

#### **CREATION VIA COMMITTEE**

The following, taken from the "Joyful Newsletter," speaks a message of the necessity of understanding God's role in our lives, in spite of all our efforts, planning, and efforts:

In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. The earth was without form and void; so god created a small committee. God carefully balanced the committee vis-a-vis race, sex ethnic origin, and economic status in order to interface pluralism with the holistic concept of self-determination according to adjudicatory guidelines. Even God was impressed, and so ended the first day.

"And God said, 'Let the committee draw up a mission statement.' And behold the committee decided to prioritize and strategize. And God called that process empowerment. And God thought it sounded pretty good. And evening and morning were the third day. "And God said, 'Let there

be a retreat in which the committee can envision functional organization, and engage in planning objectives.' The committee considered adjustment of priorities and consequential alternatives to program directions and God saw that this was good. And God thought that it was even worth all the coffee and donuts he had to supply. And so ended the fourth day. "And God said, 'Let the

committee be implemented, consistent with long-range planning and strategy.' The committee considered guidelines and linkages and structural activities, and alternative and implemental models. And God said that this was very democratic. And so would have ended the fifth day, except for the unintentional renewal of the debate about the differences between goals and objectives.

"On the sixth day, the committee agreed on criteria for adjudicatory assessment and evaluation. This wasn't the agenda God had planned. He wasn't able to attend, however, because He had to take the afternoon off to create day and night, and heaven and earth, and seas and planets, and trees and seasons and years and sun and moon and birds and fish and animals and human beings.

"On the seventh day, God rested and the committee submitted its recommendations. It turned out that the recommended forms for things were nearly identical to the way God had already created them; so the committee passed a resolution commending God for implementing them according to guidelines. There was, however, some opinion expressed quietly that humans should have been created in the com-

Matthew 28:19 - Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the son and of the Holy Spirit

On the basis of the authority Jesus has, He gives the command to go. Jesus commands them to go and make disciples. One must be a disciple to make disciples. How can we expect others to follow Jesus unless we are following Him ourselves? In 1 Corinthians 11:1 Paul says 'imitate me, just as I also imitate Christ' (NKJV). This is the way "discipling" works—by imitation. The first thing Jesus told His disciples was to go and make disciples. Read Matthew 8:18-22 about the cost of discipleship. A disciple is to sacrifice and put God and Jesus first in our lives, neighbor second, and then family. A disciple learns and never forgets that he is a follower and not a leader. Matthew 16:24-26 tells us that we must desire to follow, that we must deny self, we must take up our cross, and then we must sacrifice.

Jesus has given the authority for baptism, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. #### FATHER PARTICIPATION IN CHURCH INVOLVMENT

Winning the Battle for a Generation Column by: Rick Jones, Executive Director, Defiance Area Youth for Christ

A 1994 Swiss study explored how religion gets passed from one generation to the next. In other words, what causes a child to adopt his or her parent's faith? The results pointed to one critical factor: the father's involvement in practicing his faith. The results included the following statistics.

If both father and mother attend regularly, 33 percent of children will become regular churchgoers, and 41 percent will attend irregularly.

If only the mother attends regularly and the father attends sporadically, only 3 percent of children will become regular churchgoers, and 59 percent will attend irregu-

On the other hand, if a father attends church regularly but the mother is irregular, 38 percent of children will be-

between the mid 70s to the early 2000s, identify themselves as being spiritual but not religious. They have given up on the church, and I don't blame them. The writer of Hebrews

wrote, "Let us... not neglect to meet together." It's true, not because it is in Scripture; it is in Scripture because it is true. "You're supposed to go to church because Hebrews 10:25 says so" is not a good approach to convince anyone that they should come to the church gathering and invest time building friendships there. We are able and ex-

pected to ask, "Why?" Have you ever noticed how we're scared of that question? "Why?" Those three letters are scary, terrifying, and too often ignored by those who have not thought through why they do what they do and teach what they teach. The church seems to hate that question, but we must be willing to seek answers and explain why we believe what we believe and do what

I was one of those annoying kids that always asked, "Why?" I pestered my parents with "why". I wanted to know why everything needed to be done the way they said it needed to be done, and I wanted to know why things functioned the way they functioned. I hated any subject in school or college where the answer to why we had to learn it wasn't laid out. "Why" might be a scary question, especially when the answers are unknown, but it is one of the most important questions.

As Christians we should be able to answer the "why" question for what we do and how we do it. If you invite someone to church and they ask, "Why should I come to church?" They might phrase it, not in the form of a question, but in a statement through which they tell you that they don't need the church to be spiritual and right with God. And in a way, they are right. Church is not necessary to be right with God. But we should be about trying to live out a minimal faith of just being right with God; we want to live a faith of complete devotion. We want to be all that God plans for us to be, a group of people that will cause the gates of hell to shudder when we gather together. A group of people transforming the world around us in God's way.

I heard the excuse from a friend that they don't have to go to church to be right with God when I invited her to church the other week, and to be honest with you, it is a thought I stumble into at times. I struggle with hating the organized church. I'm ashamed of the atrocities and the violations of justice that have been done through the organized church in the name of God throughout the years and are still being supported. I'm distraught over institutions of ritual that go through the empty and endless motions of fake devotion and remain in existence long after God has left the building. I abhor the politics involved; the disagreements and distractions from the mission we have been called to. I get frustrated at being criticized for doing what I think is best to bring about

God's will here in Antwerp. I despise people thinking they are right with God because of head knowledge, being baptized, asking Jesus into their heart, or their knowledge of the Scriptures. Because of all these things, I would long to just go off on my own and do church the way I understand it should be done. And you might feel that way too. But we can be different.

I'll continue this thought next week. May God bless you and show you His will for your life, and may you have the strength and courage to go after that will. You can read more of

#### **COVER CROPS PROGRAM**

#### By: Jim Lopshire, Extension Educator

The Paulding County OSU Extension office would like to invite you to a "Cover Crops" program scheduled for Wednesday February 16 at the Extension Building located on the county fairgrounds. This program will look at cover crops with a focus on the biology of soil compaction, benefits of cover crops, selecting cover crops, yield benefits and a local farmer sharing his experiences with cover crops.

Cover crops are being utilized by more Paulding County farmers as a conservation tool to control wind and water erosion on fields with little or no residue cover. Cover crops are also being utilized as a nutrient management tool to recycle manure nutrients and prevent those nutrients from moving off site during heavy rains. Other benefits of cover crops include improved soil tilth and soil organic matter. Cover crops can also reduce compaction and increase water infiltration which decreases leaching of nutrients and provide habitat for ben-

eficial microorganisms.

The Ag Day event beings at 8:00 a.m. with registration and booth sponsors and continues until approximately 2:15 p.m. Lunch will be provided. Individuals should preregister by contacting the Paulding County Extension office at 419-399-8225 or by e-mail to lopshire.1@osu.edu While cover crops will be

the main topic of discussion, soil compaction and conservation will also be addressed upon during the event. Jim Hoorman, extension educator from Mercer County will discuss the "Biology of Soil Compaction and Soil Structure," from 9:00-10:00 a.m.; Florian Chirra, extension educator from Williams County will discuss the "Benefits of Cover Crops" from 10:00-10:30 a.m.; Dave Robinson, agronomist and seed marketing manager at Cisco, will conclude the morning sessions discussing "Midwest Specific Cover Crops" from 10:30-11:30 a.m.

After lunch, local farmer Joe Woods will share his experience with cover crops from 12:30-1:00 p.m. The final presentation will be provided by extension soil fertility specialist Robert Mullen discussing the "Yield Ben-efits from Cover Crops" from 1:00-2:00 p.m. The program will conclude with an evaluation and summary from 2:00-2:15 p.m.

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



ish Scalpbuyer Part 2 This letter was prepared

by an officer of Col. Henry Hamilton to be sent to him. Neither Colonel Hamilton nor King George III received the letter nor its gruesome packages of 954 scalps, as the bearer, James Hoyd, was captured by the Americans. The letter was later carried by Benjamin Franklin to France where he presented it as evidence to induce the French to protest the British attack on innocent civilians.

Letter to: Colonel Henry Hamilton, Detroit "I hereby send to your Excellency, under care of James Hoyd, hooped and painted with all the triumphal marks, and of which consignment this is an invoice and explanation: Package No. 1 - 43 scalps of Congress soldiers, inside painted red with a small black dot to show they were killed by bullets; those painted brown and marked with a hoe denote that the soldiers were killed at their farms; those marked with a black ring denote that the persons were surprised at night; those marked with a black hatchet denote that the persons were killed with a tomahawk. Package No. 2 98 farmers' scalps; a white circle denotes that they were surprised in the daytime; those with a red foot denote that the men stood their ground and fought in defense of their wives and families. Package No. 3 - 97 farmers' scalps; the green hoops denote that they were killed in the fields. Package No. 4 – 102 farmers' scalps; eighteen are marked with a yellow flame to show that they died by torture; the one with the black band attached belonged to a clergyman. Package No. 5 88 scalps of women; those with braided hair were mothers. Package No. 6 - 193 boys' scalps. Package No. 7 - 211 girls' scalps. Package No. 8 -122 scalps of all sorts; among them are 29 infants' scalps and those marked with the small white hooks denote that the child was unborn when the mother was killed. 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**JOHN DEERE**

If you remember, my good friend Ben Franklin told me that, "If you build a good product, America will make a path to your door." The story of John Deere is such a story.

Mr. Deere was born in

Rutland, Vermont in 1804. By 1830 he had a good blacksmith business, but things went bad and he moved to Grand Detour, Illinois in 1836. He built a pretty good-sized shop so he could be the general repair man for the village, plus he made small tools such as pitchforks and shovels. But what was more successful for him was the cast steel plow share. You see, up until now nearly all plows used a wooden plow share and the fine midwestern soil would stick to the share and had to be cleaned by hand pretty often. But it slid right off his new steel share saving a lot of time and energy. Now this was in 1837 and I want you to remember that at that time this Northwest Ohio area was very sparsely populated and mostly still a big forest. I suppose the great swamp made the people pass on by and

At first the sale of plow shares were fairly slow, so John started making them to have on hand. That way when a farmer came in the shop he had a supply to choose from immediately. Yes, sales were good. In 1842, he entered into a new business with Leonard Andros and they built a bigger building along the Rock River in Illinois.

went on to the west.

They produced about one hundred plows in 1842 and about four hundred plows in the next year. But their partnership folded up in 1848 and Deere relocated to Moline, Illinois because there was a railroad there and the river

He formed a company with

Robert Tate and John Gould and built a big 14,000 square foot factory in 1848. Production by the next year had gone to over two hundred plows a month, so a second story was added to the plant. Business was good and it was producing 1,120 plows per month. In 1857 a nationwide depression came along and the company had to split up a little. In order to avoid bankruptcy, Deere sold his interest to his son-inlaw, Christopher Weber, who had already taken over most of the managerial sales. The company was organized the last time in 1868 and incorporated. Son, Charles, had started advertising and had organized dealers all over the area and had one of the biggest companies at that time.

John Deere died in 1886 and the Presidency of the company went to his son, Charles. By now in addition to plow shares they were turning out wagons, corn planters and cultivators as well as smaller

They made and sold tractors at this time, after 1907. Then he bought out The Waterloo Gasoline Engine company in 1918. This outfit produced The Waterloo Boy Tractor in Waterloo, Iowa. Then in 1923, Deere introduced the John Deere Model D Tractor and they still make these tractors in Waterloo. You all know how big John Deere is now. They got away from its 2-cylinder Johnny Popper and now produce big equipment. Huge tractors for the big farmer and huge machines for construction work. They make ATV's and forestry equipment. There line of lawn mowers, string trimmers, chain saws, snow blowers and even some snowmobiles for the common household are as good as any. The catchy motto, 'Nothing runs like a Deere' was created by Carl Westby.

It is hard to comprehend just how big John Deere, Inc. is. They employ 47,000 people all over the world. They are big in 27 countries. In the first 500 companies of the Blue Book, Deere is 102.

They still make the tractors in Waterloo, Iowa and the combines in Moline, Illinois. The main office is still

John Deere has survived this long because they sell a good product. John Deere is one of the reasons for Americas success and big part of our

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

Hello again West Bend community. In last week's column, we briefly discussed how to be more conscious of what we are eating. By reading labels and refusing to eat anything with ingredients which you cannot pronounce or don't know what they are is a great start. We should be especially careful with products containing more than five ingredients, because this is often a sign that the product isn't as wholesome and nourishing as it should be. Our diets should be compromised of fruits, vegetables, beans, lean meat, low-fat dairy/dairy alternatives, and whole grains.

Once you begin to realize what healthy foods looks like, to get the most nourishment and energy from your food we should look to the weather. Seasonal cooking is the most basic means of telling you what you should be eating. In a temperate climate such as ours, cooking should vary with each of the four new seasons. By purchasing produce that is "in-season" you will be saving money and be eating the best tasting options available. My family knows that we don't buy peaches in the winter because they are rock-hard, lacking in flavor, and terribly expensive as they are shipped in from across the world. Another benefit, is that we crave and digest in-season foods better than those out of season. Most would agree that eating a large pasta dinner is too heavy for sultry summer weather and it would heavily tax our body and deplete us of energy if we were to do so.

Spring and summer cooking should be light and fresh, taking advantage of the seasons' fruits and vegetables. These fresher foods will produce a more gentle and relaxed energy. This time of year we are meant to step out of our kitchens and into the garden to pick fresh produce and cook it as little as pos-

In the fall and winter, we should be eating the stronger root vegetables such as potatoes and squashes as well as beans and whole grains. These foods all grow late in the season and are able to be kept without spoilage for a very long time making them perfect to sustain us through the

winter. Meals should focus more on heartier stews and casseroles and not salads and quick-cooking dishes like in the summertime. These cold seasons bring us back inside where we stew, simmer, and bake warming dishes to shield us from the harsh outdoors. This requires strong cooking, with more fire, pressure, and time in order to concentrate the effects and nourishment It comes as no surprise,

that God, the master genius behind Creation, had it all planned out. He created everything to work in harmony, knowing we would stay healthy and vibrant for Him, never going hungry despite the change in seasons. To really enjoy that juicy tomato in our summer salad, we must miss it for a few months out of the year. Just as I'm still getting used to Mid-West winters and all the snow it brings, it just makes that first 60 degree spring day all the more marvelous. Take this week to practice buying what's currently in-season. You'll be sure to save some money and it will provide you with all the hearty nourishment needed to last us through the winter. Enjoy! 


