The official ribbon cutting ceremony for EDP Renewables of North America, the first builder of a commercial wind farm, formerly known as Horizon Wind Energy, took place at the Pleasant Valley Golf Course southwest of Payne on Wednesday, October 5. Pleasant Valley is situated in the middle of the wind farm.

EDP Renewables of North America, based in Houston, Texas, is a subsidiary of the multi-national EDP Renovaveis, S.A. Of Lisbon, Portugal (NYSE Eurnext: EDPR).

The company has invested 175 million dollars into Paulding County as of 10/5/11 for

Church is far greater than just making friends. But a church is not the Church unless the people in the church are friends. You may be wondering why the capital "C" and the lower case "c" in "Church" and "church." Well, the lower case "c" stands for the local church. Local churches can be out of whack, misguided, and distracted. That's why we have developed a vocabulary to distinguish a local church from the Church universal. The Church universal is the Church that God intended and consists of people who are totally surrendered to God who reside in all churches. Hopefully, the local church reflects the Church universal, but we all know that is not always the case. We will not reach perfection this side of the grave, but that does not mean that

we should not strive for it. Jesus said, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" [John 13:34-

The air was filled with the tantalizing smell of open kettle caramel corn, along with ribs, apple dumplings, the famous apple cider, home made soup and much more to tempt your taste buds.

A lot of action was going on with the train rides, the garden tractor pull, a petting zoo and all of those things from 'back in the day' made and displayed.

(Clemens continued fr page 1) George Clemens III humbly accepted the award and proved once again how serious he takes his job.

The case involved possession and distribution of child pornography. Chief Clemens received a tip on a picture. He started investigating and was able to get a hold of the predator (Ronald Burtis, 36, of St. Paul, Minnesota). After spending many hours investigating and communicating with Burtis he contacted the Secret Service knowing if the Federal Government was involved it would be worse for Burtis. Burtis had many pictures of children in terrible situations. The Secret Service and Chief Clemens worked in conjunction on the case.

Clemens sent a bus ticket to Burtis. They were to meet in Van Wert. After Burtis reached Van Wert, George along with his wife were able to get what they needed for an arrest. Burtis received 121/2 years in a federal prison with no possibility of parole and then 10 years probation.

Secret Service Agent Piraino expressed his thanks and appreciation to Chief

("Wind" continued fr page 1) Alonso added, "The technologv from even 10 years ago has increased and the towers are much more efficient, producing more power." He went on to say he was thankful for the employees, landowners and all the people here who made this possible. The wind mills, also known

as wind power plants, are produced by Vestas, a world leader in high-tech wind power. The first phase has finished completely and each tower is capable of producing 1.8 megawatts (1,800,000 watts) for a total of 99 megawatts from 55 operating wind towers. This much power is effective for powering up to 27,000 average usage homes. The rotor diameter is 328 feet and the hub height is 312 feet above the ground. The foundation is 8' deep and a diameter of nearly 58' depending on the structure. The operating wind speed is 6.7 MPH to 45 MPH. The wind turbines are built in Colorado with parts made from all over the country including Ohio.

The original plan was larger, but was limited by a power company agreement and someday could be expanded.



**BILLY METZGER'S JOURNAL** CHAPTER 26: AT INDEPEN-DENCE, MISSOURI

#### By: Stan Jordan

We had supper here at the hotel. I'll bet we sat there two hours resting and feeling glad that we are here and can lay up for a few days.

Then Sam and I spent most of today greasing all the wagons and checking all the wheels and spokes.

Slim checked his new wagon and team thoroughly and all seemed to have made the two thousand mile trip in

We spend a lot of time in the restaurant and lounge at the hotel as it has been raining slow rain for a couple days. Back in Ohio we would call it just a normal spring rain.

Chief Yellow Pencil has made out a number of forms for buying and stowing the wagons. It covers the items name, cost, number, how many and what wagon it is carried in. We will stick to about what we bought last

I have bought two tents. Last year I bought four. I will put one between the blankets and clothing and the hay for the animals. The other I will put on the floor of the wagon and up the sides to make it waterproof for the blankets and new clothes.

I still have my fly. That is a piece of tenting, 10x20 feet. I put it about four foot in the front and the same in the rear over the horses feeding station on the wagon. Then it drapes over the top and down the sides. On our last trip nothing got wet and I still have a four foot awning to sit under when it rains or in the heat and hot sun.

Well, Sam and I spent the day taking the wagons down to the feed man and putting in the hay and oats for the trip. I think we got enough ear corn for the whole trip to the gold strike. I might have to inquire along the trail, but you don't get much corn over in Nebraska. We spend the day today

buying supplies for the miners: tents, cots, blankets, picks, axes, rope, wire, pans, buckets, mirrors, dust pans, wash pans, towels, boots and some other articles.

We have to log all of these for Chief Yellow Pencil (Hiram). He has made some special forms for us to fill out. Then Sam and I took our

two wagons down to the store and loaded our purchases in them. John and Hiram did the same with Jim's wagon. We ate our supper in the dining room of the ho-

tel. Then we turned in all of

our records and got things straight for Yellow Pencil. We played Hearts for awhile and then I went and slept in the wagon because they are loaded. The other

boys stayed in the hotel. The rains stopped a couple days ago and we are planning on leaving here on February 24th. That's a couple days early before we planned. But Jim says he might as well leave as we might need extra time somewhere on the trail.

This morning I hitched up all the mounts and the livery man had already fed them.

Last evening I told the others that I was going down the street to see if that fellow was around that had those sausages that we liked so well last year. Hiram called them hot dogs. All agreed and we walked down Main Street and he was there all right. I had two of those rascals and a stand next door specialized in apple dumplings. All of us had our supper right there on the street. I asked the man if he would sell me just the little sausages to take on the trail for slicing up and putting in the bean soup. He let me have two dozen and this is February; they should keep pretty well. We should get two meals on the road out of them. Jim is our bean specialist.

Hiram gave us our bonus money, and Jim and I went to the post office that afternoon. Jim got a letter from home and I guess all is well. His wife got the money he sent home last year. Jim sent home his share of the bonus and some more. He sends home all he can and she is very frugal and makes

I got my birth certificate from back in Montgomery County in Ohio. I was born in 1833 and I will be eighteen this year on June 27, 1851. I will enlist in the Army at Fort Kearney at that time. I will sure miss these fellows.

The other afternoon all four of us went down to the big hardware and asked if they had any of those new oil burning cook stoves.

He said, "No," but soon said, "Wait there are some boxes in the warehouse that we haven't opened yet. Let's go back and see what is in those crates."

Well, by golly, there were some of those Perfection Oil Stoves there. Some one burner—like my 'little Jim Dandy', and some two burner stoves. All of these are well packed in wood boxes. These are so new to the store owner that he hasn't looked at the invoices yet. He doesn't even know the cost of these articles. After a few minutes he sold us four one burner stoves at \$30.00 each and four two burner stoves at \$50.00 each. If we use last year's formula of ¼ of the price for shipping and freight that would total at \$186.00 or about 91/2 ounces of gold dust.

All of these stoves are still in the crates like they left the company at Kalamazoo, Michigan and all we have loaded them into Jim's wagon. Then on that afternoon lim and Hiram went down to the sheriff's office and told them that the 3M Wagon Train was going out west again. We would get there by August 10th and back here to Independence by February 18, 1851.

This is February 24, 1850 and we are pulling out in the morning. The rain has been over for a few days and it feels like spring. The roads are pretty dry and we head a little north out of Independence so we will pass Kansas City on the north side. That is Kansas City over in Kansas.

There is a lot of talk about the railroads in the east. Rumor has it that in a few years the rails will be here in the area and it will change a lot of things. This area already is talking about being a rail hub for produce and cattle ship-

ping.

If that talk of how good

" silroad is, there a train and railroad is, there will be some mighty big changes in this country. But I have never seen a train, and I don't know anyone who has. Maybe it is just a big rumor.

Well, we covered a good forty miles these two days and I'm glad to be back on the Oregon Trail again headed for Sutter's Mill and the gold strike in Coloma, California. Next week: Westward Ho

I put another round in that very same hole and it didn't show up on the target. They were about to award her the prize and I said, "Whoa, I put two rounds in that same hole, let's look and see."


The judge took out his pocket knife and dug out the round. I said, "Look, that's my slug, hers is painted red."







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#### IT'S A GOOD WEEK TO THINK ABOUT RE-TIREMENT SAVINGS

You may not see it posted on your calendar, but October 16-22 is National Save for Retirement Week. This annual event, endorsed by Congress, is designed to raise awareness about the importance of saving for retirement-so you may want to take some time this week to review your own strategy for achieving the retirement lifestyle you've envi-

If you're not convinced of the need for an event such as National Save for Retirement Week, just consider these statistics, taken from the Employee Benefit Research Institute's 2011 Retirement Confidence Survey:

\*\*The percentage of workers not at all confident about having enough money for a comfortable retirement grew from 22 percent in 2010 to 27 percent—the highest level measured in the 21 years of the Retirement Confidence

\*\*56 percent of respondents say that the total value of their household's savings

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and investments, excluding the value of their primary home and any defined benefit plans (i.e., traditional pension plans) is less than \$25,000.

\*\*Less than half of the respondents say they and/or their spouse have tried to calculate how much money they will need for a comfortable retirement.

These numbers are obviously troubling-and they indicate that most of us probably need to put more thought and effort into our retirement savings. What can you do? Here are a few suggestions:

\*\*Determine how much you'll need in retirement. Try to define the lifestyle you want during retirement. Will you travel the world or stay close to home? Will you work part time or spend your hours volunteering or pursuing hobbies? Once you know what your retirement might look like, try to estimate how much it might cost.

\*\*Identify your sources of retirement income. Take into account your IRA, 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan, Social Security and other savings and investments. How much income will they provide? How much can you withdraw from these vehicles each year without depleting them?

\*\*Calculate any retirement shortfall. Try to determine if your savings and investments will be enough to provide you with an income stream that's adequate to meet your retirement needs. If it isn't, develop an estimate of the size of the shortfall.

\*\*Take steps to close savings "gap." If it doesn't look like you'll have enough to meet your retirement needs, you may consider adjusting

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your savings and investment strategy. This may mean contributing more to your IRA, 401(k) and other retirement accounts. Or, perhaps your investment mix may need to be reviewed to find a better balance growth potential with risk. Or you may need to take both of these steps.

\*\*Monitor your progress. Once you've put your investment strategy into place, you'll need to monitor your progress to make sure you're on track toward achieving your retirement savings goals. Along the way, you may have to make adjustments, if there are changes in your objectives or your specific situation.

Taking these types of action can be challenging, so you may want to work with a professional financial advisor who has the experiences and resources necessary to help you identify and work toward achieving your retirement goals. In any case, though, National Save for Retirement Week is a great time to consider your course of action.

#### **BEETLE INVASION**

Large populations of beetles are flying around our homes as soybeans ripen and harvest begins. The two beetle species that are most notable and have become the biggest nuisance this fall are the bean leaf beetle and the multicolored Asian lady beetle. Because these pests rarely damage anything in the home, they generally are considered to be nuisance

The bean leaf beetles are a soybean pest that overwinters as an adult beneath leaf litter in wood lots adjacent to soybean fields. The adult bean leaf beetle is pest that is at least ¼ inch in length that can be red, orange, tan or gray in color. The dot and stripe markings may vary among individuals or populations; however, all adults possess a black triangle at the base of their forewings. These adults will feed on soybean or other host plants before moving into overwintering sites sometime in October. They are attracted to the sun-light reflecting off a house but generally are more of an outside nuisance.

The multicolored Asian lady beetle is considered beneficial because both the growing stage larvae and the adult beetles eat aphids and other soft-bodied insects. The name "multicolored" refers to the many different color forms of the adult lady beetles. The various color forms found in the United States include shades of yellow, orange, or red, either with or without black spots on the wing covers.

The adult multicolored Asian lady beetle is about one-quarter inch long and oval shaped, about twothirds as wide as it is long. Some have 19 black spots while others have faded spots that vary in number and size. In addition, markings on the white pronotum, the small area between the head and the wing covers, resemble a large, black capital "M" when viewed from the rear of the insect.

The multicolored Asian lady beetle becomes a nuisance factor during October when they defy all our efforts to keep them outside and off our walls, curtains, and light fixtures. Lady beetles do not harm humans or pets but are a nuisance by their presence inside the home or when these lady beetles defend themselves by emitting a yellow-orange body fluid, which has a foul odor and can permanently stain walls, drapes, carpeting, and clothing. Although an uncommon occurrence, multicolored Asian lady beetles have been reported to nibble, nip, or "bite" humans.

#### **DEER-CRASH SEASON BEGINS: ALL OHIO DRIV-ERS WARNED, ESPECIALLY IN URBAN AREAS**

Ohio has eight million drivers, 121,000 miles of roadway, and 600,000 deer. Trying to predict when and where a deer and motorist will meet is an impossible task, but drivers who understand how deer behave are more likely to avoid a crash.

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) warns all Ohio drivers that autumn brings thousands of collisions between vehicles and deer, so drive with cau-

"Fewer daylight hours, combined with the increased movement of deer due to mating and hunting seasons, increase the risk of collisions," said ODOT Director Jerry Wrav.

In 2010, there were 23,201 deer-vehicle crashes statewide with 1,063 people injured and four people killed. November saw the most crashes with 5,012, or 167

Because many deer-vehicle collisions go unreported to police and local authorities, the actual number of crashes throughout Ohio may be as high as 60,000 each year.

Last year, the areas with the highest number of deervehicle crashes were urban areas: the Mansfield area (Richland County) with 648 crashes, the Canton area (Stark County) with 630 and the Cincinnati area (Hamilton County) with 620.

ODOT advises motorists to use these driving tips to help avoid collisions with

\*\*Watch for deer-crossing signs and drive with extreme caution, especially in the posted areas.

\*\*If you see one deer near the road, expect that others will follow.

\*\*Watch for deer especially at dawn and after sunset. About 20 percent of these crashes occur in early morning, while more than half occur between 5:00 p.m. and midnight.

\*\*Always wear seat belts and drive at safe, sensible speeds for road conditions.

\*\*If a vehicle strikes a deer, motorists should report the crash by calling local law enforcement, the sheriff's department, the Ohio State Highway Patrol, or the Ohio Department of Natural Resources—even if there is no damage to the motorist's ve-


