Driving south on 49 out of Payne you will see a lot of construction going on. This construction is one of Paulding County's way of going green.

Horizon Wind Farm's, Project Timber Road Wind Farm is in it's first phase. This phase is in Benton Township on the Paulding-Van Wert County Line. The tower is up for the first turbine. They are getting ready to put the turbine blade up. The blades are nearly 200' long and there will be 3 blades on each tower. There will be a total of 55 turbines in Benton Township. The Benton Township phase will be done by the end of June of 2011.

The second phase is in Harrison Township which will hold another 55 turbines and phase 3 will be in Blue Creek and Paulding Townships. These turbines will be scattered all over these townships. The power generated from these turbines will be sold to AEP.

Erin Bowser, Project Manager with Horizon is quoted, "These are the first utility scale wind farms in Ohio."

NOTHING TO FEAR IN DEATH

Winning the Battle for a Generation Column by: Rick Jones, Executive Director, Defiance Area Youth for Christ

I met with an elderly person recently who has been informed that they may not have long to live. One of their questions for me had to do with fear and the prospect of dying. I assured them that for those who have placed their faith in Jesus Christ, He does not let us die alone, or as the Psalmist tenderly put it, "Yea though I walk through the Valley of the Shadow of Death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me, your rod and your staff, they comfort me. Life's stages may not be easy, but we need not fear.

For example, one of the commencement traditions at Harvard University is Senior Class Chapel. On the morning of their graduation, seniors gather in Memorial Church to hear the minister offer words of solace and encouragement as they leave 'the Yard" to take their places in the world.

The 1998 senior class heard the unvarnished truth from the Rev. Peter Gomes, minister at Harvard and the author of several books on the Bible, including The Good Book and Sermons. In his gentle ringing tones, that call to mind a cross between a Shakespearean actor and the TV sitcom character Frasier, the inimitable Doctor Gomes took no prisoners as he began:

"You are going to be sent out of here for good, and most of you aren't ready to go. The president is about to bid you into the fellowship of educated men and women and,"-and here he paused and spoke each word slowly for emphasis—"you know just - how - dumb - you - really are." The senior class cheered in agreement.

"And worse than that," Doctor Gomes continued, "the world-and your parents in particular-are going to expect that you will be among the brightest and best. But you know that you can no longer fool all the people even some of the time. By noontime today, you will be out of here. By tomorrow you will be history. By Saturday, you will be toast. That's a fact – no exceptions, no extensions." "Nevertheless, there is reason to hope," Doctor Gomes promised. "The future is God's gift to you. God will not let you stumble or fall. God has not brought you this far to this place to abandon you or leave you here alone and afraid. The God of Israel never stumbles, never sleeps, never goes on sabbatical. York City. Then one magical day arrives. James receives a magical seed that turns into a giant peach. James and The Giant Peach is a story of suffering, triumph, and overcoming obstacles as James floats and flies across the ocean with the giant peach

to New York City. At the end of the movie, after James arrives in New York City, his aunts appear and attempt to take credit for the peach, so they can profit off of it. James tries to get people to believe the truth when he explains the magical, wonderful, yet unbelievable story that caused the giant peach to arrive in New York City.

The aunt retorts in a slithery voice, "This is all something he dreamed up."

James finds courage and replies, "Well, maybe it started that way. As a dream, but doesn't everything. Those buildings. These lights. This whole city. Somebody had to dream about it first. And maybe that is what I did. I dreamed about coming here, but then I did it."

Everything starts with a dream. When the Holy Spirit came upon the early church, Peter quoted from the prophet Joel, "And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams; even on my male servants and female servants in those days I will pour out my Spirit, and they shall prophesy. It gives us the strength to see a world that is not yet and go after it. No longer do we have to stop dreaming as we age. We can dream, and we can change into that which we dream.

May we continue to dream, and may we, as followers of Jesus, dream His dreams. May His dreams become reality because we never give up on dreaming them. It probably won't be a giant peach, but it will be a better world.

It will be conducted from 9 a.m.-noon in the Paulding Kiwanis Building.


Chamber board chairman Melinda Krick and PCED director Tony Langham are spearheading the project.



CONTINUE TO HONOR VETERANS

The dedication of the All Veterans Memorial in the summer of 2010 at Antwerp, Ohio, was the end of one project and the beginning of another. While working on the memorial the committee heard unending stories from families and friends of our honored veterans. They said, "You should put them together in a book". That is now the next project.

The V.E.T.S. committee has been dissolved and all remaining funds will be placed in an account for future use at the memorial site. A new core committee has been formed, the VETS Continuous Honor Committee (VETS-CH). The officers are as follows: Lori Manon and Judy Steele

are co-chairpersons, Karen Sanders and Starlet Levy are co-treasurers, Sandra Wann is recording secretary. They welcome other interested persons to join them.

The purpose of this new committee is to publish a book of memories that will include a time-line of the memorial beginning with the earliest history of the Civil War Monument to the completion of the All Veterans Memorial. A book that will be an extension of the memorial, to continuously honor all Veterans. The committee desires to include information that would be submitted from the public. They would like to have photos of veterans in uniform. Letters/cards, etc. from veterans to someone back home. A biography of the veteran telling what they had done before serving, what they did while serving. What they came home to and did with the remainder of their life. A remembrance of their service and why it is special to the veteran or family member/friend. How their military experience affected their life after service.

The committee has a scrapbook that was compiled while working on the memorial, but that is not complete in itself. They welcome anything that the public can share about the early monument and the veterans whose names appear on the memorial as well as other veterans whose names are not there.

These are not just names, they are people who built our town, walked our streets and worshipped in our churches. They are our grandparents, our parents, our aunts and uncles, our siblings, our friends and neighbors. They are not just faces they have stories to tell, stories of how serving in the military affected their lives. Every veteran's name has a story, every face has a life behind it. The committee would like you to share those stories and faces with others.

So, start going through your scrapbooks and old shoe boxes that you have stashed away and are chock full of mementos. Get out paper and pen and write down the stories that you only know in your heart. Compiled with others they will make a memory book, a family treasure, something to share with generations to come.

There will be a public meeting at the Essen House Restaurant on Woodcox Street in Antwerp at 1:00 pm on April 13. The committee will share examples of items they are seeking and criteria for submission of your items of interest. Do not bring your mementos to this meeting, there will be opportunities later to do that. Also at a later date, an evening public meeting will be scheduled for those who cannot attend during the day. The goal of this committee is to publish this book and have it ready to sell in the year 2012, which is only months away. A year that will commemorate 200 years since the war of 1812 that happened not that far from our own community here in northwest Ohio. 

IKE CLANTON

Yes, you are right. I did write a column on Ike Clanton a few months ago, but I want to clear something up about his death. If you will stay with me, I will tell you both sides on what I have heard on Ike's death.

Ike was born in 1847 in Calvary County, Missouri. Not much is known about Ike until about 1877 when the whole family moved to Arizona.

In 1878, Ike and his brother, Billy, were at the Tombstone Mill running a small lunch counter. Their father, Newman, lived with them. By 1881, Ike lived on his father's ranch about 5 miles from Charleston and 12 miles west of Tombstone.

There was a band of rustlers in the area who called themselves The Cowboys or The Red Sash Gang. Ike let them use the ranch as their hide out or headquarters. They were known to rustle a lot of cattle and some from across the U.S. & Mexico Border.

Now these boys were all welcome in Tombstone as they spent a lot of money there. There wasn't much law because the Sheriff of Cochise

County was Frank Behman and he was on the take from The Cowboys. They were free and welcome in Tombstone and actually behaved pretty well. They done their stealing over in other counties.

Now, Ike Clanton is not remembered much by anything except his fighting with the Earps and his actions at the O.K. Corral.

In July of 1881, Curley Bill Brocious and Johnny Ringo had gone over into Mexico to kill a couple of the Hazlett boys for revenge of their killing a couple of the Cowboy's Gang. At that time Brocious led a gang that ambushed a trail head over in San Luis Pass and killed 6 vaqueros and physically tortured the other 8. All their dirty work just raised the temper of the Mexicans in the area and Tombstone.

Well, the Mexicans figured Clanton was the leader of The Cowboy's as they stayed at his ranch. Well, I guess Clanton was never the leader, only their caterer.

Well, then a group of Mexicans ambushed an $\bar{A}merican$ raiding party. They caught them while they slept, without setting up some guides for the night. They killed and mutilated them while they slept, but one escaped and walked for 2 weeks to get back to an American ranch.

Anyhow it was reported that Ike Clanton was one of the victims on that day in July of 1881 but he wasn't because he had a small role in the O.K. Corral shoot out. That is known for sure so Ike was not killed over in Mexico.

From July until October, things just got worse in Tombstone. The Earp boys tried to enforce the law prohibiting

any gun inside of Tombstone's limits.

Well, Ike was a loud mouth drunk and a braggart and bragged what he was going to do with the Earps. Well, this didn't set well with the Earps and that just stirred up the feelings between the 2 sides.

Ike played cards and drank rot gut whiskey until day light. Ike walked out on the street drunk any had his gun belt and pistol on. Well, Wyatt Earp was going to arrest him and lock him up, but Ike put up an argument and Wyatt pistol whipped him and dropped him to the sidewalk.

Well, the McLowery's and Billy Claborne were very upset about Ike's condition. About noon a magistrate found Ike guilty of disorderly conduct and carrying a weapon on the streets of Tombstone.

The shoot out at the O.K. Corral has been written over and over and probably changed about each time.

Well, when the shooting started Ike Clanton screamed to Wyatt Earp and showed him he was unarmed, Wyatt said ,"Well, get a gun and get out" and Ike ran away from the action. When the shooting stopped Tom and Frank Mc-Clary were dead along with Billy Clanton.

Well, basically, that is about the way it happened on the 25th of October, 1881. So you see, Ike Clanton was not killed back in July over in that bloody ambush in Mexico.

Well, then everyone has read of Wyatt Earp's vendetta on The Cowboys for the murder of his brother, Morgan. This was plain old murder.

Virgil Earp was on the train taking the rest of the Earps to Colton, Colorado where their father lived. The Cowboys tried to ambush the train and it didn't work instead Wyatt killed Frank Stillwell, one of Morgan's marauders and the rest of the ambushees rode off. Well, he did kill the other suspects in the murder of Morgan, but he didn't kill Curly Bill Brocious or Ike Clanton.

Ike lived on into 1887 and got into trouble with the law over a robbery. He was cut down by rifle fire on Jim Wilson's ranch on Eagle Creek, a little south of Springerville, Arizona and that is on the police record books.

Well, readers, that is a thumb nail sketch of some of the events in Tombstone. You and I have read a lot and seen numerous movies of that time and area but I think this is fairly accurate and factual. See Ya!


Eloise was born in July of 1924 in Antwerp. Her parents were Carl and Eva Wilson Langham. She was the only child.



AGRICULTURE SECRETARY VILSACK AND ASSISTANT ATTORNEY GENERAL WEST ANNOUNCE PROCESS TO **RESOLVE DISCRIMINATION** CLAIMS

The Ohio Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director, is informing farmers and producers that USDA has established a process to resolve the claims of Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers who assert that they were discriminated against when seeking USDA farm loans.

Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers who allege past discrimination can now participate in a claims process in which they may receive compensation. The claims process offers a streamlined alternative to litigation and provides at least \$1.33 billion in compensation, plus up to \$160 million in farm debt relief, to eligible Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers.

The program provides

panic or woman farmer who can show that USDA denied them a loan or loan servicing for discriminatory reasons for certain time periods between 1981 and 2000. Hispanic or female farmers who provide additional proof and meet other requirements can receive a \$50,000 reward. Successful claimants are also eligible for funds to pay the taxes on their awards and for forgiveness of certain existing USDA loans. There are no filing fees or other costs to claimants to participate in the program. Participation is voluntary, and individuals who opt not to participate are not precluded by the program from filing a complaint in court.

Persons seeking legal advice may contact a lawyer or other legal services provider.

EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER PROGRAM PHASE 29

Traditionally, the Emergency Food and Shelter National Board program would have already made an announcement as to the funding allocated to Paulding County. Due to Congress not passing the 2011 Budget, all allocations are on hold, and consequently the amount.

The EFSP National Board is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S. A.; The Jewish Federations of North America; The Salvation Army; and, United Way Worldwide.

A Local Board, chaired by United Way of Paulding County, will determine how the funds, when announced, are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local serthese funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.





CLASS OF 1961 - Part 3 Antwerp High School



With the weather warming up, many of you will be planting grass seed to either fill in bare spots in your yard or over-seed the lawn. Here are some tips to help you make sure your seeding is a success.

The first step is selecting a grass seed. Make sure you insist on top quality seed so you won't plant weeds. "Bargain grass seed mixes" are often full of weed seeds, undesirable grasses, immature seeds, and even filler material to make the package larger. Once it's planted, you must live with the results (sometimes ugly) for years. That's why the few dollars more it costs to buy top quality grass seed is one of the best homeowner investments you can make. For more information about grass seed, refer to the article on grass seed in a previous issue of the East Allen Courier or West Bend News.

Next, prepare the "seedbed" by working up the soil to give the seed a place to lodge and take root. Don't work the soil too finely, as this makes the surface crust-over and dry out too quickly. Soil particles from pea-to-marble size are ideal. On over-seeding: Large thin areas should be cut with a slicing machine.

Then, sow the seed evenly using a broadcast, drop, or handheld spreader to do the job. Spreading large areas by hand is a mistake, because it's almost impossible to get even coverage, so the grass sprouts in patches. To cover the seed, simply go over the area lightly with the back of a leaf rake, or drag a light object, such as a doormat, over the area.

Be sure to use a starter fertilizer the same day you seed. This will make a world of difference in your

results. It stimulates early root development, so your seedlings develop faster, and grow much thicker and greener. Agricultural fertilizers like 12-12-12 are not good starter fertilizers because they release their nutrients too quickly. Once the grass seeds have germinated, there is nothing left of the fertilizer for the young plants to use.

Mulch only if necessary. On sloping areas, such as hillsides, or to reduce the frequency of watering, mulching is good. Simply scatter clean weed-free straw or peat moss lightly over the area. Only a small amount is needed... just enough to provide a light shading, so the seedbed is clearly visible through the mulch. Mulching too thick can suffocate the young grass plants.

Watering is critical to young seedlings. The seedbed should be kept moist. Watering frequently, rather than deeply, is best. Only the top inch of soil needs to be kept moist, either by watering or rainfall. Once seedlings sprout, watering becomes even more critical. Tender young plants will die if moisture is not available to them.

Once the young plants have developed into mature grasses, mowing can begin as soon as there is anything to cut with the mower set at about 11/2 inches high. Do not mow when the soil is overly wet, as it can damage your newly planted grass. You should also apply a follow-up application of weed and feed eight weeks after the new seedlings sprout to enhance growth and eliminate any undesirable weeds.

it from its winter slumber. It is recommended to see turf growing before applying either a pre-emergence herbicide, such as crabgrass preventer, or fertilizer. This is the time to show restraint and let the turf naturally awaken. Applying high rates of fertilizer now will encourage excessive top-growth and has the potential to reduce summer stress tolerance. If a late fertilizer application was made last fall, you may not need to apply any early spring fertilizer, but instead might be able to wait until mid-May.

Weed control in lawns begins with proper mowing techniques to manipulate your lawn's natural defenses against weeds. If an herbicide is needed, two primary categories of herbicides are available to fight both broadleaf and/or grass weeds. Preemergent herbicides are used to prevent weed seeds from germinating and post-emergent herbicides are used to selectively kill weeds once they are growing and established.

Pre-emergent herbicides are usually available in granular forms and applied in the spring as one of the primary ways to keep crabgrass and other weed grasses from germinating. Crabgrass, being an annual grass weed, germinates from seed and the use of a pre-emergent herbicide keeps most seed from germinating. Depending on the type of pre-emergent used, selective grass and broadleaf weeds are prevented from germinating in early spring.

The environmental signal for applying a pre-emergent herbicide is when the forsythia bush is in full bloom. You can also use a soil thermometer to check soil temperatures. Apply pre-emergent herbicides when soil temperatures at a two-inch depth reach 50 degrees Fahrenheit.

Post-emergent herbicides are either applied in granular or liquid forms. The granular forms are generally found incorporated into lawn fertilizers and are applied as part of a fertilizer application. The liquid post-emergent herbicides are usually applied separately from fertilizers. Liquid forms are applied using a hand or tank sprayer. Using liquid post-emergent herbicides can be more difficult to apply but provide better results with a single application.

pre-emergent herbicide applications and/or light fertilizer applications. The fertilizer amounts they are applying are probably 1/2 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet or less, just enough to encourage some greening without causing excessive growth.

Before applying a crabgrass preventer, consider whether or not crabgrass is a big problem in your turf. Remember that the best way to control weeds in turf is to encourage a healthy, dense turf that competes well with weeds and crowds them out. Mowing high, returning clippings and having a good fertility program are just some of the practices that will encourage a dense turf.

Hi everyone. So this week I decided we should apply some of the things we've learned so far and put them to good use! Each of us have specific nutrition needs we are trying to achieve so I've revamped the classic mashed potato recipe with some healthy additions. Try them out or get some ideas for how you can make some good swaps to your own meals and use up those leftovers.

Sneak in some extra veggies:

2 white potatoes

2 C cooked orange veggie (carrot/sweet potato/pumpkin)

1 frozen bag of spinach Garlic, salt and butter to taste

While boiling the potatoes, thoroughly mash together the spinach and orange veggie, or use a food processor. Heat up your veggie mash and then add the cooked potatoes and mash all together with a potato masher. You can add some garlic powder and salt which goes great with the sweetness of the orange veggies. I've made it with sweet potatoes, carrots and pumpkin and they are all great. This is a new favorite staple in our house!

Added protein:

- 5-6 large red potatoes 1.5 C cooked white beans
- 2 TB butter or vegan
- spread
- 2 TB water or milk 2-4 large cloves of garlic Salt, pepper and paprika
- to taste Cook the potatoes. Beat

together the beans, butter, liquid and garlic. Then add in the potatoes and beat until you get your desired consistency. Add seasonings to taste.

1 C cashews (soaked over-

Season to taste, then heat up and enjoy. If adding the optional ingredients, add to food processor with the cashews and lemon juice. The cashews provide a very rich buttery flavor and some protein, plus you get some veggies and skip the sugary starches from the potato.

Brownies Dessert:

11/2 C chocolate or carob chips


- 1 C sweet potato
