

THE LAWS OF MULTIPLICA-

By: Pastor Joel DeSelm, **Woodburn Missionary** Church

There is tried and true illustrations of a father who offered his son a choice regarding the payment of his allowance. Here was the deal: "Son,

I'll give you the choice of

taking either one dollar per week for fifty-two weeks, or one cent the first week and an amount each week for the next 51 weeks that is double the previous week's amount." In other words, under the first plan, the son would have a total of one dollar the first week, two dollars the second week, three dollars the third week, and four dollars at the end of the first month.

In the second plan, the son would have received one penny the first week, he would receive two pennies the second week, four cents the third week, and eight cents the fourth week.

Under both plans, the giving of the allowance would continue for an entire year. As you might have guessed, the young son opted for the guaranteed one-dollar-perweek which gave him a total of \$52 for the entire year's allowance.

What would have happened if the boy would have opted for Plan B? If his allowance would have been double that of the previous week's allowance, how much money would the boy have been earning after a year? If you've studied basic math you realize that we are comparing multiplication or exponential growth with linear or additional growth.

Had the son chosen option B, his weekly allowance for the 26th week (six months into the year) would be a whopping \$167,772.16!

If you continue to carry that amount for another six months, doubling the allowance every week, the son's allowance for the last week only would be \$22,517,998,136,852.48 or over 22 1/2 trillion dollars! (A pretty good weekly allowance by anyone's stretch of the imagination...)

in one of the most famous parables of Jesus, He, too uses the principle of multiplication. It's the illustration of the sower and the seed. You'll remember that the sower sowed his seed and the seed fell on four different types of soil. Some ground was hard, some was stony, some was weed-infested. But the last type of soil Jesus mentioned was the good soil. And the seed that fell on THAT soil, we are told in Mark 4:8, MULTIPLIED itself thirty, sixty, and even a hundred fold.

FLU FACTS FOR 2008

Did you know? Influenza viruses cause respiratory illnesses and are spread from person to person primarily through the coughing, sneezing and non-hand washing of infected persons. Adults can be infectious from the day before symptoms begin through approximately five days after illness onset. Children, however, can be infectious for more than 10 days and young children can shed viruses for several days before their illness even begins. Children are always in close contact with each other, so

viruses are easily passed. This

makes children good spread-

ers of the disease. Did you know?

Did you know? The Center for Disease Control now recommends that children six months through 18 years, all persons 50 years and over, anyone with medical problems and anyone who wants to avoid getting the flu should get the flu vaccine. Health care personnel, persons in contact with the weak, elderly or debilitated, family members with a child under six months of age in the household are all especially urged to receive the vaccine so as to protect these at risk persons.

Did you know?

In addition to the usual flu shot for ages six months and above, a nasal flu mist spray vaccine is also available. This spray is a weakened live virus vaccine given to those two years through 49 years who are not pregnant and do not have medical problems. Vaccines should be gotten beginning in October of each year but can be received well into the next year.

Did you know?

These following measures will afford some protection to those who are most vulnerable. Good hygiene, frequent hand washing, covering the mouth and proper disposal of

Did you know?

The flu vaccine does NOT cause the disease. The virus changes each year so the vaccine must be taken each year. Side effects from the shot may include mild fever, achiness, soreness, and redness around the injection site.


Of the 27 members in at-



The United States Drought Monitor as of September 9th rated northwest Ohio in the abnormally dry to moderate drought conditions. The Drought Monitor does focus on broad scale conditions, as local conditions may vary. Precipitation amounts recorded at the Paulding Village Reservoir show rainfall amounts for the months of June, July and August, 2008 totaled 7.99 inches. This compares to the rainfall total of 12.01 inches in 2007 and 9.28 inches in 2006. The summer month with the greatest impact on crop yields during the past two years has been August. The total August precipitation for each year was 0.99 inches in 2008 and 8.84 inches in 2007. What a differ-

reduced nutrient uptake, and reduced nitrogen fixation by rhizobium bacteria. The smaller plant size produces fewer nodes where pods can form. Dry weather in August reduced the rate of photosynthesis and thus the production rate of grain. The lack of adequate water initiated a shorter grain filling period, causing the soybeans to mature earlier than normal.

Most fields in the county have endured extensive dry weather and plants started dropping leaves in late August rather than late September, cutting their grain fill period in half. Although the soybean crop often surprises farmers with its productivity under stress conditions, there won't be many nice surprises this year. Generally, the wet spring caused acreage loss due to ponding, lowered plant populations and reduced plant size. The dry summer brought about poor pod set in many areas, and the grain will be much smaller than normal due to the shortened grain fill period.

Rainfall in early September will greatly benefit late planted or late maturing crops assuming they are active when rain comes. Double crop and relay crops both had good soil moisture at the start, and could produce extremely good yields if they get rain in early September. State specialist are estimating a state average soybean yield in the high 30's, but hope farmers are all pleasantly surprised with their yields. The average Ohio soybean yield for 2006 and 2007 was 47.0 bushels per acre for both years.

Drought stress, combined with uneven emergence and development problems, has had an effect of corn production as well. The results will be smaller than normal ears, and a greater percentage of "nubbin" ears in many Ohio corn fields. In some fields, plants are shorter than normal with reduced ear heights. Stress conditions may have also predisposed the corn crop to more stalk rot and greater potential for stalk lodging. Corn root worm injury in localized areas has resulted in root lodging. As a result of these conditions, some combine and harvesting adjustments may be necessary.



At the Antwerp Archer's Football home games, Tim Copsey does the sports commentary chore over the megaphone from the press box. When Antwerp moves the football ten yards they are awarded a new set of four downs. Tim has a unique way of telling the people, he says, "Antwerp's first dowwwwn." As I understand, he is seekon Stone Street to get there. They had their games there until the school bought that acreage north of Woodcox Street in the early 1930's. That is where the Little League plays their games now.

As near as I can remember or find out they had no name, just Antwerp High School Football Team and at that time the colors were black and orange.

I can't find anything about a football team before the tied and unscored upon.

I think the only boys left from that team are myself and Raymond Ewing of Ewing Nursery in Hicksville.

When we played away games we had to ride there in private cars as the games were at 4:00 p.m. All the school buses were needed to take the students home at 4:00 p.m.

After having a football year like that, the school only had football one more year. Football was dropped for a couple reasons. First, I don't think the insurance company's liked that idea of moving the team. The team needed new uniforms and there was no money available. All the news at that time was bad coming out of Europe. Not to mention that some of the town's folks didn't like football.

So, football in Antwerp stopped in the fall of 1939. The team colors were black and orange. The letter 'A' was orange and the graduation sweater was black. My graduergrast, who was in charge of camping sites and bivouacs.

He even had time to show us his new picture of the eagles over on US 24. Homer Sanders had taken the pictures. That pair of adult eagles are getting pretty popular in that area.

Then we traveled on down most of the midway and later arrived at Vaughn's display area. He has around 60 refurbished small pedal farm tractors and, Mindy, their daughter, has a collection of Hog Oilers. It is a unique display. Her husband, Tim Peffley, had a collection of 'Hay Cars' just around the corner of the Midway. It was well past lunch time by then, so we went to the Paulding United Methodist Church tent. Here, my wife met an old friend from the Weatherhead years, Martha Straley. We had lunch with Harold and Sandra Wann who are members of that church. Soon some people joined

us for lunch. They were from Elida, Ohio. She had taught school for 34 years. What I'm getting at is this is country or a rural affair. Everyone is very friendly and they hail from all over. 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MENTAL ILLNESS AWARE-NESS WEEK IS OCTOBER

Since 1990, mental health advocates across the country have joined together during the first week of October to celebrate Mental Illness Awareness Week (MIAW) which is October $5^{t\hat{h}}$ to $11^{t\hat{h}}$ this year. The event was established by the U.S. Congress in recognition of NAMI's efforts to raise mental illness awareness. Thursday, October 9, has also been declared as Bipolar Awareness Day. Purpose of the event is to educate the public about mental illness and eradicate the stigma which keeps many people from securing proper help for their illness.

One in five families are directly affected by mental illness and six million Americans have bipolar disorder. Approximately 90% of adults with mental illness (2.5 million) are unemployed. Nearly four million individuals with a mental illness lack health insurance. Between 25% - 40% of all Americans with mental illness will at some point pass through the criminal justice system. The economic cost of untreated mental illness is more than 100 billion dollars each year in the U.S. One in twenty affected by mental illness are homeless. The average age of onset of mental illness is 18-24. One in 100 people will develop schizophrenia in their lifetime.

Bipolar disorder, formerly called manic-depression illness, is a brain disorder that causes unusual shifts in a person's mood, energy and ability to function. Six million American adults or about

2.65% of the population age 18 and older in any given year, have bipolar disorder. However, some people have their first symptoms during childhood, and some develop them late in life. It is often not recognized as an illness but a 'behavior' problem' and people may suffer for years before it is properly diagnosed and treated. Like diabetes or heart disease, bipolar disorder is a long-term illness that must be carefully managed through out a persons life. Mental illness is all around

us. Research indicates that it usually has an heredity basis. Not only does it affect our families but our neighbors, friends, co-workers and perhaps the person that we just passed on the street. With the proper treatment homeless people with mental illness could live within the community, work and pay taxes.

The public as well as family members need to learn about these disorders. The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) offers education and support for those affected. They also offer free educational courses on the mental illnesses. The local NAMI affiliate which covers Mercer, Paulding and Van Wert Counties meets the third Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Drop-In Center in Van Wert. Professional speakers, family members, consumers, videos, etc. provide education and support at the meetings as well as when ever help is needed.

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
