Winning the Battle for a Generation Column by: **Rick Jones, Defiance Area** YFC

This past week, as we honored the labor force of America, those men, women and young people who because of their ethic to work have helped America to become an economic giant, there are many who are unemployed; who struggle with hopelessness. Life without hope, without a sense of possibility is a real presence in our time, so let us learn from the following story from Bill Bouknight...

"A Rabbi wrote about his experience in a Nazi concentration camp. One evening in the winter of 1944, his father, who was also a prisoner there, took him and some of their friends to a corner of the barracks. He told them it was Hanukkah, and began to light a wick placed in his melted margarine ration.

"The son protested this waste of precious food. His father said, 'We have seen that it is possible to live up to three weeks without food. We lived almost three days without water once. But you cannot live properly for three moments without hope!'

"If one's hope is based on circumstances, one must always live in fear. Circumstances change as quickly as the weather. But if one's hope is based on an ever-faithful God, one can smile in the face of the foulest circumstances. God is bigger than any problem one can ever face." Jesus put it this way... Matthew 6:28-34 (NLT) $^{\ast_{28}} And$ why worry about your clothing? Look at the lilies of the field and how they grow. They don't work or make their clothing, ²⁹yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are. ³⁰And if God cares so wonderfully for wildflowers that are here today and thrown into the fire tomorrow, he will certainly care for you. Why do you have so little faith? ³¹"So don't worry about these things, saying, What will we eat? What will we drink? He commandeered a big truck and had me sent here to Echterunach, Belgium. He impressed upon me that this was absolutely top secret. Hence my security rating.


I can't understand the security part because I have made nearly 50 sorties with Snoopy. We have encountered the Bosche pilots lots of time.

BILLY METZGER JOURNAL CHAPTER 23: WINNEMUC-CA, NEVADA AND ON EAST

We finally got to Winnemucca and then headed east. Rocks, rocks and more rocks.

We have run east for days now and we will soon go north into Idaho. I remember a place called Twin Falls. This is all mountains but no snow, and we're empty and move right along.

We are going east on the original Oregon Trail. We

have passed Soda Springs and Ft. Hall and just keep bouncing along.

Out of Soda Springs we go a little south and down to where Idaho, Wyoming and Utah territories all corner up.

We kept bouncing away and finally into Cookville and we take the Sublette Cut Off on into Wyoming.

We discussed for days about not going on down to Ft. Bridger. That would be at least 60 miles down south and then back north to the Oregon Trail. We couldn't gain anything by going to Bridger. Slim wrote a letter to Jim Bridger and left it at a stage stop at the cut off and they will give it to someone headed into Bridger. I just told Jim about all we have done and where we've been and that we were now on our way to Independence getting there by February 15 and the day he wrote the letter was November 20, 1849.

I remember some of the names, Big Pinky and the Applegate Trail. They all ride very hard. Nothing but rocks and mountains. It also gets pretty cold, but no bad snow storms yet.

We just keep going to Sweetwater Junction. This is wild country, nothing for miles but rock and maybe a stage stop. Then we talk to someone and find where we are and get a good meal.

We went through Jeffery City, Alcova, Split Rock and start following the Great North Platte River into Casper.

We laid for two nights at Casper. We really worked on the horses hooves and the wagon wheels.

The elevation is 5,192 feet here at Casper. It is a sharp cold and it seems we head into the wind all the time. Needless to sav we use the buffalo robes all the time.

We met an old timer at the hotel and he says the altitude drops a little by the time we get to Douglas and this even farther when we get to Ft. Laramie.

We are still on the south edge of the Platte River. We went through Glendo, Hartville and still bouncing along going east to Gurnsey and then finally some familiar faces and places at Ft. Laramie.

I went to the livery stable and told the smithy to look at all the animals good and feed and brush them down as we would be there a couple of days. He remembered us from being there before. It is now December 10. We were here last year over Christmas. We picked up at least a week by not going down to Ft. Bridger. We spend a lot

the stage coach from the east came in today. That six-up broke a pretty good trail for us to follow. I guess we only had about six inches of snow, but the wind blew for three days from all directions. The old timer said that this morning will break clear and cold, so we are making plans to head out.

We are now into Nebraska at Scott's Bluff. I haven't written for a couple days. When we left Ft. Laramie we moved along pretty good. The stage and other traffic between Ft. Laramie and on east broke a pretty good trail for us.

We never stopped the first night. The snow was so bright we just kept on the trail headed east. It was 28 miles to Nebraska Territory and then 14 miles on east to Scott's Bluff.

Not much here except the Wells Fargo Stage stop and the Pony Express stop. We stayed here overnight and left after sun up.

The altitude here is 4,239 feet and I can tell the difference from those days in the mountains.

We plodded on east for a few days and we spent Christmas Eve and day at a stage station and rest stop. We sat around and ate and talked and played a card game called Hearts.

A stage came in and laid over and we talked to them about the trail from the east. They said it is about like this. Well, I remember that this country is pretty flat and nothing for miles, only big stone out croppings. We go for days and days along the north side of the North Platte.

Well, we are in and out of this big town. I think this is now January 10. It is cold but not bitter cold. There is a little snow on the ground. We picked up some gravy, enough for two meals.

I think we are about four to five days out of Fort Kearney. When we get there we will rest up for a couple days.

Holy smoke! What is going on up front! I am in the last wagon, but by looking around Hiram's wagon I can see an Indian Wicki-up sitting beside the road along with four horses.

Gee Whiz! That is Limping Buffalo, the Lakoda Shaman. *Next week: What a Day!*





TALL TALES AND HALF TRUTHS: THE LIFE AND TIMES OF STANLEY JORDAN

If one was to walk into the West Bend News on any given day, they would find Stan Jordan in deep conversation with his longtime confidante and closest friend Ben Franklin (I hear they grew up together). You might hear them deliberating on who used to live in an old farm house that was torn down 30 years ago and was down there around the corner from where the water tower used to be. After a short while, Stan would surely come up with the answer. However, his facts can be debatable; as his advice to this reporter on his first day on the job was "Don't let the facts get in the way of a good story." Well, the facts are good enough for this one!

Stan Jordan has selflessly given of his time and effort over his lifetime to provide Antwerp with such services as letter carrier, fireman, school board member, master of ceremonies at numerous local events, cemetery groundskeeper and most recently, unofficial town historian.

"Well, I think Stan has had a profound impact on our community and life here." stated Bryce Steiner, Editor-In-Chief at The West Bend News, "He has shown us that you can still care for people no matter how old you are and that the community and the people around you are what matters and who you take care of."

Jordan started his life of service by first serving his country, by fighting in World War II. In November of 1942, he reported to Fort Eustis, Virginia for basic training. Jordan's base was in close proximity to many historical locations such as Jamestown, Williamsburg and Yorktown. "Maybe that's why I like history so much." Jordan admitted. "Because that there was all history."

After returning home from the war, Jordan began his career as a rural letter carrier. "I always wanted to be a rural letter carrier," related Jordan. "A lot of guys wanted to be governor. A lot of guys wanted to be president. I just wanted to be a rural letter carrier."

Stan Jordan held that position from 1949-1981. Over those 32 years, Jordan was able to keep track of the citizens of Antwerp. This experience allowed him to commit to memory where people lived in town, and the surrounding area, during that time period, as well as what businesses were in operation. Much of this information would later prove to be useful in his role as local historian. During this time, Jordan also volunteered on the Antwerp Volunteer Fire Department. He was a member of the department for 29 years and also wrote an article in the local newspaper, entitled, "O'le Smokey Says". The article listed the fire runs the department made that week, as well as tips on safety. Jordan was, and still is, master of ceremonies at most of Antwerp's community functions. "I actually enjoy it because as a rule, you have the best seat in the house!" Jordan laughed. After his retirement from the postal route in 1981, Jordan continued to provide services for the Antwerp community. Jordan served on the

Antwerp School Board from 1978-1982. He was also the groundskeeper for the Antwerp Cemetery from 1988-2005. "I enjoyed being down there," Jordan said of the cemetery. "I liked being with the coons, possums, and red birds. I'd like to still be doing it now if I could."

In 2005, Jordan began writing his column on local history in The West Bend News. "The people really enjoy the Antwerp history because I tell them a lot of stuff they have never heard of because they are not as old as I am." Jordan chuckled. According to Sue Knapp, close friend of Jordan's and a fellow writer at The West Bend News, Jordan has become a local celebrity. "He was the emcee for a Senior Birthday Banquet. As we walked to our table I heard people say "Hey, there is Stan Jordan!" and "That's Stan Jordan!" We have more people stop by the paper and say that Stan's column is the one they read first."

Jordan shies away from the attention, however, stating, "I feel real good about that stuff but I am just glad people enjoy the history."

According to the people of Antwerp, Stan Jordan has been an invaluable asset. Sue Knapp summarized Jordan's impact, "Stan has stood out in the community over the years and provided us with services we cannot repay him for. Everyone knows him and he knows everyone. He's just a great guy. There is no replacing Stan. None!"

Personally, Stan has been a good friend, fellow history enthusiast and co-journalist. He helped foster my enthusiasm for both history and journalism in my time here at the West Bend.

So on behalf of everyone here in town Stan, thank you for your time, effort, knowledge, and friendship.



224TH ANNIVERSARY OF CONSTITUTION SIGNING IS 9/17/11

This Saturday, September 17, 2011 is the 224th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution of the United States of America. American colonists fought, sacrificed and died to establish and preserve the freedoms now guaranteed to us by the Constitution of the United States. George Washington was unanimously chosen to preside over this Constitutional Convention but James Madison is called the "Father of the Constitution," because of his ability to negotiate and encourage compromise. Not all the sessions were harmonious and James Madison was an important mediator. Madison kept notes on the progress of the sessions in his Debates in the Federal Convention of 1787, and told the delegates their work "would decide forever the fate of republican government." Gouverneur Morris is credited with writing the Constitution because he took all the decisions and resolutions and put it into a polished form. "Gouverneur" is Morris' first name, not his title. Benjamin Franklin was the "Sage of the Constitution" at 81 years of age, the oldest delegate. Thomas Jefferson was the American Minister to France so was not a delegate but he did insist on the Bill of Rights being inserted into the



herbs is in a tincture form. By extracting the medicinal properties from the herbs, you are able to take a potent, quick-acting dose with only a small amount. Doing this at home is a very simple process. Simply take your herb of choice (or a combination) and fill a mason jar with 1 cup of herbs and then fill with 3 cups of your medium. For this you should use vodka, or raw apple cider vinegar if the extract will be taken by children or those who do not want to use alcohol. This is the same process that can be used to make flavor extracts such as vanilla. The tincture will be stronger if alcohol is used, but both are useful. Now all you need to do is let the herbs steep in a dark cabinet for 4-6 weeks, shaking daily.

Now is a great time to harvest your herbs from your garden, or look around your yard or the woods to find what you are looking for. You can also purchase some at health food stores or online if they are harder to find. There are many books and web resources that can guide you in picking out herbs that will work for specific ailments. Here are a few simple tinctures to prepare us for the winter cold season. To take a dose of the tincture, simply take a teaspoon or a few drops from a dropper and place it under your tongue for 30 seconds. This will allow the herbs to get into the bloodstream quickly. If the taste is too hard to handle, you can add it to hot tea (which will evaporate the alcohol) or any other drink. You can take the

FALL LAWN CARE TIPS

The summer of 2011 was tough on lawns. Above normal temperatures and inadequate soil moisture left many lawns with areas of dead grass and thin grass stands. The good news is that temperatures are cooling off and cool-season grasses thrive in this type of weather. Cool days and warm nights also make a perfect environment for fall lawn care.

Fall is the most important time to fertilize the lawn. If you only fertilize your lawn once a year, the recommendation is to apply fertilizer around Labor Day. For those making two fall Antwerp High School and is employed at Tower Automotive, Auburn, IN.

fertilizer applications, the recommendation is to apply around Labor Day and again in early November.

The September lawn fertilizer application promotes a moderate rate of shoot growth and helps to thicken the turf. An application in early November, at the time of the last mowing, promotes root growth and early green up next spring. Apply one pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet in both September and early November.

Post-emergence broadleaf weed control works well in the fall. Fall applications of broadleaf herbicides are more effective than those made in spring or summer. In preparation for winter, perennial weeds translocate food energy down to their roots in the fall. Broadleaf herbicides applied from mid-September to early November also will be translocated to the weed's roots, resulting in excellent control. Before applying any pesticide, be sure to read, understand, and follow all label instructions for the safest, most effective application of herbicides.

Lawns established on clay soils and those subject to heavy foot traffic would benefit from core aeration. Aeration relieves soil compaction, improves air and water movement into the soil, and helps reduce thatch accumulation. Aerate lawns in September with a machine that has hollow metal tubes or tines. These tubes or tines remove plugs of soil from the ground. Avoid spike-type devices that simply punch holes in the turf.

For maximum benefit, the core aerator should penetrate the soil to a depth of two to three inches. When finished, there should be approximately 20 to 40 holes per square foot. For those who do their own lawn care, aeration machines are often available at rental agencies. Aeration services are also available from most professional lawn care companies. After aeration, break up the soil cores by mowing or raking.

If your lawn has bare or thin areas that have been damaged by the summer drought, fall is an ideal time to repair this damage by overseeding. Begin by raking out the dead grass in the damaged areas, or by having the lawn aerated. Next, overseed with a disease resistant grass variety that matches your existing turf. Finally, keep the overseeded areas consistently moist while the new grass germinates.


