BENEFIT FOR SOPHIA EAGER



Sophia was just four years old in June 2008, when she was diagnosed with renal cancer. She had three Wilms tumors on her kidneys—one large tumor on the right kidney, and two smaller tumors on the left kidney. As soon as the diagnosis was made in Fort Wayne, her family took her to Riley Children's Hospital in Indianapolis to meet with cancer specialists and surgeons to develop a plan of action to treat Sophia's cancer. It was determined that the large tumor on the right kidney had ruptured, which required Sophia to undergo radiation treatment along with the chemotherapy regimen.

Sophia was started on a sixweek course of chemotherapy in July to shrink the tumors. This was partially successful. Surgery to remove the tumors took place in August, and when Sophia had healed from

treatments at Riley Hospital during the month of September. Since completing the radiation, Sophia has been able to receive the chemotherapy treatments at Lutheran Hospital for the most part, with occasional trips to Riley Hospital. Sophia has undergone many CT scans and blood and platelet transfusions. She is currently nearing the end of this long chemo regimen, but will have further scans to help doctors determine what further action is required for her. Sophia's brother, Jacob, is being closely monitored as well. There is a genetic component that they both carry that leads to a much higher risk for developing Wilms tumors. Sophia lives in Fort Wayne with her parents, Jason and Melissa Eager and her younger brother. Sophia is also the granddaughter of John and Linda Eager of Har-

The battle was close, the fingernails bitten down to the quick, but when the dust had settled the reading team from Grover Hill was victorious over second-place winner, Payne in the 17th Annual competition of the Paulding County Carnegie Library's Battle of the Books. The final six teams had to first be triumphant at each of their school competitions before they could move on to the finals. According to Anissa Williamson, Youth Services team leader, "we are so proud of all of these students. Each team had to read and become very familiar with 50 titles and authors. The questions were tough. It is exciting to see young people excited about books and reading."

Six teams from the county elementary schools met to face each other on Tuesday, March 31, 2009 at the Youth Development Building at the Paulding County Fairgrounds. Susan Pieper, Library Director, volleyed twenty questions back and forth to the teams, with judges awarding a point for each correct answer and a bonus point if the team could supply the name of the author of the book. She is preceded in death by her parents; husband; a brother, Samuel Gallup; and a sister, Mary Weber.



In her book, A Practical Guide to Prayer, Dorothy Maskins tells about a noted concert violinist who was asked the secret of her mastery of the instrument. The woman answered the question with two words: "Planned neglect." Then she explained: "There were many things that used to demand my time. When I went to my room after breakfast, I made my bed, straightened the room, dusted, and did whatever seemed necessary. When I finished my work, I turned to violin practice. That system prevented me from accomplishing what I should on the violin. So I reversed things. I deliberately planned to neglect everything else until my practice period was complete. And that program of planned neglect is the secret of my success."

This same principle can be helpful as we plan our daily agenda. Unless we discipline ourselves and make a deliberate effort, other things will keep us from establishing consistent quiet time with God. And when we take our spiritual sustenance from the leftovers in our schedule, we will always be hungry and undernourished. Somehow we need to come to grips with the "Mary-Martha Syndrome." (Remember how Mary sat at Jesus' feet while Martha hustled and bustled with the tasks of the day?) Successful Christian living should have a rhythm: doing and resting, speaking and listening, giving and receiving.

Bernard of Clairvaux put it well when he wrote, "Action and contemplation are very close companions; they live together in one house on equal terms; Martha is Mary's sister."

I don't know about you, but I need that kind of reminder. Especially during this time of year. Not only is it daylight a lot longer, but I've got long grass, blooming dandelions, and an untilled garden that are all screaming for my attention. Spring is a great time of the year, but it's easy to get caught up in all the stuff to do outside and squeeze out any time to spend with the Savior. Sound familiar? Determine again that with the onslaught of nice weather, your personal time with the Lord will not be sacrificed upon the altar of expediency. To be sure, Spring is a time of yardwork, softball, and washing the car. But it's still the time to remain consistent in your communion with Christ. Let's practice some "planned neglect." In doing so, I think we'll be amazed at how everything else falls together.

A LESSON REGARDING LIFE

Many years ago there was a movie titled, "Stars in My Crown." It told of an elderly black man who owned a little farm outside a southern town. Some very precious metal was discovered in that area, and suddenly there was pressure on him from many people to

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sell his land. But he would not sell. He wanted to stay exactly where he was. However, the people in the area would not take "no" for an answer. They did everything they could to make him move. They burned down his barn, shot through his house one night, and eventually threatened to hang him by sundown the next day if he did not agree to sell.

The local Methodist minister heard about the trouble and went to visit the old man. At sundown of the next day, all the leading citizens of the community came to the farm dressed in their white hoods. They were ready to hang the black gentleman if he refused to sell. The farmer came out on the porch to meet them wearing his best clothes. He said that he was ready to die and that he had asked the minister to draw up for him his Last Will and Testament, which he wanted to have read at that time.

The minster read the will, and those present realized quickly the old man was giving everything to them. He willed the farm to the banker who seemed so hell-bent on having it. He gave his rifle to another of the men there who had first learned to hunt with it. He gave his fishing pole to another. In fact, that old man gave everything he had to the people who were prepared to kill him. He killed them first with love and affection.

The impact was incredible. Seeing goodness given in the face of such animosity was more than any of them could tolerate. One by one, in shame, they turned away, and the entire lynching mob disappeared. The minister's grandson had watched everything from a distance, an as everyone departed, he ran up to his grandfather and asked, "What kind of will was that,

The old minister answered, "That, my son, was the will of

That story causes me to think about what Jesus did when He died on the cross. The leaders of that day were intent on destroying Jesus. They wanted Him out of the way. Killed. Forgotten.

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DALLAS STOUDENMIRE

Dallas Stoudenmire was an Old West gunman and lawman. He was involved in more gun fights in his short career than most of your other fast guns.

He was born in Aberfoil, AL in 1845. He was one of nine children of Les and Elizabeth Stoudenmire.

He enlisted in the side of the South in the Civil War, but they discovered he was only 15 so they sent him home. He tried to enlist two more times and finally made it. He was six foot and four inches by now and a good soldier. He was wounded numerous times and carried two bullets in his body the rest of his life.

After the war he drifted into Texas and was in the Texas Rangers for 3 years. It was noted he was handsome, a fancy dresser and a gentleman around the ladies. He wore two guns and was very accurate with either hand. If intoxicated, he was very dangerous. He spoke Spanish very well.

He was working as Marshall of Socorro, NM when he was asked to come to El Paso, Texas and to be the Town

Marshall. The city had a bad reputation and it was a lawless boomtown. Stoudenmire traveled to El Paso by stagecoach and was hired. This was the beginning of the end of a violent and wild end of El Paso and the beginning of his fame.

He started his job on Monday, April 11, 1881. He was the sixth Town Marshall in eight months for El Paso. Getting the jail keys from the Deputy Marshall turned out to be a chore. He had to stand the deputy on his head and shook the keys out of him. This embarrassed the deputy and had bad repercussions later on.

Stoudenmire had only been in office three days when he got enslaved in one of the Old West's Famous Gunfights. The papers and writers all called it 'The Four Dead in Five Seconds Gunfight.'

A couple of boys stole some cattle from Mexico and brought them north. The owner of the cattle hired a couple Mexican boys to track the cattle down and find them. They did, but got killed by the two rustlers for their effort. Their bodies were found and returned to Mexico. The cattle owner wanted their killers to pay for the murders. The two American cattle rustlers

were named Perney and Fredericks. They were heard bragging about killing the two when they were trailing the herd to a Mr. Hale's Ranch.

The County Constable was a man named Krempkau. He was fluent in Spanish. They had an inquiry, and the two Americans were found guilty, arrested and scheduled for a full trial at a later date.

At a confrontation in a saloon the big rancher, Hale, got drunk and was upset by Krempkau's role in the investigation, pulled one of his friend's guns and shot Krempkau.

One time Stoudenmire was eating at the restaurant. He rushed out in the street and started shooting. First an innocent Mexican bystander was killed, then Rancher Hale. A man named Campbell scooped up a gun and did some firing. Stoudenmire then fired and killed him. The gunfight made Stoudenmire a legend, but that had some bad side effects.

Campbell and Hale had many friends in El Paso, Stoudenmire didn't and so he was standing alone to answer for his actions. As was the case, he did his job and the shootings were justified, but in the Old West vendettas and revenge were common.

About three days later the Manning brothers tried to hire the old Deputy Marshall Bill Johnson to assassinate Stoudenmire. He agreed but he got drunk and hid behind a large pile of brick with a double barrel shotgun. When he saw Stoudenmire and his brother-in-law, Doc Cummings approaching he got excited and fell backward shooting off both barrels. Stoudenmire pulled both guns and fired eight times killing Johnson. This started a feud between Stoudenmire and the Mannings.

Within six days of starting his job, Stoudenmire killed four men, one accidentally. Between the killing of Johnson, which was April 17, 1881 and the following February, he killed six more men in shoot outs and arrests and the city's crime rate dropped dramatically.

His reputation as a lawman and a gunmen increased his legendary status.

On February 14, 1882, James Manning killed Doc Cummings in what was called a fair gunfight. But Cummings was Stoudenmire's brother-in-law. In the last few seconds, Manning drew his pistol and told Doc, "We will settle this once and for all." They both fired at the same time, Cummings staggered backwards out on the wooden sidewalk and then fell dead into the street. Manning was acquitted by a number of his friends on the jury. Unfortunately, Cummings could keep Stoudenmire's temper under control, but he's gone now. Lots of people were afraid of Stoudenmire's temper tantrums and stayed out of the saloons and town. When drunk, he was a dangerous person. Despite his ability as a lawman and a gunman and that he had cleaned up El Paso, like he was supposed to do, he was an outsider in the town. He was well-respected by the Texas Rangers and the U.S. Marshals, but usually he was an outsider. He had no friends in high places and a lot of people hated him, because he was cleaning up the town. He had cleaned up the town more than the six other marshals who came before him and the people feared him.

On May 27, 1882, he was fired by the Town Council as a marshal. He went on a drunken rage but then resigned two days later. He then became the proprietor of the Globe Restaurant and then was appointed Deputy U.S. Marshal for West Texas and New Mexico.

The feud between Stoudenmire and the three Manning brothers was still hot. But the Mannings would never meet with the Marshal alone. They were plenty scared of him.

On September 22, 1882 they all met in the saloon for a peace treaty to end the feud. Believing the feud was settled, James Manning left the place.

Things fell apart quickly. Doc said to Dallas, "You have not kept your word," and they both went for their guns. Stoudenmire's friend tried to push him out of the way and it threw his aim off. Doc's bullet hit Stoudenmire's left arm and the second shot knocked him down. As he fell out through the door he drew his other gun and shot Doc Manning in the arm. As Dallas was firing, James Manning came up behind him and fired two rounds-one hitting Stoudenmire behind the left ear, killing him. Then Doc was beating him on the head as he lay on the ground until he was stopped.

The Mannings stood trial for murder, but was acquitted by a jury of their friends.

Marshall Dallas Stoudenmire was credited for taming the wild and violent town of

El Paso. His body was shipped to Columbus, Texas and was buried there, but the exact lo-



We traveled to Woodburn this morning to Bob's Restaurant and had an interview with Virgil Hoeppner. It was a very enjoyable hour and it brought back a lot of memories and flash backs.

Virgil was born in Woodburn on July 30, 1923. His mother was Hilda Waltke and he had two other brothers. Gerald, who I know as Jerry. He married Phyllis Gustin, a country girl. They were the parents of the late Terry Hoeppner, the well-known football coach of Miami of Ohio and then later at Indiana University.

Virgil's other brother, Don, still lives in the Woodburn area.

Virgil attended school in Woodburn and graduated from there in 1941. He went into the army in January of 1943. He was sent to the European Theater and served in a 'Military Police Battalion'. He was discharged at Camp Atterbury in December of 1945

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



GOVERNOR ANNOUNCES PRIORITY TRANSPORTA-TION PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED BY FEDERAL RE-COVERY ACT RESOURCES

Ohio Governor Ted Strickland announced that 149 transportation infrastructure projects have been prioritized for full or partial funding from American Recovery and Reinvestment Act resources.

"We have identified projects that will put thousands of Ohioans to work quickly," Strickland said. "But to make the best use of these resources, we must also leverage them to create tomorrow's opportunities. In addition to distributing the federal transportation stimulus resources broadly to provide Ohioans in every region with an opportunity to participate in the economic recovery, we are also targeting funds to develop unique regional economic assets. Doing so will strengthen the state's infrastructure system while also bolstering each region's economic vitality in immeasurable ways."

Federal transportation stimulus funds totaling \$774 million will be spent in nearly every Ohio county. Based on federal calculations for transportation investment, an estimated 21,257 jobs will be created or retained through these stimulus projects, with thousands of additional jobs likely to be spurred by the economic development that will occur as a result of the projects.

When combined with Recovery Act funds allocated under Ohio's Rural Transit Program, stimulus investments will be made in 87 of Ohio's 88 counties (Noble County, the remaining county, did not submit a federallyeligible transportation stimulus project; however, the state will be investing more than \$9.7 million in non-stimulus transportation funds over the next year.)

"Without the leadership of President Obama and the members of Ohio's Congressional Delegation who supported this bill, we would not opportunities and build toward a stronger, more cohesive transportation system in the future," Strickland said. "Consistent with the 21st Century Transportation Priorities Task Force recommendations, these projects will move Ohio toward a more multi-modal system of transportation that links Ohio's businesses, highways, railways, transit and ports into an advanced and efficient network for moving goods and people," Strickland said.

As part of the state's \$774 million stimulus investment, ODOT will invest \$603.5 million into 113 separate roadway projects. Of those 113 projects, \$242.9 million is dedicated to 30 bridge projects, and \$360.6 million to 83 pavement projects.

ODOT will invest \$34.5 million into five maritime projects, including major enhancement projects at the Port of Toledo and the City of Lorain's waterfront development along Lake Erie, and along the Ohio River at the South Point Intermodal Facility in Lawrence County, and the Wellsville Intermodal Facility in Columbiana County.

An additional \$68.9 million will be directed to 22 separate railroad projects, mostly targeting the state's busy freight rail system.

The state will invest \$50.9 million to support improved intermodal connections, including \$14 million at Franklin County's Rickenbacker Intermodal Terminal and Global Logistics Park, and \$6.5 million at Toledo's Airline Junction Intermodal Terminal to connect freight shipments by air, rail, and truck.

The remaining funds (approximately \$16.2 million) will be directed to additional planning and engineering, as needed.


As part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, Ohio will also receive \$29.8 million for Rural Public Transit capital projects, including dollars set aside for rural intercity bus capital projects. Combining the Recovery Act dollars with Ohio's annual federal transit funding, ODOT will be able to fund every rural transit system request for new vehicles.

Recovery Act dollars will also fund critical facility, equipment, and technology needs, allowing Rural Public Transit systems to upgrade from the use of paper and pencil to schedule vehicles and allow the agencies to be more agile and responsive in providing services to Ohioans who rely upon them every day.

Last year, Ohio's 35 Rural Pubic Transit providers of-

regional Metropolitan Planning Organizations, where needed. ODOT will begin accepting public comment on stimulus projects not already on the STIP.

Governor Strickland stressed the importance of ensuring accountability and transparency in the subsequent contracting of projects funded through the Recovery Act. And he reiterated his support for the establishment of a new, independent, nonpartisan deputy inspector general position with authority to monitor distribution of federal recovery resources in Ohio to ensure taxpayers have full confidence in the stimulus process.

thAs we put these Recovery Act resources to work quickly and efficiently, we must continue our commitment to taxpayer accountability," Strickland said. "Every project selected for funding will be identified online. Every contract will be selected in a fair and transparent manner and subject to careful scrutiny. And we will require recipientes of stimulus resources to account for how every dollar is spent."

The governor also recognized the importance of providing all Ohioans with access to opportunities to participate in the recovery.

The State of Ohio will re-

quire recipients of Recovery Act resources to post any new job opportunities at both www.OhioMeansJobs.com and Ohio's "One-Stop" sites. At least one site is located in every Ohio county. One-Stop provide a variety of training services and match job seekers with employment opportunities.

Recovery Act (stimulus) Transportation Infrastructure Project Investments

In addition to selecting projects which met standard federal transportation requirements and Recovery Act guidelines, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), the Ohio Rail Development Commission and the Ohio Department of Development (ODOD) collaborated to prioritize many of the 149 projects that meet both the critical infrastructure needs of each region and promote lasting economic growth.

"The Recovery Act resources have put Ohio in a unique position to seize new fered more than 2.3 million rides to Ohioans in 36 rural counties. In rural area, where distances are long to reach essential services, the people who use the system tend to be more transit dependent. They may be unable to drive a car, have no access to a car or cannot afford to operate the car they own. In 2007, over 45% of all riders on Rural Public Transit in Ohio were either elderly or people with disabilities. At some transit systems in Ohio this can be as high as 80%

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TQA KEEPS SWINE CARE AND PORK QUALITY MOV-ING FORWARD

Responsible pork producers have no tolerance for acts of neglect nor abuse of animals in their care. Responsible pork producers care about their animals and recognize they have both a moral and ethical obligation to protect and promote animal well-being.

In addition to the moral and ethical principles in swine production, producers also demonstrate their commitment to animal care, well-being and pork safety by achieving certification and implementing current best management practices of the Pork Quality Assurance Plus[®] and Transport Quality Assurance[®] programs which help ensure those who work closely with the animals are providing the best possible care.

A new Transport Quality Assurance program is now available to producers, animal handlers, and transporters of pigs of all weights and production phases. Individuals involved in the movement, loading or unloading of pigs should consider receiving TQA certification.

The Transport Quality Assurance program replaces the program formally known as Trucker Quality Assurance. The new TQA increases its scope to include all individuals in charge of moving pigs of all weights and production phases, including breeding stock animals and weaned, growing and finishing pigs.

TQA teaches people to handle animals in a way that takes advantage of their behavior and in the most appropriate way to their size and weight and to promote animal

well-being, health and pork quality. TQA reviews the laws that apply to livestock transporters.

Transport Quality Assurance certification training is scheduled for Wednesday, April 7 from 7:00-9:00 p.m. at the Williams County Agriculture Services Meeting Room. Reservations are requested by calling the Williams County OSU Extension office at 419-636-5608 or contact your local Extension office by April 2.



WHEAT HEAVING AND ROOT

By: Jim Lopshire, Extension Educator

Wheat in Ohio is at the 'green-up" stage, and now is a good time for growers to evaluate plant stands for adequate yield potential. Begin by counting the number of tillers per foot of row. Extension specialists recommend a minimum stand of 12 tillers per foot of row, but like to see 20 or more per foot of row. This time of year also marks the beginning of possible stand losses from heaving-a situation where ground freezing and thawing pushes the plant crown and roots to the surface. The result of heaving is the desiccation and eventual death of the plants.

Wheat plants generally do not show stress of heaving until the temperatures warm and the plants begin to grow. By late March early April, growers begin to see these plants turn color and report that the wheat is going backwards. This is because heaved plants take several weeks to begin showing water stress and die.

Wheat plants with the crown heaved out of the soil. have almost no chance of survival. Heaved plants with the crown still in the soil have the

potential to develop new roots and produce some grain. Depending on soil type, soil moisture and degree of heaving, there is a slight chance that rolling the field may save much of the stand, but a good outcome is still a long shot at best. While no-till doesn't guarantee the elimination of heaving, no-till seeding to the proper depth of 1.0 to 1.5 inches will reduce heaving by more than 90 percent.

While observing fields for heaving, it would be a good time to look for root and seedling disease problems. If there are low-lying areas in the field or areas with unhealthy-looking plants, carefully remove a few plants from those areas and examine the roots and crowns for discoloration. Gently remove, preferentially by washing, the soil from the roots, and look for darkish areas or lesions. Healthy roots and crowns typically have a milky-white color, compared to the dark discoloration usually seen on infected roots. Remember, it is not uncommon for the older, lower leaves of the plant to die at this time of the year. If these plants are not completely heaved out of the ground and the root systems are healthy they will likely recover to produce grain.
