PAULDING LIBRARY SYS-TEM OFFERS AMNESTY **FOR FINES**

The Paulding County Carnegie Library system will be providing an opportunity for patrons to start the new year with a clean slate and clear their fines. The library has a "zero balance" policy, so patrons who have outstanding overdue fines are prevented from borrowing materials or using library computers. This "Fine Amnesty" provides a way for them to catch up while at the same time, benefits area food

"We use to call this program Food for Fines," states Susan Pieper, Director of the library system. "Patrons could bring in non-perishable food products and the staff would determine how much of their fine could be waived. In this new program, patrons are encouraged to bring in non-food products such as paper products (napkins, paper towels, toilet paper, etc.); personal hygiene products (deodorant, shampoo, soap, feminine products, etc.); or cleaning supplies (laundry soap, dish detergent, window cleaner, etc.)

The staff will still determine how much can be waived based on the donation. This amnesty period will run from December 28th through the first week in January, ending on Saturday, January 9th. "This has always been a popular program", shares Pieper. "But, instead of food products, we will accept paper products. The food pantries cannot allocate funds for these types of goods; and, food stamps cannot be used to purchase them. Hopefully, this will help the area food pantries fill county needs."

Patrons may bring their donations to any of the Paulding County Carnegie Library locations in Paulding, Antwerp, Oakwood and Payne. For more information about the "Fine Amnesty" program, call the main library at 419-399-2032.

ON FACING THE **IMPOSSIBLE**

The year was 1918. The man's name was Joseph Strauss. Not exactly a household name or someone who historians immediately recognize. Nevertheless, Joseph Strauss was a man who believed he could accomplish what some considered the impossible.

Joseph Strauss was an engineer and on a very normal day in 1918, this man stood alone on a windswept cliff overlooking the Golden Gate of San Francisco Bay. In his imagination, Strauss could see a span, a suspended span of more than 4,000 feet.

In his mind's eye, he could envision a mighty suspension bridge, connecting the shores that surrounded the bay area. Strauss shared his dream with others but they were not at all supportive of his vision. "The winds are too

strong," some said. "It will never work!"

"The waves are too destructive; it'll never work!" claimed others.

"The tides are too powerful; it will never work!" many predicted.

"The distance is too great; it will never work!" declared

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But Joseph Strauss had a vision of a suspension bridge that could span the Golden Gate and he pressed on.

It took him 15 years to convince enough people that, although it had never been done, it could be done. Finally, on a blustery January day in 1933, the construction work began. On May 24, 1937, the

bridge was opened, and 200,000 people walked over it during the dedication ceremonies. They finally believed in Strauss' vision.

In 1987, in celebration of the Golden Gate Bridge's 50th anniversary, 200,000 people walked across the expanse that connects both shores of the San Francisco Bay.

Building such a bridge is alot like believing great things from God. It requires a vision, perseverance, and the willingness to be stretched beyond anything we presently think is possible.

God makes a tremendous statement in Jeremiah 32:27. That verse states, "I am the Lord, the God of all flesh; is anything too hard for me?" I'm wondering something...

If the Lord made that statement to you today, what issue in your life would He be referring to? What are you facing right now in your life that appears impossible?

Take it to the Lord in prayer, commit the matter to Him, and seek to walk before Him according to the biblical standards He's revealed to us. In His time, God will accomplish His purposes.

Sound difficult? You bet it is. Impossible? No way. Tougher issues have been conquered. Like a huge suspension bridge that majestically spans the San Francisco

NEW YEAR MEANS NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR ROTH IRA CONVERSION

Beginning in January, the income restrictions will be lifted for individual investors looking to convert their traditional individual retirement accounts (IRAs) to Roth IRAs, according to area Edward Jones Financial Advisor, Phil Recker.

Previously, investors with an adjusted gross income of more than \$100,000 (filing individually or jointly) could not convert to a Roth IRA from a traditional IRA.

Investors will have to pay taxes when they convert to a Roth IRA. However, those who convert in 2010 may report the taxable income from the conversion in two equal installments over a two-year period, 2011 and 2012.

Investors who own a traditional IRA make contributions that may be tax-deductible, depending on their income levels. Traditional IRA earnings grow on a taxdeferred basis.

This means your money has the opportunity to grow faster than it would if it were placed in an investment on which you paid taxes every

at a private medical center recently. They said they were not treating anymore Medicare patients. Is this legal?" The answer: "The govern-

ment cannot force doctors or hospitals to take Medicare patients. If doctors or hospitals do decide to treat Medicare patients, there are certain conditions they must accept, such as set "fees for services." I carry a secondary health

insurance plan which pays for those "fees that Medicare services do not." If the government is allowed to take money out of the Medicare fund to pay for this new health plan, they will reduce what Medicare will pay. The point is that technically I will be without insurance.

Example: The doctor's fee is \$2,000 for services rendered. Medicare says they will only pay \$1,000 and will only pay 80% of that. That means that Medicare will pay \$800 and our supplementary insurance will pick up the rest or part of this amount. However, if any of the charges are not covered by Medicare, what recourse do we have when secondary insurance only picks up what Medicare will not pay?

I feel it is important that you call or write to your congressman and question them. Only a united front will gain any action.

BLACK BART

Black Bart was a stage coach robber of some small notoriety back in the early 1880's. Most of his actions were in Old California.

He was actually born Charles E. Boles of Norfolk Co. England back in 1829. They migrated to the U.S. when he was two years old. There were at least seven in the family. His father farmed about 100 acres in upstate New York.

When he was about 20 he and a cousin, David, started for the gold fields of California in 1849. They had to layover in Independence, Missouri for the winter.

By 1850, they had reached California and were mining on the North Fork of the American River. They had some success and they returned back east.

By 1852 he and some of his family were back out west. His brother, Robert Boles, died and was buried in San Francisco.

After two years Charles headed back east by going through Decatur, IL and he married Mary Elizabeth Johnson and they had two daughters by 1861. But being a father and husband wasn't exciting enough for Charles so he enlisted in the Illinois 116th Infantry Regiment on August 13, 1862 at Decatur.

I have read and studied his war time campaigns and he was a good soldier with a lot of combat time. He was a 1st Sergeant by 1863 and spent most of his time with Gen. Sherman's Army.

By 1867 he was discharged and on his way west again to the silver mines in Idaho and Montana. It was here that he wrote his wife that he had some run in with Wells Fargo and he would get back all he had lost and that is what put him on the Owl Hoot Trail.

I think the first stage coach robbery that he pulled was the Sonora to Milton in Calavares County. The lone robber wore a feed sack over his head with two holes for his eyes. He wore a long duster and sacks over his boots. He was very polite and didn't use any foul language. So this was the way that Charles E. Boles conducted himself on most of his robberies. It was sort of his trade mark.

He always acted alone in his robberies but he might tell the stage driver that he had more help hid in the bushes.

He pulled that trick one time and he pushed some sticks into the bushes with a portion of them visible from the road and he told the driver there were three more gunmen in the bush. But the posse found only sticks and not rifles.

In the early 1870's the Sacramento Union talked about a 'fancy Dan' robber and this was pleasing to our bad guy and he started using the name Black Bart. But his real name was Charles Boles.

His last stage coach robbery was in Calavares County and things went wrong from the start. The stage driver, a Mr. McConnell, secured a handgun and shot three rounds at Black Bart. I think he was struck by one of the rounds. Anyhow, he chased Bart off, but left some gear at his campsite. One of the objects left was a handkerchief that had a laundry mark, FXO7, stamped on it.

Well, there was 91 laundries in Calavares County but the sheriff located the correct one inside of a week. It gave his name and address and when the police called on him he was not any trouble and confessed about everything.

He was sentenced for six years to San Quentin Prison but he was a model prisoner and was paroled in four

He was in Frisco on February 28, 1888 but he was never seen again.

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





The Maumee River

On Carryall Island W. of Antwerp in the Maumee River on Cĥristmas Eve two male bald eagles were perched for a length of time. Our family was having Christmas dinner across from the island and saw the birds flying in from the E. and lighting in the middle of the island until after dark. As you may know, this is our national bird and they are nesting on the Auglaize River the past few years. Perhaps Carryall Island will be lucky this year to have some baby eagles.

The Maumee River has been historical for thousands of years because of the glacier activity which left the "puddle" of "The Great Black Swamp" of which we are a part of geographically. We are left with the dried up sludge, "Paulding County Clay", that one can usually find in the bottom of a mud puddle. It's very fine and just like putty when it's wet.

The Indians lived all around the edge of "The Great Black Swamp". It was fearful, dangerous, and stunk. If animals or people ran into the swamp to escape, they rarely returned if they stepped into sink holes deeper than a horse's head is high. After 1,000's of years and no sunlight, there was no vegetation on the ground except what could escape. It was said that there were gigantic trees that made an umbrella of dark shade over the Black Swamp

and that, too, added to it's fearfulness to man.

The place where Fort Wayne now stands is on a summit and three major rivers run E. to Lake Erie, one of them being the Maumee. You may hear of Fort Wayne being called "The Summit City." The Maumee was a very famous and important waterway for hundreds of years for hauling furs and goods to Lake Erie. The Indians were using the waterway before the white men arrived ca. 1600.

On 8 August 1794 Gen. Anthony Wayne arrived at the confluence of the Maumee and Auglaize Rivers and erected "Fort Defiance" (Ohio). On 20 August 1794 the engagement known as "The Battle of Fallen Timbers" took place along the Maumee River. The Indians were defeated for good. Gen. Wayne destroyed Indian crops and the largest Indian encampment known of different tribes at the confluence near where he had erected the fort. Also destroyed were hundreds of Indian villages on both sides of the Maumee River from Fort Miami (Ohio) to Kekionga (Indiana).

When General Anthony Wayne came to Kekionga (confluence of St. Mary's and St. Joseph's Rivers), he built Fort Wayne there, also. On 22 October 1794 with military honors and discharge of 15 cannon, the Americans marched into the fort and the American Government was fully established at the confluence of the Rivers. He then left with most of his forces to Greenville and at the same time destroyed the strong alliance between the British and the Indians.

Our Maumee River was

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much safer and we had Fort Defiance and Fort Wayne each only 25 miles away by waterway. The Indians had been defeated technically, however, that didn't take care of the pirates or other dangers of the river.

With the 2010 tax bills just being mailed, everyone is looking for ways to save money. Saving or managing your property taxes more effectively is no exception. Here are a few of County Auditor, Susan K. Simpson's thoughts and available programs that may help the tax payers of Paulding County:

your tax bill is not paid by the due date; penalty and interest will be added, increasing your tax burden. If for some reason you do not receive a tax bill, State statue declares the property owner is still responsible to pay the taxes. Contact the county treasurer on any questions related to billing and payment of your taxes.

2. Obtain a building per**mit.** It is the property owner's responsibility to report any new construction. This is normally done by obtaining a building permit. State statue directs the county auditor to collect back taxes and to charge a 50% penalty against the unpaid taxes of unreported improvements (structure). Agricultural buildings are NOT exempt from property tax regardless of zoning laws; therefore, they require a building permit. If you chose to take a "wait until they find

it approach" you may be facing the costly burden of back taxes along with penalties.

3. Report destroyed/ damaged structures. If you have a destroyed/demolished or damaged improvement (structure), whether from fire, high winds, or just cleaning up your property you want to report it to the county auditor's office. You will need to fill out a form and an appraiser will visit your property for verification. Depending on the time of the year, an adjustment may be necessary to your tax bill. At a minimum, the value affected will be removed from future taxation.

4. The 2½% Rollback credit program. It is a statesponsored, county-implemented program to provide a measure of property tax relief for owner-occupied residential property. Most owner-occupied residential property qualifies for this program. However, the property owner must file with our office to receive the reduction. Once you are signed up for the program, you never have to renew unless you purchase and move to a different house. CHECK YOUR TAX BILL - if you are receiving this credit, it will be on your tax bill as 2 1/2% Rollback with the reduced dollar amount shown.

5. The Homestead Exemp**tion program.** This program has various guidelines and rules property owners must meet to be approved. One of the most familiar rules ing and living in your home. Other rules and variations to this program include being permanently and totally disabled. This program is complex and application is necessary. You will want to check with the County Auditor's office for more information. Application sign-up for the current program is between Jan. 5-June 7, 2010. You may file a one year late filer application if you missed last year. Those already receiving this reduction will be mailed a renewal application. The renewal application must be returned ONLY if there have been changes as listed on the application form.

6. The Current Agricultural Use Valuation program. It is a state-sponsored, countyimplemented application program providing property tax reductions on farmland of ten acres or more devoted exclusively to agricultural use or for timberlands. The program is available for tracts of land that are less than ten acres, IF the average yearly gross farm income for the past three years is at least \$2,500 from agricultural products. Income must be proven and applications filed. The filing period for CAUV is the first Monday in January through the first Monday in March for NEW applications. The applicant must renew every year by returning a renewal form that will be mailed out. Also, if there is a change in ownership, the new owner must apply for the CAUV program along with paying the appli-

7. Exempt properties. Properties/structures owned by not-for-profit or government entities (i.e. schools, churches, etc.) and used for certain purposes may qualify to be exempt from paying property taxes. This requires an application to be completed through the county auditor's office and forwarded to the State. The State then reviews and makes the decision to approve or disapprove the application. If ownership or use of property changes you must re-apply. 8. Be pro-active and re-

view your property record card. If you haven't reviewed your property record card information recently, the most convenient way to do so is via the county auditor's web site www.pauldingcountyauditor. com. You may also access this information in the auditor's office or at public terminals provided by the auditor's office located in the county recorder and treasurer's offices. You can verify information such as number of bathrooms, fireplaces, square footage, etc. If you believe there are any discrepancies, please notify the county auditor's office to speak with the real estate de-

9. Be an educated voter.

The passive or expiration of a levy can have a significant effect on the tax calculations. Also the type of levy, for example, a replacement levy vs. a renewal levy will increase your tax burden. Property tax revenue is vital in providing many public services, understanding this revenue source is very important. Many taxpayers believe if their valuation decreases their tax burden decreases. This is not correct; many levies are set to provide a stable amount of revenue. Each year the county auditor's office receives "effective rates" from Ohio Department of Taxation that are used to calculate revenue for levies. The State will adjust the rates (up or down) so steady tax revenue is generated. Therefore, in order to generate consistent revenue, you most likely will be paying more taxes if your valuation

BIRD FEEDING

By: Jim Lopshire, Extension Agent

There are many kinds of feeds available to attract birds. You can buy mixes or single types of feeds at supermarkets, livestock feed stores, garden supply stores, or through catalogs. The particular type of mix you put out influences the number and variety of birds that will use feeding places. Until recently, there has been little scientific information to guide the selection of bird feeds.

Studies conducted by the Urban Wildlife Research Program of the United State Fish and Wildlife Service have determined the relative attractiveness of bird feeds. These findings are based on observations of birds choosing between two or more feeds at experimental feeders in sev-

eral states, including Ohio. In these studies, black-striped sunflower and white prove millet were used as standards. All other feeds were presented at experimental feeding tables along with one or both of these standards to measure relative attractiveness.

Sunflower seeds attract most seed-eating birds. The most attractive sunflower seed is the black, oil-type. It costs a little more but is preferred by many smaller species, including chickadees, nuthatches, and titmice. It has a high oil content that is nutritionally important for birds, and a thin seed coat that is easy for them to crack open. If you are going to provide one seed, this is the one to choose.

The striped sunflower seed, slightly larger, is very popular with blue jays and cardinals, but it is difficult for many smaller species to crack open. Sunflower seeds usually are provided in a hanging feeder. A disadvantage of sunflower seeds is that birds crack them open to eat the hearts and then drop the hulls on the ground, creating a mess under the feeder. You may instead opt to buy hulled sunflower seeds, which come without the seed coat. These are more expensive but leave

Another outstanding food is a type of millet, known as

white prove or white millet. White millet attracts house sparrows and brown-headed cowbirds. However, when there are small sparrow-like birds around, such as juncos and song sparrows, white prove millet is needed.

grain—sorghum, wheat, cracked corn, oats, and ricerate significantly below black oil-type sunflower seed or white prove millet in feeding tests. Other relatively unattractive seeds are flax, canary, and rape. A common ingredient in mixes, peanut hearts, strongly attracts starlings. You can discourage house brown-headed sparrows, cowbirds, blue jays, and grackles while at the same time offering a moderately attractive food to cardinals and mourning doves by feeding safflower seeds. Safflower is of little interest to other bird species, however.

The decision to feed wild birds is not a casual one, but the reward can be many hours of relaxation and winter time enjoyment.
