BOYCE PROVIDES

TORNADO DAMAGE
IN CENTRAL AND
NORTHWEST OHIO

Treasurer Kevin L. Boyce is offering emergency financial relief programs for Ohioans affected by tornado damage in Allen, Auglaize, Van Wert, Franklin, Fayette, Pickaway and Paulding counties. People can apply now for financial relief through the Treasury's Renew Ohio and Rebuild Ohio programs. The Treasurer is initiating these programs for residents, farmers and business owners. There is no minimum damage threshold required to apply for a loan.

"The Ohio Treasury is here to make sure people have the support they need as they recover from these sudden losses," said Treasurer Boyce. "Through the Treasury's linked deposit programs, \$10 million has been allocated to the Renew Ohio and Rebuild Ohio programs to provide an up to three percent interest rate reduction on new and existing loans."

Renew Ohio will assist homeowners financing the restoration of their homes through the use of construction loans by providing an up to three percent interest rate reduction on those loans for up to a one-year period. Small business owners and the agricultural community can apply for priority rate reduction assistance though the Treasurer's GrowNOW Program.

The deadline to submit an application for a Renew Ohio or Rebuild Ohio loan is Janu-

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# TAYLOR RINGERS IN CONCERT

The Taylor Ringers, directed by Dr. Keith Kunda, from Taylor University in Upland, Indiana will be performing at First Presbyterian Church, 114 West Caroline Street, Paulding, Ohio on Friday, November 19 at 7:00 p.m. This concert is free and the public is most welcome to attend.

The Taylor Ringers is an advanced choir that rings five octaves of English handbells. The group consists of thirteen college students (five men and eight women), all of whom have had previous bell ringing experience. The group rehearses two hours per week and performs a variety of musical styles, mostly levels 3, 4, and 5. Founded in 1982, the group has performed in various churches throughout the nation as well as at various music education conventions and bell choir festivals. In addition, the group has presented programs in Eastern Europe (Hungary and Czechoslovakia) in May, 1992, in the Holy Land (Israel and Jordan) in May, 1996, in Ireland in March, 2000, in Eastern Europe (Czech Republic and Ukraine) during the spring of 2004, and Ecuador during the spring of 2008.

# **Woodburn Missionary** Church

Some of us remember Neil Armstrong stepping on the moon like it happened yesterday. I remember being glued to the tube, like millions of other American's and watching that historic moment unfold before my eyes. Every kid in the U.S. wanted to be an astronaut in those days. Neil Armstrong and his "small step" became household words.

Let me throw another name at you – Buzz Aldrin. Sound familiar? Buzz Aldrin was the second man to step on the moon. Sometime back in a television interview, he told of the years of education, the hard work and dedication, the dreams and rigorous discipline he spent preparing for that historic mission with Neil Armstrong to the moon. Yet, during the interview, Aldrin also told of his later emotional breakdown and slow, painful recovery. This crisis didn't have anything to do with the moon or with space travel or weightlessness. What caused it? Over and over again, Buzz Aldrin kept saying that the breakdown resulted from the terrible disillusionment he felt after working so hard, achieving every goal set before him, and then finding it all empty when it was over.

He documented those long, dark days of despair in a book he wrote entitled *The* Moon Was Not Enough. I've got that book on my shelf in my office. It is a testimony to the truth of the scripture that says, "a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." In short, there is more to life than the accumulation of things or the accomplishment of success as the world defines it.

Isn't it funny, though, how materialistic issues are so often the central focus of our thinking? The pursuit of some achievement or something on our "wish" list rushes to the center stage of our minds and monopolizes our motivation, our dreams and our energies. And after achieving the goal or purchasing the object, it very quickly loses its lustre.

The psalmist's perspective is alien to our lifestyles, where he states in Psalm 16:11, "In Thy presence is fullness of joy; in Thy right hand there are pleasures forever." What David is saying is this: Real joy, genuine pleasure and true fulfillment are found by being in a proper relationship with God. How easy it is to SAY that is true—how difficult it is to LIVE OUT that truth!

My friend, we need to recapture a sense of what is truly valuable and what will bring us real fulfillment. Contrary to what you read in the magazines or see on the TV, having more money, more things, a bigger home, a better job, a new car will not bring us peace and joy. Those priceless treasures are found only by being in proper relationship with Jesus Christ and living in harmony with His Word. All that other stuff is simply not enough. Ask Buzz Aldrin.

# **ALL ARE A PART OF ONE**

### Winning the Battle for a Generation Column by: Rick Jones, Executive Director, Defiance Area **Youth for Christ**

I've had many conversations with people who for one reason or another, believe that their contribution to work and church aren't that important. However, nothing could be further from the truth.

In his sermon "Blowing Your Horn," Richard Love shares this: "Sir Michael Costa, the celebrated conductor, was holding a rehearsal. As the mighty chorus rang out, accompanied by scores of instruments, the piccolo player—a little pintsized flute-thinking perhaps that his contribution would not be missed amid so much music, stopped

"Suddenly, the great leader stopped and cried out, Where is the piccolo?'

"The sound of that one small instrument was necessary to the harmony, and the master conductor missed it when it dropped out. The point? To the conductor there are no insignificant instruments in an orchestra. Sometimes the smallest and seemingly least important one can make the greatest contribution and even if it doesn't seem to make that big a difference to the audience at large, the conductor knows it right away! "In church and everyday

work the players and the instruments are diverse—different sizes, different shapes, different notes, different roles to play. Like the piccolo player in Sir Michael's orchestra, we often in our own sovereignty decide that our contribution is not significant. We think that our contribution couldn't possibly make a difference, so we quit playing, stop doing that which we've been given to do. We drop out, but the Conductor immediately notices. From our perspective, our contribution may be small; but from His, it is crucial.

"I just have to believe I'm talking to some piccolo players who have dropped out of the orchestra for whatever reasons: pain, exhaustion, insecurity, criticism, laziness, misbehavior. Convinced that your contribution doesn't mean a hill of beans in the bigger scheme of things, you have buried your talent in the ground. Please, please don't make that mistake!

With regard to the body of Christ, its individual members and unity the Apostle Paul put it this way... 1 Corinthians 12:19-26 (NIV) 19 "If they were all one part, where would the body be? 20 As it is, there are many parts, but one body. 21 The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I don't need you!' And the head cannot say to the feet, 'I don't need you!' 22 On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, 23 and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, 24 while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honor to the parts that lacked it, 25 so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. 26 If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices

A. Foolishness is a form of sin; Proverbs 24:9 the devising of foolishness is sin and the scoffer is an abomination

to men. NKJV. B. Foolishness comes from the heart; Mark 7:20-23; and he said, what comes out of a man, that defiles a man. For from within, out of the

heart of men, proceed evil

thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders, thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, an evil eye, blasphemy, pride and foolishness. All these evil things come from within and defile a man. NKJV. C. Foolishness is known by

God; Psalms 69:5 O God, you know my foolishness; and my sins are not hidden from you. 2. The consequences of

foolishness;

A. Foolishness brings sorrow; Psalms 38:4-6 for my iniquities have gone over my head; like a heavy burden they are heavy for me. My wounds are foul and festering because of my foolishness. I am troubled, I am bowed down greatly; I go mourning all the day long. B. Foolishness twists a

man's way; Proverbs 19:3; the foolishness of a man twists his way, and his heart frets against the Lord. NKJV. C. The message of the

cross is foolishness to those who are doomed for the second death; 1 Corinthians 1:18. For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. NKJV.

D. Foolishness of the message works toward faith; 1st Corinthians 1:21 for since, in the wisdom of God, the world through wisdom did not know God; it pleased God through the foolishness of the message preached to save those who believe. NKJV.

"Having undertaken for the glory of God and advancement of the Christian faith and honor of our king and country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of Virginia, do by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one of another, covenant, and combine ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation, and furtherance of the ends aforesaid; and by virtue hereof to enact, constitute and frame such just and equal laws ordinances, acts, constitutions, offices from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the colony; unto which we promise all due submission and obedience.

'In witness whereof we have hereunder subscribed our names; Cape Cod the 11th of November, in the year of the reign of our sovereign lord King James, of England, France and Ireland, eighteenth and of Scotland fiftyfourth, Anno Domini 1620."

### A GLIMPSE OF THE WINTER **AHEAD & A MORE OMI-NOUS FUTURE IN STORE**

Last week, in Northwest Ohio, we were well above record temperatures as we had temperatures reaching the upper 60's and lower 70's. According to The Weather Channel and NOAA, the first five days of November were slightly below average across the Eastern United States but the period from November 6-14 was one of the warmest on record only behind 1968 as record warmest. For the next several days, temperatures will drop quite a bit from what they have been so far this November. In fact, our temperatures will be normal to slightly above normal until Thanksgiving week, when an arctic cold wave will plunge southward out of Canada and cause our temperatures to drop from the upper 40's and lower 50's to the mid 30's by the end of Thanksgiving and possibly on Thanksgiving Day itself. Forecasts are still pretty blurry as to whether or not there will be a snowstorm before November is over. This all depends if the arctic wave comes during Thanksgiving week (like it is supposed to)

and if it gets cold enough for several days for snow to fall. In the meantime, it could possibly snow this Thursday when temperatures might hit the upper 30's and lower 40's allowing for snow and rain to fall. Even though NOAA, Accuweather, and The Weather Channel are all predicting a major arctic blast at the end of this week, the ten day forecast is looking very

sketchy as to whether it will

be in the 50's or 30's.

But other than that, I think it will be very likely that an arctic blast will come causing temperatures to dip to the 40's and 30's, and then another cold blast will rush through at the very end of November—around the 26th—causing our temperatures to fall even further to the upper 20's. This would lead to the possibility to a major snowsform in the first week of December and the period from Thanksgiving to Christmas could be one of the coldest times this winter other than in late February and early March.

Last weekend, a rare snowstorm occurred over Minnesota, parts of Wisconsin and northern Iowa. The National Weather Service and NOAA at first were unsure if there was going to be a snowstorm in this region, but then by Thursday, November 11, 2010, they had already issued a Winter Storm Watch for East Central Minnesota

to Northwestern Iowa. This

over Colorado on Wednesday and then dumped snow on the panhandle of Texas while intensifying over the central plains on Thursday and Friday. Snow started to form in a band on Friday Night when temperatures fell below freezing which stretched from Iowa to the Twin Cities. Overnight, many areas saw one to four inches of snow before the snow began to intensify and become heavy for most of the morning on Saturday dumping as much as 11 inches of snow over areas surrounding the Minneapolis and St. Paul area. By Saturday evening, though, snow tapered off, leaving behind official snow totals around the Twin Cities and other areas of up to 13 inches. As temperatures warm up in this region, clean up will be much easier—for electric companies fixing power lines; and tree trimmers, and for snowplows

As most of the northern part of the nation has already had a first glimpse of winter, I think that this is pointing to a more ominous future in store. If forecasting signals and signs are right, then a large cold dome will build over Alaska and northern Canada. Depending on its size, cold waves will be very frequent over the northern tier and possibly reaching as far south as the Gulf Coast. This is why I think that November and December will be the harshest months for the East Coast and the southern United States before a southeastern ridge builds caused by a positive NAO and the La Nina. During the summer, in our area, the jet stream has been avoiding our area and has been causing storms to move to the north and west of us. This will not be the case this winter. Because of the extent of the below average temperatures in Canada and in the northern US, the jet stream will remain much farther south over the course of this winter causing storms to run through the Ohio Valley and with our area in

Even though I don't really see a significant snowstorm coming for this November, I think that Thanksgiving week, there will one or two major Lake Effect Snow events.

Now next week I will be giving my last winter forecast before the winter starts. So remember to keep reading and I will keep you updated.





Neville joined the Illinois National Guard on October 23, 1939. He trained at Fort Carson and joined the 331st. Infantry Regiment of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division. He served in Europe and was in the Ardennes Rhineland on Central Europe Campaigns as a platoon leader.

He was wounded along the Weser River on April 7th, 1945. He took a round in his right arm and he nearly bled to death. He was discharged in October of 1945.

After he got out of the service he made a couple of films with the U.S. Army Signal Corp. and then he attended the Geller Drama School in L.A. On the G-I Bill.

He started on the big screen in 1950. Then he played in Love Me Tender and he was the villain who killed the character of Elvis.

He was generally the bad guy because he was not handsome and he had a scratchy voice. He must have appeared in over one hundred roles, but the one he is remembered for mostly is as Al Capone in the Untouchables and as George Raft in another movie.

### **VETERANS DAY IMPORTANT OPPORTUNITY TO RECOG-NIZE SERVICE, SACRIFICE OF OUR MILITARY HEROES**

Most Americans could probably tell you where they were on the morning of September 11, 2001, the day that 19 al-Qaeda terrorists hijacked four passenger airplanes, slamming two into the World Trade Center in New York City, flying the third into the Pentagon outside Washington, D.C. and crashing the remaining aircraft into a field in Pennsylvania after the heroic efforts of the passengers and flight crew to try to retake control of the plane. These senseless attacks killed nearly 3,000 people and continue to have a dramatic impact on our country and the world.

Shortly after the tragic events of 9/11, the U.S. launched the War on Terror in Afghanistan and Iraq in an effort to root out terrorists and prevent future attacks on our homeland. Today, thousands of men and women in our nation's armed forces continue to put their lives on the line in the Middle East and other parts of the globe to protect this country and defend our freedoms. Sadly, thousands of other soldiers, including hundreds of Ohioans, have bravely and selflessly died

for this worthy cause. On Wednesday, November 10, the Ohio House and Senate will hold a joint ses-

sion at Veterans Memorial in Columbus to present the Ohio Military Medal of Distinction to the families of 190 Ohio servicemen and women who have lost their lives fighting for our state and country since 9/11. The Ohio General Assembly established this honor in 2009 through passage of Senate Bill 248 as a way to recognize the service and sacrifice of our state's fallen soldiers. In addition, Ohio voters

sent a resounding "thank you" last November to all the Ohio military personnel who have served and continue to serve our country in the Middle East and other parts of the world. Nearly 75 percent of voters approved State Issue 1, a constitutional amendment that authorized the sale of \$200 million in bonds to help grant cash bonuses to Ohio veterans of the Persian Gulf, Iraq and Afghanistan wars, as well as members of the armed forces who were stationed elsewhere during these conflicts.

State officials officially launched the Ohio Veterans Bonus Program in August. Under the program, Ohioans who served on active duty with the U.S. Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, Coast Guard and the Ohio National Guard in the Persian Gulf, Iraq or Afghanistan can receive a bonus of \$100 per month of service, up to \$1,000, while members of the armed forces who were stationed elsewhere during that time can receive \$50 per month of service, not to exceed \$500. In addition, a \$5,000 death benefit may be available for the families of soldiers killed in the line of duty.





THE UNWANTED VISITOR

Fall is upon us and now is the time when homeowners will notice mice moving in for a winter visit. The deer mouse and the white-footed mouse make their way into homes in search of winter shelter after having spent the spring and summer outdoors raising their young and foraging. The house mouse, on the other hand, will live year-round in your home without the seasonal migration.

Mice are nocturnal creatures, and, therefore, are rarely seen by the homeowner. The most obvious indicators of their presence are droppings, sounds of them running, gnawing or squeaking, or damage to stored food or materials used for nesting.

To control mice, you need to keep in mind their behavioral traits. Mice are able to squeeze through extremely small openings narrower than the diameter of a dime. Mice prefer to travel adjacent to walls and other edges. Mice are very inquisitive and will investigate each new object placed in their foraging territory.

To avoid seasonal mice visits, exclusion is the preferred method. Look for gaps where the siding meets the foundation or where pipes and other utilities enter. Good sanitation and food storage practices are helpful in reducing problems with house mice. However, because mice are able to occupy such small nesting areas and survive on minute amounts of food, sanitation alone will not normally eliminate an existing infes-

For mice already inside, snap and box traps work effectively. The snap trap can be baited with cheese, peanut butter or moistened rolled oats. Set traps at right angles to the wall, with the trigger end touching the wall as mice travel along the edges of and behind objects, where they are less visible. To improve your chances of catching mice, set multiple traps in different locations, where you see the most ac-

Box traps vary in design and all are live traps. They work without bait, relying on the mouse's natural curi-

PH: 419-258-2000 • FAX: 419-258-1313 • info@westbendnews.net osity. If you have many mice, consider the multiple-catch box traps. Set these traps in the same locations described above. Live-trapped mice can be released outside.

Other options include poisons which can be a risk to pets and children and often means mice die in inaccessible places, which can cause odor problems. Use glue boards with caution because the mouse caught in the trap may still be alive. As for ultrasonic devices, independent research has not shown them to be effective at rodent control.






