

SECRETS FROM A SQUASH

By: Pastor Joel DeSelm, **Woodburn Missionary** Church

At Amherst College, reexperimented searchers with a squash seed that had been planted in rich, fertile soil. Eventually, the seed produced a squash as big as a soccer ball. Then the researchers placed a steel band around the squash. Attached to the steel band was a device for measuring "lifting power." The purpose of the experiment was to determine the lifting power of the squash. As the squash continued to grow and to stretch the steel band, months, the lifting power of 500 pounds. Amazing! Within two months, the lifting power went up to 1500 pounds. A month later it was 2000 pounds. It was not until the lifting power had reached an incredible 5000 pounds that the rinds broke. When the squash was opened, he researchers discovered that it had built up a whole network of tough fibers to fight against the pressure that was binding its growth. Moreover, the roots supporting the squash had reached out some eighty thousand feet in every direction, searching for more and more nourishment to strengthen the

Interesting, isn't it? The eason for the squash's a power was outer roots and inner fiber. Only when the plant sent its roots down very deep was it able to develop its inner strength. The depth of the roots determined the strength of its fiber.

The same is true for us. The God who made us has given us His word as rich, fertile soil. We have pressures in our lives that threaten to bind us. It is only as we send our roots down deeper into God's Word, assimilating its truths and internalizing its power, that we develop inner power to withstand those outer pressures. God provides for us "lifting power" that will transform despair into hope, weakness into strength, and fear into

faith. But it will happen only

to the degree that we choose to send our roots down deep into the soil of His word.

Next time you see a squash, pumpkin, or a gourd, think about the experiment they did at Amherst College. Then take some time reading and meditating on the scriptures. I'm sure you could use a little "lifting power."

I've had the privilege of doing a fair amount of trav-

eling and I've stayed in a variety of homes, extravagant and homes that were nothing but a lean-to. I've never stayed or observed a home like the one I read about last week in preaching today.

At first glance Steve

and Kathryn's home might look like a dingy basement apartment. But then you notice that everything rests on crates. You see, Steve and Kathryn live in an underground flood tunnel in Las Vegas. And get this around 700 other people live in these tunnels, too. Day in and day out, they deal with black widow spiders and mosquitoes, but they say it's cooler than the streets, and the cops don't bother them. An article on the site

Asylum.com profiled these flood-tunnel dwellers, saying "they've formed a community, united by a collection of graffiti drawn by resident artists that they call their art gallery." And what else holds them together as a community? There's a fear of flooding, which has killed 20 underground dwellers over the last two decades. In some ways this story



THERE IS HELP AT THE TURNING POINT

By: Sue Knapp "Why Me Lord, What Have I Ever Done?"

This song was written and sung by Kris Kristofferson in 1972. It tells the agony of a man coming to terms with himself and his addictions.

"So how does this pertain to me?" you ask. "Here in Paulding County, come on, we don't have those big city problems. Every thing here is hunky-dory, no alcohol or drug problems here, no sir,

Are you one of those people with their heads in the sand? You don't want to 'dirty' yourself by thinking there is a problem. "Nope, not in my family, not with my kids." Okay, so do you party with your kids or let them watch you party?

Keep on believing it people—think—is the action worth the consequence because you don't want to admit or think on it?

This is about drug, alcohol and sexual abuse in our own Paulding County. What is happening to our families, what is happening to ourselves that we need some kind of addiction so we don't have to feel?

A few years ago right here in Antwerp two little girls were being abused by their mother, father and uncle. What in the world?!? How

many more people must suffer because of someone's addictions.

There is a lady whose father started abusing her when she was little. He hooked her on drugs, so she allowed the abuse to get the drugs. After awhile he started pimping her out and watching it. When the girl was little, her mom left her with the dad.

This is just one of many stories the ladies from the support group at The Turning Point had to tell. These ladies are recovering alcoholics, drug addicts, sexually abused victims and convicts. These ladies have children, they have let their addictions become their priorities, not their children. These ladies have hit bottom, some felt suicide was the only answer. But these ladies are strong and they are survivors. They are coming to terms with their addictions and vying for a life free of them. They are raising their children and their children can see the difference. They can see that mom is trying to get it together for herself, for them. This is about forgiving yourself.

The Turning Point (on McDonald Pike in Paulding) offers a Women's Recovery and Support Group for those women recovering from alcohol, drugs and or sexual abuse. This program is a LSW counselor facilitated program paid for by

a Women's Grant. Miria Minch LSW is a Licensed Social Worker and a Women's Treatment Specialist. She is loving and compassionate with the women but she also doesn't allow excuses and is hard when she has to be. Miria focuses on the sobriety, physical health, social, physiological and spiritual well being of the women. The program offers a way out from addictions. The women learn to replace their addictions with positive things such as family and giving back to others. This helps them to recreate new experiences to take the place of the feelings felt by their addictions. It also give them another perspective on life. One of the ladies has had the opportunity to speak about addictions and recovery to other groups.

topics the whole wellness of the female's mind, body and soul. Women's Treatment is based from Stephanie S. Covington's Helping Women Recover. Substance abuse, addiction, self-esteem, sexism, stigma, trauma, physical and emotional abuse, family relationships, communication, body image, sexual identity, domestic and interpersonal violence, spirituality and self-education through experiential activities are just some of the topics covered.

The women who attend the support groups consider each other family. They cook a meal and clean it up together. They do activities and outings. They are there for each other. They have laughed and cried together, they have shared their sto-

U.S. 30 REST AREA NOW OPEN

A highway rest area facility on U.S. 30 in Allen County near Cairo reopened for use Both the eastbound and

westbound parks on U.S. 30 in Allen County and the northbound and southbound parks on Interstate 75 in Hancock County near Findlay have been closed since May 3 for extensive remodeling.

The I-75 facilities are expected to reopen next week. The upgrade of the parks

was part of a statewide effort which included the remodeling of 44 parks across the The remodeling at each

location includes new walls, plumbing, electrical, fixtures, roofing and flooring. Toilet areas were expanded and energy efficiencies added such as on-demand water heaters, low-flow toilets and more efficient heating and cooling "This is the ODOT busi-

ness plan in action," said Leonard E. Brown, Ohio Department of Transportation District 1 deputy director. "We stated in our plan that we would be a leader in environmentally-responsible government. The energy efficiencies that have been incorporated into these parks will allow us to operate them more efficiently while also providing the public with an improved place to stop and rest," he said.

Under the "Go with Green" initiative in the business plan, the department vowed to achieve LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification for at least 50 percent of its newly constructed or remodeled buildings. The remodeling of the parks is being done to LEED specifi-

cations. LEED is a nationally recognized certification program that has produced a standard in green development and building designs. Developed by the U.S. Green Building Council based in Washington, D.C., LEED promotes the use of environmentally-friendly products and materials.

The parks in Van Wert County on U.S. 30 near Van Wert are also slated to receive the upgrade. Those parks are expected to close today for 150 days.

The whole family went to the Zion Lutheran School for the elementary grades. Clarence graduated from the Woodburn High School in

Right after high school he worked with the corn shellers in the area and at the Woodburn Elevator and he was there for 10 years from 1950-

He met his future wife, Marcille, at Woodburn High School and they were married in 1950. They have two children—daughter, has three children and lives in Woodburn; David has two children and lives in Columbia City.

Clarence took over as manager of the Edgerton Elevator in 1960. While at the Edgerton they increased their grain capacity by over one million bushels. They also took over the Monroeville elevator in 1972 and increased

their holding ability by a million bushels.

When at the Edgerton facility he took some business courses at Purdue. He returned as manager at the Edgerton Elevator in 1992 with a total of 32 years.

He has been a hard worker for the city of Woodburn. He has been on the City Council for over 40 years and also served one term as Mayor. He has also been a member of The Woodburn Lion's Club for over 40 years.

He really hasn't retired. He still keeps very busy with a lot of volunteers. He does a lot of mowing around the



city. He also takes car of some of the flowers on the street with watering as well. He was caretaker at the City Park and where ever else he could.

In the meantime he served on the Indiana State Grain Association for 25 years and was Vice President for many vears. He also served on the Northwest Grain Association for many years. This covered elevator all the way from Ligonier over to Van Wert and Payne. He served as President and on the Board. He unsuccessfully ran for Allen County Commissioner back in 1992. He has volunteered at Parkview for 17 years. His

wife has helped in the gift shop there for twelve years.

We talked about hobbies. He had a cottage at Lake George for many years and did a lot of bass fishing there. He also fished Lake Erie for walleyes. He and his wife like gardening and traveling. They traveled all over Europe for three weeks with a lot of other grain people and really enjoyed it.

COL. WALKER 'BUD' MA-HURIN

Col. Mahurin was the first American to become a double Ace in the Europe Theater. He shot down planes in both the ETO and the Pacific Theater and Korea. He was the only American pilot to achieve this



The Col. was credited with 20.75 kills total. This made him the 6th highest American P-47 Ace. He was credited with 3.5 kills of MIGs-15 in Korea. This gave him a total of 24.5 aircraft that he destroyed

in aerial combat. Walker Mahurin was born in Benton Harbor, Michigan in 1918. I think he had relatives in Fort Wayne because during this war a lot of information on the Pilot War was carried

in the Journal Gazette. Mr. Mahurin was an engineering student at Purdue and in September of 1941 he joined the Army Air Forces Cadet Program. He graduated from this group in April

of 1942. He was shipped to England and joined the 63rd Fighter Squadron and was based at Halesworth. By now he was a Captain and a flight leader flying missions.

His first victory came on August 7th, 1943 when he shot down a pair of Focke-Wolf 190's when he was on bomber escort duty. It was said that one of those pilots was the Great WWII German Ace Adolf Galland who had 55 kills on his record. I had never heard that before.

Mahurin became an Ace on October 4 when he shot down three Messersmitt BF 110's. Then on November 6th he shot down three more BF 110's. That made him the first American Pilot to score 10 aerial victories. His primary plane was the P47-D.

He was promoted to Major in March of 1944, and on March 27 his plane was shot up badly by a German Dornier Bomber that he helped down,

forcing him to bail out. He was picked up by the

French Resistance Forces and was returned to England two months later. He was grounded and sent home from the ETO because of his knowledge of the F.R.F. (French Resistance Forces).

In October he was shipped over seas to the 3rd Air Command Groupe in the Philippines. In January of 1945 he was credited with a Jap bomber. He was promoted to Lt. Col. and was the Commander of the 3^{rd} Air Commission Group in September of 1945. When the Korean War

started he was working in the office of the Secretary of the Air Force. In July of 1951 he was made Commander of the First Fighter Group Training with the North American F-86 Saber Fighters. He was assisting Col. Gabry Gabreski but then was sent to the 4th Interceptor Group in March of 1952.

On March 13, 1952, he was shot down by North Korean ground fire. When the plane crashed he broke his arm and was captured by enemy forces. He spent sixteen months in a P.O.W. Camp. His treatment was very bad and he was forced to write some notes that America used biological warfare. He did this to save his life but the way he worded the statement everyone realized it was not true.

After his release from prison, he helped teach American soldiers how to get along with that cruel and inhuman treatment by the Asians. He had been released in September of 1953 and promoted to Full

But Colonel Mahurin was forced to resign from the Air Force because he wrote those confessions in Korea. His service fell four years short of retirement privileges.

I wonder what those Gold Braids would have done if they had been in his place with a North Korean's saber at his throat.

Colonel Mahurin died in March of 2010 at the age of 91. He served his country from 1941-1956.

This reminds me of a line in a great poem, 'The Harpies of the Shore. I shall Pluck the Eagle from the Sea.'
