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KEY STEPS IN CORN HYBRID SELECTION

Many farmers have made a portion of their seed purchases for 2009 as they take advantage of the early price discounts. With the continuous improvement in the genetics of corn hybrids, farmers need to introduce new hybrids into the production to remain competitive.

Farmers consider many factors, such as, previous crop, soil type, tillage practices, desired harvest moisture, and potential pest problems to determine which genetic traits will enhance their yield potential. As farmers continue to evaluate their corn and soybean genetic choices for next year, they should access the productivity of various hybrids and varieties from unbiased

Peter Thomison, Extension Specialist for The Ohio State University, suggests the following steps to follow in choosing hybrids that are best suited for various production systems:

STEP 1. Select hybrids with maturity ratings appropriate for your geographic area or circumstances. Corn for grain should reach physiological maturity or "black layer" (maximum kernel dry weight) one to two weeks before the first killing frost in the fall.

STEP 2. Choose hybrids that have produced consistently high yields across a number of locations. The 2008 Ohio Corn Performance Test indicates that hybrids of similar maturity varied in yield potential by as much as 60 bu/A depending on test site. Choosing a hybrid simply because it's a "triple stack" or "quad stack" or possesses appealing cosmetic traits, like big "flex" ears, will not ensure high yields; instead, look for yield consistency across environments.

STEP 3. Plant hybrids with good standability to minimize stalk lodging. This is particularly important in

areas where stalk rots are perennial problems, or where field drying is anticipated. Major differences in lodging were evident among hybrid entries in the 2008 Corn

Performance Test with % plant lodging ranging from less than 5% to over 90% at certain test sites. STEP 4. Select hybrids

with resistance and/or tolerance to stalk rots, foliar diseases, and ear rots. Corn growers should obtain information from their seed dealer on hybrid reactions to specific diseases that have caused problems or that

have occurred locally. STEP 5. Never purchase a hybrid without consulting performance data. Because weather conditions are unpredictable, the most reliable way to select superior hybrids is to consider performance last year and this year over a wide range of locations and climatic conditions.

For access to performance data, here are some choices you may want to consider. The 2008 Ohio Corn Performance Test and Soybean Performance Trials are now available at http:// corn.osu.edu; the Farmers Independent Research of Seed Technologies at www. firstseedtests.com; and the Integrated Ag Services at www.integratedag.net yield trials results insert in the Ohio's Country Journal magazine.

Your choice of a corn hybrid for 2009 will determine your income, so a methodical approach should be taken to select seed that is most appropriate for your farm and its environmental conditions. Develop a checklist of attributes, then prioritize them by maturity rating, yield, standability, and disease resistance. A great impact on performance will be weather conditions, but this year's top yielding hybrids may not perform well if 2009 weather is different, which it will likely be.

there is a Santa and he is called, people in our community who care. The donation from the Royal Neighbors is part of their ongoing effort to help their community where help is needed.

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

Interesting exchange, isn't

it? What the man held to in theory and what he believed in actual practice were two different things. When it came right down to demonstrating his convictions in ways that would crowd his comfort zone and cramp his style, the man wavered. Sadly, the same is true for many of us.

On paper, most of us would look pretty virtuous. If we were to fill out a form that asked us if we loved God, our mates, our children, and other people, most of us would quickly check the "YES" box and move to the next series of questions. But in practice, I wonder how close our behavior would support our belief? It's one thing to talk about love, compassion, forgiveness, and tolerance of others; it's something else to demon-

As one man was overheard to say, "Of course, I love people; it's the guy next door that I can't stanď."

It often seems like the most difficult people to show practical love are those with whom we have to interact on a regular basis. Our mate, our family, close friends, work associates, students at school, and people in the community or neighborhood.

Part of the reason it's more difficult to show kindness, consideration, and tolerance for those sorts of people is because we know them so well and they know us. We lower our guard and tend to let our hair down around such people. We feel like we have the right to be rude, cutting, impatient, and cruel. Certainly with those we know well, we should feel more of a freedom to be ourselves. However, that freedom should not give us a license to speak or act in ways that are hurtful or unkind.

Another reason we find it easier to be short, uncivil, and even harsh with those close to us is because the better we get to know someone, the more we see their faults. And the more we see a person's faults, the easier it is to get ticked off and frustrated by them.

In contrast, however, the Bible tells us that Jesus showed love, forgiveness, and compassion to those who were not easy to love. His enemies. Those who were seeking to take His life. Those who disagreed with Him. His disciples as they argued and quibbled with one another.

At the time of the year when we engage in gift-giving to celebrate the Savior's birth, perhaps giving the gift of kindness, the gift of forgiveness, the gift of understanding, or the gift of time would be the most vital gift of all that you could give someone this Christmas season.

In our last study I was telling you about the Roman eagle and this being the emblem they had on their banners or flags. Today I would like for us to look at some very controversial verses. Now, let us look at Matthew 24:29. In verse 29, it

says immediately after the tribulation of those days... What this is talking about is the horrible events that occurred during the siege of Jerusalem and after the siege, the final destruction would occur. Before I go any further, you and I need to understand that Jesus is using apocalyptic language to draw attention to the importance of these events. It is not to be taken literally, but is illustrating a point. Old Testament books such as Ezekiel, Zechariah, Isaiah, Daniel and the New Testament book of Revelation have these symbols and figures. Notice in verse 29 it says "those days" and is referring to the destruction of Jerusalem. Notice it also says "the sun will be darkened." This is terminology in a apocalyptic language which refers to the following events in the Bible-please



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LATTA STATEMENT ON H.R.

Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) made the following statement after the House of Representatives considered H.R. 7321, the Auto Industry Financing and Restructuring Act.

"The auto industry is a critical segment of our nation's economy, especially in Ohio. During the testimony from the "Detroit 3" and the drafting of this legislation, important questions remain unanswered that put the American taxpayer at serious

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Similar to the financial bailout, Congress is putting one person in charge of an entire area of our economy. We cannot in good faith give one person management power over the "Detroit 3" if they cannot currently manage themselves. This bill yields vast power in the "car czar" to decide what types of vehicles Americans will drive, how corporate organizations and debt will be restructured, and whether or not the companies are meeting the criteria of the bailout. This bill also fails to address what will happen to the companies should they not be in compliance with the bailout, as Congress will immediately demand repayment. It is clear each company currently does not possess the cash to operate at this time. How will they repay the loan in the near future if they cannot meet the requirements set forth in the bill? In addition, this legislation was nothing more than a short-term bridge loan to the "Detroit 3" with no guarantee they would not return in the near future for additional funding.

House Republican leadership laid out an alternative plan earlier today, mapping out a plan of faster restructuring with harder deadlines for the "Detroit 3" to meet. Additionally, the plan calls for each of the companies' creditors to drastically reduce their respective indebtedness by at least 1/3. Most impor-

As County Auditor/Chief Fiscal Officer for the county, I believe it is important to respond to the many questions surrounding the jail bond and 2009 property tax bills. First, let me say, I am not providing this information to be critical of past decisions, only to provide information to the public. It is the County Auditor's responsibility to enter the correct property tax and bond rates that appear on your tax bills. The question being asked is "since the jail closed, will the jail bond still be on my property tax bill?" Yes, the jail bond will remain on your tax bill. The closing of the jail does not remove the jail debt. The debt is directly related to the renovation and construction of the new jail facility-open or closed. I will try and explain the fundamental purpose of bonds and how they work. Most tax levies and bonds have specific purposes and intent.

For basic definition, a bond can:

-Raise funds for permanent improvements (struc-

—Be used to pay off debt —The money can only be

used for the purpose stated on the ballot (not for operating expenses)

-Bonds are sold in the

amount approved, then money is used to pay for improvements

–Money is paid back with interest, usually over 20 or more years (similar to an individual's mortgage To try and explain fur-

ther, with a levy you vote on

an exact millage; however, with a bond you vote on an amount of debt in dollars rather than an exact millage. Once a bond is approved by the voters, the debt obligation is reviewed annually to determine the amount of tax dollars to collect to pay principal plus interest for the annual payments. If necessary, the millage is adjusted (up or down) so enough tax dollars are collected to pay off the debt over the number years that were originally voted on. The current jail bond was voted on and passed November 2005 for \$1,800,000 to be collected over 17 years. The current balance on the voted debt is \$1,496,500, with the amount of \$118,000 to be collected in 2009 for debt payment (principal and interest). Using the annual amount due and the county's certified valuation; the necessary millage (used to determine your tax bill) is calculated. If county valuation decreases, the millage is adjusted up; if valuation increases, the millage is adjusted down. Delinquent taxes and fees must also be considered to cover the annual debt payment. It is equally important to not over collect, especially as you get closer to meeting the debt obligation. If the debt would be paid off before the 17 years is up, the levied millage would then be removed from your property tax bill. There is also an additional amount of jail construction debt that is not "voted" debt covered by bonds. The current amount of the unvoted debt is \$494,500 and can't be paid from the levied millage for the voted debt. This additional debt will have to be paid from other sources. I realize this is a complex issue, and my intensions are to provide you with facts, not to suggest blame. As your County Aumy primary goal to make information available to the public with open, honest communication. I hope you continue to use our website (www.pauldingcountyauditor.com) as we strive to add new information. We will be updating the tax year 2008 payable 2009 property tax levy information as soon as possible. I also plan to continue submitting articles to the local newspapers on various topics. I realize these are very difficult times for many residents and it is important to me to keep a line of communication. Please feel free to contact me with any further questions about the responsibilities of the County Auditor's office.


The Wayne Trace Wrestling Club competed recently at the Lincolnview Invitational.

Fireplace Safety Tips

Well-seasoned firewood generally has darkened ends with cracks or splits visible, it is relatively lightweight and makes a clear "clunk" when two pieces are knocked together. "Green" wood has a much higher water content,


making it harder to start and less efficient when burning.

Firewood can harbor insects, such as the Emerald Ash Borer Beetle, a species that feeds on ash trees and has killed millions of trees across the U.S. Because of insects like these, it's important that you not move firewood, and instead purchase it close to where you plan to use it. Also, make sure that the firewood you purchase is from local resources.

At the end of the season, be sure to burn all the wood that you have ordered, so that any insects or larvae in the wood do not have the chance to spread.

About the same time as the John Dillinger exploits and the antics of Bonnie & Clyde, it was the brazen robberies and killings of the Ma Barker Gang. This was before the lawmen had good police cars and radios and any of the up to date systems that police have now.

'Ma' Barker was born Arizona Donnie Clark in Ash Grove, Missouri in October of 1873. She came from good Christian parents who believed in hard work and traditional values. She also believed in these traits in 1892 when she married George Barker. They had four boys: Herman, Lloyd, Arthur and Fred. After Fred was born the father, George, departed. The general opinion was that he was a worthless drunk and he was thrown out by Ma.

Most people agree that was why the boys went bad. They had no father and they grew up wild and without any fatherly advice.

As early as 1921, some of the Barker boys were in trouble and in jail. In 1922, Lloyd Barker was sent to Leavenworth Prison for robbing the Mail Train at Baxter Springs, Kansas and sentenced to 25 years and was released in

About a month later, Arthur, 'Doc' Barker went to Oklahoma State Prison for the murder of Thomas Sherill, who was a night watchman at St. John's Hospital at Tulsa.

In 1927, Fred robbed a bank in Windfield, KS and was arrested and sent to Kansas State Prison.

In August of that year, Herman Barker committed suicide after being stopped at a police roadblock. A Wichita policeman named J. E. Marshall had been killed by a gang that Herman had been

These boys were in and out of trouble about the time that Capone was operating in Chicago. It was a little before Dillinger's time.

In March of 1931, Fred Barker was released from Kansas State Prison after serving time for robbery and it was here he met Alvin Karpis, another serving time for

On June 10. 1931, he and Alvin Karpis were arrested by Tulsa Police for burglary. Karpis was sentenced to four years but was paroled after restitution was made. Fred Barker also avoided a jail sen-

On November 8, 1931, Fred Barker killed the Pocahontas, Arkansas Police Chief Manly

On December 19, 1931, Fred and Alvin Karpis robbed a store in West Plains, MO and were involved in the killing of Howell county, MO Sheriff, C. Roy Kelly.

On January 8, 1932, Lloyd Barker started serving a sentence at Leavenworth.

April 26, 1932, the body of A. W. Dunlap was found at Lake Franstead, MN. He had been killed by Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis.

On June 17, 1932, Fred, Karpis and five other men robbed the Fort Scott, Kansas

On July 7, 1932, 3 members of the Barker-Karpis Gang were arrested by the FBI.

July 25, 1932, Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis robbed the Cloud County Bank at Concordia, Kansas. They had to use a couple new men in the

August 14, 1932, Atty. J. Earl Smith of Tulsa, Oklahoma was found killed at Indian Hills Country Club, north of Tulsa, he had been retained to defend the Barker-Karpis Gang over the Fort Scott robbery, but the men were con-

September 10, 1932, Arthur 'Doc' Barker was released from prison.

Decmber 16, 1932, Fred and Arthur Barker, Alvin Karpis and gang robbed The Third Northwestern Bank in Minneapolis killing policemen, Ira Leon Evans and Leo Gorzki and one civilian.

April 4, 1933, Fred and Aurther Barker and the Alvin Karpis Gang robbed the Fairbury, Nebraska bank.

June 1933, the Barker-Kapris Gang kidnapped William Hamm, then on June 17th released him after the ransom

On August 10, 1933, the Barker-Kapris Gang robbed a payroll at the Stock Yards National Bank of south St. Paul in which one policeman, Leo Paulak was coldly executed and another man was made an invalid for life.

Septmber 22, 1933, two bank messengers held up by five men identified as the Barker-Karpis Gang. Chicago policeman, Miles A. Cunningham was killed by this gang. Gangster, Vern Miller is accused of this killing. He was also in on a massacre in Kansas City where four lawmen were killed.

January 17, 1934, they kidnapped George Bremer and then released him on February 7 after the ransom was

January 19, 1934, the gang wounded M.C. Cord of Northwest Airways thinking he was a policeman.

March 10, 1934, Barker Gang member Fred Goetz (also known as 'Shotgun George') who was a participant in the Brenner kidnapping is killed by fellow gangsters in Cicero, Illinois.

July 1934, underworld Doctor Joseph Maran was last seen on this date.

January 6, 1935, Barker gang member William B. Harrison was killed by fellow gang members at Ontarioville, Illinois.

January 8, 1935, Aurther 'Doc' Barker was arrested in Chicago. Gang member Russell Gibson was killed and his colleague, Byron Bolton was captured at another address.

January 16, 1935, when the lice captured Arthur Barker in Chicago. While looking through his papers they found a map of where his mother and brother lived in Lake Weir, Florida. So the FBI and police surrounded the cottage with about 20 men. When asked to surrender the Barkers refused and fired a round. The Feds started firing and about 100 rounds were blasted into the cottage. Then they waited and after no more return fire from the cottage the policemen entered and found both Barkers dead. The place was a shambles. One of the top FBI men placed a tommy gun in Ma Barker's hands so when the news came out, they had more of a reason for killing a

woman Over the weeks and months, the news media led the world to believe that Ma

The notorious bank robber, Harvey Bailey, who knew the Barkers well said, that Ma Barker couldn't even plan a breakfast.

May 1, 1936, Karpis and a buddy, Fred Hunter, were arrested in New Orleans. January 3, 1939, Arthur Barker was killed while trying to escape from Alcatraz.

Of the Barker-Karpis gangsters, 18 arrested, three killed by lawmen, two killed by gangsters.

Lloyd Barker was released from prison in 1938, he was serving time for robbery. In WWII, Lloyd Barker served in the military as a cook in a POW camp in Fort Custer, Michigan and received The Good Conduct Medal and an Honorable Discharge.

On March 18, 1949, Lloyd was killed by his wife. He was the manager of a market in Denver, Colorado. She was sent to the Colorado State Insane Asylum.



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LEGISLATURE WORKS TO ADDRESS ELECTION CON-CERNS

Every Ohio voter should feel confident that once their ballot is cast, it will be counted as part of a fair, secure and transparent process. Unfortunately, many of my colleagues and I have heard from voters in recent months, who expressed significant doubt about the integrity of our elections system. In response to these con-

cerns, the Ohio Senate recently approved legislation designed to further secure elections in Ohio and help strengthen voter confidence. Senate Bill 380, which is currently under consideration in the Ohio House State Government and Elections Committee, makes four important, yet narrowly-tailored changes to state election law. These reforms have been championed in the past by Secretary of State, Jennifer Brunner, and Ohio's bipartisan election officials, as well as affirmed through rulings by the Ohio Supreme Court.

Prior to the November 4th General Election, an unintended overlap was discovered in state law between the start of early voting and the voter registration deadline. This "Golden Week," as it came to be known, allowed unregistered voters to register and cast an absentee ballot in the same day, avoiding a requirement in state law that an individual be registered for at least 30 days before they can cast a ballot.

To address this problem, SB 380 would shorten the inperson absentee voting period to 20 days before the election. However, due to its popularity, the bill would permit local boards of election—through a bipartisan, supermajority vote—to establish up to three locations in their county where voters can cast an absentee ballot. Hopefully, this will also work to reduce long lines at the polls. This idea of shortening the in-person absentee voting period was advanced by the Secretary of State as part of several discussions with media in the days following the election.

In addition, under SB 380, absentee voting by mail would begin 28 days before the election, a change which was suggested by the Ohio Association of Election Officials. The bill preserves the 35-day, mail-in, absentee window for overseas civilians and military voters that is in current law.

Also, in an effort to promote greater transparency in the elections process, SB 380 would allow bipartisan observers at in-person absentee voting centers. While current law permits any political party to appoint a qualified elector to act as an observer during the casting and counting of ballots, the Secretary of State said that the law did not provide for observers during in-person absentee voting. The issue was taken to the Ohio Supreme Court, which overturned the Secretary's directive. SB 380 codifies the Supreme Court's ruling. Shortly before Election Day, the Secretary of State

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announced that thousands of new voters appeared to have driver's license numbers or Social Security numbers that did not match the information they submitted on their voter registration forms. However, despite obvious concerns about potential election fraud from voters, legislators and elections officials, the Secretary argued that the law did not authorize her to share these mismatches with local boards of election. SB 380 would require the Secretary and the registrar of

motor vehicles to enter into an agreement to match information in a federally-mandated, statewide voter registration database with motor vehicle records to verify information on voter registration applications. This data would then have to be shared with local election officials.

Current Ohio law requires that voters provide five pieces of information on their absentee ballot identification envelopes, including name, address, date of birth and signature, as well as the last four digits of their Social Security number, a driver's license number, or one of several other forms of identification. However, the Secretary of State issued a directive before the election that said voters only had to fill out three of the five fields required by the law-1.) name; 2.) signature, and 3.) one of the various forms of identification-for their ballot to count.

SB 380 clarifies that all five fields must be complete for the ballot to count to ensure that boards of election have all the information they need to verify a voter's identity. In the interest of fairness, the bill requires election boards to notify voters of any mistakes on their ballot envelope, so they can be corrected and the vote counted.

The success of Ohio's elections system should not only be measured by the number of delays or other problems reported at local polling locations, but also the overall confidence of the electorate that their votes were counted as part of a fair and transparent process. With this in mind, SB 380 seeks to address the concerns of many Ohio voters, who feel that more can and should be done to heighten voter confidence and strengthen the integrity of our elections system.

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
