ODOT: DON'T PLACE SNOW ON ROADS

With the weekend's snow still on the ground and more forecast to fall in the next few days, ODOT is issuing a reminder that anyone who plows out their driveway and leaves a considerable amount of snow on a state highway in the process could be in violation of state law.

"We've come across several incidents where piles of snow have been left on the highway after a county, township or private drive has been plowed out. This is against the law," said Tim Burkepile, Ohio Department of Transportation District One deputy director.

Ohio Revised Code 4511.74 prohibits the placement of injurious material on a highway except that which is placed on the roadway by a proper authority, such as the salt or grit which ODOT uses to treat icy

Placing anything on the highway could be dangerous to motorists in that they may hit these obstructions and lose control of their vehicle. "Individuals could be both civilly and criminally responsible if it is found their actions caused or contributed to an accident," said Burkepile.

According to the Ohio

State Highway Patrol, the offense is considered a first degree misdemeanor and carries a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

ODOT advises snow from private drives and side roads be pushed completely off the highway. It is recommended that the snow be placed so that a passing ODOT truck will not throw the snow back into the driveway, said Burkepile.

In addition, the department recommends individuals clear snow away from their mailboxes in order to aid mail delivery and also reminds parents to keep their children from playing in piles of snow which are close to the road.

"Once snow is cleared from a roadway, it is common practice to push snow piles farther back off the road to make way for any additional amounts of snow. Children playing in these piles could be injured should the equipment operator not see them," said Burkepile.

CHANGING OF THE GUARD IN ANTWERP

There has been a loyal patriot standing guard at Veterans Memorial Riverside Park in Antwerp. Weather and age have taken a toll and after ninety years he will be taking some time off. There will be a changing of the guard.

In 2008 a group was formed here in Antwerp to investigate the possibility of refurbishing our Civil War statue. The group, now named, Veterans Equally recognized for Time Served, (V.E.T.S). On Saturday morning, January 17, 2009, the local V.F.W. post was the host to a gathering of local veterans and citizens. Those assembled were welcomed by V.E.T.S. committee member Nancy Lichty stating, "We've gathered here to pay respect and give honor to the Civil War Soldier Statue that has resided in Riverside Park since 1918." She shared that in the beginning the people gave to have the statue and now citizens are again giving to extend his

it now is and the plans for the future. Also, the names of local Civil War soldiers were listed. Barry sang his original song saluting our veterans.

There were several speakers on the program including Antwerp's Mayor Ray DeLong who thanked the V.E.T.S committee and the veterans for all they do and have done and asked that the community support their effort.

Paulding County's Veterans' Service Office, Randy Brooks, stated that this is an effort to "Restore the statue to its former glory." George Hedrick, commander of the local American Legion, shared that early on there was much skepticism about the project, but applauded and thanked the V.E.T.S. for their perseverance that, "All vets will have a place of honor here in their hometown."

In conclusion, Mark Homier, of Homier Monumental in Defiance, shared what the actual process and plans of restoration are, saying, "There are a lot of unknowns as we proceed to take the statue apart and take him to the shop."

What we do know is

that there are several pieces to the project, some are chipped, some are broken, some are in tact. Most of it will be cleaned, parts will be repaired and others will be replaced. This will take four or five months. He said, "Six months from today the statue will be ready and waiting to return." The foundation and platform need to be in place before the return. There is no exact date for the statue to leave or for his return. The plan is to remove him from the park while the ground is frozen.

This event marked the beginning of the first phase of three in the total project. The completion date will be determined by the funding and how quickly it is received. It is estimated that \$100,000 will be needed for the first two phases. Ms Lichty stated, "We needed about \$30,000 to get to this point and we did it in a

The third phase will be a series of upright black granite tablets on which veterans' names will be engraved. These tablets will measure three feet wide, eight inches thick and five feet tall. The precise number of tablets will be determined by the number of names received.

When completed, this memorial will be a place that future generations will be able to take their children and grandchildren, point out the name of an ancestor who served and say, "This is your grandfather or grandmother, this is your great-grandfather." The goal of the V.E.T.S. group is to make this a reality and you can help.




Notice in the next verse,

HEBREWS 10:1

For the law having a shadow of good things to come, and not the very image of things, can never with those sacrifices which they offered year by year continually make the comers thereunto perfect.

I would like to share with you this week concerning types and shadows of the Old Testament. If we see and understand these types, we will be able to see the truth unfold in the New Testament. What is a type, or shad-

ow? It is something of a literal nature that prefigures and foretells something of a spiritual nature. The Old Testament ritualistic forms of worship were typical of something to be experienced spiritually in this gospel dispensation. In my Bible, I have this saying, it reads, The New is in the Old contained, the Old is in the New explained, The New is in the Old concealed, The Old in the New revealed. To give you an example of what a type, or shadow is: The animal sacrifices in the Old testament were a shadow of what Jesus did on the cross. He was our sacrifice. The furniture in the tabernacle, the candlestick, showbread, golden altar, veil, mercy seat, all pointed to the inward works of redemption, that Christ did on the cross at Calvary. The temple was typical of the church of God today. Paul said in II Corinthians 6:16, "ye are the temple of God." I Peter 2:5, "ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house."

My friends, we who are born again; we are the "spiritual" temple of God. What we see in the Old Testament shadows, points to the spiritual realities of today. Each believer is that "lively" stone which makes up that spiritual temple. And its through a sanctified life, which is a life of holiness, that keeps the spiritual body as one. We need to understand

that these shadows were only temporary; they were done away with by a "better covenant" and "better promises." Read Hebrews 8:6. Throughout the Old Testament, God pleaded with Israel to change their ways, that he would save them, and how he would give them his spirit within. How did God do that? It was through the blood on the cross that saved those who believed, and it was on Pentacost that those believers were filled with the Spirit of God. Christ was the fulfillment of Old Testament prophesies. While Christ was on the cross, his words were, "it is finished." This meaning the prophesies that were promised in the Old, which pointed to the New Covenant, was nailed to the cross. God went to great lengths to stretch out his arms for you and I. God did away with the Old because it could not do what the New could do. Hebrews 10:9—He taketh away the first, that he may establish the second. The Old was done away with in Jesus. God no longer recognized the old animal sacrifices or any of the carnal ordinances. Many look for the temple, and animal sacrifices, priesthood, to be reestablished in some future age. My question is, "Why would God reestablish something, which did not work the first time?" Read Hebrews chapters 8,9,10.

Remember, dear readers, these were only shadows that pointed to this gospel dispensation. They were only temporary. Let me share the danger that comes from this belief. First of all, to go backwards, and resurrect the Old Testament way of doing things does this. It denounces Jesus Christ, it is to say, "Jesus, your blood is no longer sufficient for us." Secondly, it denounces the

gospel message, the New



WILLIAM P. LONGLEY

William Preston Longley was an American Old West gunman, outlaw, ruthless killer, fast draw, quick temper and unpredictable demeanor. Sometimes he killed just to

He was a fast gun that all people feared. He would go into a town that had no lawmen. He would tease a person who was unarmed. No one would help the victim because Longley was too fast a gun. He enjoyed being over someone.

He said he killed 32 people, as he bragged a lot. Yes, he did, and nearly all of them were Hispanics or Afro-American and unarmed. He had no qualms about murdering anyone.

Let me tell you about him. He was born William Preston Longley in Austin County, Texas in October of 1856. He was the sixth of ten children. He was raised around Evergreen, Texas. He had just an average education for that

All of Texas was under military control because the war was over and the Reconstruction Act was enforced and many people hated the North for that reason.

About this time, Longley, dropped out of school and began a wild life of drinking, gambling and running in wild company.

In 1868, three former slaves named Green Evans, Pryor Evans and a guy named Ned rode through Evergreen going south to visit some relatives. Longley and two buddies forced them at gunpoint into a dry creek bed. Green Evans panicked and spurred his horse to escape. Longely shot him several times killing him although the others were also shooting. This was his first murder and it didn't

Longley drifted around in Texas for awhile, and he got acquainted with gunman, Ben Thompson and a gambler, Phil Coe. Then Longley and his brother-in-law, John

bother him at all.

Wilson, for some reason or other went on a rampage in South Texas in 1869. The stole horses and robbed settlers and killed another freed slave named Paul Brice in Bastrop County, Texas. So, then Longley left Texas to avoid prosecution.

Longley worked on some cattle drives and even joined a party searching for gold in Chevenne, Wyoming. This was by May of 1870. Because of a treaty with the Indians the whites could not enter the Black Hills area to hunt for

Longley was 19 years old now so he joined the Army for a five year enlistment at Camp Stambaugh. He could not adapt to the military life so in two weeks he deserted. He was captured and court martialed and got two years at hard labor fastened to a ball and chain. He served four months but as he was a good marksman he was assigned to some hunting parties for food for the post. He deserted again in May of 1872.

By February of 1873, he had returned to Texas and he was accused of murdering another freed slave in Bastrop County. He then went to Bell County to stay with his father's family. In that same year in Mason County, Texas.

Sheriff J.J. Finey arrested Longley for murder and brought him to Austin to collect the reward of \$1,000. However, when the reward was not forthcoming from the Union Military Forces, the sheriff released Longley. Some folks think that Longley's Uncle Prez offered the sheriff a pretty good bribe.

On March 3, 1875, Longley shot his boyhood friend, Wilson Anderson, with a shot gun. This was sort of a put up deal. Longley's, Uncle Cole blamed Anderson for the death of his son and urged Longley to take revenge. Longley then fled northwest accompanied by his brother, Jim, who was later tried and acquitted of the Anderson murder. So, a new reward was posted for Longley's capture.

for Longley's capture, he fled from place to place under several aliases.

In November of 1875, he had a fist fight with George Thomas, a hunting buddy. As George gave him a good beating, then Longley shot him

Then in January of 1876, Longley tried to ambush a fellow outlaw named Lou Shroyer and a gunfight started. Shroyer shot Longley's horse out from under him, but then Longley killed Shroyer. This is the only known case where Longley's opponent returned fire. He generally picked on unarmed people. So, now, Longley is on the

run again and went into East Texas and became a sharecropper with a minister, William R. Lay. However, Longley became rivals with Lay's nephew over the affections of a young girl. So Longley beat him up and was put in jail and he then escaped. Longley blamed Lay for his brief im-

On June 1, 1876, Longley rode out to his landlord's farm and found Lay milking a cow. He murdered him there with a 12-gauge shotgun. Lay was the last man known to be killed by Longley.

Longley went to Grayson County, Texas and broke a couple of hoodlums out of jail there and then Longley went over into Louisiana.

On July 6, 1877, Longley was surrounded and captured without incident by Nacogoches County, Texas sheriff, Milt Mass, and two deputies while he was residing in Desoto Parish, LA. He was taken back to Texas, tried in the Lee County Court and convicted of the murder of Wilson Anderson. He appealed, but it was turned down in March of 1878.

On October 11, 1878, Longley was hanged in Giddings, Texas, only a few miles from his birthplace of Evergreen. He claimed to have killed 32 people, most of them Hispanic or African American. Although after referred to as a gunfighter, most of his victims were unarmed and he killed most of them while committing robberies.

In my thinking, Longley was a yellow-bellied no-good killer—a back shooter and he always had the advantage of the situation.

In the 1960's or '70's one of the major TV networks had a serial about Longley being a good man. Nothing was further from the truth.

RELIEF FOR FIRST-TIME HOME BUYERS, NON-ITEM-IZERS

President Bush signed into law Wednesday a weighty housing and economic recovery bill designed to encourage home ownership, revamp the housing finance industry and reduce

The Tax Institute at H&R Block reports that the legislation will have a positive impact on taxpayers by making it easier to buy a first home and deduct real property taxes even if homeowners do not itemize.

Refundable tax credit up to \$7,500 available to first-time home buyers

The law provides a onetime refundable tax credit of \$7,500 or 10 percent of the home's purchase price, whichever is less, for qualifying homes purchased April 9, 2008 through June 30, 2009. Income limitations apply.

A credit reduces a tax payer's bill dollar-for-dollar. However, as Jackie Perlman, a research analyst at The Tax Institute at H&R Block notes, "This is a 'recapture credit,' which must be paid back over time, so it essentially operates as an interestfree loan."

For example, a first-time home buyer who purchases a home on October 1, 2008, for \$100,000, will be able to claim a \$7,500 tax credit on his 2008 tax return but must repay \$500 every year over 15 years starting in 2010.

Additional deductions on property taxes save tax dollars

Homeowners who take a standard deduction rather than itemize will be able to claim an additional standard deduction for real property taxes on their home. The maximum deduction is \$500 (\$1,000 if married filing jointly) effective for the 2008 tax year.

"This deduction can reduce the tax liability for homeowners who don't itemize," said Perlman. "For instance, a retired couple who have lived in their home for 20 years may not have enough interest on their mortgage or other deductions to justify itemizing. Now, they can still benefit by deducting their real property taxes."

The housing bill also triggered changes in the low-income housing credit for building or rehabilitating low-income homes and modifies Section 121 - exclusion of capital gains on the sale of a principal resi-

In addition, this legislation outlines new tax incentives for areas affected by Hurricanes Katrina, Rita or Wilma. If a tax payer took a casualty loss due to one of the 2005 hurricanes but later received a grant as reimbursement, they are able to amend a previous tax return to alter the year they have to claim the grant funds as taxable income.

LOCAL GROUP PARTICI-PATES IN A STATEWIDE **HOMELESS COUNT**

The Northwest Ohio Housing Coalition will be joining other communities in Ohio in conducting a "point-in-time count" on Tuesday, January 27. The goal is to identify a realistic count of the number of individuals in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, and Williams counties that are currently homeless or are at immediate risk of homelessness on a given day. These statistics will assist service providers in improving services to the homeless in our community. Local information will be submitted to the Coalition on Housing and Homelessness (COHHIO) to be compiled into a statewide report.

The "point-in-time" will include three groups of homeless persons; unsheltered homeless, sheltered homeless, and at-risk homeless.

Unsheltered homeless include adults, youth or families living in parks, streets, alleys, tents, campers, vehicles, abandoned buildings, stairwells, under bridges, roadways, farm outbuildings, or 24 hr. laundromats, restaurants or stores.

Sheltered homeless include adults, youth or families living in emergency shelters, transitional housing, domestic violence shelters, or any hotels/motel/apt paid by arrangements from a public/ private agency.

At-risk of homelessness include adults, youth or families at risk of being homeless within three months, presently residing in substandard housing, temporary housing, or with family/friends.

The Northwest Housing Coalition will be contacting homeless shelters, domestic violence shelters, substance abuse treatment programs, community parks and campgrounds, sheriff and police departments, churches, social service and faith based agencies that provide emergency and supportive services, job placement and temp. agencies, mental health providers, hospitals, emergency rooms, and stress centers, small hotels, veterans organizations, MR/DD programs, 24 hour coffee shops, shopping centers and restaurants, libraries, prisons and jails, public schools, foster care agencies,

If you are at risk or you have a friend or family member currently living with you and they may become homeless within the next three months, please pass this information on so that it may be included in the local data. The information will be kept confidential. Names are not required - only the gender and age of the person will be requested. To report homelessness or for additional information, please contact First Call for Help at 1-800-468-4357 or by dialing 211.



STUDENTS SUCCEED WITH **INFOHIO @ YOUR LIBRARY**

The school library isn't what it used to be. Even its name has changed. Far from being "just books," today's

The most powerful electronic resource available to all Ohio schools and students in INFOhio, a virtual library funded by state and federal funds.

INFOhio provides agespecific, curriculum-related resources for PreK-12 use in Ohio. Negotiating a statewide contract for these resources makes them available across the state without charge to all Ohio students and schools. In the study Student

Learning through Ohio School Libraries 13,000 students in Ohio PreK-12 schools were surveyed. The study results show there is a direct link between student achievement and school library media programs that are staffed by professional media specialists and stocked with a full range of print, electronic and other resources. All three Paulding County Districts have a certified Library teacher in their district.

INFOhio is critical to Ohio's teaching and learning and linked to student achievement and performance. Individual databases will be described in future articles.

LOOKING AHEAD TO THE 128th General Assembly

Capitol Letters Weekly Column by: Senator Steve Buehrer

The new year brings a dramatic change to the political landscape in Ohio and across the country. In November, Democrats captured the White House and secured large majorities in Congress. At the state level, Democrats also took charge of the Ohio House for the first time in 14 years, while Republicans retained a 21-12 edge in the Ohio Senate. These changes, coupled with the current condition of our economy and other pressing issues, will present significant challenges and opportunities as work begins in the 128th General Assembly.

On January 28, the Governor will give his State of the State address, outlining his goals for the next two years and highlights of his budget proposal for fiscal years 2010-2011, including his longawaited plan for fixing Ohio's

education funding system. While the budget process is always difficult, the switch in party leadership in the House, as well as the impact of a recession on the availability of state resources, will present unique challenges this year.

Toward the end of last year, after announcing a series of cuts and accounting maneuvers to balance the budget for FY 08-09, the Strickland Administration warned that there could be billions of dollars less in funds for the upcoming two-year budget if the state's fiscal situation continues to decline. Since then, the Governor has lobbied President-Elect Barack Obama and Congress for billions in one-time money from the federal government to prevent cuts in state services. We will have to wait and

see whether the Governor's doomsday prediction is accurate, but it is clear that Ohio's economy will take center stage in the budget debate.

While the budget will consume much of the General Assembly's time over the

next six months, it will not be the only area of focus. In the coming weeks, Senate Republicans will finalize committee assignments and begin working on a list of priority bills for the two-year session. This priority legislation is likely to include legislation that builds on past efforts to improve Ohio's business climate and bring jobs to our local communities.

In addition, I will continue my focus on the future of Ohio's transportation system, which will play a key role in the growth of our economy. Along with my work as Chair of the Senate Highways and Transportation Committee during the 127th General Assembly, I was chosen as a member of the 21st Century Transportation Priorities Task Force.
