PAULDING COUNTY HOSPITAL WELCOMES ORTHOPAEDIC TRAUMA SURGEON



Dr. Steven Haman began seeing patients in the outpatient clinic at Paulding County Hospital in December 2008. Dr. Haman is an orthopedic trauma surgeon who will be available on an emergency basis to respond to calls from the emergency room. Some examples of the

emergency cases Dr. Haman can consult on include fractures, motor vehicle accidents involving broken bones and falls. The advantages to having access to an emergency orthopedic trauma surgeon are obvious. Now the doctor can come to the patient at Paulding

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County Hospital rather than the need to transport the patient to set a fracture or perform orthopedic surgery.

Not only will Dr. Haman be available to respond to emergencies, he will also conduct an orthopedic clinic at Paulding County Hospital on Fridays where he will see patients referred by family physicians. A variety of medical issues can be referred to Dr. Haman including hip, knee, elbow, shoulder and joint problems.

Dr. Haman is Board Certified with the American Board of Orthopedic Surgeons, a graduate of Bluffton University and University of Toledo College of Medicine. He completed his intern/residency at University Medical Center at the University of Toledo. Dr. Haman completed Orthopedic Trauma fellowship at Florida Orthopedic Institute in conjunction with Tampa General Hospital, Tampa, Florida. He is a candidate member of American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons and candidate member of Orthopedic Trauma Association. He specializes in acute trauma. post traumatic reconstruction, osteomyelitis, and limb deformity.

Dr. Haman conducts a clinic on Fridays at Paulding County Hospital. LOVE IS ALWAYS WORTH IT

I've heard it said that until you experience something for yourself it remains theory. Even though it may be true, it isn't for you. There's a song from the 1970's that remains one of my favorites, "Love Hurts" by Nazareth. I would put it on the turntable and crank it as high as it would go. My buddies and I would sing along to it, and play "air guitar." It was kind of like "Rock Band" before you could hook it up to your TV gaming system.

Of course, I had my share of love hurting as I grew into a teenager and into adulthood. It's a fact of life that love is risky. When you put yourself out there whether it is a girlfriend/boyfriend or spouse you are putting yourself in a position of vulnerability. Because of this I developed a "safety system" when it came to love. I would shield and only commit so much of myself to a relationship. When I got married I learned eventually that this wall I had put up would have to go if I wanted our marriage to last and thrive. I would like to say that I learned it right away, but that would not be true. I had a first hand experience that love is worth any risk to us.

One winter night a few years ago my wife and I were settling in for bed. We weren't there for only a few minutes when the door to our bedroom flew open and our daughter came in sobbing. She was crying so hard that it took a minute for my wife and me to understand what she was saying. After having her repeat herself 3 or 4 times, we finally heard her. "Lillian is dead!" she cried.

I threw the covers back and flew to her bedroom, my wife and daughter followed behind. I was praying on the way to her room that she was mistaken, that Lillian was in fact only sleeping. When I looked into her cage, it was clear that Rachel was right. Lillian was dead.

My wife and I had bought Lillian for 6 dollars almost two years before after our daughter convinced us that she was responsible enough for a pet. So, one day we headed off to Fort Wayne to the pet store. Rachel walked up and down the display cases containing the various types of hamsters. Finally she stopped in front of a particular case looking at one in particular. Finally, she turned to us and said, "I want that one."

"Are you sure?" my wife asked. She nodded confidently, this was the one.

"How do you know?" I asked.


"Because she looked me in the eyes, there is a connection," she said boldly. After we paid the six bucks for Lillian and another fifty for a cage, wheel, food, bedding, hamster vitamins etc. we were on the way home with her new pet. Very early on we saw that she had a very unusual relationship with this hamster. She would actually come when Rachel called her. My hamster never did that when I was a kid! Rachel was always carrying that rodent around; it drove her mom and me nuts. Whenever we would tell Rachel that, she would say, "She's my best friend." We would just grin and bear it.

As Lillian's first birthday

came and went we started to pray that she would be the longest living hamster ever. No one wanted to think of how Rachel would handle the demise of her first pet and best friend. My daughter poured so much of her love into this animal that I thought it would really hurt her when the inevitable happened. As often happens, especially when it's inevitability. That day came all too soon for us.

I was thinking about all of this as I saw the lifeless body of Rachel's hamster lying still in her cage. It was almost surreal as I watched my wife holding our daughter as she wept. My wife and I were crying almost as hard as she was. Not because we were mourning Lillian's death, we were hurting because our little girl's heart was broken, and at least for awhile, there was nothing we could do about it. At the same time an old specter was coming back to me. "See what happens when you love something?" My daughter was learning for herself that when you love someone/something you put yourself at the risks that love carries. One day while praying for my daughter I heard in that still small voice in my spirit something I will never forget. I heard the Lord say to me that, "Love is always worth it." I sat back and soaked that word in. That even became the theme for Lillian's eulogy. It was something that I hoped that Rachel would learn so she would never grow hardened to love's risks like I had. I was happy to see that

after a few days Rachel seemed to be getting back

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to her old self. There were a few tears now and then, but she was moving on. After a few weeks she came to her mom and me and asked if she could get another hamster. We were thrilled that she was ready to pour out her love again. So off we went and found L.J. (Lillian junior).

Here we are nearly two years later and my daughter is learning that Love is truly worth it. She poured her love into L.J. and now into a very precocious boxer puppy named Max. She is learning that wonderful lesson at such a young age that took me so long to understand. But, I shouldn't be so surprised. God understands this first hand.

Why did the Father send His Son here to bear the sins of people who would never come to Him? Why would Jesus Himself forgive those who were guilty of putting Him on the cross instead of cursing them? To God, love is always worth it. To Him, we are worth it. John 3:16 tells us that, God loves us so much that He gave what was most precious to Him so we could find life. Even though it came with suffering and sorrow, He gladly paid the price so we can live in Him. He was willing to pay the price, because He lives what He speaks.

Here we sit at another Christmas season, a time when we remember when Immanuel - God with us, came to show us God's love, grace, and redemption. As we gather around the tree with family and friends and when we open our gifts, let's remember a vital truth. Love is always worth it. Pay whatever price, bear whatever crosses. You may have a ʻprodigal" child, maybe you are weeping over the loss of a loved one this year. Maybe you're mourning the death of a marriage. Let God's word sooth and renew you this year. It may not seem like it right now, but in Jesus - Love is always worth it.

Okay, all you folks at the ACLU, we give up. Your march to the courts to argue against Nativity scenes on public property has become as much a herald of the Christmas season as Macy's parade. Maybe you're right; maybe the risks to our freedom are just too great.

As one federal judge put it last year when he ruled against a creche displayed at Chicago's city hall, we certainly can't be "sending a message to the people of Chicago that the city approved of Christianity."

So next December, you won't have a fight. We're throwing in the towel. But we're taking our holiday with us.

That's right. Because Christmas is just too "religious" for a public forum, we're taking it back. You can keep December 25 (there's considerable doubt that Jesus was born on that date, anyway), but you'll have to find another reason to celebrate.

You'll also have to come up with a new name for the day, for obvious reasons. Someone's suggested Retail Sales Day, which does seem to capture the mood of the season, religious notions aside.

We would caution you, however, that any promotion of such a day must avoid the theme of giving gifts. After all, it was Jesus Christ who said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." And if you do some research, you'll discover that the wise men coming to worship Jesus initiated the custom of giving Christmas presents.

We're taking Christmas trees with us, too. A clergyman named Luther in the 16th century was the first one to drag an evergreen indoors and decorate it to celebrate the season, thereby saturating it with religious meaning.

Much of the music of the season belongs to us: "Joy to the World", "Silent Night", Handel's "Messiah." Those all go. You can, however, keep the immortal "Jingle Bells."

The fat guy in the red suit can stay on as your spokesman. But he, too, will have to find a new name. The "jolly old elf" was Clement Moore's poetic creation, Santa Claus, on the other hand, is derived in several steps from St. Nicholas, a real-life churchman who gave gifts to the needy. Wreaths, angels, stars, bells, fruitcake-they're chock-full of Christian meaning and symbolism. So we're taking all those back, too (except maybe the fruitcake.) Oh, yes, one more thing. That message of "peace on earth, good will toward men" that you're so fond of quoting (without attribution)—you'll have to get along without that. You can have what's left, and feel free to celebrate all you want. Have a nice day.

ROMANS 11:25



On January 2 at noon, the Johnson Memorial Library will be hosting its twice monthly Role Playing Game Group.



WACHTMANN DENOUNCES **ODOT FEE INCREASES ON** TRUCKS

State Representative Lynn Wachtmann (R-Napoleon) denounced a plan by the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) to implement a fee increase for oversized and overweight trucks and announced he will pursue legislation capping the fees. In the past nine months, the fees will have increased by 3,536 percent.

"I simply cannot believe the Strickland administration's exorbitant fee increases," Wachtmann said. "This places yet another severe economic hardship on an industry that has already been hit hard."

Wachtmann said he plans to introduce legislation in the coming weeks that would cap these fees at 100 percent of the original rate.

ODOT has stated the permit fees were too low for too long and other states were higher. Apparently, they'd like to play catch up and I don't think that's right," Wachtmann said. "If the governor and ODOT do not want to resolve this issue themselves, I think the Legislature should be willing to do it for them."

ODOT PAVES WAY FOR SANTA'S ON-TIME DELIV-**ERIES TO OHIO**

Whether you drive a sleigh with eight reindeer or a truck with 18 wheels, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) has paved the way for delivering all of Ohio's important packages on time, completing 493 construction projects this year.

As part of a more than one-billion dollar investment, ODOT resurfaced 105 interstates and state routes, replaced or repaired 94 bridges, modernized 62 roadways, improved ten intersections and built seven bikeways. More than 6.6 million tons of asphalt was placed on ODOTmaintained roadways enough asphalt for a two-lane road from Columbus to Corpus Christi, Texas.

Instead of going over the river and through the woods, motorists will find several routes to take this holiday season, including:

—US 30 and US 24 – A new interchange of US 30 at County Highway 330 is complete west of Upper Sandusky, marking the final link of a project expanding and relocating US 30 in Northwest Ohio. Also, two sections of US 24 opened to four lanes of traffic in Defiance and Henry

across the Ohio River at Belpre, completing the final link of a continuous four-lane roadway that stretches from Northern West Virginia to Cincinnati.

-State Route 86 - This newly relocated two-lane roadway in rural Lake County was completed early because of an innovative construction phasing and scheduling plan. —US 33/Pomeroy-Mason Bridge - Next week, ODOT

and West Virginia will open the new four-lane cable-stayed suspension bridge carrying US 33 traffic from Pomeroy to Mason, WV.

These completed projects help Ohio's logistics businesses remain a leader in "on-time" deliveries. An estimated 600 million tons of freight valued at \$1.6 trillion is moved by trucks on the state's highways throughout

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BONNIE AND CLYDE

Bonnie and Clyde were notorious gangsters in the mid west and south during the depression eras. Actually, they robbed more small stores and gas stations as opposed to banks. This gang was believed to have killed nine police officers.

Bonnie was born Bonnie Elizabeth Parker, October 1, 1910, in Rowena, Texas. She was the second of two children. Her father was a brick layer. He died when she was four years old. This prompted her mother to move to West Dallas where they lived in poverty. She was a very good student in high school. She excelled in creative writing and won some awards for Cement City Schools. She was quite petite, 4ft. 11in. and weighed about 90 lbs.

She married a Roy Thornton before she was 16. They were soon separated, but never divorced. In fact she was wearing Thornton's wedding ring when she was killed.

Thornton's reaction to his wife's death was, "I'm glad they went out like they did, it's better than being caught." Thornton himself was arrested for burglary in March of 1933. He was shot and killed in October 1937 while trying to escape from Earlham Prison Farm.

Bonnie met Clyde Barrow in 1930 at a mutual friends house. Most people who knew them said they really were in love with each other. Some say she was not a blood thirsty killer. Some writers say that there were no papers out on her when she was killed.

Clyde Barrow was born March 24, 1909, in Elms County, Texas, that's just a little south of Dallas. He was the fifth in a poor family of seven. He was first arrested in 1926 for not returning a rented auto on time. His second arrest was with his brother, Buck Barrow, with stolen goods in their possession. At this time he also cracked safes, robbed stores and stole cars.

I guess the officials say he was in 15 bank robberies, but robbing stores and gas stations far exceeded that number.

He had an arsenal of weapons, but liked the Army B.A.R. the best. That was a semi-automatic with very high hitting power. While his brother, Buck, was in jail the Barrow Gang robbed a grocery store and a man was killed. Clyde was identified as one of the killers.

Bonnie Parker was captured at this time while assisting in a bungled store robbery in Kaufman, Texas and she was jailed for this.

While she was jailed, Clyde killed a man. J.W. Butcher in Hillsboro in April of 1932.

Bonnie was released from prison June of 1932. The Kaufman County Grand Jury had no bill on her so she was released. With in a few weeks she met up with Barrow and they were on the run again.

She went too visit her

Barrow Gang were drinking alcohol at a dance in Stringtown, OK. This was illegal at that time. Sheriff G.C. Maxwell and deputy Eugene Moore approached them, Barrow opened fire killing the deputy. This was the first lawman to be killed by the Barrow Gang. His name went on the list of nine officers killed by the Barrow Gang.

Buck Barrow and his wife along with Bonnie and Clyde and W.D. Jones were in a temporary hide out in Joplin, MO. Somehow the officials came to arrest these people for bootlegging. Barrow and Jones shot first and killed one lawman and mortally wounded another.

The place was raided by police who had B.A.R.'s and the gangs Thompson sub-machine guns were no match. The gang managed to escape, but there were some wounded in the gang.

On July 24, 1933, the Barrow Gang were at Dexfield Park near Dexter, Iowa which was an abandon amusement park. They again found themselves surrounded by the local police and about 100 local citizens. Clyde and Bonnie and Jones escaped on foot. Buck was shot in the head and died five days later in the King's Daughter's Hospital in Iowa from pneumonia after surgery.

Bonnie and Clyde almost got caught on November 22, 1933 in Sower's Texas while attending a family gathering.

In January 1934, Clyde helped Henry Methvin, Ray Hamilton and several others to escape from Texas Correction Department in which was called the Eastham Breakout of 1934.

This was something Clyde always wanted to do, to get even with those people for some nasty treatment that he received there. There is some more action by the Gang in Texas but I'm going to move along to the end of Bonnie and Clyde.

The police had gotten to their driver who was sort of jealous of the fact that Bonnie and Clyde were very famous and he had not been heard of. After a little bargaining and promises of easy treatment he told the police where and when the pair would be at 9:00 a.m. on the morning of May 23, 1934.

So on a desolate road near their Bienville Parish, LA hideout they were shot by four Texas officers and two LA officers.

At approximately 9:00 a.m. on May 23, the posse, concealed in the bushes and almost ready to concede defeat, heard Clyde's stolen Ford V8 approaching. The posse's official report had Clyde stopping to speak with Henry Methvin's father, planted there with his truck that morning to distract Clyde and force him into the lane closest to the posse, the lawmen opened fire, killing Bonnie and Clyde while shooting a combined total of approximately 130 rounds. By 9:15 the couple were dead. The posse, under Hamer's direct orders, did not call out a warning or order the duo to surrender. Barrow was killed instantly from Oakley's initial head shot. Parker did

reported her uttering a long, horrified scream as the bullets tore into their car.. The officers emptied the specially-ordered automatic rifle, as well as rifles, shotguns and pistols at the car. —*information taken from Wikipedia*

Bonnie and Clyde wished to be buried together, but that didn't happen. The Parker family would not allow it. She is buried in Crown Hill Memorial Park in Dallas, Texas. Clyde Barrow is buried in the Western Heights Cemetery in Dallas.

The following words are inscribed on Bonnie's stone: "As the flowers are all made sweeter by the sunshine and the dew. So this old world is made brighter by the lives of folks like you." See Ya!





But naturally, Clyde Barrow and the gang would not hesitate to shoot anybody, lawman or civilian, if they got in the way of their escape.

Here are some of the men known to have committed murder: Raymond Hamilton, W.D. Jones, Buck Barrow and Henry Methvin.

The Barrow Gang escaped the police at Joplin, MO but W.D. Jones was wounded and they left most of their possessions in the apartment. The police confiscated a camera with film inside. The police got most of their photos from that camera.

Buck Barrow died from injuries he received in a shootout. This came about in June 1933.


The gang located in the Red Crown Tourist Court in Plat City, MO. this is now part of Kansas City, MO.







LEGISLATURE ACTS TO SAFEGUARD OHIOANS' PERSONAL INFORMATION

This fall, Toledo-area native, Samuel Joseph Wurzelbacher, a.k.a. "Joe the zelbacher, a.k.a. Plumber," vaulted into the national spotlight after he publicly asked President-elect Barack Obama a question about raising taxes on small businesses, and then became a focal point of the final presidential debate between Obama and Sen. John Mc-Cain. Weeks later, his name was once again in the news, this time at the center of an investigation into questionable activity at the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services.

In late October, it was discovered that officials at ODJFS, notably Director Helen Jones-Kelley, had accessed Mr. Wurzelbacher's personal information using a state database to determine if he owed child support, unemployment, back taxes or was getting public assistance. Ms. Kelley, an Obama supporter, stated that it was her department's practice to "take a quick look" at people thrust into the public spotlight.

The incident prompted an investigation from Ohio Inspector General, Tom Charles, who found that Ms. Kelley improperly authorized searches on Mr. Wurzelbacher's personal information and also used her state email account for political purposes. The Governor responded by suspending her for one month without pay, a move that angered many legislators, who felt that Ms. Kelley and other top officials at ODJFS should have been fired. She has since resigned from her position.

In response to concerns about the security of Ohioans' personal information in the hands of state agencies, State Senator Mark Wagoner and State Representative Shannon Jones introduced joint legislation in the House and Senate earlier this month, which would implement several recommendations from the Inspector General for how to prevent another "Joe the Plumber"-type situation from occurring in the future.

On December 17, the General Assembly approved the House version of the bill, House Bill 648, with strong bipartisan support. The legislation will now be sent to the Governor for his consideration.

HB 648, which I cosponsored, would require state agencies to develop criteria tor determining which employees may access or authorize access to confidential personal information and list valid reasons for accessing the data, based on the agencies' responsibilities. Also, agencies must define procedures for recording each specific case where an employee accesses somebody's personal information. Should an unclassified employee violate these rules by improperly accessing personal information, they would be fired and could be charged with a first degree misdemeanor. In addition, HB 648 would require that a person be notified by an agency if their personal information is found to have been improperly accessed. The bill would also require agencies to establish

a training program, so that all employees understand the rules, as well as post guidelines in the office and on the agency website.

George Orwell's classic book Nineteen Eighty-Four depicts a society where the government controls everything and "Big Brother" is always watching. In a country founded on the principles of personal freedom and democracy, no Ohioan should ever have to worry that "Big Brother" is watching them or accessing their personal information, because they may have been "thrust into the public spotlight," or chose to ask a question of an elected official. HB 648 would take important steps to restrict access by state agencies to confidential personal information and hopefully help restore Ohioans' trust in their government.

A MERRY CHRISTMAS FROM THE PAULDING COUNTY EXTENSION OF-FICE

Scientific studies have been conducted to determine "What Makes for a Merry Christmas." Hirschman and LaBarbera in a 1989 study found that many values and behaviors of individuals and society are reflected in festivals such as Christmas, which is why so many themes intermingle during the holiday. Another study investigated many of these themes and found that family and religion provided the greatest benefit to holiday well-being, whereas the secular, materialistic aspects of the holiday either contributed little to Christmas joy, or were associated with less happiness and more stress. Such findings fit well with research about how family, religion, and materialism relate to well-being during the rest of the year. A 2002 study conducted by Kasser and Myers reinforces the findings that the path to a Merry Christmas comes not from purchasing many expensive
