# SUPREME COURT TO HOLD OFF-SITE COURT IN PAULDING COUNTY IN OCTOBER

Chief Justice Thomas J. Moyer has announced that the Supreme Court of Ohio will convene in official session in Paulding County on Wednesday, October 21. The visit is part of the court's semiannual Off-Site Court Program.

Chief Justice Moyer and Justices Paul E. Pfeifer, Evelvn Lundberg Stratton, Maureen O'Connor, Terrence O'Donnell, Judith Ann Lanzinger and Robert R. Cupp will hear oral arguments in four cases beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Paulding County Courthouse, 115 N. Williams St., in Paulding.

Paulding County Court Judge Tiffany E. Beckman extended a formal invitation to Chief Justice Mover.

The Off-Site Court Program, initiated by Chief Justice Moyer in 1987, has gained national recognition as a model program for education about the judiciary. The program enhances students' understanding of the legal system by providing an opportunity for hundreds of students to attend and observe the proceedings of the Supreme Court in person and to interact with justices, attorneys and court staff.

Students from Antwerp Local, Paulding and Wayne Trace high schools will participate. The students and their teachers will receive

curriculum material to study before the session, including summaries of the specific cases to be argued. Local attorneys will team with educators at each participating school to explain Ohio's judicial system

and review case materials. On the morning of October 21, students will attend a special briefing during which they may ask questions and interact with the justices. In addition, students from each school will be assigned to attend one of the oral arguments. After the assigned case has been argued, each group of students will meet with the case attorneys for a debriefing and discussion of the legal issues in the argument they just heard.

Chief Justice Moyer said the Paulding County session will mark the 58th time the Supreme Court has heard oral arguments outside Columbus during the past 22 years.

"The idea of this program is to bring the court closer to the public and especially young people," Chief Justice Moyer said. "Our off-site sessions have enabled 32,870 Ohioans, 24,945 of them high school students, to observe the Supreme Court in action without leaving their communities."

#### SAFETY SHOULD BE FOCUS AS KIDS HEAD BACK TO SCHOOL

Over the next few weeks, kids across Ohio will make the annual trek back to school. For children heading off to kindergarten or students making the jump from middle school to high school, this can be a nervous, but exciting time. For many other kids, the thought of trading in summer fun for textbooks and pencils is enough to make them want to run and hide. There will also be hundreds of high school seniors who will start working toward graduation and preparing to take their next step into college, the military or the workforce. However, no matter where they are in their educational careers, our young people need to know how to stay safe when traveling to and from school.

For thousands of Ohio kids the trip to school in the morning and the journey home in the afternoon begins and ends on a bus. Statistics show that riding the school bus is one of the safest ways for children to travel-many times safer than riding with a parent in a car. What many parents may not realize is that students are actually at the greatest risk for accidents when they are approaching or exiting the bus or waiting to get picked up at the bus stop.

To protect themselves and their fellow classmates from serious injury, the Ohio State Highway Patrol recommends that students get to the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive. If a child is running late, they may be more worried about getting to school on time than getting there safely.

In addition, students should always be aware of the "danger zone" around a bus by staying at least three giant steps away from the side of the vehicle, never walking behind it and making sure the bus driver can see them,

driver. When boarding and getting off the bus, students also need to be careful that clothing with drawstrings and book bags with straps do not get caught in the handrails or doors. In addition, they should not try to enter the bus until it comes to a complete stop, the door opens and the driver gives them permission to get on.

Making bus stops safer also requires cooperation from motorists. In the morning when children are on their way to school and after the bell rings every afternoon, drivers need to be extra cautious on the road and pay attention to the flashing yellow and red lights on the school bus. Just as important, motorists need to look out for children walking or running to the bus stop or riding their bikes to and from school.

The General Assembly has also worked in recent years to ensure our children are safe while riding the bus. In March 2007, after a Columbus school bus driver was found with a syringe of cocaine, the House and Senate approved a proposal as part of House Bill 67-the state transportation budget for fiscal years 2008-2009-to toughen background checks for employees of school transportation companies in Ohio.

Later, the Legislature passed a bill requiring that school bus drivers undergo federal background checks in addition to the state checks already being conducted. The proposal also allowed the Ohio Department of Education to create a database to match arrest records with the names of bus drivers in the state.

As another school year quickly approaches, I encourage parents to sit down with their children to discuss how to stay safe on their way to and from school. Whether the student is going to school for the first time or is preparing to move on to bigger and better things, knowing proper school bus safety can not only prevent injuries, it can also save lives.

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

# **MEDICAL BILLING AND BENEFITS PROGRAM ON SEPTEMBER 10**

### **COUMADIN® CLINIC COMES TO PAULDING COUNTY HOSPITAL**

Paulding County Hospital has developed a much needed service for patients who need anticoagulation therapy, or prevention of blood clots forming in their body. The anticoagulation clinic, sometimes referred to as a "Coumadin" Clinic" is an outpatient monitoring service provided for patients that have been prescribed warfarin or Coumadin<sup>®</sup>. Some examples of patients who may need anticoagulant therapy include hip or knee replacement, deep vein thrombosis (clots), or pulmonary embolism. For other anticoagulant usage, the diagnosis may be Atrial Fib, myocardial infarction, a pacemaker implant, or placement of a mechanical

heart valve. Since this program involves the laboratory and the pharmacy, Barb Hoersten, Director of Pharmacy and Laura Roth, Laboratory Director have developed a program that will be managed by the pharmacy at Paulding County Hospital. The patient will come to the hos-

pital and have a finger stick performed by lab personnel. This test result is calculated almost immediately and a pharmacist will perform the patient evaluation and consultation, make any necessary dosage adjustments and manage the patient's prescription, including refills of their Coumadin® medication. Once the patient is regulated, they only need to be seen once a month by the pharmacist. Until that point however, more visits will be necessary.

Many things can affect anticoagulant levels in a patient including diet, other medication interactions, even vitamins or herbal supplements. The patient will be provided the dosage of anticoagulant both verbally and in writing at the time of the appointment.

The obvious benefits to this program are the immediacy of the dosage adjustment and the fact that the patient will not have to travel long distances for medication monitoring and adjustments.

#### THE ONE TRUE CHURCH

As I look around today and see all these institutions that say they are the Lord's church, but what does the Bible say? Is the Bible correct in saying that Jesus would build His church and that His church is the one He is coming back for? I could have let you read prophecy after prophecy in the Old Testament about the church and its fulfillment in the New Testament. This would be a good Bible study for you. The word to look at in Strong's Concordance is 'kingdom' or Strong's dictionary and then check the reference verses out. In this way, you will soon see where these verses are talking about something in the Old Testament or in the New Testament. In the New Testament the Greek word for kingdom is 'Basileia' and the number in Strong's Concordance or dictionary is 932. The kingdom of heaven and the kingdom of god mean the same thing and are interchangeable-see Matthew 19:23-24. Spiritually, the kingdom of God is within you.

Both of these expressions also refer to the prophecies of Daniel 2:44, 7:13-14 and denote the everlasting kingdom which God would set up and give to Christ, or the spiritual and eternal kingdom which was to subsist first in more imperfect circumstances on earth, but afterwards to appear complete in glory of heaven. This kingdom of heaven or Kingdom of God is God's rule within Christians while on earth, Matthew 13:41, 47-50. The reason I am writing these lessons on the church of Christ is so others may know and understand what the Bible says about the true church. I know and understand that these lessons on the true church may confuse some, anger some, there will be those who don't care one way or another, but I would just ask have patience with me and the others who are helping me with these lessons. I would ask of you, does the New Testament teach only

one church? Does the New Testament teach only one way for salvation? Does the New Testament teach that Jesus is the head of His church? The churches of Christ that the apostles started with the help of the Holy Spirit, can we have the same teachings and teach the apostle's doctrine today as they did? The answers to all of these questions is yes and having the one church they had, but we must all be in unity and teach the apostle's doctrine that is the New Testament. The church is the completed plan of God. This means that redemption is complete within Christ's church. Read what Paul says in Colossians 2:10. This tells us we are complete or full in Christ. To be full or complete in Christ is to be all that Christ's death, burial, and resurrection was intended to do. If the church is the fullness of Christ it is the Redeemed of Christ. Please read Ephesians 1:22-23 Paul declares the church to be the fullness of Christ. John 17:1-4 (please read), this tells us that the church is the finished work of Christ.

# **LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

Once again I feel a need to respond to Mr. Potter's lesson dated August 26th. As I read through his article, I see confusion in the text. I know that I Corinthians 14:33 tells us that God is not the author of confusion, so that fault either lies with Mr. Potter or myself. I realized early on while studying the Bible one glaring fact. I recently read the Antwerp Local School's newsletter and was surprised to learn the school board had approved a drug testing policy for Antwerp athletics. The newsletter indicates that athletes alone are subject to the testing while no other extracurricular groups are affected. In addition, this policy was implemented at the local level and not mandated by the State of Ohio suggesting we have a drug problem solely within our athletic program. What else could be the motivation for such a policy? Is there concern that student athletes are doping? This is a ridiculous question, but no more ridiculous than the policy itself.

Participation in Antwerp athletics is a privilege and as such, we have high expectations for our student athletes. We expect them to maintain a minimum GPA. We expect our student athletes to conduct themselves in a way that enhances the school's reputation both on and off the field of play. We expect them to follow the rules. While scholastic achievement and conduct are reasonable expectations. drug testing without probable cause is not. After all, these are not professional athletes.

Beyond the obvious concerns raised by such a policy are the not so obvious concerns such as the cost. How does the school board intend to fund this program? Might we expect a drug testing levy on the next election ballot? In a down economy with ever increasing operating costs, we cannot afford to spend taxpayer dollars on non-essential, non-productive policies.

our school board officials making fiscally responsible decisions that positively affect the bottom line while protecting the right to privacy of our students.

Will this drug testing policy cause any lasting negative effects for our athletes? Probably not, but that doesn't make it any less wrong. Will this policy bankrupt the school? Of course not, but that still doesn't make it any less wrong.



The above picture is of the old school that sat on CR 250 as soon as it turned off US 24 the second time going west.

This picture was sent to us by Mrs. Marjory Rupp. We ran a story a couple of weeks ago about this school but we didn't have the pictures at that time, so I will tell about it again.

The school was built some time after 1892 and abandoned before 1924. Marjory's mother, Lucile Smitley, Juanita Smitley and their brother, Kenneth, did not attend that school, but their aunt, Della Smitley did. As I understand, these people moved to the Antdaughter, Mrs. Marjory Rupp who lives in Bryan. That school was named

The Coffelt School, because I think they owned the land that it sat on. The Maumee Cemetery was called the Coffelt Cemetery at one time because that 30-some odd acres was purchased from the Coffelt's. I think at one time, they were a family of means. I knew some of the early ones were John Coffelt (1853-1910). Ida Coffelt lived from 1861 to 1920. I know there were more of that big family, as they were early pioneers.

Well Mrs. Rupp, I really enjoyed our visit to the old school site. Many, many thanks for all the information and the snapshot of the old Coffelt School. We here

When Pigs Fly

Remember when farmers stored hay loose in the hay mow and the barn roof was extended on one end. A hay car ran the length of the barn and was attached to the ridge roof and giant forks were used to haul hay up and into the hay mow. A team of horses at the opposite end of the barn was needed to pull the hay up and into the barn.

My father, Wes Stuart, was a farmer in northwest Ohio. A neighbor, Hub Conn, had asked my dad to help butcher a hog that was so big he could not handle it alone.

So dad and my brother, Owen, showed up one cold winter morning to help. Hub was ready for butchering. He had a barrel of boiling water all set up. Hogs were dipped in boiling water to loosen hair, then scraped as part of butchering.

A barrel was set up right below the hay mow window where they killed and bled the hog. The hog was trussed and attached to the hay car rope. A tam of horses was ready to go at the other end of the barn. Hub's wife, Mary, was in charge of the horses.

Hub called to Mary and she said, "giddy up." The horses pulled forward, the pig was raised over the barrel, Mary backed up the team and the hog was lowered into the hot water.

My brother thought, "Wow, this is a great way to raise and lower a hog." A lot easier than struggling with a rope and tackle over a tree

ing. But my father scolded Owen and ordered him to stop laughing. Dad saw only a catastrophe. Broken hay car, hole in the barn, run-a-way horses with broken harness, etc. Dad knew that if this story was told, all the local farmers would torment Hub about the "flying pig". My dad, who died many years ago, never told this account of butchering. My brother never told the story until many years after

the death of Hub. It's fifty years later and I only recently heard Owen



# **LIME CONSIDERATIONS** FOR LATE SUMMER AND FALL

### By: Jim Lopshire, Extension Agent

Fall is a good time to address soil fertility issues, including the application of lime. A recent soil test from a reputable lab will provide information to determine the amount of lime needed, if any. Results on the soil test list pH, buffer pH, and sometimes you may see lime test index, or LTI. To convert LTI to buffer pH, divide LTI by 10. The pH figure indicates whether or not lime is needed and the buffer pH value specifies the amount of lime needed to reach the target pH preferred by future crops.

Lime materials should be applied to increase soil pH, not to supply calcium. A calcium deficiency is extremely unlikely in Ohio and in most Midwestern states. Most of our soil contains abundant amounts of available calcium and more calcium becomes readily available at optimum pH levels.

Raising soil pH is the goal of liming, and cost per acre should be the basis for selecting liming materials. If magnesium is deficient or low in the soil, the soil may benefit from the application of dolomitic limestone, though magnesium availability will increase with an increase in pH. Consider price per ton and effective neutralizing power (ENP) to compare products equally. Extension has an Excel calculator that will figure lime application rates and costs using your pH, buffer pH, target pH, and effective neutralizing power of the material you will be using. Contact your local Extension office for more details regarding this calculator.

When applying lime, some factors to consider include tillage, which is the best way to incorporate lime, due to water solubility of lime. In a continuous no-till system, consider cutting the lime rate by half, since the tilled assumption of the lime calculator assumes 8" of soil. Also, do not surface-apply urea within a year of lime application. Urea volatilizes much more quickly on an alkaline surface, and nitrogen is lost

to the atmosphere. when selecting which

### CAP-AND-TAX: AMERICA'S MOST DAMAGING TAX INCREASE

As I have previously mentioned, cap-and-tax legislation would drive the final nail into the coffin Congress has prepared for Ohio's economy. Instead of creating muchneeded jobs, it would actually kill more jobs than it would create because American energy companies would either move out of the country or shut down entirely. The next phase of the government's cap-and-tax plan is to impose devastating tax increases on Ohio's businesses and families as energy companies struggle to stay afloat.

Cap-and-tax hits Ohioans disproportionately harder than other states due to the fact that nearly 90 percent of our electricity is generated from coal-fired power plants. If Ohio's utility companies choose to remain in the U.S. despite the restrictions of capand-tax, they would be forced to buy credits to continue releasing carbon emissions.

Inevitably, these cost increases resulting from restrictions and punitive fees will be passed along to consumers. Higher prices will appear in everything from electricity bills and gas prices to food prices and cars. These high costs begin a terrible domino effect of decreased consumer spending, decreased demand for production, higher unemployment, and less revenue to our state treasury, all resulting in a slowing economy. To my astonishment, the federal lawmakers acknowledge that consumer prices for energy will suffer significant increases, yet they continue to laud the many benefits of this legislation. Similar to the unemployment provision that states the government will supply 70 percent of your job benefits if you lose your job because of cap-and-tax, there is a clause regarding energy prices as well.

This section buried within the bill would provide compensation to consumers in the form of tax credits and government subsidies to defray the added financial burden of high energy costs. Cap-and-tax would use the states to allocate monthly payments to households eligible for food stamps or with a gross income up to 150 percent of the poverty line.

For being so adamant about bringing hope and change to the nation, the U.S. House Democrats sure have a backwards strategy of instilling hope in the grim future they are creating, with the largest tax in American history looming on the horizon. I remain firmly committed to preserving Ohio's vital industries while keeping tax rates low and conducive to job growth and investment.
