

CIVIL WAR SOLDIER MONUMENT FACE LIFT CONTINUES

V.E.T.S. have some great news to share. Homier Monumental has notified us the broken bill on the Civil War Soldier's cap has been replaced. During the restoration process, Mark Homier found that the Soldier's head where his neck meets the jacket collar was a separate piece of granite.

The bayonet was also a separate piece attached to the side of the jacket. The original plans to grind away

the bayonet would have left a large hole where it is attached. Mark reshaped the lower broken area of the blade allowing the bayonet to stay. We were sure happy to hear that.

Homier's are still waiting for the Black Granite accent pieces to arrive and have some engraving work that will need to be done. V.E.T.S has the Phase I funds set aside as we near completion of the restoration process of the 91 year old monument. To return the



Monument to the Park will require Phase II, which is the location site to be completed.

V.E.T.S. have many fundraisers coming up over the course of 2009 in order to accomplish Phase II. A tentative goal is to bring our restored Civil War Monument back to its new location for Veterans Day. Our savings account is growing, but we still need your support. 
Natural:

In the last study when we finished we were looking at Genesis 1:20-23. Now, let us look at Genesis 1:24-31 as this is the sixth day of creation. The Hebrew word for creeping thing is Remes and can mean insects which creep upon the earth; I Kings 4:33; Psalms 148:10; Ezekiel 8:10.

Remes also refers to the animals of the sea Psalms 104:25 and to every slowmoving creature that is alive Genesis 9:3. Also in Genesis 1:24 we also see the word beasts and the Hebrew word for beast is behemah and means beast, cattle or animal. Here in Genesis 1:24 it refers to a class of animals. Also this classification is based on anything that moves or has its habitat on land, as opposed to the class of creatures that exist in the sea or air. Now we are coming to the climax of God's creation, and that is the creation of man.

In Genesis 1:26 God said let us make man in our image. NEIRRS CELEBRATES THIRTY YEARS

Wednesday, May 27, 2009, 12:00 noon, 900 Library Plaza. As part of the thirty year celebration for the Northeast Indiana Radio Reading Service (NEIRRS) volunteers will attend a special luncheon in their honor and a private showing of a newly released movie in the library's theater. The 162 volunteers, who collectively donated nearly 7,000 hours last year, will also receive certificates in appreciation of their work, which provides audio access to printed information for people with reading challenges.

In northeast Indiana and northwest Ohio, thousands of people with visual, physical, learning, or language challenges are able to tune in 24 hours a day, seven days a week to listen as volunteers read over a dozen newspapers, 30 magazines, grocery ads, obituaries, short stories, public service announcements and more. Listeners range in age from 22 to 104 and come from all walks of life. Many hear the free NEIRRS broadcast using a special SCA radio receiver loaned to them at no charge. Others listen by way of in-house television channels at select facilities which receive the audio broadcast over the internet. And still others subscribe to podcasts.

It's possible because our volunteers give their time, their vision, and their voices to make it happen – everyday."

NEIRRS signed on for the first time at 2:00 p.m. May 14, 1979 with volunteers John White and Dale H. reading the News-Sentinel. For the first few months NEIRRS

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources and the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services recently formed a partnership to create immediate jobs for young Ohioans improving parks, trails, and natural areas throughout the state.

Through the Recovery Conservation Corps partnership, ODNR has identified maintenance, repair and improvement projects within four divisions: Parks, Wildlife, Forestry, and Natural Areas and Preserves. The RCC will establish work crews of young Ohioans, ages 16 to 24, who will work throughout Ohio's natural lands.


Focusing on both rural and urban areas, particularly those in economic decline, RCC workers will help improve recreation lands, build boardwalks, observation areas and trails, and help to curb the spread of invasive species. Based on the number of projects identified, ODNR estimates the program could put hundreds of young people to work.

Workers will gain critical experience as well as on-thejob training while helping to improve the state's parks, wetlands, forests and other natural areas.

Funding for this program comes from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), signed into law by President Barack Obama in February, which provides a total of \$138 million to Ohio through the Workforce Investment Act program. ODNR and ODJFS will partner with their workforce investment boards to make optimal use of ARRA resources.

However, at the same time dedicated, full-time career ODNR and other State of Ohio employees are being furloughed. Don't you just love Socialism!

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CONGRESSMAN LATTA OP/ED "CAP AND TRADE, A FLAWED PROPOSAL"

Energy prices are on the rise. Families, homeowners, and businesses are feeling the pain every time they pay their electric bills or fill up at the pump. The cap and trade, or cap and tax, energy plan, introduced by the Obama Administration and Democratic leadership in Congress, will only make matters worse. This energy plan raises taxes, leads to more government intrusion, and leads to the unprecedented loss of American iobs.

Democrats claim that this plan will help the environment and create "green jobs" that will benefit our nation. I believe that this could not be any further from the truth. Any new jobs created will not even come close to compensating for jobs lost to this energy plan. According to a study by the Heritage Foundation, Ohio's Fifth District is the third most vulnerable Congressional District in the United States. The entire state of Ohio ranks as one of the most vulnerable to the energy tax - with eight of the 18 congressional districts with the highest Manufacturing Vulnerability Index.

The Center for Data Analysis at the Heritage Foundation reports that cap and trade could result in job losses of up to 844,000 per year until at least 2035. I feel that this is a high price to pay during such harsh economic times. We need legislation that creates American jobs, not destroys

Cap and tax claims to be taxing energy for a goal - to improve the environment and prevent global warming. However, according to a study by the Environmental Protection Agency, a 60 percent reduction in carbon-dioxide emissions by 2050 will only reduce global temperature by 0.1 degree Centigrade by 2095.

Cap and trade is a costly policy. Analysis of the economic impact of Waxman-Markey estimates that by 2035 the GDP will be reduced by \$7.4 trillion, electricity rates will increase 90 percent, and residential prices for natural gas will increase by 55 percent. In addition, an average family of four could see their energy costs rise \$3100 per year – a price that I feel is too much to ask.

In a speech before Congress in February, President Obama promised Americans that families that make less than \$250,000 per year "will not see (your) taxes increased a single dime." Apparently, President Obama was not including energy taxes. While a candidate, then-Senator Obama stated in California that under his cap and tax plan, utility rates would "necessarily skyrocket," and those costs would be passed along to consumers. This national energy plan will hit the poor the hardest. Individuals with lower incomes spend a greater share of their income on energy consumption. All Americans will pay more for energy, but those who are already struggling to make ends meet will be forced to struggle even harder. Cap and tax intends to improve the environment, However, the truth is that it will relocate manufacturing

with less stringent environmental regulations. This will only serve to take jobs away from Ohio's Fifth District. I believe we need to improve our environment and solve our energy crisis. However, I feel that there is a better way for America to become energy independent than hurting our economy and losing jobs.

plants overseas to countries

More government, more taxes, and fewer jobs sounds more like a problem than a solution to our energy crisis. I support an "all of the above" energy plan that produces energy made by American workers, encourages greater efficiency, conservation, and promotes the use of alternative fuels. In January, I introduced H. Res. 29, an "All of the Above Plan" to use as a platform in solving America's energy crisis.

As a member of the American Energy Solutions Group, I am working with my colleagues to find a better solution than the tremendously flawed cap and tax proposal. Congress should never put American families in a position where they have to decide between putting food on the table and paying energy bills. I will continue to fight for energy solutions that put the American people first.

WOMEN'S HEALTH AWARE-NESS MONTH SERVES AS MAMMOGRAM REMINDER

According to the American Cancer Society, Women's Health Awareness Month during the month of May can serve as a great reminder for women to understand the importance of having a yearly mammogram. In Ohio, an estimated 8,100 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer this year, and 1,900 will die from it.

Although a specific cause of breast cancer is unknown, several risk factors may contribute to the development of breast cancer. Risk factors include: gender (women are 100x more likely than men), age (95% of breast cancers occur in women 40 and older), genetics (about 5-10% of cases are hereditary), family history (having one or more first-degree relatives doubles the risk), and race (white women are slightly more likely to develop breast cancer). Currently, a woman living in the United States has a 1 in 10 lifetime risk of developing invasive breast cancer. Early detection is the key to survival. Nearly all breast cancers can be treated successfully if detected early. An annual mammogram beginning at age 40 is the most effective way to detect breast cancer at an early, curable stage. Annual clinical breast exams by a doctor or nurse, monthly self-breast exams,

and magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) for women at high lifetime risk are additional ways to detect breast cancer early.

MASTER GARDENER VOLUNTEERS TEACHING "GREEN" MGV WEEK MAY 17-23, 2009

Ohio State University Extension Master Gardener Volunteers will spend the week of May 17 promoting and participating in educational gardening activities that enhance communities throughout Ohio. You can help Master Gardener volunteers celebrate by participating in your own gardening activities at home, in your neighborhood or around your community. Here are a few "green" tips to show your support for MGV Week and to spruce up the landscape, while protecting the environment.

1) Plant a vegetable garden. Fresh vegetables are healthy and taste great, and you also get exercise while gardening. Planting or buying local helps saves energy used in shipping. Take what is left over to your local food pantry. Consider taking extra plants (like the other 5 peppers in your 6 pack) to a local food pantry as well.

2) Recycle plastic nursery pots, or purchase biodegradable pots.

3) Build a rain barrel and collect rainwater to use on your garden, or plant a rain garden to capture storm water run-off.

4) Recycle newspaper, and use it in your garden as mulch. Simply place paper on the ground in layers and cover with grass clippings or straw.

5) Plant a tree near the southwest corner of your home for energy conservation.

6) Diversify your landscape to attract beneficial insects and discourage major pest outbreaks on one species. Many herbs and flowers attract beneficial insects.

7) Practice Integrated Pest Management (IPM). Identify the pest problem before grabbing the pesticide. If you need to spray, follow the labels for proper use.

8) Select the right plants for the right location. Happy plants are less likely to have insect and disease troubles.

9) Water early in the day, and use drip or trickle irrigation to conserve water.

10) Build a compost pile to recycle garden and kitchen scraps.



CASH RENTS

A question that landowners often ask the Extension office is "What is a fair cash rent price for my land?" The answer is only an estimate based on several factors that include soil type, drainage and crops grown. Another tool that has just become available comes from The Ohio Agricultural Statistics Service and the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS). NASS recently published county-level data on cash rental rates for agricultural land on May 1.

The information includes average rental rates for nonirrigated cropland, irrigated cropland and pastureland during the 2008 calendar year. NASS is providing the county data in response to requests from customers as well as the new requirements of the 2008 Farm Bill.

Since 1997, NASS has published land value and rental rate data at the state level. The release on May 1 will mark the first time NASS is publishing the information at the county level. The data will be based on information NASS gathered from 700,000 agricultural producers nationwide during the 2008 end-of-year surveys which included the first-ever county-level cash rents survey.

The county-level data on cash rental rates is available online through Quick Stats, the National Agricultural Statistics Service agricultural statistics database, at www. nass.usda.gov. Users are able to access cash rental rates at the state, county or crop reporting district level.

To help access the data, here are the steps you can follow to find the average cash rent for your county. First go to the NASS web site at www.nass.usda.gov. On the home page you need to select Economics. A new window will appear titled "Search by Commodity" and you will select cash rent. On the final page you will select locale, state, and county of choice. Your last step will be to click Get Data on the bottom of the page.

The cash rent information will be listed on a spreadsheet and is a county wide average. Cash rent for your farm land can be lower or higher based on soil type, drainage, crops rotation, and factors unique to your situation.

This an additional tool landowners and farmers can use to help them find a fair cash rent price for their land.

HOME & GARDEN TIPS FOR MAY

Spring weather is invigorating, especially after a long winter. Green grass and spring bulbs beckon everyone to come outside and enjoy the warming weather. Following is a list of things to consider doing while you are outside. Happy Gardening from the Paulding County Master Gardeners!

Yard:

**Prune spring-flowering trees and shrubs after they are done blooming.

**Plant a new tree or shrub, and be sure to water thoroughly.

**Remove any bagworms that have over wintered in your trees and shrubs and destroy them.

**Apply fungicides to roses to control black spot and other diseases.

**If you plan to fertilize your lawn, apply three quarters to one pound of nitrogen per 1000 square feet. Use a product that contains at least fifty percent slow-release fertilizer. Try to apply granular fertilizer just prior to a rain.

Garden:

**Plant vegetables and flowers after danger of frost is past, and don't be afraid to try something new. **Plant beans and sweet

corn in succession to extend the harvest. **Pinch back mums and

annual flowers to keep them compact. **Harvest asparagus by

cutting or snapping just below soil level.

**Harvest rhubarb by cutting or gently pulling to the side and up. **Plant strawberries and

Home:

**Bring houseplants outside during a gentle rain for a good washing.

**Move houseplants outdoors to a shady location after the nights are consistently above 55 degrees. You may need to water them more often while outside.

**When fertilizing houseplants, remember that foliage plants like nitrogen, and flowering plants like phosphorus. **Take cuttings of your favorite houseplants and root them in perlite, vermiculite, or potting soil.
