Because we live in a fallen world, unfortunately disasters, natural or otherwise, happen virtually everyday. The earthquake in Haiti has been a grievous thing to helplessly watch happen. That number is just a drop in the bucket compared to the catastrophic circumstances facing the Haitian earthquake victims. But at least we all know I.D.E.S. (as well as other organizations) is there when disaster strikes and we here don't have to feel helpless on what to do to help. 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

THE ONE TRUE CHURCH THE NEW TESTAMENT CHURCH #2

4. The New Testament <u>church was built by Jesus and</u> bought by His blood.

1. In Matthew 16:13-20 Jesus promised and told His disciples that I will build my church.

2. 1 Corinthians 3:11 tells us that Jesus is the foundation and that man cannot lay another foundation. Isaiah 28:16 tells us this foundation stone was laid by God. Ephesians 2:19-22 tells us the apostles and prophets were built into the temple of the Lord. Also the word of God declared by the apostles and prophets is the foundation of their faith, with Christ being the chief cornerstone. Also read these scripture verses: Matthew 21:42; Acts 4:11; 1 Peter 2:7.

3. Acts 20:28 tells us that Jesus bought his church with his blood. There were no pollutants in this blood, for Jesus did not commit any sin.

5. The one true church has a specific organization.

1. Jesus is the head of the church. Ephesians 1:22-23 tells us that when Christ was raised from the dead Ephesians 1:20, that He was exalted to be the ruler of all things and made the Head of the church; which derives its life from the Head. The body is the spiritual church, living by union with the Head, pervaded by the life of Christ. Please read Colossians 1:18; Matthew 28:18.

2. The New Testament, word of God, Gospel of Christ is its constitution. Please read Mark 16:15; Galatians 1:6-9, these verses tells us there is only one Gospel. 2 Timothy 3:16-17; Revelation 22:18-19.

3. Each congregation is autonomous: please read Acts 14:23; Philippians 1:1; 1 Peter 5:12. Notice that elders were not appointed as soon as the churches were planted. Churches need to take time to know what men are fitted for the office of elder. Notice also that elders were not appointed to preside over a district, but were assigned in every church. Also notice the plurality of elders, in each church, if there are men, who are qualified. If there aren't any men qualified, then the church must continue on until men are qualified. 4. Elders are appointed to oversee local churches Acts 14:23. <u>A.</u> They are called bishops or overseers Acts 20:28; Titus 1:5-7; Philippians 1:1; B. Elders must meet specific qualifications: 1 Timothy 3:1-7; Titus 1:5; C. Deacons are servants of the one true church: Philippians 1:1; 1st Timothy 3:8-13. D. Evangelists, ministers of the word are preachers of

the Gospel: Acts 21:8; Ephesians 4:11; 2 Timothy 4:1-5.

Time is running out for many local communities across the state to partner with the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) on future projects aimed at better access for bicycle users and pedestrians.

ODOT is currently accepting applications for its federally-funded Transportation Enhancement Program, which has invested nearly \$182 million in pedestrian and bicycle projects across the state since the start of the program in 1992.

Transportation Enhancement funds can also be used to improve downtown streetscapes, preserve historic transportation sites, beautify scenic locations, and establish transportation museums.

With approximately \$20 million in future funding available, ODOT's Transportation Enhancement Program targets the state's rural and suburban communities which are not currently served by a Metropolitan Planning Organizations - which have their own Transportation Enhancement efforts.

Communities that are interested in the ODOT funds have less than two weeks left to apply. Letters of interest for Transportation Enhancement funding are due to the department by Febru-

ary 1. Competition is on the rise: in 2008, ODOT received \$24 million in project requests and awarded \$21 million in funding.

While the awards will be announced later this year, this round of funding won't be made available until the 2012 and 2013 fiscal years, giving local communities enough time to finalize planning and identify the required 20 percent matching funds.

In addition to local communities, citizen advocacy groups or other private organizations can also sponsor projects by working with their local government officials.



One of the reasons is because an employee was receiving sick pay from the village as well as workman's compensation checks at the same time, which is illegal. When she informed the mayor, he told her to continue paying him. She did report this; the employee was taken to court and trial. He was never suspended from work or written up. In fact, this was never addressed at a council meeting. Another employee used a village cell phone for private use, a sizable bill and was allowed to pay back in two separate payments and received no other punishment. Another employee used an emergency vehicle for private use. When this was questioned by the clerk... she was quickly terminated. I find it interesting that an emergency vehicle can be used out of state for private use, but our own village residents can't be transported to Van Wert, Ottawa, Lima, or Fort Wayne. Antwerp's "Six-Mile" **Canal Reservior**" Part 2

What held up the water in the canals? The water fed into them by other waterways, of course! The water in the reservoirs! They were located all over plat maps where canals were located, if you looked. Lake St. Mary's at Celina was a canal reservoir that was man-made.

Antwerp's "Six-Mile Canal Reservoir" was located SE of Antwerp. "Old Reservoir Rd." is now the same as is CR 176 or the road local people call the "Cement Plant Road". Six-Mile Creek was the creek that was flooded for the reservoir and is located on the bridge in Section 31.

Work was started on the 'Six-Mile Reservoir" about 1840 and was completed about 1842. Irish immigrants probably worked on it. The creek was cut off and enclosed by embankments; these were formed by clearing away the brush and timbers and standing the timbers on end and packing earth at the bottom of them; then by tramping the earth against the base of the timbers with horses, making a wall on both sides. This was then done all away around the reservoir to hold approximately 3,000 acres of flooded area.

Note: The East embankment of "Six-Mile Reservoir" is still very evident in 2010 while driving on CR 176 through the reservoir. Thus, the "pool" was fortified and a lock was placed on the NE corner of it. This was the first lock that was "blown out" on April 25, 1887. The reservoir ran beside the canal with a lock positioned to let water into the canal as needed. This lock is located on the NE corner. It was located in Crane Twp. Section 31, 29, 30, 32, 28, 33; Carryall Twp. Section 25, 36. (This is approximate because during times of flooding, even though embankments enclosed about 3,000 acres of land, it at times overflowed to 14,000-15,000 acres of land.) This made the land worthless. When the canal was in operation, the public put up with it, but when the rail road came and the canal was no longer in operation, the reservoir became a mud-

dy nuisance (for decades).

Mr. Holtsberry noted he had been advised that a fence has been erected around the property without providing Mr. Powell a key; therefore, not allowing him access to the property at his conve-nience. He relayed the City of Defiance recently settled a case involving a similar issue with American Ag Fuels which cost tens of thousands of dollars to settle. Mr.

Powell had nothing to add. Mayor White noted Mr. Powell may access the property anytime by contact-ing the Paulding Police Department to unlock the gate. Solicitor Jones noted the difference between the Village's situation and that of Defince is that the Definare and that of Defiance is that the Defiance Fire Department limited the property owner's access to the building unless a member of the Fire Department was pres-ent, whereas in Powell's case he merely had to contact the police department. G. Allen Fillman is the Priest of the Divine Mercy of Paulding County that will be two years old this July. He was the Paulding Priest for about 10 years before that.

G. Allen Fillman was born in Defiance County about six miles west of Defiance on US 24. His parents were Bill and Monica. He was the oldest of four boys.

He went to grade school in Sherwood and graduated from Fairview High School in 1969.

On July 1st of 2008, Saint Joseph of Paulding, Saint





It is called the New Madrid Fault as it lays under the town of New Madrid and that is in the state of Missouri now. It is on the Mississippi River close to the Kentucky and Tennessee state line.



There wasn't a lot of damage or loss of life because it was so sparsely populated.

The officials said most of the damage was ground warping, ejections, fissures, a number of landslides and caving in of stream banks. On February 7, 1812, there was another 8.3 quake. This one was felt as far away as Boston and in New York where it rang some church bells. Some sidewalks were broken in Washington D.C.

There were numerous effects on the landscape in the most affected areas, a stream was caused to form Reel Foot Lake in Tennessee and the Mississippi River changed its course creating geographic exclaves including the Kentucky Bend. It is said that the ground heaved up and caused the water to run backwards for a short time.

The officials at that time said the New Madrid Fault put pressure on the Reel Foot Fault (they are both in that area) and caused the trouble. It is said that the Mississippi River at Kentucky Bend heaved up and caused a wave that propagated upstream and caused the formation of Reel Foot Lake. Well, I was told years ago by an old Florida fishing buddy of mine that it didn't happen that way. He said he was there and this is the way it came about. Oh, they had some huge earthquakes alright and that is still a dangerous area. It is said this Reel Foot Rift is over 550 million years old. My old buddy used to fish this area as there was some king-sized catfish that terrorized the people and kept the cattle up on the river banks.

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

MYCOTOXINS IN FIELD CORN

The 2009 corn crop is providing some challenge to grain users due to various levels of mycotoxins that are being found in individual lots of grain. Mycotoxins are mold-produced substances that can be harmful to people and livestock when ingested, inhaled, or come in contact with the skin.

Mycotoxins are toxic substances produced by fungi or molds that grow on grain or feed in the field or in storage. Several mycotoxins are associated with cool and wet conditions. The abnormally cool and wet weather during and after corn silking in 2009 provided optimal conditions for the development of Gibberalla ear rot that resulted in high levels of mycotoxin contamination of harvested grain, most notably vomitoxin or DON. Although there have been localized problems with ear rots in Ohio in past years, the incidence and severity of ear rots and associated mycotoxins this year is more severe and widespread.

Gibberella ear rot is caused by the fungus also known as Fusarium. Fusarium molds are everywhere in a field environment. In 1995, research by Vincelli and Parker found that Fusarium overwinters in the soil, on plant debris, and on or in the seed. Molds and spores may enter the plant through the roots, via pollen transfer down the silks, through the damaged seed, and through plant wounds caused by wind, hail, mechanical damage, or insect feeding. Therefore, eliminating Fusarium is unrealistic.

Corn ear rot can cause problems at the elevator with discounts due to damaged kernels or presence of foreign material, especially when the cob is badly rotted and does not separate well from the grain. Some of the ear rot fungi can cause additional problems because of their ability to produce mycotoxins that can contaminate the grain. If fed to livestock, moldy corn with mycotoxins can cause serious problems and even death, especially in nonruminant and young animals.

LOCAL GROUP PARTICI-**PATES IN A STATEWIDE HOMELESS COUNT**

The Northwest Ohio Housing Coalition joined other communities in Ohio in conducting a "point-intime count" on Tuesday, January 26th. The goal was to identify a realistic count of the number of individuals in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding and Williams counties that are currently homeless or are at immediate risk of homelessness on a given day. These statistics will assist service providers in improving services to the homeless in our community. Local information will be submitted to the Coalition on Housing and Homelessness (COHHIO) to be complied into a statewide report.

This is the fifth year that the Northwest Ohio Housing Coalition has conducted a local homeless count. The 2009 count resulted in the identification of 159 persons found to be homeless and 439 persons who were at immediate risk of homelessness.

The "point-in-timecount" will include three groups of homeless persons; unsheltered homeless, sheltered homeless, and those at immediate risk of homelessness Unsheltered homeless include adults, youth or families living in parks, streets, alleys, tents, campers, vehicles, abandoned buildings, stairwells, under bridges, roadways, farm outbuildings, or 24 hr. laundromats, restaurants or stores. Sheltered homeless include adults, youth or families living in emergency shelters, transitional housing, domestic violence shelters, or any hotel/motel/apt paid by arrangements from a public/private agency. At-risk of homelessness include adults, youth

or families at risk of being homeless within three months, presently residing in substandard housing, temporary housing, or with family/friends.

The Northwest Housing Coalition will be contacting homeless shelters, domestic violence shelters, substance abuse treatment programs, community parks and campgrounds, sheriff and police departments, churches, social service and faith based agencies that provide emergency and supportive services, job placement and temp. agencies, mental health providers, hospitals, emergency rooms, and stress centers, small hotels, veterans organizations, MR/DD programs, 24 hour coffee shops, shopping centers and restaurants, libraries, prisons and jails, public schools, foster care agencies, and bars.

If you are at risk or you have a friend or family member currently living with you and they may become homeless within the next three months, please pass this information on so that it may be included in the local data. The information will be kept confidential. Names are not required only the gender and age of the person will be requested. To report homelessness or for additional information, please contact First Call for Help at 1-800-468-4357 or by dialing 211.







Not everyone is sorry to see temperatures dip below freezing. According to Tim Butcher, Occupational Safety and Health Administration Program Coordinator, many individuals look forward to venturing out onto frozen rivers, lakes and ponds to enjoy skating, ice fishing and other wintertime sports. The problem is there is no such thing as ice that is 100% safe. The depth of water under the ice, size of the water body, water chemistry and currents, the distribution of the load on the ice, and local climatic conditions are all factors that affect the safety of ice. In fact in February of last year 126 people were stranded on a miles-wide ice flow in Lake Erie when it broke free and floated away from the Ohio shoreline.

Whether you ice fish on Lake Erie or skate on your pond, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources offers the following tips for anyone who ventures out on water when it is frozen. The minimum thicknesses for ice safety are: 4 inches of new clear ice for travel on foot, 5 inches for snowmobiles and ATVs, and 8 to 12 inches for cars or small trucks.

Additional safety guidelines when venturing out on frozen water include wearing a life-vest or inflatable, and carry a pair of ice-safety picks. It is difficult to pull yourself back onto the surface of ice, especially when soaked with frigid water. Do not remove your winter clothing. Heavy clothes will not drag you down. They trap air to

If you personally fall in, turn toward the direction you came from and remain calm. Place your hands and arms on the unbroken surface and, using your ice picks, work forward onto the ice by kicking vour feet. If it breaks, repeat the effort. Once on the ice, do not stand; roll away from the hole. That spreads out your weight until you're on solid

Winter in Ohio provides many outdoor activities. If being on the ice is one you enjoy make sure you prepare yourself with as much information and equipment as necessary to do it safely. Remember there is no such thing as absolutely safe ice and its strength varies from spot to spot, constant preparedness is the most reliable strength.
