STROKE AND OSTEOPOROSIS SCREENING **COMING TO ANTWERP FEBRUARY 1**ST

TOLEDO-Residents living in and around the Antwerp, Ohio community can be screened to reduce their risk of having a stroke or a serious bone fracture. Life Line Screening will be at St. Mary's Catholic Church on February 1st. The site is located at 303 S. Monroe St. in Antwerp. Appointments will begin at 9:00 a.m.

A stroke, also known as "brain attack", is ranked as the third leading killer in the world, and the leading cause of nursing home admissions. Stroke often occurs without warning. The good news is that painless screening can help identify problems that can lead to stroke before it is too late.

Screenings are fast, painless and low cost. They test for blocked carotid arteries, abdominal aortic aneurysms, and hardening of the arteries in the legs. Bone density screening is also offered to assess the risk of osteoporosis.

These screenings are important because of the silent and often debilitating nature of the conditions. The majority of strokes are caused by plaque build up in the carotid arteries. The abdominal aorta is the largest artery in the body, and a weakness in the walls of the artery can cause a ballooning called an aneurysm, which can rupture. A ruptured aneurysm is generally fatal. Peripheral arterial disease or PAD is also known as "hardening of the arteries." Sufferers have a 4-6 fold increased risk of cardiovascular disease. Risk is evaluated through a measurement called the "Ankle-Brachial Index", which is obtained by reading the systolic pressure in the ankle and arm. All five screenings take 60-90 minutes to com-

Life Line Screening was established in 1993, and has since become the nation's leading provider of vascular screenings. Over 85 ultrasound teams are on staff to travel to local communities, bringing the screenings to residents. These non-invasive, inexpensive and painless, ultrasound tests help people identify their risk for stroke, vascular diseases or osteoporosis early enough for their physician to begin preventive procedures.

FLAT ROCK CREEK LOG JAM REMOVAL DENIED

On January 16 two public hearings were held to discuss the petition for the Flat Rock Creek Log Jam Removal. Around 150 people attended the morning meeting with many stating their opinions about the project. The biggest being the cost of the project and the fact that it would show up on their Real Estate Tax Bills. There were those that were worried about flooding and the fact that the creek had been cleaned out except in the Payne area.

Jason Kissel, Executive Director of the Acres Land Trust, commented on the environmental issue. He also was concerned that there was endangered species in the creek.

Dr. Don Snyder spoke about his part and his reason of starting this project along with the Village of Payne. He sees the flood plain increasing and endangering Payne and the residents along the creek. He remarked that the channel wouldn't be changed, just the logs removed. He knowingly built in a flood zone

and commented every year it got worse. He built a dike and now water comes up to it. He remarked that the other ditches in the county get cleaned regularly and this ditch also needs cleaned for water to flow well.

The last time the log jams were removed was in 2004 by a private group, the Flat Rock Creek Society.

Travis McGarvey, County Engineer, visited the area and compiled an estimate of the improvements. The estimate totaled, at landowners expense, \$953,677.23. He advised that the cost of the project outweighed the benefits. His advise was to withdraw the project.

At the end of the meeting on Wednesday night it was decided to follow Mc-Garvey's advise not to go through with the project.

cult energies to harness is the energy of your mind. Controlling your thoughts, disciplining your mind, monitoring your brain-all are essential ingredients to successful Christian living, an a formidable challenge! The difficulty of controlling the mind is underscored by Lanny Bassham, an Olympic gold medalist in shooting the small-bore rifle. He wrote, "Our sport is controlled non-movement. We are shooting from 50 meters—over half a football field—at a bull's eye three quarters the size of a dime. If the angle of error at the point of the barrel is more than .005 of a millimeter (that is 5 one-thousandths), you drop into the next circle and lose a point. So we have to learn how to make everything stop. I stop my breathing. I stop my digestion by not eating for 12 hours before the competition. I train by running to keep my pulse around 60, so I have a full second between beats... You do all of this and you have the technical control.

But you have to have some years of experience in reading conditions: the wind, the mirage. Then you have the other 80 percent of the problem—the mind!" How easy it is to fail in that critical area! Like iron

filings drawn to a magnet, our thoughts tend to drift into old patterns of worry, negativism, complaining, lust, guilt, and a host of other joy-killing habits. They not only drain the vitality out of our life, but they also neutralize our effectiveness in reflecting Jesus Christ. pleasing thought patterns you are not alone. Welcome to the human race. But as you partner with the Lord and determine to do your part, you can begin to overcome the "battles in the



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

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

We would like to clarify a few points in a recent letter to the editor entitled "Mars Attack." The reference to the Sheriff's budget being the "least affected" by the 2008 county budget meant that we will continue to be burdened with providing incarceration for our prisoners with or

without passage of the Levy. The full impact of the loss of the revenue from the Levy will not be realized until 2009. This will continue unless corrective action takes place. The Sheriff's budget was reduced in 2008 but not to the extent it will be in 2009, along with other County offices. It was suggested that we would put pressure on other agencies and squeeze them financially to get the public to vote for the Levy. If we didn't find value in those agencies, we wouldn't have helped them financially to begin with. There is no pleasure in making cuts that will cost our county jobs

and services. It was mentioned that our Sheriff's budget was about the same as the Defiance County Sheriff. On the surface it might appear that way, but with a little research you will see that the Defiance County Jail expenses are not included in their Sheriff's budget. The Defiance County Sheriff's budget in 2007 was \$1,497,916; and \$1,538,049 in 2008, an increase of over \$40,000.

The Paulding County Sheriff's budget in 2007 was \$1,427,954, and \$1,370,548 in 2008, a decrease of over \$57,000. Adding to our Sheriff's budget the "soon to expire" Levy money of \$483,000, you get a total of around \$1,911,000. The Defiance County Commissioners

have jail expenses appropri-

ated at over \$3,500,000. Adding this to the 2008 Defiance County Sheriff's budget, it totals over \$5,000,000. Trying to compare different county budgets can be misleading. Remember Defiance County has a general fund of over \$11,000,000, and Paulding County provides the same required services with a general fund of just over \$4,000,000. It is a constant struggle to provide our citizens with the same level of services with our limited resources. The issue of not having a

building permit for the new

jail can be easily explained if asked. Once the property was purchased by the County, it became the jurisdiction of the County. The Village does not get a permit from themselves, nor do the Townships get a permit from themselves. To infer that the Village was kept out of the process could not have been further from the truth. We commend the Village and their staff for the cooperation on this project. The Village has worked well with us in this project and others, as we attempt to make Paulding County a better place to live. The County and Village know quite well that if we don't work together we all To our amazement, the

issue of the new jail building being located in the floodplain continues to be brought up. A survey was completed by the County Engineer office and it was found that the building was not in the floodplain.

Some of the land is, but not the building itself. A guarantee that any area in Paulding County will not have water damage is unrealistic. We live in a swamp.


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We feel we have a new jail at the most economical price. If you think the State was going to allow us to continue operating in the old jail, you are mistaken. The fact remains that we were left with limited choices. Some of these choices were to join with Putnam County in a new jail, taking all our prisoners to other counties or to build our own jail. The choice to build our own jail was made only after careful consideration of all the issues and expenses associated with each option.

There was some question about an interview conducted many years ago concerning the collection of the jail levy money. If you have ever been interviewed you will realize that what you said, and what the interviewer thinks they heard may not always be the same. No deception was intended and if there was a misunderstanding, that was unfortunate. What we can tell you is that the record shows that every penny collected for the jail levy went to the operation and maintenance of the new jail. To insinuate otherwise would only serve to mislead the public into thinking the money was not used for its intended purpose.

It was mentioned that one person can make a difference. (Continued on Page 4)

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

A couple of Letters to the Editor which appeared recently in the West Bend News referred to the National Instant Check System (NICS) Improvement Act, H.R.2640 as the "Veterans Disarmement Act" and called President Bush's signing of it into law on January 8, 2008 as "criminal." While I admire the passion expressed in those letters and share their support for our American military veterans and of the 2nd Amendment, I respectfully disagree with their characterization of H.R.2640 and of those who supported its passage. And yes, I am proud to say I'm a member of

H.R. 2640 is not a "veterans disarmenent bill"—far from it! The signing of H.R. 2640 into law by President Bush had the full support of the National Rifle Association's Institute for Legislative Action (NRA-ILA) and the NRA's Military Affairs Committee chaired by Lieutenant Colonel Oliver North (USMC, Ret.). It is now possible for some people who were unfairly prohibited from owning guns to have their rights restored, and to have their names removed from the instant check system.

The following are the key provisions of H.R. 2640 courstey of the NRA-ILA.

—H.R. 2640 prevents the use of federal "adjudications" that consist only of medical diagnoses without findings that the people involved are dangerous or mentally incompetent. This ensures that purely medical records are never used in NICS. Gun ownership rights can only be lost as a result of a finding that the person is a danger to himself or others, or lacks the capacity to manage his own -H.R. 2640 requires all

federal agencies that impose mental health adjudications or commitments (such as the VA) to provide a process for "relief from disabilities." The bill allows de novo judicial review when an agency denies relief-that is, the court would look at the application on its merits, rather than deferring to the agency's earlier decision.

-As a practical matter, the mental health disability is the only firearm disqualifier that can never be removed. Criminal records can be expunged or pardoned, but mental records cannot.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (BATFE) used to have the ability to accept applications to remove individuals' prohibited status, appropriations riders every year since 1992 have barred it from doing so. Allowing this process through H.R. 2640 is an improvement over the current law.

-Under H.R. 2640, even if a person is inappropriately committed or declared incompetent by a federal agency, the person has an opportunity to correct the error—either through the agency or in court.

-H.R. 2640 prevents reporting of mental adjudications or commitments by federal agencies when those adjudications or commitments have been removed.

-H.R. 2640 also makes clear that if a federal adjudication or commitment has expired or been removed, it could no longer bar a person from possessing or receiving firearms under the Gun Control Act. -This actually restores

the person's rights, as well as deleting the record from NICS—a significant improvement over current law. -States that receive fund-

ing also need to have a relief from disabilities program for mental adjudications and commitments. State relief programs have to provide for de novo judicial review, as in the federal programs. —Relief granted by a state

program removes the federal prohibition on the person possessing or receiving a firearm under the Gun Control Act—again, an improvement over current law.

—Many states have processes for temporary emergency commitments that allow a short-term commitment based only on affidavits from police, doctors or family members, without opportunity for a hearing. Because federal law prohibits gun possession by a person who "has been" committed, a person committed under

such a process can't possess a gun even after full release from the temporary order. By requiring participating states to have a relief program that actually removes the disability, H.R. 2640 is a significant improvement over current —The legislation improves


the accuracy and completeness of NICS by requiring federal agencies and participating states to provide relevant records. For instance, it gives states an incentive to report people such as Virginia Tech murderer Seung-Hui Cho-that is, people who were found after a full court hearing to be a danger to themselves or others, but not reported to NICS due to lack of funding or contrary state laws. —The legislation requires

removal of expired, incorrect or otherwise irrelevant records. Today, totally innocent people (e.g., individuals with arrest records, who were never convicted of the crime charged) are sometimes subject to delayed or denied firearm purchases because of incomplete records in the system.

—The legislation prohibits federal fees for NICS checks. Under current law, only annual appropriations riders prohibit the FBI from trying to impose fees by regulation (as the Clinton Administration proposed in 1998). A permanent ban on such a gun tax" has been an NRA priority for nearly a decade.

—The legislation requires an audit by the Government Accountability Office of funds already spent for criminal history improvements. There has only been limited documentation of how hun-

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dreds of millions of dollars intended for NICS were spent on non-NICS programs such as automated fingerprint sys-

Neither current federal law, nor H.R. 2640, prohibits gun possession by people who have voluntarily sought psychological counseling or checked themselves into a

-Current law only prohibited gun possession by people who have been "adjudicated as a mental defective" or "committed to any mental institution." Current BAT-FE regulations specifically exclude commitments for observation and voluntary commitments. Also, records of voluntary treatment can not be made available under federal and state health privacy laws.

—Similarly, voluntary drug or alcohol treatment can not be reported to NICS. First, voluntary treatment is

not a "commitment." Second, current federal law on gun possession by drug users, as applied in BATFE regulations, only prohibits gun ownership by those whose "unlawful [drug] use has occurred recently enough to indicate that the individual is actively engaged in such conduct.'

-In short, neither current law nor this legislation affects those who voluntarily get psychological help. No person who needs help for a mental health or substance abuse problem should be deterred from seeking that help due to fear of losing Second Amendment rights.





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ANTWERP HISTORY

This picture is of Main and River Streets. You can see that this is the three story building that is now The Video Junction. The sign says Graves and Doering. I knew both those men when I was a little fellow, in the early 1930's, but by then that sign would read Doering

This three story building was erected by Robert Shirley. He passed away in 1866, just a few months before it was finished.

The first business in this building of record was of a Caroline Harris and T.B. Harris and they purchased this building from the Shirley Esinto the 1950's.

I worked for Mr. Long in 1941 and into 1942. Also working there was Gerald Hawkins, Mildred McLaughlin, Bertha Chaney Hemenover, Helen Hartman Sleesman, sometimes Jane Long and Bob McCreery. I really enjoyed working there. I worked each morning before school, after school, Thursday nights and all day Saturday and Saturday night for \$6.00. Taylor allowed me time off to play basketball for Antwerp High School.

After WWII ended and the boys came home, the city needed housing. Mr. Long built apartments on the second and third floor of that building. Paulene and I had

tate and moved in and it was known as Harris & Graves. About 1910, Charles Doering purchased an interest and the name was changed to Graves & Doering, just like it shows on the sign. This had to be in the early 1920's.

This was Sam Graves and he lived where Marjorie Leinard used to live. I knew them pretty well. They had a daughter named Eula. Sam had snow white hair and always wore a business suit. I think by my time, Joe Doering took over from his father, Charles Doering.

In 1928, Sam Graves sold his interest to J.L. Doering and Taylor Long and the business was changed to Doering and Long. Taylor Long had married Lucille Doering and this became a family business and was very successful up

It had a range and fridge for \$30.00 a month. The Dick Schilb family, Woody Friend family, and Robert Wycoff family lived on the top floor and some school teacher on the middle floor.

After Mr. Long retired he sold that business to Jim Panico, his son-in-law. Then later on Jim built part of the building over on US 24 known as Kammeyer's.

Mr. Long had served in WWI as an officer. They had two daughters, Joan and Jane. Iane lives in Florida in retirement. Lucille lived to be over one hundred years old, but is

The next building south, what is now The Village Hardware, was in mid-1930's The Kroger Store. It had

moved from south of the railroad about 1935. A Mr. Berrie was the manager. Bill Carr worked there as well as Alvin Fett, Leota Davis, Bob Smithey and a couple other boys on Saturdays. By now, it was about 1940 or 1941. Employment was pretty good, most fellows who worked in Ft. Wayne brought home \$18.00 - \$19.00 each week. At that time that money would go a long way. The next building south,

which is now the center part of the drugstore and hardware complex, was J. Haddock Clothing Store. I think Mr. Berg was a partner there. I always liked to go in there because of all the nice aromas from the shoes, boots and clothing. After these two men retired they closed the shop and sold out.

The next building was the William C. Pate Drug Store. He had taken over ownership from his father John Pate. Most people referred to the druggist as "Billy". He was certainly one of Antwerp's characters. When he retired, he sold out and Frank Smith was the town druggist.

The last building on that side is The Oasis. Henry George built that building about 1870. He operated a grocery store there for awhile. Then later in was owned by Shaffer Brothers. It was very successful for many years as a department store. As early as I can remember The Hertel Brothers had a jewelry and drug store in that building. Then in the middle 1930's, Frank Knight moved The Oak in to that building. Albert Guysinger became the owner and changed the name to The Oasis. It too has become a successful venture.



The Village of Antwerp adopted an income tax that became effective on September 12, 2006. The income tax rate for the Village of Antwerp is 1.0% (one percent) with up to a .50% (fifty percent) credit for residents paying a municipal income tax in their employer's municipality/county. (see tax return form to determine amount of credit)

Please note for tax year 2007, ninty-percent (90%) of your estimated tax due must be paid by January 31, 2008 to avoid penalty and interest.



#### **FARM OUTLOOK & POLICY MEETING**

OSU Extension is sponsoring a Farm Outlook and Policy meeting on Tuesday, January 29, 2008 from 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the American Legion Hall, east of Ridgeville Corners, OH on U.S. 6, go south on Co. Rd 19. The event will feature grain marketing outlook, 2008 Farm Bill discussion, farm inputs and land values, and global trade.

Dr. Matt Roberts, OSU Associate Professor will discuss the grain commodity markets. Matt focuses on the supply and demand of grains that Ohio and U.S. farmers grow. The price "battle ground" between corn, soybeans and

wheat will be discussed and the impact to the end users of U.S. grain commodities.

Dr. Carl Zulauf, OSU Professor will provide his insight into the 2008 Farm Bill. The 2008 Farm Bill has not been made into law yet. The content will shape the U.S. farm policy for risk management, production programs, and conservation incentives.

Barry Ward, OSU Assistant Professor will present his research on current agriculture inputs for crop production and the current assessment of land values and cash rents. OSU crop budgets pinpoint the realistic profitability of the 2008 crop production year. Trends in U.S. and Ohio land values will be presented as well as the data describing the return on farmland investment.

Dr. Ian Sheldon, OSU Professor will discuss China and international trade. Consumer choices per capita in other nations can have a significant impact on U.S. commodity demand. China will be highlighted with a discussion of its political and economic
