties we serve, why not Paulding?

You may ask how that affects our residents. Personally, I want to know if there has been an armed robbery, break-in, trespasser spotted or a more serious crime. Other counties in the area comply willingly as required by the Sunshine Law to pro-

vide that very public information when we request it of them daily. Some even fax it to us without request.

Are we trying to hide something in Paulding County? Is their more hidden in the manure than cow patties? Pray tell that isn't so, help us to be equally informed as others in our state. Paulding County is not a third world country why should it be treated as such?

We have a right to know, a right to be informed so that we may be prepared properly to take care of our children and grandchildren.

Marty let your voice be heard. Please, we gave you a title, Paulding County Commissioner. Use it to encourage others to willingly comply with our statewide laws. I'm sure you are very aware this is the tip of the iceberg, but we must start letting the Sunshine into the dark areas in our county to clean them

Our newly elected commissioner believes that we the citizens of Paulding County were uninformed in the past election and need education to make the right decision concerning funding for the new jail. Some of us are over informed and need to see changes made to bring compliance to current laws that are ignored. Before we consider opening our purses to throw our confidence and support behind more funding for the jail we need you to take action. 7398 voted on the jail funding, 3898 voted no as I did, how many feel as

Are you aware that the initial incident report from a police shooting is immediately open to any citizen anywhere in any state that requests it without a court order? It's all there in the 2006 edition of the Sunshine

Most all initial incident reports are public. No people, that's right. You are not required by law to pay \$3 for the top sheet of an incident report that contains very little information, you get the whole initial report at real cost of supplies (the Ohio Attorney General's office charges .05) and if you're denied and file a mandamus you also may, at the honorable (literally) Judge Webb's discretion, get your legal fees back to be paid for by the offending office. It comes right out of their operating budget. I am confident we can count Judge Webb in on fully following the law and letting the chips fall where they may.

Look it up for yourself. Don't trust your fate to what you are told by others. No, you're not lawyers, but you are literate. This is public information very easy to understand. May I recommend Lexis Nexus, and the Sunshine Law, www.ag.state. oh.us. Keep in mind if you feel you need an attorney to sort through this, may I suggest a private attorney. Some commissioned attorneys may have private financial reasons or be pressured by others to not disclose the truth, leaving you in the position of setting on thin ice. In a serious health issue you consult two doctors; I hope you take this serious it's your counties residents' safety you are considering.

We need to vote for candidates committed to obeying the law and holding them accountable for their actions with our votes. We have seen many changes in our state and national government as people nationwide cry out for a change and let their voices be heard. We the people still are in charge. Let's act like it! Consumers can also turn to the Consumer Protection Section of the Ohio Attorney General's office. This section investigates consumer complaints, mediates settlements, and also initiates legal actions against companies accused of using unfair or deceptive business practices. In addition, so consumers can lodge complaints or have their questions answered, the Consumer Protection Section operates a toll-free hotline, 1-800-282-0515.

Although researching a company is always a good idea before making a purchase, it is equally important to protect your personal information from falling into

Make sure you keep information (such as your social security and bank account numbers) in a safe place and avoid giving them out unless absolutely necessary. Many thieves will pose as legitimate companies and claim that you have a problem with your account. They then ask for your information to address the issue, a technique known as "phising." If you are concerned about someone fraudulently seeking your information, ask to contact the company yourself to make sure the inquiry is legitimate. Victims of identity theft

Here in Ohio, members of the legislature are taking an active role to help keep you from becoming a victim of identity theft. In addition, the bill also increased penalties for identity theft in general and created even higher penalties for those who steal the identities of

JAMES DOUGHTY UPDATE

This is an update on James and Sera Doughty for all their family and friends in Northwest Ohio. James is the sonin-law and Sera is the daughter of Donald and Rebekah Smith of Antwerp.

James is not only battling a rare cancer for the third time (Recurring Hodgkin's Lymphoma, in the form of a large tumor by his heart), but he is now also fighting cancer of the blood and bone marrow (Acute Myelogenous Leukemia). He has returned to Atlanta for treatment and entered Northside Hospital on December 28, 2006.

Sera continues to work each day from the hospital and is staying with friends, Brian anḋ Ďanna Nelson, 3949 Russell Street, Suwanee, GA 30024. These friends have opened their home to her.

While in the hospital Jim got pneumonia in both lungs. His pneumonia appears to be bacteria-based and nonfungal. Fungal pneumonia is much more difficult to treat. In late January he was tested and found that he was clear of leukemia cells. The catch is that blast cells can reset as either cancerous or non-cancerous. His pneumonia was still a primary concern.

On January 29th the doctors felt that because his counts are way up and the pneumonia had improved, they would release him from

to return to the clinic each day for treatment. They are both now staying at the Nelson's and they return each day to the clinic and Sera works from that area on her lap top computer. The week of February 8th, Jim will get a CAT and PET scan and a bone marrow test to see where things stand. Depending on the results, his next round of chemo may be given to him. REP. GILLMOR VOTES TO RENEW FISCAL DISCIPLINE IN FEDERAL BUDGET

Less than one month into the 110th Congress, Representative Paul Gillmor (R-Tiffin) says the new Democratic leadership is already "way off course" of the views of his district. Gillmor today voted against the federal spending which he says contains billions of dollars in earmarks and runs afoul of the promises by the House leadership.

"I had been hoping to receive legislation to fund federal programs consistent with the will of my constituents and the needs of the federal government. Unfortunately, this bill has more pork in it than a spit-roasted pig. I cannot imagine how Members of Congress will be able to go back to their districts and justify a \$45 million Tropical Rain Forest in Iowa," Gillmor said. "At the end of the day, politics has overtaken promises and this bill has taken us way off course."

A traditional continuing resolution is used to continue funding from a previous year with only minor adjustments. The 2007 continuing resolution was brought to the floor under a closed rule, which does not allow for amendments, realigns significant federal dollars and adds an additional \$6.1 billion in federal spending.

Among the realigned funding, U.S. foreign aid is

cut by \$1.25 billion, NASA MARGO MOO™ funding is cut by \$545 million, the jobs of 160 DEA **AIDS CHILDREN'S** Agents are now on the line, **DELIVERY OF MED**and Army and Air National Guard construction fund-**ICATION** ing is slashed by \$121 million while other programs receive additional funds beyond what

President Bush had requested.

GILLMOR ANNOUNCES \$49,495 GRANT FOR TIF-FIN TOWNSHIP VOLUNTEER **FIRE DEPARTMENT**

Congressman Paul E. Gill-

mor (R-Tiffin) announced today that the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Office of Grants and Training has approved a \$49,495 grant for the Tiffin Township Volunteer Fire Department in Defiance County. "Receiving money from the federal government has

become much more difficult as we work to reduce our deficit spending. However, it has always been the priority of Congress to fund projects which protect public health and welfare. I have no doubt that the money which the Tiffin Township Fire Department received today will better protect the residents of our area," Gillmor said.

"Having the most advanced equipment for our firefighters is a national goal which everyone shares. These first responders play a critical role in safeguarding Defiance County and the monies approved by Congress will deliver the resources necessary to excel in their mission. This grant is an investment by the Federal government in the Fifth District of Ohio and I think it is money well spent," Gillmor concluded.

The Tiffin Township grant can be used to fund different expenses such as training, the purchase of fire fighting equipment, personal protective equipment, vehicles and modifications to stations and facilities. This is a competitive grant program intended to enhance the ability of local first responders to protect the health and safety of the public as well as their personal.

"Our goal is to greatly enhance the collective preparedness of the nation while making certain that finite resources are directed to areas most at risk and to solutions that are innovative and regionally driven," said Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff. The grant Tiffin Township received came as a result of money appropriated by Congress for direct assistance to provide smaller law enforcement and emergency responder agencies with equipment items that will enhance and support regional response, mutual aid, and interoperability of responder equipment.
