CAN TOXIN LEVELS INCREASE WHILE THE GRAIN IS IN STORAGE?

Mycotoxin levels in corn can certainly increase in storage if storage conditions are inadequate. If there are warm, moist areas or pockets in the grain, mold will continue to develop, causing the grain to deteriorate further and toxin levels to increase. Aeration is important to keep the grain dry and cool, and if not done appropriately, pockets of warm, damp areas will develop due to the metabolic activity of the grain and microorganisms.

Stored grain is still alive and as such carries on respiration. Two end products of respiration are water and heat, exactly what the fungus needs to grow and produce toxin. In addition, kernels close to the walls of the silo tend to be at a lower temperature than kernels towards the center and the exchange of warm air from the center with cool air from the top or sides of the silo may lead to further moisture build up, due to condensation. However, it should be

noted that while cool temperatures, air circulation, and low moisture levels will minimize fungal growth and toxin production, these will not decrease the level of toxin that was already present going into storage.

Some storage guidelines that are recommended to minimize problems associated with kernel rots and mycotoxin contamination include:

-Drying harvested grain to 15% moisture and below to prevent further mold development.

-Store dried grain at temperatures of 36 degrees to 44 degrees Fahrenheit in clean, dry bins. Moderate to high temperatures are favorable for fungal growth and toxin production.

—Periodically grain for mold, insects, and temperature.

If mold is found, send a grain sample for a mycotoxin analysis to determine if toxins are present and at what level. The presence of a fungus known to produce toxins is not proof that the stored grain contains injurious levels of toxin. It may be a good investment to collect a representative sample and send it to a laboratory for chemical analysis.

After his return from the Army, he was hired by ITT as they make Air Traffic Control equipment and that has been his field.

When his company would sell some of the A.T.C. equipment he would train some of the country men on how to install and maintain it.

If a country had some trouble with said equipment

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Bob was the person sent over there to repair it.

Bob was sent to Norway to repair a unit and I asked about the customs and the food and drink. He said that at breakfast they had cheese and an egg held in a tall glass. Well, he didn't know what to do, so he waited until the other folks broke a hole in the shell and ate it with a spoon. But lunch and dinner were about the same as ours.

Bob said sometimes he had to call his wife and have her pack his suitcase and then meet him at the airport. He said that his wife, Maxine, was always very

He had an 8:30 a.m. flight to Saudi Arabia. He stopped at Heathrow in England first. He said his flights were usually first class. He then went on to Vesroy.

On one trip he flew from Chicago to Copenhagen and then on to Jetta. In Saudi Arabia there was two million Muslims making their pilgrimage to Mecca. At the airport tower they told him all the streets were covered with sleeping people and not to step on them. Muslims are expected to make that pilgrimage at least once in their lifetime. They came from all over the world. The city of Mecca was about 20 miles away. All of that area was off limits to other people.

While Bob was in Saudi Arabia, two Palestinian men were caught stealing. After the hearing their right hands were severed just below the thumb and people had to watch all this action to impress upon them not to

On another flight, the one to Norway, as he returned to his hotel room there was a cigarette butt in his ashtray and Bob didn't smoke. He was a little nervous about this. But I'll bet he was under surveillance at most of the cities he was in.

When he left Copenhagen, he flew to Frankfort in Germany. He had to lay over one day and left there at 5:30 p.m. on Monday for a flight to Bombay, India, then to Singapore, then down to Indonesia and arrived there at 4:00 p.m. Tuesday, a long tiring flight of 23 hours.

Nobody met him at the airport. There was a mix up on the dates. A fellow said to use the paging system. But it didn't help, this man used broken English and told him to exchange his money. Bob told the bank teller to put the big bills on the bottom so he wouldn't over pay.

A sign said to use Blue Bird Taxi service. The driver grabbed his suitcase and headed across the parking lot to his taxi, a 1952 Chevy. He was going to put Bob's suitcase in the trunk of the taxi but Bob said company policy wouldn't allow that. Or never give anyone your passport, you won't get it back.

A policeman came up and took Bob to the hotel. Due to the mix-up Bob didn't have a reservation. This was a scare

but he got a room anyhow.

While he was in Indonesia he met a fellow who used to work in Fort Wayne with him. They went out to a restaurant to celebrate Bob's 34th birthday with a big seven course meal with salads and a number of meats. His friend said, "You

don't want any of that one,

that is the stomach of a

monkey." Nearly all the food was spicy. Bob said that nearly all of the airport towers had a man that could speak English. But you needed an interpreter for the technicians. Bob was there two weeks. The people

were very friendly. His wife, Maxine, and the kids were going to call on his birthday, but due to the date line they were a day off.

He took a flight from Indonesia to Tokyo. This flight two weeks earlier had been hijacked to Bangladesh. Bob was a little worried about

So his flight was from Tokyo nonstop to Chicago then on to Fort Wayne and home. He had traveled all the way around the world.

I hope you have enjoyed this story about some of Bob's trips. I just think this little town of Antwerp is blessed to have a fellow who goes anywhere to set up and repair Air Traffic Control equipment. Many lives have depended on his expertise.

Bob, I know I speak for all of Antwerp when I say, 'We're proud of you!"

I know that there were many times when he was thousands of miles from home and knew no one and that he was a little nervous and scared. But Bob said when he went to the hotel at night he had his Bible and church books and prayed a lot for guidance and support. He had the best helper he could get.

He was born in Maumee Township in Allen County, IN in 1913. His parents were Ernest C. and Carrie Byroade. He had one brother and one

He wanted to attend Yale University but at that time money was very tight and he could not afford that. He managed to get an appointment for West Point and graduated from there in 1937.

He married Mary K. Richards in 1937 and they had three boys.

He was an intelligent officer and rose quickly up the ladder. He was a temporary Brig. General by the time he was 32 years old in 1946. He was the youngest General in the U.S. Army.

In 1949 until 1952, he was assigned to the State Dept. for German Affairs. In 1952 he resigned his Army Commission and then joined the State Dept. and was still in his 30's.

He tried to be a go-between between the Israelis and the Arabs back in 1954 and that was an impossible job. In 1956 he was transferred to South Africa because he couldn't satisfy everybody, they all wanted their own way.

From then on he was an Ambassador to five other countries. He was a very intellectual man and his advise

and suggestions were generally accepted.

He was divorced from his first wife, Mary K. Richards in 1961. He was married to Jitka Donda Henson and they had one daughter and two

He died at the Suburban Hospital in Bethesda, Maryland on December 31st. He was 80 years old and lived in Bethesda. The cause was Cardiopulmonary Arrest and some complications from a cancer surgery in June of that year. He was buried January 10th of 1994 in Arlington National Cemetery.

He served his country faithfully and well for 40 years retiring in 1977. See Ya!

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



In February a focus on checking over school work to make the best possible choices will be a school-wide topic. As parents/guardians you can help by having your child check over their homework before having you check it. When students are able to find and correct their own mistakes this reinforces learning and self esteem.

Math is difficult for some students but with practice children gain confidence that they have the skills needed to do their work. Here are some tips to help your child do well in

1. Help them master the basic facts. (Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division)

Mastery of a basic fact means that children can give an answer in less than three seconds. Considerable drill is required for children to give quick responses. Use basic facts. When they don't know an answer, have them lay out objects to solve academic success. the problem or draw the problem on paper.

2. Encourage them to write their numbers

main problems can be traced back to sloppy number writing. keep the numbers in problems neatly aligned.

3. Show them how to handle their math homework.

Doing math homework reinforces the skills your children are learning in class. If they are having difficulty at home or you do not understand how your child is to complete an assignment let your child's teacher know.

4. Explain how to solve word problems. Teach your children to read a word problem several times. Also, have them draw a picture or diagram to describe it.

5. Teach them how to do math "in their head.'

One of the major ways to solve problems is by using mental math. Kids should use this method frequently instead of using pencil and paper or a calculator. When helping your children with a problem, help them determine when it would be appropriate to use mental math.


