In 2007, a group of Paulding citizens decided what people had been saying all along: Paulding needs a new athletic weight room. The ceilings were too low, the water was too high (it flooded when it rained or snowed) and over all just too small! After all, it was previously a storage area.

In August of that year a committee decided to take action and start getting funds. A new tax was out of the question, and so they worked with the area people. The donations poured in much faster than anyone could have hoped for.

It took less than a year to collect the necessary donations for building this new facility. Ground breaking was June of 2008. Guess what? The new building was paid in full at the time of ground breaking due to all of the area people who donated their time & money. The final cost was about \$140,000.

The committee didn't purchase everything new in fact the equipment is from the previous building. And the lights have also been refitted for new bulbs and reused from a school structure torn down, saving quite a bit of money. This past weekend the

new facility, named the Wellness Center, had it's open house and the snowy weather did not keep people away! People from all over the area were invited to see what the excitement was about and loved it! Oh, and the snacks were good too!

#### **MATTHEW 24 LESSON 17**

Last time I left off I was talking about the Lord coming in the clouds—and this meaning he was coming in Judgment. Today I will give some other scripture verses about coming in the clouds.

In the gospel of Matthew, he uses the word "coming" in a number of different ways. In Matthew 10:23, it is believed that he is talking about the spirit coming on Pentecost as in Acts chapter 2. In Matthew 25:31, here it talks about his coming on the day of judgment. Also there is another scripture verse in Matthew 26:64 when Jesus told Caiaphas at his trial that he would see the son of man sitting on the right hand of power and coming on the clouds of heaven. Notice in Matthew 26:63 that Caiaphas said in this verse, "I adjure you by the living God." The word 'adjure' means Caiaphas is binding an oath on Jesus to give a direct answer to his question.

Notice in Matthew 26:64, Jesus doesn't identify Himself with the misconception of the Messiah they had, but as the son of man in Daniel 7:13, as one who would be the judge of all. Jesus did not tell them that he was the son of God, but that they had said it. Jesus is talking about two Old Testament scriptures which relates to what he is saying Psalms 110. About him sitting at the right hand of power, as well as in Daniel 7:13 about coming on the clouds of heaven. And this is clouds again being used in a judgment context. Yes, Caiaphas being the high priest, should have been familiar with these scripture verses. Caiaphas, from the scripture verses, was the last high priest because at Jesus' death he became the one and only high priest. According to what Jesus is saying in Matthew 26:64, Caiaphas could have been alive in 70 AD, not as high priest, because this was taken away from him in 36 AD. According to several dictionaries that I have, as far as I know from my research, there isn't any information about the year Caiaphas was born or died. The lesson is yours.

#### **H&R BLOCK: FORECLO-**SURES TRIGGER TAX LI-ABILITIES

New home sales are down. Foreclosures are up. In fact, one out of every 416 homes in America received a foreclosure notice in August\*, leaving many taxpayers scratching their heads to understand their tax liabilities.

"Homeownership is usually a benefit to one's tax situation. But, as more and more people experience a foreclosure, the complexity of their tax situations also increases." said Amy McAnarney, executive director of The Tax Institute of H&R Block (NYSE:HRB).

"Given the current housing market, tax professionals are advising more taxpayers on what they need to do when they file their returns," McAnarney said. "H&R Block tax preparers are seeing first-hand an increase in questions about the tax implications of foreclosures."

The recently passed Emergency Economic Stabilization Act includes tax breaks to Americans involved in a foreclosure, relieving some of their financial burden. EESA extends the Mortgage Forgiveness Debt Relief Act to 2013 - it was originally scheduled to expire at the end of 2009.

Taxpayers will benefit from two kinds of "forgiven debt" on a primary residence. First, in efforts to not foreclose on a home, a lender may let the owner sell the home at a loss and forgive the remaining balance due on the loan. Second, a lender may foreclose on a principal residence then forgive the remaining debt owed. In both cases, that canceled

However, the Mortgage Relief Act allows taxpayers to exclude such "forgiven debt" from taxable income, as long as the debt was incurred to buy, build, or substantially improve the residence. The exclusion applies only to acquisition debt to \$2 million. Cancelled mortgage debt which was not used to buy, build or improve a principal residence is not eligible for this exclusion but may be eligible for some other type of relief.

"Because of the decline in the housing market, the number of people who qualify to utilize the new debt cancellation exclusion could increase," McAnarney said. "That's why it's even more important to consult your tax professional to ensure you are correctly utilizing the changes in the tax code involving debt cancellation and foreclosure."

#### **PAULDING VILLAGE COUNCIL MINUTES FROM DECEMBER 15,21, AND 29,** 2008

Paulding Village Council met in Regular Session on December 15, 2008, at 6:30 p.m. in Council Chambers at the Municipal Building. Mayor Greg White called the meeting to order.

Finance Director Tope called roll call with the following members present: Barb Rife, Roger Sierer, Randy Daeger, Sam Jeffery, Ronnie Breedlove, and Kim Sutton, Administrator Wiebe and Solicitor Jones were also present.

Sutton motioned to approve the minutes of the December 1st meeting, seconded by Jeffery. Vote: all yea.

Resolution No. 1230-08 re: Authorizing the Purchase of Supplies for the Year 2009, was read for the third time. Breedlove motioned to approve the legislation, seconded by Daeger. Vote: all yea.

Mayor White noted the following two pieces of legislation were to be tabled until the Special Council meeting scheduled for December 22, 2008:

Ordinance No. 1389-08 re: An Ordinance Amending and Increasing Appropriations for Current Expenses and Other Expenditures of the Village of Paulding, Ohio, during the Year Ending December 31, 2008.

Mayor White requested residents use caution this winter while driving on ice and snow. The Village will be reducing the amount of salt used on salt routes due to low supply.

Administrator Wiebe noted he, the Mayor, Tope, Rife, and Winners will be attending an RCap education session on December 17th and 18th. The session will discuss utility management and finance issues.



Sam Bass, outlaw, train robber, shyster and all around no goodnic was born in Mitchell, IN on June 21, 1851. He was orphaned before he was 13 years old. He spent five years in the home of an uncle. He ran away and worked at a saw mill in Rosedale, MS. He was there awhile and then left there on horseback and went to Denton, TX. He worked on a cattle ranch for awhile, but being a cowboy did not come up to his liking.

He went back to Denton and got a job of handling horses at a Hotel Livery Stable. He then worked for the county sheriff doing odd jobs and spent a lot of time as a freighter between Dallas and Sherman, TX.

He became interested in horse racing and acquired a fleet mount called The Den-



ton Mare. He left Denton to race his horse in North Texas then later he moved down to San Antonio.

When the racing petered out, he and a number of fellows gathered up a heard of cattle for all the area ranchers and drove them north to market. When they got to Dodge City they decided to go on north for a better price. After they sold the herd and paid off the hands, he and Joe Collins took the remaining money and went north. They never did pay the ranchers for their cattle. Instead they squandered the \$8,000 on gambling in Ogalla, NE and then on in to Deadwood in the Black Hills.

In 1887, Bass and Collins tried freighting without success. Then they recruited some ne'er do wells and started robbing stage coaches.

Sam's luck was sometimes bad. At one stretch he robbed seven stage coaches with no loot. In fact, in one robbery, they had to share their water with some of the victims.

This wasn't so good, so Joe Collins picked up some drifters along with Bass and they rode south to Big Spring, NE. They held up the Eastbound Pacific passenger train and got \$60,000 in brand new, 20 dollar gold pieces along with four pocket watches and \$13.00 cash from the passengers.

After splitting the loot, they decided to go different directions by twos. In a couple weeks, Collins and two others were killed while resisting arrest, but Bass dressed up like a farmer, made it back to Texas and found a new outlaw band.

He and his brigands held up a couple stages in the spring of 1878 and four trains within 25 miles of Dallas. They didn't get much money but the citizens were getting tired of the robberies and wanted those men caught. They were chased all over North Texas by a posse' and a special company of Texas Rangers led by Junius Peak.

Bass eluded the mobs but one of his henchmen, Jim Murphy, turned informer. Bass's Band rode south intending to rob a small bank at Round Rock on July 19. They got into a gun fight with the lawmen and Bass got wounded. The next morning he was found lying helpless in a pasture field and was brought back to Round Rock. He died there on July 21 on his 27th birthday.

I have read in other places where they propped him up on a porch against a post and he talked some before he died.

There was some discus

shot at that robbery in Round Rock, TX. That town celebrates Sam Bass Day in the third week of July each year.

First: Your BBB warns consumers to redeem those gift card presents as soon as possible. Unfortunately, some retailers might possibly close or even declare bankruptcy. If so they may not be worth anymore than the plastic they're printed on. And, while you're at it, get those mail in rebates

on their way too. Gift card note: If a business files for bankruptcy, consumers will need to file claims with the bankruptcy court for the value of the gift card.

Rebate note: When filling out the coupon or rebate form - be sure to follow the instructions. Rebating companies often reject a rebate application if the instructions are not followed exactly. Furthermore: Almost all rebates expire if they are not mailed within a certain period of time after purchase. Make sure you are aware of those terms.

Next: Those homeowners who are having problems paying their mortgages should beware of slogans like, "Please save my home." The Ohio Attorney General is keeping an eye out for so-called foreclosure rescue imposters. Not only will victims not get foreclosure protection, but they may wind up being out a huge up front fee for empty promises of services rendered. The pitch: In one lawsuit the victim alleges receiving a mailing stating "Regardless of your present mortgage or loan situation, we will be able to assist you by arranging a repayment plan to bring your loan current" and "Call Today & Save Your Home." Retailers are easy prey too. In August the Justice Department indicted 11 members of a retail hacking ring, accusing them of grabbing millions of credit and debit card numbers off networks inside stores run by TJX Companies, BJ's Wholesale Club, OfficeMax, Barnes & Noble and Forever 21.

#### LATTA INTRODUCES LEGISLATION FOR 111TH CONGRESS

Earlier today, Congressman Latta (R- Bowling Green) re-introduced the following legislation he sponsored in the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress.

-The TRICARE Continuity of Coverage for National Guard and Reserve Families Act of 2009, a bill that allows retired members of National Guard and reserve units with 20 or more years of faithful and honorable service to purchase healthcare that was available to them during their time in active service or after they reach 60 years of age. Currently, members who have retired but are not yet 60 years of age are not eligible for TRICARE, and are referred to as being in the "gray area." Right now there are approximately 220,000 retirees that fall within in the "gray area" and an additional 12,100 service members retiring and entering this status each year. —A bill that would increase the standard charitable mileage rate tax deduction for

#### HOW TO REPAIR ICE-DAM-AGED TREES

#### By: Jim Lopshire, Extension Educator

After accessing the icedamage to your trees, your next step is to determine what damage you can repair. The following guidelines were provided by Ron Wolford, University of Illinois Extension Educator in Horticulture on repairing ice-damaged trees. Broken limbs should be removed. Generally, if the branch has not split away from the trunk, the broken segment should be removed back to the next major adjacent branch. Do not leave branch stubs. Stubs encourage rot and decay.

For trees with tops broken out, remove the snags to the next major interior branch. Generally, this will be a major fork. Avoid topping the tree to allow small side branches to grow out and continue the tree's height growth. These branches will be weak and prone to breakage.

To avoid stripping the healthy bark from the trunk when a heavy, broken limb is removed the 3-step procedure should be used. The first cut is made on the underneath side of the branch about 18 inches out from the trunk. The cut should be approximately half-way through the branch or until its weight first starts to bind the saw. The next cut should be made on top of the branch about 1 to 2 inches toward the end of the branch in front of the bottom cut. Continue cutting until the branch drops free.

The last cut removes the remaining branch stub from the trunk. The cut should be made from the top of the branch at the branch collar. The collar is the slight ridge where the branch attaches to the tree's trunk or another major branch.

In certain situations, a damaged limb may strip healthy bark from the tree. To repair this type of damage, cut any ragged edges of torn bark away from the damaged area. Take care to limit the amount of healthy, tight bark removed. To speed the healing process, the repair cut made with a sharp knife into healthy bark should leave a wound shaped like an elongated football with the pointed ends of the cut running vertically along the trunk or limb or as near parallel to the initial damage as possible.

Trees with split trunks or major limb forks may possibly be salvaged if the split is not too extensive. Repairing this type of damage will involve a cable and brace technique that should be left to a professional

Corrective pruning to help improve the shape of damaged trees is best done now. The tree will respond quickly this spring if it has not been severely damaged. Take care not to remove more than onethird of original branches. This will severely retard the tree's growth in the spring and may damage it beyond recovery.

Treatment of the trunk and limb wounds with tree paint is not necessary. In fact, research shows that painted areas can lead to increased rot and decay due to trapped moisture in areas where the paint cracks open. You may want to fertilize your tree this spring with a good quality tree fertilizer. Check with a local nursery or garden center, or your county

was also a top priority for the 127th General Assembly. In addition to the passage of property tax relief in the state budget bill, state lawmakers offered strong support for a measure to increase longterm care options for seniors, eliminated Ohio's offset of unemployment compensation benefits when a person is also receiving Social Security and passed a bill to establish a statewide emergency alert system to help law enforcement locate missing senior citizens.

Working to keep Ohio families and communities safe, the House and Senate approved bills to strengthen penalties for sex offenders, toughen laws targeting repeat drunk drivers and address concerns with school employee misconduct. There were also efforts to protect Ohio consumers from identity theft and predatory lending.

I also introduced several important bills over the past two years. Senate Bill 184, which was signed by the Governor in June 2008, establishes Ohio's Castle Doctrine, affirming the right of every Ohioan to defend themselves and their family from violent intruders in their home.

Senate Bill 263 would have established a criminal penalty for using a deceased military persons' persona for commercial purposes. A similar measure was included in Senate Bill 248 and approved with strong bipartisan support.

In addition, I introduced Senate Bill 174 to ban human cloning in Ohio. While the bill did not pass this session, I will continue to work on the issue in the 128<sup>th</sup> General Assembly.

I also spent a great deal of time the last two years working on transportation issues. In January 2008, I was named Chair of the Senate Highways and Transportation Committee. I also served as Chair of the Fuel Production Task Force and was chosen as a member of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Transportation Priorities Task Force.

While the 127th General Assembly accomplished a great deal, there is still much more work to be done in the months ahead. In particular, the Legislature will be responsible for helping craft a new two-year state budget in the spring, which could prove to be quite challenging given current state revenue projections. No matter what happens moving forward, I will continue to be a strong advocate in the Senate for policies that help attract business to Ohio, create jobs, keep taxes low and uphold the values that make our communities strong. 
