RESOLUTION PROVIDES

Whether they are at home or abroad, America's servicemen and women sacrifice a great deal on our behalf. During a time of conflict many are shipped overseas, leaving their homes, jobs, friends and, most importantly, their families in order to defend our freedoms. Even when the conflict ends, they face an almost equally difficult transition from the military back to civilian life, taking back all the responsibilities, financial and otherwise, they left behind.

This week, the Ohio Senate took an important step to help reduce this financial burden. Senate Joint Resolution 5 would place an amendment on the November ballot to give Ohio voters the opportunity to extend a "thank you" to soldiers who are returning, by providing each of them with a cash bonus to honor their

Under this proposal, those who served in the Persian Gulf, Afghanistan, and Iraq could receive \$100 per month of service, up to \$1,000. Soldiers who served elsewhere during these conflicts could receive \$50 per month of service, up to \$500. In addition, SJR 5 would offer \$5,000 as a death benefit to the families of soldiers

killed in the line of duty. Ohio has a history of sup-

porting veterans, as voters have overwhelmingly approved similar constitutional amendments in the past. In 1921, Ohioans approved a measure to extend bonuses to those returning home from World War I. Ohioans followed suit over the next several decades, granting bonuses to the soldiers of World War II, Korea and, most recently, Vietnam. While bonuses have been an important way to help veterans transition back into their communities, they also send a strong message that we all appreciate their service and respect the sacrifice they have made. I am a firm believer that

Ohio's soldiers deserve all the support we as civilians can offer. Therefore, I am proud to be a co-sponsor of SJR 5. Come November, I hope that we will have the opportunity to show our appreciation to Ohio's servicemen and women. After the Senate's vote

this past week, SJR 5 now moves to the Ohio House for further consideration. For more information on the amendment, please visit the Ohio General Assembly website: www.legislature.

A Defense for the Second Amendment

By: Laura E. Wegmann Our nation owes its prosperity to the dauntless courage of our Founding Fathers. The Declaration of Independence was inscribed by patriots who pledged and gave their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor in its defense. Over two hundred years ago our forbears penned the eloquent words of our Constitution in order to specify both the role of government and the protections for our God-given liberties. These rights, as John Dickinson proclaimed in 1776, "are created in us by the decrees of Providence, which establish the laws of our nature. They are born with us; exist with us; and cannot be taken from us by any human power without taking our lives." After enduring many years under Britain's feral mercantile rule, the Founding Fathers recognized that any right not expressly cemented into our Constitution would be left shamefully unguarded. This lead to the protective necessity of our Bill of Rights. In his book, Origins of the Bill of Rights, Pulitzer Prize winner Leonard W. Levy states: "The triumph of individual liberty against government power is one of history's noblest themes,

epitomized by the Bill of

In this essay we will ex-

amine one of the greatest triumphs of individual liberty, the Second Amendment. Does the Second Amendment still hold the same meaning today as it did to our forefathers 250 years ago? Is it still relevant to present day society? In order to answer this twofold question, we must examine the Second Amendment's words and allow them to illuminate the author's intent. "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms shall not be infringed." The very nature of the Bill of Rights and the wording of the Second Amendment presents a dilemma to those who believe it to be irrelevant. When one examines the amendment for its original intent-its sole intent, it becomes apparent that this amendment protects an individual's right to posses arms. This is evident in the words of George Mason: "I ask, who are the militia? They consist now of the whole people, except a few public officers." (Mason 1788)

The claim that the Second Amendment addresses a "collective" right, that it belongs only to a group of people, is neither rational nor historical. Rights, by definition, belong to the individual. To speak of a "collective" right is not to speak of a right at all, but rather a privilege. The assertion that the Second Amendment applies only to the National Guard is also invalid. Historically, the right to keep and bear arms did not denote a military connotation. It must be stated that Pennsylvania's constitution of 1776 was the first to use the phrase: "the right to bear arms" though it, itself did not posses a state militia. The essence of the Second Amendment can be further seen in the words of James Madison when he spoke of the Bill of Rights as: "guards for the private rights.'

The effects of the Second Amendment are far reaching, for in 1803, even the English acknowledged its enduring significance. British statesman St George Tucker avowed: "In American we may see reasonable hope that the people will never cease to regard the

right of keeping and bearing arms as the surest pledge of their liberty." Undoubtedly this was the intent of our forefathers. The Second Amendment is most certainly an unchanging fundamental component in our freedom and independence.

Having addressed the

meaning of the Second

Amendment, we may now

turn our attention to its

present-day role in our society. Sir William Blackstone once stated: "[Self-defense is] justly called the primary law of nature, so it is not, neither can it be in fact, taken away by the laws of society." The stubborn reality is this: firearms are the simplest and most effective means of individual protection. In his book, Stopping Power, J. Neil Schulman points out that "American women use handguns 416 times a day in defense against rapists." The women of America cannot suffer this liberty to be denied. Not only do millions of Americans enjoy the right to keep and bear arms, but they have exercised this right to save countless lives. According to the National Rifle Association, "Each year in the U.S. gun owners use firearms for protection as frequently as 2.5 million times." America's first patriots recognized that in order to secure the rights for posterity, free citizens must be able to arm themselves. In the words of Noah Webster, "Before a standing army can rule, the people must be disarmed; as they are in almost every kingdom of Europe. The supreme power in America cannot enforce unjust laws by the sword, because the whole body of the people are armed...

The Second Amendment is freedom's legacy. It is through the Second Amendment that we are guaranteed the ability to protect our right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. If we do not safeguard this cornerstone of independence we will certainly loose it. Over two centuries ago John Adams cautioned: "A Constitution of Government once changed from freedom, can never be restored. Liberty, once lost, is lost forever." Let us see to it, that it is never so!

Paulding County EMA director, Randy Shaffer reviewed with Commissioners various grant fund balances used by his office. Requests for reimbursement for the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th quarter of FY2007 under the Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) were submitted and received totaling \$21,770.98. Current expenses for grant dollars in the amount of \$3,321.02 will be submitted to the State for reimbursement within the next week.

County Recorder Carol Temple updated the Commissioners on the number of mortgage filings her office has processed last month compared to last year at this time. In December 2006 there were 113 mortgages processed and in December 2007 there were 67. Carol indicated that there should be a spike in the coming months now that the interest rates are falling. Many will be homeowners refinancing at a lower interest rate.

County Treasurer Lou Ann Wannemacher was present for the opening of bids on a combined note for the CSEA Annex and the Eagle Creek-Wilson ditch. The note totaled \$80,053.04 and the successful bidder was the Antwerp Exchange Bank at a 3.43% interest



Brett Shepherd wanted to do something different with his life. He decided to take a buy-out from GM and he enrolled into the Kentucky Horseshoeing School. His wife, Lori, works at Hawthorne Court and their two children, Amanda 11, and Zoe 7 go to school in Paulding. The girls like to go with him to shoe and trim horses feet. When he works on Belgian horses it can be quite a work out with each leg weighing 40-60 pounds.

He made a special back end for his truck that contains what he needs to do horseshoeing. He carries a gas forge, anvil, grinders to sharpen his knives, a plasma cutter plus everything he needs to shoe a horse.

Brett has learned a lot and considers Melvin Hoch, the Auglaze Village Blacksmith his mentor.

Brett uses bar steel that he purchases from Kohart's. He'll take a piece of bar steel, make slits in it and out of that comes a very pretty cross. He makes other decorative items such as brackets for shelves and details a lot of his items with leaves

and vines that he forges out of metal. He also makes candle holders. One that he has reproduced is called a courting candle. Back in the day, before electricity, the dad had this special candle holder. He was able to raise and lower the candle. When his daughter's beau came the dad would raise the candle and say you have her back by the time the candle burns down to there. Well, how are they supposed to know how long it will take for the candle to burn down to there?

I guess that's the point. He's taken a loop off of an old coil spring and made a pair of tongs to work with. He does make a lot of his tools. He has made a tripod for camping and hot dog

All the food items he makes are coated with vegetable oil and all others are coated with bees-wax and mineral oil.

Brett is just one of a talented group of people around Paulding County who want to keep the history and the preservation of old ways alive.





ANTWERP HISTORY By: Stan Jordan

We interviewed Chuck and Ann Wiedman the other day and actually this story should be in the column called Stan and Sue on the Road, but Sue and I think that Chuck and Ann are part of Antwerp's History because they go back over 50 years.

Chuck was born in Ft. Wayne in 1937. There were three boys and one girl in the family. He went to Adams Center School for awhile and then graduated from Central High School in 1958.

He traveled to Antwerp and stopped at the A & W Root Beer Drive Inn and he met a very pretty car hop named Ann Derck and about a year later they got married.

Now, you can tell right now that this is going to be a good story after a starting like



They had a son, Tom, in 1960, Dan in 1963 and Lori came along in 1964.

Chuck worked at Carl and Wilbur Langham's Chrysler and Plymouth Dealership from 1955-1961, down in the body shop. Then he had about 10 years down at Antwerp Sales for Keith Davis. Then in 1972, Dale Adams was School Superintendent and he influenced Chuck to be Transportation Manager and School Bus Mechanic for Antwerp High School.

He did an excellent job with the school buses and retired in 1998, but he could not completely walk away from the bus garage, so he drove the Vantage Bus on the morning trip. He drove the bus over to Vantage about

March 24th

7:45 a.m. and then drove the school's little green compact car on the return trip. He did this for eight years until his accident in 2007. That route now is handled by Mrs. Nan-

Ann Derck was born in 1938 here in Antwerp. There was six sisters and four brothers in her family. She graduated from Antwerp High in 1955. She worked for over 15 years at Stokley's in Paulding.

Her son, Thomas, has two children, Lori had two children and live over by Farmer. Ann is very proud of her children and grandchildren. She also has four great-grandchildren

Chuck's hobby is remodeling and restoring old classic cars and trucks. At first he had a 1955 Thunderbird. He was very proud of that T-Bird and he put it in the Antwerp Day Parade and sometimes carried the Queen of the parade in his T-Bird.

Then he sold the T-Bird to a friend and started on a bigger venture, a 1936 Dodge Pick-Up Truck.

The pick-up truck is a beauty. It has won a lot of First Place Awards and was featured in The Classic Truck Magazine and the Rolling Thunder Magazines. A little while later in the Heming Motor Sport Calendar.

Yes, Chuck is well known in the classic car circles. Not long ago he and Ann drove it out to Oklahoma to see his old friend, Jerry Davis. Along somewhere in there he remodeled and then sold a 1949 Ford. He and Ann attend a lot of car shows and Cruise-Ins. His whole south wall of his living room is trophy's and

awards that he has won. Chuck's big accident happened on May 10, 2007. He doesn't remember any of it, not even getting on the tractor. Ann said that she heard the tractor running and then it stopped running and she went back to the ravine behind the garage and saw that the tractor had upset and was lying on top of him. She tore over to the neighbors house and got the two boys. The three of them could lift the tractor but couldn't pull Chuck out, as he was pushed down in the mud.

Right about then, a truck driver going by on US 24 could see the predicament that they were in so he pulled his rig over to the side of the road and ran down the hill to help out. So now they could lift the tractor off of Chuck and carefully lifted him from the mud and from under the tractor. His eyes and nose and mouth were full of mud and he was almost a black color all over. Antwerp EMS was there

Ann says the truck driver was a big help. She says she never saw him before or since. He was not of American extraction and couldn't understand him very well, but he knew he helped out a lot and he was appreciated.

By now, the Life Flight Helicopter from Parkview Hospital came and the people worked hard and fast to clean out his airway and that took some time because now they are in the air and headed for

Chuck chuckled to Sue and I and said that was a \$6800 plane ride and he didn't see anything. He said, "Golly, I can ride with Oley McMichael for free and see lots of things!"

He said the accident collapsed both lungs and his liver was damaged. There was no oxygen going to his brain as all his breathing parts were chock full of mud. He had been lying in the bottom of a drainage ditch with the tractor sitting on him. It took many hours and many doctors and nurses to get him to breathing right. He was in a coma for weeks. Then they drained a liter and a half of fluid from his lungs and he slowly started to improve.

Then he was moved to St. Joe Hospital because, I understand, they have a therapy unit there that can work around all of the tubes and electric wires that a patient has attached to him. He said all those people at St. Joe were super. They make you work, but that was what he was there for. He said learning to walk all over again was agonizing, painful and time-consuming. But he said the staff at St. Joe bent over backwards for him. He has since returned to St. Joe and thanked them all for their help and kindness.

Chuck said the flight crew that took him to Ft, Wayne in the chopper called on him a number of times while he was at Parkview. I think they realized that they witnessed a miracle because Chuck pulled

Chuck has received a plaque from the school for 35 years of dedicated service to the school and community.

I leaned back and asked Chuck, "How are you doing now and what percent have you recovered." He said he feels good and his faculties are fine. He said, "I think I'm about 90% normal." He giggled and said carrying a battery out to the garage now, they seem heavier than they used to be.

Chuck and Ann both want to thank the people who helped out and attended the They want to again thank all their cruise-in friends and over the next few months they

Chuck and Ann we thank you for this fine interview. I would be amiss if I didn't

mention that Chuck was a race car driver for years. He doesn't race anymore, but he still attends the stock car His son, Tom, is a first-

ler Dealer in Auburn. Tom has been in the race business from go-carts on up. Dan, who is the low pressure engineer at the Antwerp

High School, is very much in car racing on Saturday nights at the Angola track. Dan races his own racer. These three Wiedman boys are well known in Southern

Michigan and Northeast Indiana and some other race tracks. That was pretty much in evidence when all those car drivers showed up at Chuck's

STAN & SUE ON THE ROAD

We went over to the Manor House and interviewed Ruth Smith. She was born in Emerald Township in July of 1919. She attended the Emmett School for about three years. In 1925 they moved on Road 83 on the Glenn Yager farm, that is right up against the rail road on the west side of the road.



She then attended the Knoxdale School. That was a mile away if she walked the railroad track and she did most of the time because it was three miles if she walked around on the road.

Then Antwerp School had a new school bus and it picked up three Smiths and three Chesters and took them to Antwerp school.

When she was in the sixth grade they moved two miles north over on US 24. She graduated from AHS in 1937.

In September, 1937, she enrolled in Lucas County Hospital School of Nursing in Toledo. When she did get home she rode the Greyhound Bus. She graduated in September of 1940, this was a three year course and she only missed two days in that time to attend her father's funeral in 1939.

She took the State Board in November of 1940. It was very hard and it took two days. Then she worked at the Defiance Hospital for about five years. She then went to Ft. Wayne and worked for Dr. Berghoff for about 5 years.

She started to work for the Weatherhead Corp. in 1951. She was the plant nurse, but she did a lot of other chores also. She retired from there in 1984 after 32 years.

After she retired she helped with the Meals on Wheels clothes, so you could say she

was pretty good at sewing. Then she added that her father had a pair of white mules years ago and they came in handy on the farm.

She added she is fond of her great-nephew who plays basketball at Antwerp High School.

She says she feels pretty good now. You see, she fell and broke a hip at the school auditeria. She spent three months in rehabilitation over in Hicksville, she had three pins put in. After all the rehab she feels pretty good but has trouble remembering names and faces.

She has been at the Manor House a couple weeks now and really likes the food, staff and surroundings.





BUEHRER'S ADULT GUARD-

COLUMBUS-The Ohio Senate today voted unanimously to concur on House changes to Senate Bill 157, legislation sponsored by State Senator Steve Buehrer (R-Delta) that would make needed changes to state law to give the parents of a developmentally disabled child greater authority in selecting a guardian for that child once they reach adulthood. The bill, which is Buehrer's first to pass the General Assembly as a member of the Senate, now heads to the Governor for his

role in planning their children's future." said Buehrer.

Sen. Buehrer noted that a significant number of developmentally disabled children now survive well into adulthood, and it is important that their parents have a choice in who cares for them later in life. Current Ohio law does not allow the parent of a child who is developmentally disabled to name a guardian for

the parents of a disabled child—the people who have lived with them for years and know best what services they need-should play a role in choosing a guardian to care for that child during their adult years," explained Buehrer. "This bill is designed to not only improve the quality of life for Ohio's developmentally disabled adults, but give their parents greater piece of

"During tonight's State of the Union Address, President Bush addressed many important issues facing our Nation." "The Economic Stimulus

package, which already has bi-partisan support in the House, was a main topic of discussion. This package is important because it provides an immediate boost to the economy, and returns money to the taxpayer's walletswhere it belongs. While this is not a long-term solution, this will provide our economy the boost it needs in order to fight the short-term problems it is facing. After this economic stimulus package is passed, Congress must continue to work on making the tax cuts permanent to help the economy in the long run and again return money to the taxpayers. Many people have stopped and asked Jerry Price (as he mows his in-law's lawn) where the canal is. "It's right there," he replies. Right there it is, you can follow it. Right now it looks like a big ditch but if you go on CR 163 and go over the 6-Mile Bridge you can see the culvert the Irish immigrants built to go under the Canal around 150 years ago. They had to square each stone by hand. If you travel along the canal you will see the beauty of the terrain and you can just imagine the boats and mules and all the activity that went along with it. The small towns in Paulding County weren't so small back then. They were commerce centers full of businesses and warehouses. Junction alone had six grocery stores at one time. Have you traveled through Charloe lately? The river, ravines and trees that run through there are gorgeous.

We have so much history in Paulding County we really need to preserve it and the beauty of the county.

The canals have always fascinated me. I think about my husband's grandfather riding down the canal on one of the boats. Paulding County being all Black Swamp in the beginning fascinates me also. I can't imagine what the first settlers went through to make

homes and businesses here.

Jerry Price, his wife, Mary and her parents, whose homestead has been in the family 150 years and is across from the canal, also love Paulding County history, especially the canals. Jerry started the ball rolling to have a marker put up at the place where the two canals met. He has enlisted the help of the John Paulding Historical Society and they have sent a letter to Lynn Watchman endorsing the project. The Historical Society received a reply that it should be no problem and out of pocket should only be \$1,500. The Historical Society would like to buy some land to have a place to park to be able to get to the marker.

The Buckeye Trail, which is in the process of being built, will follow the tow paths of the canal among other things. In Ohio it will cover 40 counties and will form a circle around the state. You may camp while hiking the trail. It's a great way to see part of Ohio's history.





Congressman Bob Latta visited the Antwerp Rotary at their regular meeting on January 31 at the Essen House. Indiana News Center's, Jeff Neumeyer and camera man Brian Gillett were also there.

Don Oberlin introduced Congressman Latta who then spoke on some of the bills that are being considered now.

He talked about the need to cut taxes and to get things in order. The rebate checks to stimulate economy was also brought up. He said we need to purchase in "our own backyard" to help the businesses surrounding where we live. He mentioned that the U.S. has the 2nd highest corporate tax in the world and that is one of the reasons cooperations are sending job overseas. "We need to control our own destiny and not let foreign countries do it. If the foreign countries would

pull out we (U.S.) would collapse," Congressman Latta commented.

The FISA (Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act) will give our foreign intelligence agents the right to wire tap terrorists (such as Osoma Bid Laden) without getting a court order. This pertains to foreign soil only.

The House and Senate need to get control over the Earmark (Airdrop) Bills. To much money is going out for unnecessary personal proj-

The Farm Bill was mentioned and Congressman Latta mentioned that by the time money for other projects is taken out there is not much left for the farmers.

The United States needs to come up with alternative energy sources and soon. Congressman Latta also stated that the illegal aliens need to go back home if they are not here legally. They are a drain on the economy.

Current expenses for grant dollars in the amount of \$3,321.02 will be submitted to the State for reimbursement within the next week.

County Recorder Carol Temple updated the Commissioners on the number of mortgage filings her office has processed last month compared to last year at this time. In December 2006 there were 113 mortgages processed and in December 2007 there were 67. Carol indicated that there should be a spike in the coming months now that the interest rates are falling. Many will be homeowners refinancing at a lower interest rate.

County Treasurer Lou Ann Wannemacher was present for the opening of bids on a combined note for the CSEA Annex and the Eagle Creek-Wilson ditch. The note totaled \$80,053.04 and the successful bidder was the Antwerp Exchange Bank at a 3.43% interest rate.

Commissioners traveled to Bryan for the quarterly meeting of the Four County Solid Waste meeting. Paulding County along with Fulton, Williams, and Defiance comprise this district. Funding for our recycling programs are supported by funds made available from this district. An Ohio Recycling Market Development Grant is in the process of application from Kohart's Surplus & Salvage. The District will submit a letter of support with this grant application. Becky Suvar, Paulding County district coordinator gave a report to the district on her activities for the quarter. Some of those included recycling tires left along County roads. Becky presented a pro-

gram to fourth graders about recycling and the importance of our environment. May 31, 2008, has been set as the date the TV recycling day.
