

THE ONE TRUE CHURCH RESTORATION #8

Today is the last one of Calvin's five-point creed. The title of this one is: Perserverance of the Saints. Looking back at the names of the others, Total Hereditary Depravity; Unconditional Election; Limited Atonement; Irrestible Grace; Perserverance of the Saints; Notice the underlined letters, take these letters and it spells the name of Calvin's creed.

Calvinists teach that the

elect cannot fall from grace, but will persevere and ultimately be saved regardless of what they do or how they live. Sam Morris, a denominational evangelist, in his writings "Do a Christian's Sins Damn His Soul?" had this to say, "We take the position that a Christian's sins do not damn his soul. The way a Christian lives, he says, his character, his conduct, or his attitude toward other people has nothing whatever to do with the salvation of his soul. This often is called the doctrine of eternal security or once saved, always saved. Some say if one goes back into sin after his call, it is a sign he was never of the elect." Does the Bible

Notice what the Bible says in 2 Peter 2:20-22. Notice in verse 20, it says, "If they have escaped the corruption of the world by knowing our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and are again entangled in it and overcome, they are worse off at the end than they were at the beginning. It would have been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than to have known it and then to turn their backs on the sacred command that was passed on to them. Of them the proverbs are true: 'A dog returns to its vomit,' and, 'A sow that is washed goes back to her wallowing in the mud." This is in direct conflict with this writings of Sam Morris and anyone else who

teaches this doctrine.

1 Corinthians 10:12 tell us to take heed lest we fall. Those that teach we can't sin or can't fall from grace are teaching what Paul told us not to do in Galatians 1:6-10. Also in Galatians 5:4, this tells us here that if we are trying to have salvation by following the Law of Moses, we have fallen

from grace. Study the book of Hebrews about falling from grace, especially these chapters: Hebrews 2:1-4; 4:1; 11; 6:4-8. Loved ones, if you want to believe the false teaching of Calvinism, that is entirely up to you. After all, we live in a wonderful country that allows freedom of religion. It is up to you to determine if you are following the New Testament in your lives. Remember Jesus will determine your destination after this life, not the United States government! He will base His judgments on what He has sent to us through the New Testament. Each individual will stand before Jesus and answer for the deeds done in our lives, whether good or bad. I have truthfully shown in God's

word what God says, not what

I say and I would rather be-

lieve what God says than any man. Just remember this: that Christ came to this earth to die to give us salvation. Our obedience to His words are essential. In Mark 16:16 He says, "He that believes and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believes not shall be damned."

Please read Philippians 2:5-11, Hebrews 4:12-16 and 1 John 1:6-10. The question I need to ask is are those who teach Calvinism walking in darkness with man's teaching or in the light of God's word? 

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THE SUNDANCE KID

Harry Longabaugh had been serving 18 months in the jail at Sundance, Wyoming. He was arrested in 1887 for horse thievery.

Harry was born in Mount Clare, PA and not a whole lot is known about him until he got arrested in Sundance.

This is how he got the name of The Sundance Kid. There were a few years that it is known that he worked on a big commercial ranch in Canada called the Bar U Ranch in Alberta.

In 1886, he met Butch Cassidy, his real name was Robert LeRoy Parker. So Butch and the Sundance Kid fell into some robberies and other lawlessness and formed The Wild Bunch Gang.

In 1896 these guys and the rest of the gang pulled off a long list of train robberies in the Old Northwest.

In 1969, a movie was made called Butch Cassidy and The Sundance Kid. Well, as usual, the movies made the robbers as a non-violent gang and is not true. There was another mem-

ber of the gang called Kid Curry. His real name was Harvey Logan and we wrote about him a few weeks ago. I guess there is no evidence

of The Sundance Kid killing anyone until that big shoot out in Bolivia. Now this guy, Kid Curry,

who had joined the gang, he killed a number of men and sometimes the media got mixed up because of the closeness of their names.

The police followed Kid Curry (Harvey Logan), to their hideout at the Hole in the Wall in Wyoming and there was two policemen wounded there.

Longabaugh and Logan used an old cabin near Cody, Wyoming before they robbed a bank in Red Lodge, Montana. There was also a cabin in north central Wyoming. These natural hideouts had been used by other despera-

The movie made the participants out as non-violent men, but records show that a number of people were killed by members of the gang.

Logan, or Kid Curry, killed five policemen alone. That brought out a lot of wanted posters as much as \$30,000 dead or alive.

This Hole in the Wall hideout was near Kaycee, Wyoming. This place was on the high ground with a good view in all directions. It was almost impossible to get in without being noticed.

On February 20, 1901 Butch and The Sundance Kid wanted to live in a quieter atmosphere so they sailed to Buenos Aries and Longabaugh took his lady friend, Etta Place, along with them.

We really don't know much about those two in Bolivia but this we do know.

On November 3, 1908 a courier from the local silver mine was going along the trail with the payroll. He was robbed by two American bandits. So they traced Parker and Longabaugh to a small hotel in San Vicente, Bolivia. A few of the local police, a couple friends and two soldiers shot it out with who they said was Butch Cassidy and The Sundance Kid.

Over the years reports have came out that both of our outlaws returned later to the States. Now you are always going to have tales about anyone famous surfacing after they have been dead for many years.

But in this case, Harry Longabaugh, alias The Sundance Kid, returned to Duchesne, Utah and lived under the name of William Henry Long and died in 1936 and is buried in a cemetery there. In December of 2008 his body was exhumed and tested to see if he was Sundance. So far the tests have not been read. However, until those two bodies in Bolivia are found and tested some of these claims will stay unsolved.

Claims of Butch Cassidy or Robert Parker, that he returned to Spokane in 1910 and built up his own factory. But in the Great Depression of 1929 he lost it all. He returned to the Hole in the Wall

area and looked for some buried loot that he had stashed but found nothing. He died in 1937 at the Spokane County Poor House. It makes interesting reading but it don't follow the movie at all.

But I'm inclined to believe this ending over the movie's ending. But again, it was over 100 years ago.



Snakes also known as Garter Snakes (Thamnophissirtalis) can be dangerous. Yes, grass snakes, not rattlesnakes. Here's why. A couple in Sweetwater, Texas had a lot of potted plants. During a recent cold spell, the wife was bringing a lot of them indoors to protect them from a possible freeze. It turned out that a little green garden grass snake was hidden in one of the plants. When it had warmed up, it slithered out and the wife saw it go under the sofa. She let out a very loud

The husband (who was taking a shower) ran out into the living room, naked, to see what the problem was. She told him there was a snake under the sofa. He got down on the floor on his hands and knees to look for it. About that time the family dog came and coldnosed him on the behind. He thought the snake had bitten him, so he screamed and fell over on the floor. His wife thought he had had a heart attack, so she covered him up, told him to lie still and called an ambulance. The attendants rushed in, would not listen to his protests, loaded him on the stretcher, and started carrying him out.

About that time, the snake came out from under the sofa and the Emergency Medical Technician saw it and dropped his end of the stretcher. That's when the man broke his leg and why he is still in the hospital. The wife still had the problem of the snake in the house, so she called on a neighbor who volunteered to capture the snake. He armed himself with a rolled-up newspaper and began poking under the couch. Soon he decided it was gone and told the woman, who sat down on the sofa in relief. But while relaxing, her hand dangled in between the cushions, where she felt the snake wriggling around. She screamed and fainted, the snake rushed

back under the sofa. The neighbor man, seeing her lying there passed out, tried to use CPR to revive her. The neighbor's wife, who had just returned from shopping at the grocery store, saw her husband's mouth on the woman's mouth and slammed her husband in the back of the head with a bag of canned goods, knocking him out and cutting his scalp to a point where it needed stitches. The noise woke the woman from her dead faint and she saw her neighbor lying on the floor with his wife bending over him, so she assumed that the snake had bitten him. She went to bottle of whiskey, and began pouring it down the man's throat. By now, the police had arrived. Breathe here...

They saw the unconscious man, smelled the whiskey, and assumed that a drunken fight had occurred. They were about to arrest them all, when the women tried to explain how it all happened over a little garden snake! The police called an ambulance, which took away the neighbor and his sobbing wife. Now, the little snake

again crawled out from under the sofa and one of the policemen drew his gun and fired at it. He missed the snake and hit the leg of the end table. The table fell over, the lamp on it shattered and, as the bulb broke, it started a fire in the drapes. The other policeman tried to beat out the flames, and fell through the window into the yard on top of the family dog who, startled, jumped out and raced into the street, where an oncoming car swerved to avoid it and smashed into the parked police car. Meanwhile, neighbors

saw the burning drapes and called in the fire department. The firemen had started raising the fire ladder when they were halfway down the street. The rising ladder tore out the overhead wires, put out the power, and disconnected the telephones in a ten-square city block area (but they did get the house fire out).

Time passed! Both men were discharged from the hospital, the house was repaired, the dog came home, the police acquired a new car and all was right with their world.

A while later they were watching TV and the weatherman announced a cold snap for that night. The wife asked her husband if he thought they should bring in their plants for the night. And that's when he shot

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

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THE GERMAN LANGUAGE

I reported to you in my first article that my classes in school would be in English while I learned German. Well, it turned out to be quiet different. Instead, almost all of my classes are taught in German! However, I happen to attend one of the only bilingual schools in Stuttgart meaning not only is English class taught in English, but so is Biology.

What am I doing to learn German? I am taking an intensive course at the language school here in Stuttgart. I started my course the last week of September and it ended December 3rd. The course was held each Monday-Thursday from 1:30-5:30. Yes, that's right... 4 hours, 4 days a week of pure German! It was long and hard... but I'm progressing quickly! In my course, there were

21 people from all over the world! We had people from north, south, east, and west-with countries including: China, Nigeria, Bulgaria, Turkey, Canada, and, of course, the USA! I was by far the youngest, with others ranging in age from their early 20s to early 50s. We are all here for different reasons. A couple people are here because their spouse lives here, some followed jobs, and then there is me—just here for the amazing experience! We have become somewhat like a family because we are all at the same level, regardless of age or wisdom, when in comes to learning German. We're all very supportive and are trying to tackle this language!

We have a workbook that we follow along with the teacher's lessons and, of course, hausaufgaben (homework). Because I am still unable to understand the majority of what is going on in the classroom, I take my German homework to school for my friends correct, if needed, and help me out! I've also started, on my own, a small project with my friends. At night, I write about my day (in German of course) and take it to them the next day to correct! Naturally, I have plenty of grammatical errors, but they tell me that they can understand it! It's great practice for

As far as my progress... I'm nowhere near fluent, but I've most definitely improved! If you speak fairly clearly and somewhat slowly, I can understand 90% of typical small talk or easy daily topics. But when people speak really fast and use big words and topics I didn't even know existed, I'm lost in a heartbeat! But my friends are really impressed with how quickly I've progressed and how much I can understand. For any of you who haven't ever attempted to

easier said than done! When you are at my level and know a decent amount of vocabulary and basic sentence structure, then understanding it is not too hard. But when I have to reply in German, words just swirl around in my head and I put together really grammatically incorrect sentences and even spout out "denglisch" (Deutsch plus English)! But my friends just giggle along with me and correct me! It's great! My host family and friends are now speaking about 80% German with me unless I don't understand or they KNOW I won't understand! Many people have asked

me if German is a hard language. Everything is only as hard as you make it out to be. But... it's not easy! German is actually the closest language to English. And it is certainly easier than attempting to learn Japanese! The alphabet is nearly the same, with just a few differences in pronunciation. For instance, the V sounds like an F, the W sounds like a V, and the I sounds like an E. Once you have those memorized, things flow easier. The German language also has the accent, called an umlaut, which you may know about. German is a very "throaty" language. Even the most feminine of girls can't make German seem "cute." I love the language, but it's going to take lots of practice to get the "R" to roll in the back of my throat and the perfect hard, hissing "ch" sound, but I'm optimistic that I will have it in no time!

LATTA, HOUSE REPUB-LICANS CALL ON WHITE HOUSE TO AVOID COMMIT-MENT IN COPENHAGEN

On December 7th, Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green), a member of the American Energy Solutions Group, joined over 30 House Republicans in sending a letter to President Obama, asking him and his administration not to make any binding commitments at the upcoming Climate Change Convention in Copenhagen, Denmark.

"As your negotiators prepare for this important summit, we would urge you not to let them portray illconceived carbon regulations under the Clean Air Act or action by the OMB as appropriate substitutes for Congressional action on comprehensive energy legislation. We urge you to allow Congress to appropriately deliberate over your personal proposals and not use unilateral action by the EPA and the OMB to press forward any binding agreements at the Conference," the letter states.

"Just as the House Democrat leadership ignored the will of the American people in passing Cap and Tax, the largest energy tax ever, President Obama and his administration should not ignore the wishes of Congress by entering into commitments on climate change regulations in Copenhagen.

There is still much delibera-

tion left on this jobs killing, national energy tax legislation that Congress must undertake," Latta stated after signing the letter.

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



POINSETTIA CARE

By: Jim Lopshire, Extension Agent

The poinsettia is the most popular Christmas season plant. It was introduced into the United States in the late 1820's from its native Mexico by our first ambassador to that country, Joel Robert Poinsett. The plant was first known and probably is still best known for the bright red leaves or bracts that surround the inconspicuous, small, yellow, true flowers. The colorful parts of the poinsettia, the bracts, are actually modified leaves. The poinsettia flower is small, green or yellow, and situated in the middle of the Proper care of poinsettias

will keep your plant looking attractive for a long time. The conditions inside our northern homes often are not ideal for poinsettias, natives of the tropics. Under unfavorable conditions, the leaves will turn yellow and drop off; the bracts may also drop. Since the poinsettia is greenhouse grown at temperatures of 60-70°F with high relative humidity and maximum sunlight, homeowners should try to simulate these conditions for best home care

The poinsettia thrives on bright, sunny natural daylight; at least six hours daily is recommended. Placement near a sunny window is ideal. To prolong the bright red of the bracts, temperatures ideally should not exceed 70° F during the day, or fall below 65° F at night. Be sure to avoid placing the plants near drafts, fluctuating air currents, excess heat and dry air from appliances, fireplaces or ventilating ducts.

Poinsettias do best with a moist soil condition, not too wet and not too dry. Water the poinsettia thoroughly when the soil surface feels dry to a light touch. The best indication of a thorough watering is when the water begins to seep through the drain holes at the bottom of the inner pot. Water until enough of the water barely begins to seep through the drain holes. Be sure to discard any excess water, as poinsettias left sitting in water may suffer from

permanent root-rot damage. It is not necessary to fertilize your poinsettias when they are in bloom during the holiday season. However, after 6-8 weeks, a balanced, allpurpose household plant fertilizer mixed 1/2-strength will help maintain the rich, green foliage color and promote new growth. Repeat once more in nother 6-8 weeks

A wilted plant may drop its leaves prematurely. If wilting does occur, water the plant thoroughly to moisten the soil, then re-water again in 5 to 10 minutes, but never allow the plant to stand in excess water.

LATTA CALLS FOR FULL **FUNDING OF CAROLINE PRYCE WALKER CONQUER** CHILDHOOD CANCER ACT

On Friday, December 3rd, Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) sent a letter to Office of Budget and Management Director (OBM) Peter Orszag asking for the full funding of the Caroline Pryce Walker Conquer Childhood Cancer Act in his Fiscal Year 2011 budget request. The Caroline Pryce Walker Conquer Childhood Cancer Act of 2008 was introduced by former Congresswoman Deborah Pryce (R-OH), in memory of her daughter who passed away due to child-hood cancer. The bill passed the House of Representatives during the 110th Congress by a vote of 416-0 and a unani-

mous vote in the Senate. Congressman Latta's letter was co-signed by 13 members of the Ohio Congressional Delegation.

Earlier this year, Congressman Latta was successful in securing approximately \$10 million in the FY 2010 Labor, Health, and Human Services Appropriations bill as passed by the House to fund a portion of the Caroline Pryce Walker Conquer Childhood Cancer Act. These funds were directed to the National Cancer Institute (NCI) in order to conduct special research into pediatric cancers. With this re-direction of funds, cancer cluster studies such as the ongoing study occurring in Clyde, Ohio will be able to receive funding from the NCI for their ongoing research into the Clyde Childhood
