THE TWO RELIGIONS: PART 2

Last week, I started the first part of this article with the shocking quote, "There are only two religions in the world." After hopefully getting your attention, I explained that these two religions were actually systems of religions. There are "do" religions that say you must do something to gain God's approval and earn entrance into heaven and the "done" religion that teaches that Jesus Christ has already "done" everything that is necessary for your salvation.

Anticipating the objection that this is just "my interpretation of the Bible," I quoted verses from the Bible to let you decide for yourself if the Bible is teaching a "do" or the "done" religion. Here's a continuation of those verses:

"Then said they unto him, What shall we do, that we might work the works of God? Jesus answered and said unto them, This is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent." John 6:28-29

"Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith without the deeds of the law."

"Now to him that worketh is the reward not reckoned of grace, but of debt. But to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness."

"But as many as received him (Jesus), to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them who be-

lieve on his name." John 1:12 "Sirs, what must I do to be saved? And they said, believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved..." Acts 16:31-32

"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast." Ephesians

Still not convinced? Then let me ask you another question. Do you remember the thief hanging on the cross next to Jesus in Luke 23:39-45? He had lived such a wicked life that he admitted he deserved to die. He hadn't lived up to the list of any "do" religion by any stretch of the imagination. And now he was in big trouble. Even if he wanted to "turn over a new leaf" and start doing the "dos" of a "do" religion he couldn't. He was hanging on a cross! But because he transferred his trust to Jesus Christ and accepted Him as Lord and Savior of his life, Jesus said to him, "Verily I say unto thee, To day shalt thou be with me in paradise." The thief on the cross received eternal life by faith alone in Christ alone!

To those of you who think that it's faith in Christ PLUS something you have to do after you exercise that faith, such as being baptized, the thief on the cross, Jesus' statement, "It is finished," and the above-cited verses (which are but a sampling of the New Testament teaching on this topic) all clearly refute your

You see, that's what it's really all about. As long as you think you have to do something to please God and earn heaven, you are trusting in yourself. Even if you give a nod

to Jesus and say, "Of course, I believe in Jesus. I believe that Jesus died for my sin, but I'm also trusting in my baptism (or fill in the blank from your "to do" list) to save me," you are still trusting in yourself. But as Ephesians 2:8-9 tells us, salvation is not of ourselves. It is by the totally undeserved favor (grace) of God that is offered as a gift to us that is free for the taking. If it has any strings attached to it—if we have to do anything to earn it—then it's not a gift! The way to accept this

free gift and receive Christ as your personal Savior is to 'believe on the Lord Jesus Christ." (Acts 16:31) To believe on someone is different than believing in them. I believe in George Washington. I believe he existed as a person and I know some facts about his life. But I'm not counting on him to do anything for me. I have knowledge about him and I believe that knowledge to be true, but I am not trusting George Washington for anything. The Bible says that even the demons believe in God this way, so we know that's not enough to get you to heaven. (James 2:19)

Believing on Jesus Christ is more than that. To believe on Jesus is to have knowledge about Him, to believe that knowledge to be true, and then to trust Him for your eternal life. In other words, you must know that Iesus is the Son of God who came to earth to die in order to pay the penalty for your sin, you must believe that there is nothing you can do to pay for your own sin and that Jesus has already done all that needs to be done by dying on the cross, and then place your trust in Him and what He has done rather than anything

If you've never understood this before, but understand it now, why don't you transfer your trust to Christ alone today? It's the Bible way of sal-

CONFESSIONS OF AN EGG COLORER

I have a confession to make. I enjoy coloring Easter eggs. This may sound weird to you, but there's still enough of a kid in me that I get a kick out of dunking Easter eggs into the colored dye and watching those babies turn pastel shades of yellow, blue, pink and lavender.

Some of the most vivid memories I have of growing up are coloring Easter eggs. It was kind of a ritual around our house each year. Back then, we would tear open a package of PAAS colored tablets (does that company make anything else besides Easter egg pills?), and drop them into coffee cups filled with steaming liquid. As I write this, I can still smell the

strong scent of vinegar. The first few eggs I did each year were your standard, one-color eggs. However, once the creative juices starting pumping, we would begin doing two-toned eggs, mixing colors and writing our names on the eggs with this nifty little wax crayon. (Remember Mom would always super-

vise the project. She'd show us how to carefully balance the egg on those little wire holders. Of course, at least one or two eggs would decide to have a mind of its own and jump off the wire, either cracking on the kitchen table or splashing colored dye all over everything. Once we were done ("You

mean the eggs are all gone?"), we would carefully place our trophies into the big Easter basket with the fake green grass. Sometimes we would put stickers on the side of the eggs or punch out the cut-outs on the back of the PAAS box, turning the egg into a duck or little chick. Man, it seems like only yesterday, doesn't it? Easter would come and

go and we'd have Easter eggs to eat for the next week and a half. I remember taking lunches to school in those days and everyday I'd have a leftover Easter egg in my brown bag. Easter would be over, but some of the Easter holiday would spill over into the next few days, as the memory of a holiday gone by would show up every day in my lunch sack.

There's some interesting theology in these memories. Even though Easter would be over, the Easter eggs were still there, carrying the reality of Easter on into the next week. That's really true, isn't it? Easter should carry on into our lives beyond the holiday sea-

Easter is the celebration of Christ's resurrection and His power over sin, death and the devil. It is the hope of believers, because now we can know that same power in our lives when we come into a personal relationship with Jesus. She keeps the patrons busy with field trips including: eating out, shopping, taking walks and going to different places such as Build A Bear, Fort Wayne Zoo, Animal Shelters, Festival of Trees, bowling and picnics at LaFountain Park. The patrons help take care of the facilities cats and birds. The patrons are very happy to be there and very welcoming to

Rachel Steffan is in charge of the Residential Services. She will go into the home and help with day to day activities such as laundry, cleaning, medications and shopping. Children are included in this program with a written waiver for the program. They also attend a Dude Ranch on Wolf Lake in Michigan each year.

ISS also provides nonmedical transportation with modified vehicles for wheel chair access for their patrons.



JOHNSON COUNTY WAR

In the development of the American West, conflicts over land were commonplace in the late 1800's. Over the later years a lot of stories and legends have been made into movies about some of these wars over land and water rights. This is a true story about The Johnson County War or the War on Powder River.

This was a war between the small ranchers and the big ranches in and around Johnson County, Natrona County and Converse County in the State of Wyoming in April of 1892.

It included some lynchings, murders, burning of ranches and lawmen hired killers and ne're-do-wells.

In the early days of Wyoming nearly all the land was public domain, open to cattle raising and homesteading. The large ranchers turned loose large numbers of cattle on the open range and they soon thought they owned the land.

Sometime the large ranchers would ban together to monopolize large tracts of range land to prevent newcomers from settling down in the area.

Now looking back at that time and era, over 120 years ago, this situation took place all over the old west where there was water and grass. The first settlers took over the grazing land and they went by the doctrine known as "Prior Appreciation" or I was here first.

The Wyoming Stock Growers Association (WSGA) included nearly all of the big ranches in Wyoming. They were some of the wealthiest and the WGSA had a lot of political pull in the state and region. They just about ran the cattle industry. They even hired some detectives to watch for cattle rustlers.

Things in this area were always uneasy, but by 1887-1888, after a very cold winter killed off a lot of cattle, a hot dry summer followed made things bad for everyone.

The larger companies began to regulate the flow of water. Some small ranches were burned out and forced out and lots of crimes against the small people were made up. One woman was lynched for horse stealing. One man was hanged for rustling but he had no cattle. Neither one of these were brought to trial, the WSGA just killed them to scare the others off.

There was some horse stealing and cattle wrestling. In 1889, Montana declared war on the rustlers and then Wyoming did in 1890. Like I said, some people were killed by the big ranchers for no reason at all. Some small ranchers were found dead. The WSGA ran rough shod over the whole area. Sort of the Untouchables in reverse.

The Sheriff of Johnson County, Frank M. Clanton, was an employee of the WSGA. It was rumored that he was behind some of the killings. That double lynching really enraged the local people and those killers

went scot free. They even had some near lynchings in 1891, while Clanton was still sheriff.

There was a group of smaller ranchers led by Nate Champion. They called themselves Northern Wyoming Farmers and Stock Growers Association (NWF-SGA). The bigger ranchers warned them to stop operations and black listed them all over the area.

The WSGA formed an expedition of hired gunmen to get rid of all cattle rustlers in the area. Well, what they was going to do was get rid of all the small ranchers.

They had twenty-three hired guns from Texas, four detectives from the WSGA and a number of other volunteers numbering about fifty guns. They hired a retired sheriff called Frank M. Clanton who had turned gunman. Later on in the sheriff's saddle bags was found a list containing the names of a dozen "rustlers" who were to be shot or hanged and a contract of \$5.00 a day plus a bonus of \$50.00 for every rustler shot.

Of course, the so called rustlers were the small ranch owners. This group was called "The Invaders" and "Wollcott's Regulators". These were just hired guns led by the law.

The first target was the ranch of Nate Champion called the KC Ranch. He was a small rancher who was vocal about the big ranchers. He was going to be the first to go. He had to die.

He was in his ranch house on April 8, 1892, with 3 other visitors. The Invaders surrounded his house and waited for daybreak. Two visitors walked down to the nearby Powder River to get water and were captured. The third man named Nick Ray was shot while standing in the cabin door unarmed and died a few hours later. Nate Champion was besieged inside his cabin.

Well, readers, I don't like to continue a story over into next week, but there is a lot more to this Johnson County War. There is a lot more murder and mayhem.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS FOR THE MAY 4TH PRIMARY

Absentee ballots will be available on or after March 30, 2010 for the upcoming Primary Election to be held on Tuesday, May 4, 2010. Polling locations on Election Day will be open from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30

Any qualified Ohio voter may request an absentee ballot without stating a reason. The ballot must be applied for in writing or in person for each election that you wish to cast an Absent Voters Ballot. You may, but are not required to, use the application form prescribed by the Ohio Secretary of State (form 11-A). Your request must contain all of the following information:

- -your name;
- -your signature;
- —the address at which you are registered to vote; —your date of birth; —one of the following: a.
- your Ohio driver's license or state ID number; or b. the last four digits of your Social Security number; or c. a copy of your current and valid photo ID, military ID, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that

—a statement that you are a qualified elector;

—if you want the ballot mailed to you, you will need to include the address to which you want it mailed.

An application by mail must be received by the Board of Elections office by noon Saturday, May 1. Applications by the voter in person must be received by Monday May, 3 the day before the election, by 4:00 p.m. You may not vote in the office on Election Day. You must vote in the precinct where you reside on Election Day. Applications for persons who are hospitalized by a medical emergency will be accepted until 3:00 p.m. on Elec-

If you request an absentee ballot you will not be allowed to vote a regular ballot at your polling location, nor turn in your absentee ballot at your polling location on Election Day. If you return your absentee ballot by mail, the envelope which the ballot is enclosed must be postmarked with a date not later than May 3, or you may deliver your absentee ballot in person to the Board of Elections office no later than the close of polls on election Day to be counted. The polls close at 7:30 p.m.
