



One of the most vivid memories I have growing up was watching home movies as a family. Nostalgia washes over me as I vividly recall the whir of that old Bell & Howell projector and the dust-speckled images of 8mm movie film hitting the portable screen in our living room. We'd sit there and watch ourselves when we were 8 years old, blowing out the candles on a birthday cake. We'd see Christmas trees from 30 years ago, laden with packages yet to be opened up by three little kids anxious for dad to stop taking movies.

There would be pictures for posterity of my brother, sister, and me waving at mother and dad as we walked to school on the very first day of my third grade year. Family vacations and family reunions were all captured on reels and reels of movie film that has been lovingly labelled and kept through the years. The collection of home movies of my boyhood years is priceless.

One of the family rituals that was part of watching home movies was talking my dad into "freeze framing" the reel at different times that would capture one of us in a crazy pose. We'd laugh and howl at whoever was caught in an unbecoming position when the projector was paused. Occasionally to this day, we break out some of those old movies and show them to our children, nephews, and nieces. The funny thing was, once the movieshow was over, all would have this overwhelming sense that life has moved on. We were no longer the same people shown on that movie screen.

As I mused about that the other day, I realized how easy it is for parents to "freeze frame" our children. To label or peg our children according to a particular characteristic – this one's the funny one, this one's the quiet one, this one over here is the moody one, this one is the smart one, this one needs extra help.

Labelling our children is like pausing the 8mm movie film on one particular frame and using it to describe the still-pictured person for the

That can be both dangerous and destructive. Just as those freeze-frame movie shots were not accurate repre-

shots were not accurate representations of who we actually were at that time of our lives, neither are some of the labels that we tend to place on our children.

Like with the old movies, time goes on. People change. They grow. They mature. That is, if we as parents let them.

In what way have YOU pigeon-holed your kids and, in fact, locked them into a role or characteristic from which they are having an awful time trying to break out of?

Want to piece of advice? Give them some space. They'll change. They'll grow. They'll mature. You did. And I did. Maybe one of the best things we can do for our children is to give them the freedom to grow, change, and move through the various stages of development without mom and dad expecting them to be perfect.

After all, that's the way my heavenly Father treats me. I'm so glad that God doesn't look down on me and say to some of the angels in His company, "See that guy there?" That's Joel. He's the one who always fouls up. He's one of those who's constantly dropping the ball."

Rather, God the Father gives me room to grow, room to develop, and most importantly, room to make mistakes and fail. And He still accepting me, loves me, forgives me, and encourages me onward.

If that's the way GOD treats me as a parent, perhaps I can learn to give my children the same freedom.


Antwerp Exchange Bank's Board of Directors approved a \$5,000 donation for the All-Weather Track.



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

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ANTWERP HISTORY

By: Stan Jordan

This picture we are using today was loaned to us by Jean Derck Rinehart. I want you to look at it closely and then we will talk about it.

A few months ago I interviewed Paul Smith about the football team of 1935. As I left Paul that day he said, "you know they tore down a building there by the Reeb's Store." I said, "Well, that last building on the north end of the west side of North Main Street, that was always Frank and Ray Reeb's Grocery. I know before that it was Zigler & Derck. Paul said, "Well, I know they tore down the building that was on the north side of what is now The Bee

Argus." So, I bid Paul a goodbye and I drove back to Antwerp and told my wife I think Paul was wrong. But after we received the photo from Jean Rinehart it shows Paul is only half wrong because they tore down two buildings instead of one.

Now, you look close at the three round top windows in that third building from the right, then you look at the Bee Argus building and you will agree that they are one and the same. Those two buildings are not there anymore. If you figure those two buildings were about 30 feet each what is now Archer Drive didn't hardly exist at that time. That street was hardly anymore than a horse trail. I bet they just tore those stores down and left it lay there for fill.

There was a big ravine that ran past the school from the west all the way to the east to the cemetery. The town filled in enough fill on Main and Oswalt to make those streets passable to traffic.

This picture was taken after 1900, because it shows the electric light poles. Now I just assume that after the Antwerp High School was built in 1912, Archer Drive was not near wide enough for traffic to the school so it was deemed necessary to tear those stores down to make a passable street. I have seen old pictures of that street and it showed a raised wooden sidewalk all the way to the west from Main Street to the high school. Because that was a ravine there and when it rained the water stood in the low ground.

That is still a low area on Archer Drive because a few years ago where we got that seven inches of rain, Chuck Wiedman's Ford Van got flooded out about halfway down that block.

Going back to the picture, the third building to the left with the three round top windows is now The Bee Argus. Then that next building to the left was Gaisford's Hardware

that burned down about 1939 or 1940. Then I think that next

building was The Green Pantry Restaurant.

I just finished talking to Lucille Horn Seslar and she remembers just south of The Green Pantry was The Bee Argus on the first floor and Otto Ehrhart's Studio on the second floor.

This picture seems to show a little alley and the three businesses in that next building. I think the northern most was Harry Ely's store.

That picture had to be taken between 1900 and 1916, because I found out the Council voted in the money to pave all of Main Street from the north corporation limit south to Canal Street. It was to be paved with a special brick. I really don't remember when the bricks were covered over with blacktop, but they were very durable. Back then you didn't have as much traffic as the heavy traffic you have now.

Friends and readers, Bryce Steiner, the head honcho here at WBN and I have discussed this picture and this block and we are not sure of what was torn down. After the fire it looks like the whole eastern facade of those buildings have been remodeled or rebuilt. In fact, we are not sure of any thing other than, like Paul Smith said, "there was one building torn down."

We are going to run this old picture and have everyone take a look at it. We say the one with the man standing there is now The Bee Argus, before that was Reeb's Grocery. Then to the left of that was Gordon's and later Gaisford's Hardware and it burned down in 1939 or 1940. So it shows the next building as a masonry but everyone says The Green Pantry Restaurant was made of wood. We know that wooden building with the little step in front was The Bee Argus and Ehrhart's Studio was on the second floor.

So, where was the Green Pantry and later the Pine Room? If they were not in that southern most masonry building we lost them. So, friends, if you remember some more of this give us a call. We would appreciate it as we're not sure of some of this.

Well, we just talked with Pinky Billman and he said The Green Pantry wasn't a wooden building. It was of

These girls play good basic softball. The first game is March 31 at Edon, next is April 1 at Hicksville, April 3 here with Continental.



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ANTWERP COUNCIL MEET-ING

The Antwerp Village Council met at their regular meeting on March 17 at 6:30 p.m. Karen Lee and Ron Farnsworth were excused. Karen Sanders, Nancy Lichty and Sandy Wann were the visitors.

Sandy Wann, President of Antwerp Chamber, appealed to the Council on behalf of the Chamber. The Chamber would like to see improvements made in the Park for parking. The drawings have been done and bids received and the Council was asked if the Village could help defray the costs. There is a Park Fund available for maintenance and upkeep of the park only. The Park Board will meet and then bring a proposal before the Council and then it would be decided if the Village will help with this project. The Chamber is asking if the Village will match the funds needed. 70 parking spots would be put in and Harry Harrmann has bid the job at \$4200. It was recommended by him that the stone be purchased now before the price goes up and before ODOT needs the stone for the new highway. No grants are available at this time.

Karen Sanders and Nancy Lichty gave an update on the Veteran's Memorial. Homier's and Town and Country Monuments have been asked for bids. The statue needs repaired as there is damage to the base. It would cost around \$9,000 to repair. The Commissioners have been asked for help in fixing the statue and they are looking into it.

Chief Clemens' Police Report for March included 113 calls for service and 80 citations for Mayor's Court. The new cruiser is ordered and is estimated to come in April or May. Chief Clemens suggested that a mass e-mailing be sent to those residents who have internet and have signed up to receive news about water main breaks, etc. Sarah Keeran, Administrator will look into it.

Administrator's Report by: Sarah Keeran; Contractor will be here this week to give an estimate for patching and paving potholes and road cuts caused from water line repair. This annual repair will be funded with permissive tax dollars. Village utility workers surveyed streets and marked potholes, etc., with blue paint. If you know of a pothole that has been missed, let me know so we can include it in the contract.; Contractor is in town this week to start the removal of 18 trees along North and South Main. Once the trees have been removed and stumps ground, the process of surveying sidewalk conditions on North and South Main will begin.; Three contractors were contacted to give estimates to replace the furnace at village hall. Two have responded to date: Fitzenrider, Inc, Defiance, York 2 Stage Furnace \$5,323.00; Hartman Brothers, New Haven, Bryant Plus 2 Stage Furnace \$3,732.00; Hormann Heating/Cooling no bid as of Council Meeting.; Last year during budget discussions, it was proposed by the administrator that Maple Street be repaved due to the condition of the street, caused in part by the storm sewer project. The estimate for this repair is \$20,000. It was decided that this amount would be budgeted but which street to be repaired would be discussed further in the spring. A utility committee meeting needs to be scheduled to look at which street(s) can be repaired this year. In a conversation with the State Auditor on March 13, she stated that the street budget normally needs assis-

> tance from the general fund if grants are not available. The Utility Committee met and presented a proposal to revise the utility bills. It is proposed to send out one bill for storm, sewer and water. The bill would be sent the first of each quarter and all three would be due 45 days later. You have the choice to pay all three at once or spread the payments out in the 45 days. You will have a grace of 10 business days to pay after due date with a late fee. Between now and next Council Meeting you will be notified and if you have any questions or concerns you can get a hold of the water or utility department or you may address the Council. This proposal will come under an ordinance and it will have to be read three times at three different meetings so you will have plenty of time to provide any feedback.







COMMUNITY MEMORIAL Hospital views patient Safety as top priority

HICKSVILLE—Community Memorial Hospital is joining other hospitals, nursing homes, ambulatory facilities and emergency medical services across the state in standardizing wristbands used to identify certain patient conditions, such as allergies or the risk for falls.

Hospitals and health care providers across the country received a wake up call in 2005 when a nurse in Pennsylvania incorrectly placed a yellow "do not resuscitate" ment, exploring, explaining, elaborating and evaluating. Lab technology is administered into each unit to insure students are using modern techniques of problem solving and critical thinking. Each unit written by the Vantage staff includes Ohio Aca-

ing and critical thinking. Each unit written by the Vantage staff includes Ohio Academic Content Standards for (DNR) wristband on a patient who later had a heart

attack. Fortunately, another nurse caught the mistake just in time to resuscitate the patient.

The case focused national attention on a common problem. Many doctors, nurses and other practitioners work in more than one facility, each with their own set of wristband colors. In Ohio, health care providers are currently using 19 different colors with 28 different meanings, according to a survey of Ohio hospitals, home health agencies, nursing homes and ambulatory surgical centers con-

ducted in November 2006 by an OPSI-created task force.

To ensure patient safety in our community, Community Memorial Hospital is proud to join the Ohio Patient Safety Institute (OPSI) in implementing a statewide standardization of colored wristbands for Ohio hospitals, nursing homes, ambulatory facilities, home health and hospice.

The statewide standardization of colored wristbands reduces the colors down to four, with the ultimate goal of eliminating wristbands altogether in favor electronic tracking systems. In the interim, OPSI recommends that all Ohio health care providers adopt the following standard wristbands:

White/Clear – Patient Identification

- Red Allergy
- Yellow Fall Risk

Green – Blood Product

The statewide wristband standardization is endorsed by the Ohio Patient Safety Institute, Ohio Hospital Association, Ohio State Medical Association, Ohio Osteopathic Association and Ohio Board of Nursing, Ohio Academy of Nursing Homes and Association of Ohio Philanthropic Homes, Housing and Services for the Aging.

Community Memorial Hospital also holds a daily patient safety briefing to ensure that individuals involved in the patient's care are aware of the patient's status, limitations, etc. Also initiated a 2007 was a Rapid Response Team, Lift Team, and Ticketto-Ride, a hand-off communication tool that provides ancillary departments with important patient information prior to testing.


They also feature a variety of cheeses sold in bulk or blocks. They are planning to provide cheese trays for your convenience in the near future.
