reach trip with a young man named Joe who had a difficult time finishing our climb up the backside of Chimney Mountain, part of the Smokey Mountain Chain. My encouragement of Joe to finish reminded me of a similar event that author and Pastor Max Lucado has written about, he said this:

Every Thursday during a Young Life summer camp, four hundred students make the fourteen-thousand-foot climb up Colorado's Mount Chrysolite. Several Young Life leaders and I walked with On one of those trips,

somewhere around the number four thousand, a student named Matthew decided to call it quits. I coaxed him, begged him, and negotiated a plan with him: thirty steps of walking, sixty seconds of resting. Finally, we stood within a thousand feet of the peak. But the last stretch of the trail rose up as straight as a fireman's ladder.

We got serious. Two guys came up beside Matt, each taking an arm. I pushed from the rear; we all but dragged Matt past the timberline and to the awesome view at the

That's when we heard the applause. Four hundred campers on the crest of Mount Chrysolite gave Matt a standing ovation. As I slumped down to rest, a thought stream-rolled my way: There it is, Max, a perfect picture of my plan. Do all you can to push each other to the top. Was this a message from God? Well, it does sound like something he'd say.

The Apostle Paul has something to say about the ministry of encouragement when he says... Romans 15:1-2 (NIV), "1 We who are strong ought to bear with the failings of the weak and not to please ourselves. 2 Each of us should please his neighbor for his good, to build him up."


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CLOTHING GIVEAWAY AT MELROSE UNITED METH-ODIST CHURCH

ON EXPECTATIONS AND EXAMPLES

A little league baseball coach was watching his team take batting practice off a pitching machine. The team was not hitting well at all during this particular practice, much to the coach's chagrin. Nearly every player who stepped into the box was "whiffing" with very few batters making any contact with the ball at all. The coach continued to get increasingly frustrated and upset with the players. Finally, after the sixth batter in a row struck out, the coach threw down his clipboard and stomped onto the field.

'Give me that bat!" he roared. With that, he stepped into the batter's box and barked at his team, "Now pay close attention!"

The first pitch came flying out of the pitching machine and the coach swung and missed the ball. A little embarrassed, he shouted at the assistant coach who was operating the machine, 'Give me another one!"

The second pitch came right over the plate and the coach swung again but did nothing but fan the air.

Composing himself, he readied himself for the next pitch. Right across the heart of the plate it came and the frazzled coach swung on mighty swing. Nothing. The red-faced coach

abruptly turned around and stormed back into the dugout. He glared at the ballplayers and snapped, "That's exactly what you guys have been doing this entire practice! Now get out their and hit the ball!

Pretty quick thinking if you ask me. I'm not sure if I could have come up with a such a comment that fast. But the interesting thing about that story is that it is a picture of so many of us when it comes to the expectations we have for our kids. We want them to straighten up and live right. We're always wanting them to talk right, act right, and do right. In no uncertain terms we explain to them how they are supposed to behave at

school, in church, at Sun-

day School, when they're at a friend's house, etc. We go to great lengths to make sure they do their chores, clean their plates, treat their brothers and sisters kindly, brush their teeth, pick up

But the question that haunts me is this: How good of an example are they seeing in their mom and dad? If I'm the coach of the team, how well am I "hitting the It's awfully easy to correct

their clothes, and on and on.

and discipline our kids when they foul up. But I think that most of the time, what we as parents DO speaks volumes louder than what we SAY. It's pretty tough to tell a child to demonstrate kind-

ness to his brother when he

sees dad lose his temper on a

regular basis. It's pretty tough to expect a child to help out around the house when he never sees dad lift a finger to help clear the table, do the dishes, or pick up things around the house.

It's really hard to expect a child to be honest and tell the truth when he sees mom or dad telling "white lies" to get out of a jam or protect their backside.

Am I advocating perfection on the part of us parents? Hardly. None of us would qualify. What I am recommending, first of all, is to set the standard ourselves by being good examples. We're models for our kids whether recognize that fact

Second, when we as parents blow it, strike out, and flat out mess up... have courage enough to admit it before our children. Parenting doesn't mean we can never make mistakes. But it does mean being big enough to admit it when we do.

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BLACK SWAMP AND BE-YOND

And yet, here is another story about our Great Black Swamp. I will tell you what I know about it in layman's

It covered all or parts of over 11 Ohio counties, plus a good bit of Allen County,

Now as I understand, the whole swamp area was pretty much caused by the clay ground under the top soil. This clay is so compacted it makes it very hard for rain water to drain down through it, just like this spring. Now there are areas in these counties that are covered by a good sandy loam soil but from what I read on this is that the entire outside of this lake was like a sandy beach. For thousands of years and that perimeter is where most of the good ground is (Black Swamp was called a lake.).

For instance that is east and west, north of Hicksville and in the south of Van Wert County. They used to call US

The swamp slowed the migration quite a bit. The bugs and insects were almost unbearable. There was lots of sickness as well as cholera and malaria caused by the wetness and mosquitoes. People could only travel on the ridges or high ground and if they had a covered wagon pulled by oxen or horses, the soft wet ground was almost impossible to navigate. This place was about 40 miles wide and 120 miles long.

After a few years, the settlers didn't want to travel clear around this huge area, it was to time consuming, so people started to try to go through it or to settle that part of the

The tree population per acre was about as thick as could be. This was a part of the Canal Reservoir after it was drained.

The lake was formed about 20,000 years ago by a big glacier up in Wisconsin. I guess they had a global warming and the glaciers melted and the runoff water could not drain clear through the clay ground and this big 4800 square mile of lake or swamp was formed.

It was a nightmare for pioneers as it was full of snakes, cougars, wolves and all kinds of biting flies and insects.

People were traveling through here in the 1800's and starting to settle this area by 1830. It was then that they started to drain the water off.

That area became the holding pond for this whole 12 county water shed, which includes Maumee, Auglaize, Portage and I think part of the Saint Mary's, then also Sandusky, Ottawa, Tiffin and

With the settlers coming, there came the problem of how to drain the mess. Most of the so called roads were laid on top of tree trunks that had been cut to size and dropped down into this abyss and sometimes they sank out of sight. But those corduroy roads helped out somewhat, they at least formed a base or

By about 1850, they were started on the draining problem. Then the railroads came and with it came the local tile draining industry and by the end of that century the problem was about taken care of.

We still have the clay ground, it is not the best in the world, but over the years, the farmers have learned how to farm it. So, along with the know how and all the fertilizers and spray, our farmers do quite well. I know that the elevator in

Antwerp was well established by 1880. It bought and sold like any other elevator plus cattle and feed. So by that time the farmers were raising a little more than they needed. By this time the area was pretty well cleared and drained. All in all this so-called reclaimed area is not a bad place to live. I have lived here all my life, 85 years so far, and will probably die here, but we have a lot of things going for us here.

We really don't have an extreme of weather. Our highs and lows are not that bad, if they come, they don't last long. We have a pretty good four season climate. Our rainfall waivers, sometimes a dry season and in a while it is normal.

In this Paulding County clay it retains the moisture more in a dry season than sandy soil. So if you can get a good crop started and get a rain once in awhile the farmers generally do alright. The common home owners, if he can get a good lawn started in the clay ground, it will usually be beautiful and long lasting.

You can usually get a good well of water if you drill deep enough. Sometimes you get sulfur and you might have to go deeper. Sometimes your city officials put chlorine in the water and it bothers, but that is usually because the State of Ohio says so.

The people who live in this sort of slow area, are darn good friends and neighbors. We back our city and schools and church and are very out

I am very proud to have lived all my life in the area. It would be hard to beat our four season weather or our rainfall per year. We get a bad storm once in a while but, all in all this is a dandy place to live and I enjoy the history part.

REPLANTING SOYBEANS

By: Jim Lopshire, Extension Educator

One of the most difficult early-season management questions that soybean growers ask is "Should I replant a poor soybean stand or leave it alone?" The answer depends on a number of factors, and growers quickly need to make accurate stand and potential vield loss estimates to determine the most profitable course of action. Let's examine the important factors growers must consider when making replant decisions and provides tools and strategies they can use to help them make those decisions.

When a partial stand exist, the decision to replant is tougher because we need to take into account the expected yield of the original stand and the potential yield of the replanted crop. The first step in the process is to get an accurate estimate of the plant population to de-

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termine potential yield. There are two common methods for estimating plant populations: counting plants in a row and using the hula hoop method. No matter which method you use, be sure to count only live plants. Any plant with a stem broken off below the cotyledonary node is considered dead. Plants with missing leaves can recover, but stem damage is more detrimental. Even plants with bruised stems may have difficulty sur-After estimating popula-

tion, use the lists below as a guideline to estimate yield potential based on plant population and planting date. Remember that soybean yields are most affected by weather conditions in July and August, respectively. It is nearly impossible to predict in May or early June what weather events will occur in July or August. Unless you have good reason to believe differently, assume normal weather pat-

Two important issues for the grower to consider in replanting are: 1) the yield of the surviving stand versus yield of a replanted stand and 2) the cost of replanting versus losses resulting from the surviving stand. If the decision is made to replant, consider planting the crop in intermediate- or narrow-row widths. Soybeans planted in mid-June or later flower sooner than normal and do not develop to the same height as soybeans of the same variety planted earlier. Shorter plants may not close the canopy as rapidly as normal, and plants may not be able to use the available radiation and moisture efficiently to maximize

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battle. The Michigan troops had

an easy time reaching Toledo, but the Ohio troops had to slug through the Black Swamp trying to move heavy artillery and battle wagons down the Maumee-Western Reserve Road. They barley made it to Perrysburg, and only after shedding their heavy equipment and supplies in the mud. Luckily, the Ohio troops never had to do battle. Before a real skirmish could take place, Congress awarded Toledo to Ohio and gave Michigan the Upper Peninsula, and President Andrew Jackson dismissed the governor of Michigan, thus dispersing his troops. But the governor of Ohio never forgot his ordeal of trying to get through the Black Swamp. Upon his return to Columbus, he ordered the General Assembly to seek ways to improve road as a military route, especially now that Michigan was to become a state.

The new ditch laws provid $ed \, for \, ditches \, deep \, enough \, and \,$ located strategically enough to drain the entire lake plain into nearby rivers and thence into Lake Erie. People didn't like the idea of paying taxes for these improvements. Nor did they like the state telling them what to do with their property, but they learned to accept these things as the cost of the land and of living in a swamp."

The Great Black Swamp

Even the formation of counties in 1820 and the removal of the Indians in 1830 didn't entice people to come live here in the Black Swamp. Instead, it was a sequence of events brought on by the Ohio-Michigan War of 1835, that humorous episode in the history of state's rights that was to determine whether Toledo would be in Ohio or in the new state of Michigan.

The fracas were brought on by a surveying dispute as to where the Ohio-Michigan border was. One surveyor, Harris, claimed it was north of Toledo. The other, Fulton, claimed it was south of Toledo. When Congress failed to resolve the dispute, the two

governors ordered their militia to Toledo to prepare for

In the subsequent decades, more ditch laws were passed that provided for establishing river channels though formerly inundated areas. This was for extending river watersheds into formerly swamped areas, creating artificial headwaters for many of the rivers, and actually creating rivers in places where they had never been. In turn, "cutting off" the headwaters of sluggish streams like the Portage, channeling them into more direct rapid routes of Lake Erie.
