



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ABSENTEE BALLOTS FOR THE NOVEMBER 3RD GEN-**ERAL ELECTION**

Absentee ballots will be available on or after September 29th for the upcoming General Election to be held on Tuesday, November 3,

Polling locations on Election Day will be open from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Any qualified Ohio voter may request an absentee ballot without stating a reason. The ballot must be applied for in writing or in person for each election that you wish to cast an Absent Voters Ballot. You may, but are not required to, use the application form prescribed by the Ohio Secretary of State (form 11- A). Your request must contain ALL of the following information:

- -Your name;
- —Your signature;
- —The address at which you are registered to vote;
 - -Your date of birth;
 - —ONE of the following: (a) Your Ohio driver's li-
- cense or state ID number; or (b) The last four digits of
- your Social Security number; (c) A copy of your current

and valid photo ID, military ID, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows your name and current address. (Note: You cannot use as proof of identification a notice that the board of elections mailed to you.)

-A statement identifying the election for which you are requesting an absentee voter's ballot;

-A statement that you are a qualified elector;

-If you want the ballot mailed to you, you will need to include the address to which you want it mailed.

An application by mail must be received by the Board of Elections office by Noon Saturday, October 31, 2009. Applications by the voter in person must be received by Monday November 2, 2009, the day before the election, by 4:00 p.m. You may not vote in the office Election Day. You must vote in the precinct where you reside on Election Day. Applications for persons who are hospitalized by a medical emergency will be accepted until 3:00 p.m. on Election Day.

If you request an absentee ballot, you will not be allowed to vote a regular ballot at your polling location, nor turn in your absentee ballot at your polling location on Election Day. If you return your absentee ballot by mail, the envelope which the ballot is enclosed must be postmarked with a date not later than November 2, 2009, or you may deliver your absentee ballot in person to the Board of Elections office no later than the close of polls on Election Day to be counted. The polls close at 7:30 pm.

One of these Villages is Charloe, located on the Junction of 138 and 171.

Charloe is rich with history. It is the site of the Oquanoxa's Indian Reservation. The Indians left the Reservation around 1820 for out West. Charloe Peter from the tribe of the Ottawas was the last Chief of the Okonosee Village of Oquanoxa's Reservation.

In 1839 the town was formed and platted and named Charloe after the Indian Chief. The town held the

first courthouse in Paulding County and was the second county seat.


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WELCOME TO CHARLOE

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Well, it's coming around to that time of the year again, according to the Paulding County Health Department staff. We know that every one is wondering what to do about the flu season and shots. First of all, people should

FLU INFORMATION

get their regular seasonal flu shot, which covers the three strains of flu virus thought to be circulating this flu season. This virus usually hits in January, but, of course, can show up anytime. The seasonal vaccine can now be received earlier in the fall. Research has shown that the vaccine immunity lasts longer than originally thought. As there supposedly are not shortages, the seasonal vaccine will soon be readily available at many sites. Pregnant women, children 18 years & under, people

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over 50 years of age, and anyone with medical problems are especially recommended to get the seasonal vaccine as they are more likely to have complications resulting from the flu disease. Households or caretakers of children under six months and healthcare and emergency medical care workers need to get the seasonal vaccine. They do not want to be responsible for passing the disease, should they get it, to those vulnerable persons in their care. But, anyone of any age who wants to avoid the disease should get the vaccine. What about the H1N1

disease and its vaccine? At the present time most of the flu viruses seen in other parts of the country are the new H1N1 type. Usually this flu is not severe. But, it may cause more problems in the

at risk populations who are more prone to developing complications. These groups include children under 24 years, pregnant women, and persons with medical conditions. First available vaccines are not targeted for 65 years and older with medical problems. These individuals seem to have a little protection although medical experts are not sure why. The H1N1 vaccine has

been developed and the testing is being completed. So far the experts are very happy with the amount of immunity that the H1N1 vaccine is providing. The testing results should show what short term side effects to expect. However, these side effects are expected to be the same as for the seasonal flu. The new H1N1 vaccine is made in the same manner as the seasonal When is the vaccine ex-

pected? It is thought that maybe the County may see a little of it in late October. However, as it takes months to make this vaccine, it will be here in limited amounts at the start. So, distribution will be to SOME of the targeted AT RISK groups to start with. As more vaccine becomes available, it will be distributed to more and more groups, until eventually it will be available to all. As time draws near, please watch the papers for more information. Eventually, we hope to be offering it at the schools. Information and permission slips concerning this will go out to the families prior. We want to protect our children, but they are also known to be the main spreaders of the flu.

In these types of situations, patience must be exercised. In the mean time - PROTECT

- YOURSELF! -Wash hands frequently.
 - —Cover your cough.
- —Don't share drinks, tow-
- -Stay home if you are ill.

Wait 24 hours until fever is gone without the use of feverreducing medicines before returning to work or school.

Eat nutritiously – lots of fruits & vegetables.

-Get enough rest, fresh air & exercise. —Don't Worry - It just

lowers your immune system's ability to fight infections!

PC AG. SOCIETY HAS **MAINTENANCE TOO!**

The Board of Directors for the Paulding County Ag. Society needs your help. As you know our funding was cut by over thirteen thousand dollars in 2009. In 2010 we expect the County to cut our funding to the minimum required by the Ohio Revised Code which would only be twenty-five hundred dollars.

Our 2009 County Fair was one of the best fairs ever, we are greatly appreciative of the five area business' that stepped up and sponsored the free gates. We also know that we cannot be assured that area business' will be able to offer the same support in 2010.

With this in mind and after months of discussion and consideration, the Board has realized that for the fair to continue we must come to you, the citizens, and ask for your help and support in the passing of a levy of .19 mills. This millage would generate approximately fifty thousand dollars per year for the Board to maintain and improve our County Fairgrounds. These funds would allow the board to begin replacing roofs on buildings, replacing water lines, many of which are over 30 years old.

To help explain our request for this levy, we have listed below our ongoing expenses that the Ag. Society are responsible for:

Electricity – Before the first kilowatt of electricity is used our electric bill is \$1,000.00 each month. Add to that the kilowatt hours used and we are now at 1,200-1,300 each month. Like other customers we too must factor in the 15% rate increase that has gone into effect.

Water/Sewer - the approximate minimum bill is \$300.00 per month. Again we must also pay the new surcharge implemented by the Village.

Liability Insurance – costs are \$9,000.00 for a year.

Phones - we maintain two phone lines year round at an approximate cost of \$80.00 per month.

Every two years we also are required to have a state audit at a cost of \$8,000.00

As you can see that leaves very little extra money to do the many repairs or to make any improvements to the grounds.

The support of the Citizens of this county would enable the board to continue operations and begin making the repairs so that the county can continue to be proud of the facilities that they have.

The Commissioners met in a special session to rename US 24 recently. Travis McGarvey recommended that the road be renamed County Road 182. The highway will be renamed when ODOT turns the roadway over to Paulding County. The motion was presented and approved by the County Commissioners.

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



roadsides. When over-seeding is required, tall fescue seed should be used.

Avoid turf grass mixtures containing annual ryegrass, orchard grass, Kentucky 31 coarse-leaf tall fescue, redtop linn a perennial ryegrass cultivar, and timothy.

Successful gardeners have learned that choosing the right plant for the right spot is essential. The same is true

for lawns. Most lawns do not have uniform light conditions so off the shelf products contain a mixture of perennial rye, fescue and bluegrass to compensate for variations. The species best suited for the environmental conditions in which grass seed is planted will prevail. Both Kentucky bluegrass and perennial ryegrass require plenty of sunlight. They do not tolerate shade. Fescues are much more

adapted to shady conditions.

No grass will grow in deep shade; consider that area for ground covers.

Mid-August mid-September is the optimum time for renovating an existing lawn or putting in a new one. Fall provides a long stress-free grow-in period and less weed competition than spring. The warm days, cool nights and frequent rainfall are ideal for seed germination.


