The Western Buckeye Educational Service Center Governing Board held their regular monthly Board meeting at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 26, 2008 in the Van Wert ESC Board Office. Board President Mr. William Poe II welcomed Board members and school personnel to the meeting.

The Board members approved the agenda for the evening. Treasurer Kristine Stuart review current investments and financial reports with the Board. 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

ability in window systems because it provides the seal between the indoor and outdoor air. If that seal fails, condensation will occur and the gas filling will leak and no longer be effective. The outside materials also play a role in efficiency and sustainability.

"Homeowners are better off looking for nonconductive components, framing and sashes," adds Erb. "Wood, composite and fiber-

The Save our Homes Task Force held it's first seminar on June 28 at the Youth Building at the Paulding County Fairgrounds.

A panel of 4, including: Michael King, CCCS (Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Toledo), Teresa Smith of Key Bank, Suzanne Rister of Rister Law Office, Antwerp, and Gordon Barnes of Antwerp Exchange Bank was on tap to answer questions and provide information about your credit.

Abbey Mortemore from Richard Cordray's office gave an on screen presentation on ways to manage your debt and getting your credit back on track. Lou Ann Wannamacher, head of the Task Force, is concerned about the foreclosure problem and wants to help people to save their homes. She and the Task Force are working very hard to help educate people with these problems.

Some of the points made were: a good credit score is 680+, 700+ equals A+.

Your score is based on your behavior pattern in spending your money. The higher your score the lower your interest rates will be. 35% of your score is based on paying your bills on time and the amount you owe adds up to 30%, 15% is credit history, 10% is new credit and 10% is type of credit used.

Use your credit card minimally and make your payments on time and include more, if possible. Watch for your due date, the credit card company can change due dates on a whim.

Assess where you are right now. What are your expenses, debts, income, credit challenges. Get a copy of your credit report. Don't be afraid to call and talk to your credit card company, if you have to talk to a higher up be polite but firm.

Identify and set goals. What do you want to accomplish to feel like you are in better shape financially? Set up a timeline and goals to help you succeed.

Develop a budget and spending plan. Find a



method that works for you. Identify priorities and track spending. Spending plans should include steps to your goals.





On July 2 Senator Brown, business owners, the Commissioners and heads of several Paulding County organizations sat in a round table forum and answered questions asked by Senator Brown and discussed how each of their departments was fairing with the economy the way it is now.

Some of the things discussed were: the job opportunities, what the pay scale is in Paulding County and the gas situation. Different alternatives are being thought of by the schools and colleges in the area on how to cut gas for the buses and the fact that students have to use so much gas in getting to and from vocational schools and college. They are dropping out because they can't afford the fees and books, etc. to go to college.

There is a big need with the local food banks. There are more and more people who need help and where is the help going to come from.

More efficiency and less waste from the government was mentioned along with using our own oil, and using alternative energy.

The new highway being built is costing more money. Roads being torn up by the big trucks will have to be fixed, where is the money going to come from.

The hospital is trying to lower it's cost for stays and drugs. Money for Social Services is going down. These were just a few of the things brought up.

It was mentioned that we are being taxed so much that the renewals on the ballots are getting turned down.





SENATE VERSION OF GREAT LAKES COMPACT HELPS PRESERVE VALUABLE **RESOURCE, PROTECT PRI-VATE PROPERTY RIGHTS**

The Great Lakes are one of our region's most important environmental and economic resources. They provide drinking water to millions of Americans who live in the area, help pump valuable tourism dollars into Ohio communities and those of surrounding states, and work to employ thousands of people in transportation, fishing, recreation and other

industries. In December 2005, Gov-



Earlier this month, the Ohio General Assembly moved to ratify the Compact, passing House Bill 416 on June 10th. However, this came after several weeks of debate and compromise between Republicans in the Senate and other interested parties over concerns that the Compact language could negatively impact private water rights for Ohioans living throughout the 35 counties that are part of the Great Lakes Basin.

Under dispute was a portion of the Compact that reads "The Waters of the Basin are a precious natural resource shared and held in trust by the states." While it is true that the Lakes are held in trust, that is to say, belong to the people, the term "waters of the basin" also includes streams and navigable surface waters, as well as groundwater and wells, which run under the homes of private property owners and supply many families with water to meet their needs. Several legal experts warned that passage of the Compact without language to protect private water rights could lead to costly litigation with little recourse for landowners.

To help address these concerns about the Compact's wording and ensure that private property rights stay pro-


tected, Senate Republicans rallied support in the General Assembly to pass Senate Joint Resolution 8 in conjunction with HB 416. SJR 8 places a constitutional amendment on the November ballot, giving Ohio voters the opportunity to affirm the private water rights of all Ohioans, while carefully preserving the original intent of the Great Lakes Compact to protect the waters of the Basin from future diversion.

The Great Lakes are a tremendous natural resource that has the potential to spur development, create jobs and attract visitors to our region for years to come. However, in our effort to preserve these valuable waters, we must be careful not to violate the constitutional rights of Ohio landowners. The approval of HB 416 and SJR 8 work to strike this important balance.

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ernors from the eight Great Lakes states-Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin-as well as representatives from the Canadian Provinces of Quebec and Ontario, signed the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Basin Sustainable Water Resources Agreement, in an effort to preserve the Lakes' water for future generations and prevent it from being diverted out of the region to other states or countries. The agreement called for the legislative body of each Great Lakes state and province to enact a companion measure, the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Basin Water Resources Compact, before going to Congress for final approval.

Martin Miller, Principal of Paulding Elementary is included in the group to participate in the trip to China this year. He was in central China in the city of Wuhan in the Hubei province. Wuhan is a city of 8 million people and the province has 60 million people living in it. His group visited many schools. One school has 4600 students attending.

Hundreds of educators traveled to China this summer to learn about the language and culture of one of the world's oldest civilizations.

The third annual Chinese Bridge Delegation took place June 23–July 1. More than 400 delegates-including school superintendents, principals and language instructors—were scheduled to participate in the 2008 tour. The goal of the trip, which began in Bejing, is to build sister school ties and network with other U.S. Educators who have, or hope, to build, Chinese language programs in their schools. After Beijing, the delegation fanned out to visit elementary and secondary schools in 13 provinces. Ultimately, the program aspires to foster better understanding of Chinese culture and fluency in the language among U.S. Students.

The Chinese Bridge Delegation is just one result of a partnership formed in April 2006 between the College Board and China's Office of Chinese Language Council International (also known as Hanban) to build and expand Chinese language programs in U.S. schools. The partnership also includes a Chinese Guest Teacher program that brings qualified language teachers from China to teach in U.S. Schools. More than 100 teachers from China arrived in 2007 and were welcomed in schools and districts in 31 states. In addition, the College Board, with support from Hanban and other organizations, launched the new Advanced Placement Program[®] Chinese Language

and Culture course and exam in 2006-2007.

"In the new global community, students will need fluency in other languages and an understanding of diverse societies," said College Board President, Gaston Caperton. "Advances in technology offer us a great opportunity for sharing ideas and creating a better future, and I look forward to that future being make brighter by the Chinese Language and Culture Initiatives that we are building together."

Randy Davis, principal of Grayslake Central High School in Grayslake, IL, said of the 2007 Chinese Bridge Delegation, "It was eye-opening... It was interesting to compare and contrast the United States educational system and the Chinese educational system." Organizers hope that delegates will return to the U.S. with increased awareness of Chinese language and culture and will provide their own students with new opportunities to learn as well.

The Chinese Bridge Delegation is sponsored by Hanban in partnership with College Board, the Chinese Language Association of Secondary-Elementary Schools, the National Council of State Supervisors for Languages, the National Association of District Supervisors of Foreign Languages and Chinese Consulates in the United States.

Established by the Chinese government in 1987, Hanban is China's official agency with a mission to promote Chinese language and culture internationally, fulfilling a function similar to that of both the U.K.'s British Council and France's Alliance Francaise. 
