PETE SCHLEGEL FILES TO RUN FOR 82ND **HOUSE SEAT**

Pete Schlegel of rural Paulding County has filed with the county board of elections for the 82nd House District seat as an independent. The new House District takes effect in January, and will include Defiance, Paulding and Van Wert counties, as well as the



northwest corner of Auglaize County.

Schlegel cites the need for an independent political voice as his reason for seeking the seat.

"People ask what my platform is. It's really simple. We need a voice in the 82nd that will listen to the people of this district no matter what political party they may come from, or if they are even associated with a party. The definition of representative is standing or acting for another, especially through a delegated authority, and that is truly what I believe. It's about what the people want.

"Now, can we agree on everything? Probably not, but we at least need to have an open discussion in our district to discuss the challenges that we all face, and if we can't agree, we need to disagree respectfully and tackle the next challenge."

2012 SPRING PLANTED CROPS **MUST BE INSURED BY MARCH 15**

Steve Maurer, the Ohio Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director, would like to remind producers that they have until Thursday March 15, 2012 to sign-up for the 2012 Noninsured Assistance Program (NAP) coverage for spring planted crops. This deadline applies to the following spring planted crops: 2012 forage sorghum, oats, potatoes, soybeans, sunflowers and all spring planted specialty crops grown for food.

NAP covers losses caused by damaging weather conditions. Producers receive a payment when the loss is in excess of 50 percent. Losses are generally determined by the percentage of loss compared to the producer's Actual Production History (APH). Eligible production losses are paid at 55 percent of the established value for the crop.

There is a service fee is per crop per county or per producer per county. Limited resource producers may request a waiver of service fees.

"Producers who currently have NAP coverage or who are interested in coverage are encouraged to keep accurate production records," said Maurer, State Executive Director for the Ohio Farm Service Agency. NAP coverage is only available for crops not covered under the Federal Crop Insurance program. Producers are reminded about the requirement for FCIC insurance or NAP coverage on all crops in order to remain eligible for the agency's Disaster Assistance Programs such as SURE, LFP, TAP, and ELAP.

Producers are encouraged to contact their local FSA office to obtain NAP coverage or for additional information on NAP prior to the March 15 deadline.

AN AFTERNOON IN LIBERIA – ONE DROP

the channel, so I could stop looking. As they say, "Out of sight, out of mind." But this is not television. It's reality. Not the fake kind manufactured by the networks. This is survival. It surrounds me. I can't change the channel. I could go to another neighborhood, but it would more than likely be the same. I see people who think

they are sustaining themselves by eating cooked dirt they call chocolate. And nearly everyone is drinking water that is not safe. I see children with bloated bellies. They appear to receive enough nutrition, but they will die from waterborne diseases. A sure sign of having one that is dangerous is a belly button pushed out. Think of an outie, but one that pokes out one to two inches. It doesn't matter whether you were born with an innie or outie; once the intestinal swelling starts to happen, the belly button is pushed out. The struggle of humanity surrounds me. I would weep if I could, but here I am in the midst of it

I stand for a few minutes watching a soccer game as the team I am with is nearby training a family how to use a water filtration system we came over here to give to those in need. I can almost forget the pain and suffering. The community cheers. The players hustle and compete with one another. It's just like back at home.

When you think of household, don't think of our houses and our families. Think extended. We just left a house with six rooms and a living room. Each of the six rooms houses a family consisting of five to nine people. Some of them, especially the younger ones, will probably be dead within a year. But maybe not in this house, as they will now have clean water. So the small house has somewhere around thirtyfive to fifty people. Before that, I left a tiny house that housed fifteen. This house had two little kids that were scared of white people. And it had an electric box on the wall that once was used to provide electricity to the house. I took a picture of the outdated General Electric electric box with my General Electric camera. My camera was a cheap camera. It only cost me \$80. We had forgotten to bring a camera on a vacation, so we bought an extra one. That money could feed these people for months and provide a water filtration system with some money left over.

Just a drop in the bucket. That's all I feel like I am doing. I wish I had Bill Gates' billions. I wish I could live here educating this postcivil war generation about how to have a better life. I wish I could help turn this sorrow into joy, death into

life, despair into hope. God

help us all. Those suffering and those too comfortable to help the suffering. We all need your help to be the people we were made to be. I don't want to paint too

hopeless of a picture. These are good people. Hardworking. Friendly. Loving. This extreme poverty has brought out the best in humanity, although it does bring a set of vices all of its own. And as I look around, I see hope. I see people doing what it takes to survive. Enjoying a soccer game. Starting businesses. Living in community with one another. Building new homes. Growing food. Among the many tossed into the ashes by the few who fight for power, humanity strives on. And I see other organi-

zations here in Liberia besides Hope 2 Liberia. Many churches. A few secular organizations. More drops in the bucket. Another water system given. drip. A toy given to a kid who has absolutely nothing. drop. A Bible given. drip. A school started. drop. I wish I could do so much more. But together, I think we will fill this bucket one drop at a time.

Have you ever wondered what makes a man or woman who has lived a life that is 180 degrees different from that of Jesus, decide to change and stay changed? Perhaps the following story will explain it

Kurt Vonnegut's novel Time-quake centers on a series of stories about people who have lost control of their lives. Rather than determine their own destinies, the characters in the book enter a "time-quake" where they are forced to repeat the same bad choices over and over again without the possibility for improvement or redemption.

When the "time-quake" finally ends and people once again have the chance to live their own lives, most people are still gripped by Post-Timequake-Apathy (or PTA), a condition that keeps people immobilized by despair.

One of the main characters, named Kilgore Trout, is the only one who isn't gripped by this state of apathy. Towards the end of the story, he tries to revive others by repeating this motto: "You were sick, but now you're well, and there's work to do."

'You were sick, but now you're well, and there's work to do.' That's a description of ev-

ery Christian's experience. I was sick. Now I'm well. And now there's work to do. God, in his infinite love, doesn't just save us, clean us, and dump us. He saves us, cleans us, and employs us. The scriptures remind



I am the newly elected Clerk-Treasurer of Woodburn and I would like to take this opportunity express my gratitude to the citizens of Woodburn for electing me and also pass on valuable information pertaining to this job.

Since taking office I have tried to streamline the office by networking our accounting system. It is now running efficiently. I have tried to dig into wasteful spending and have eliminated some of it. For instance we no longer pay for AOL dial up that was costing the City \$256 a year. I switched it over to free AOL. We have begun to set up our own website that will be maintained by this office and updated in a timely fashion.

One thing I have tried unsuccessfully to implement is water/sewer payments only

by mail. My reason for taking away the bank as a drop box is because if a payment is made on Friday and the bank is closed on Monday then it can potentially sit at the bank for five days without being processed. City Hall does not always observe the same Holidays as the bank. The bank does not process the payments their only function is to take the payments. The payments are due at City Hall on the 15th of the month. City Hall has a drop box on the east side of the building and payments made on the 15th after hours are processed the morning of the 16th and then penalties are applied. From the 13th through the 15th, meters are being read for the next billing. As soon as penalties are applied the process of billing the next month begins. We load all the meter reads, calculate the bills and analyze excess usage and under usage and determine if there is a problem. Work orders are issued for any property that appears to have an unusual usage. When all abnormal accounts are investigated and corrected we then prepare the invoices. Our goal is to have this done in a timely matter to allow as many days between billing as possible. We shoot for the 20th to have the bill out. That allows 25 days for residents to pay their bills. So just a reminder to our water/sewer customers, the payment is due at City Hall on the 15th. If you pay at the bank close to the due date you are taking your chances of getting a penalty. We hate to say you absolutely cannot pay at the bank, but we strongly encourage you to use our drop

THE OVERHOLT DRAINAGE **SCHOOL 2012**

The Overholt Drainage Education and Research Program and The Ohio State University are sponsoring the 2012 Overholt Drainage School to be held the week of March 19-23. The five day program will be held at the Baughman Tile Company located one-half mile north of State Route 613 on Township Road 137 in Paulding County.

The school is intended for land improvement contractors, soil and water conservation technicians, farmers, engineers, consultants, sanitarians, and others interested in advancing their knowledge of drainage with an emphasis on water management and water quality.

The five day program is divided into three sessions. Attendees can register for individual sessions or for the full five day program or a combination of individual sessions. The registration deadline is March 12. You can contact Larry Brown at 614.292.3826 or your local Extension office after this date for availability and fees.

Each session will focus on a specific area of drainage or water management. Session 1 is scheduled for March 19 and 20. This session will provide training on laser surveying, topographic mapping and GPS mapping of drainage systems. Extensive fieldwork, classroom instruction and evening work sessions are planned.

The second session runs March 20-22 and will cover agricultural subsurface drainage and installation. Minor fieldwork is possible along with classroom instruction and work sessions.

The third session on March 23 will look at drainage water management, including controlled drainage system design and installation. You need to bring a calculator for the class and warm clothes and boots for field work.

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THE DEATH & TORTURE OF WILLIAM MAY

William May had a varied life. He was captured as a young boy and raised by the Indians. He was later sold and then captured by another tribe of Indians. He later escaped and worked for the Army as an interpreter. He was in and out of the native tribes and he was trusted by some and not by others.

William May and four other fellows, considered to be spies, raided a camp of natives in the Maumee area. They rode in and started firing on anyone they could see, one got wounded and May got chased into a river and his horse slipped on some rocks and went down. Well, May got captured and the others escaped. A number of Indians knew William May, as he had been a member of some tribes

They said he left once and wouldn't live with them, so he was going to die. They said, "Tomorrow we will draw a black spot on your chest and we will see who can come the closest to the black spot." They tied him up to a big post and everyone took a shot at the bulls eye. There were fifty some holes in his torso.

Another white who was tortured by the Indians, that we have record of, was in 1782, the Delaware Indians tortured and killed a Col. William Crawford. This Crawford was the man in charge of the Penn. State Militia who committed the Gnadenhutten Massacre a few months earlier. That was when they massacred 94 Indian men, women and children at a place called Moravian. They beat them to death with clubs. This was in retaliation for that massacre.

They burnt Crawford at the stake a little at a time. They prolonged his death as long as possible. He kept calling for Simon Girty to, 'please kill me', but Girty didn't come, actually he couldn't. If Simon Girty had mercifully killed Crawford, the Indians would have killed Girty, because he would have taken away their fun. Girty surpassed the Indians in the deeds of violence

Simon Girty was a no-good who would kill without compassion and was even court marshalled by the Army for treason. He fought on the side of the British and Indians at Fallen Timbers and then went to Canada and he died there

LEADING UP TO THE GREENVILLE TREATY

By: Stan Jordan Dear Friends and Readers, I called Ray Keck the other day and asked him about some of the details of the Greenville Treaty pertaining to the annuity promised to

Well, he (Ray) worked long and hard and fixed me up a portfolio with excerpts from a book by Charles Galbraith, A History of Ohio.

It is very interesting to me and I'm sure you will also find it interesting. Maybe you already know some of the details, but please go along with me because we are going to start back before the Greenville Treaties. General Anthony Wayne

was appointed to be leader of the Army and to settle the Indian's questions here in the midwest. General Mad Anthony Wayne had served very well as a leader in the Revolutionary War and got the job done, but he was not liked by everyone because he took chances and lost a lot of boys. I guess he was something like the later General Patton and Colonel Custer. I guess he had earned the name of Mad Anthony Wayne. The first treaty of Green-

ville came in 1795, but it was long in coming with a lot of distrust on both sides. But there was a lot of battles and skirmishes and a treaty was needed by both sides. As I understand there were seven forts between Greenville and the Ohio River. They were all needed and the natives were

One of the forts was Fort St. Claire named after the resigning General St. Claire. In the winter of 1791-1792 Fort St. Clair was built between Fort Hamilton and Washington. This was built under the jurisdiction of English William Henry Harrison who fifty years later became the President of the United

A wagon along with 100 Kentucky volunteers were returning home from taking supplies to Ft. Jefferson. They were attacked at day break by Chief Little Turtle and 250 warriors. This battle lasted two days. The natives left and took most of the horses and all their dead except two. Six of the Kentucky Militia were killed. The battle was won by the Indians. This battle was one mile east of Eaton, Ohio and there is a marble marker there. Well, all across that part of Ohio the whites were losing to the Indians. So General Washington put Anthony Wayne in charge and gave him about 1500 officers and men. It was his job to bring peace to this area.

Wayne had been in Pennsylvania whipping his troops in shape in what is now Legionville in southern Ohio, Wayne's headquarters.

İn 1792 in October a great Indian council was held where Defiance now stands. with Chief Cornplanter, representing 48 chiefs from six nations. The Shawnees and Blue Jacket, the great Seneca Chief who stated that he and the U.S. would have peace. He was talked down by a Shawnee chief who was in favor of war and accused the Seneca Chief of cowardice. He claimed the defeat of St. Clair was just, as the Indians had title to this land. This was part of the defiant Shawnee Chief's answer to Blue Jacket, but he did show a little bit of a compromise by a willingness of stopping hostilities with a meeting in the spring and but

was hard to swallow. "We ask you, our older brothers, to inform General Washington we will meet with him at the rapids of the

Miami next spring, at the

time when the leaves are all out. We consider ourselves as the owner of some of the land on the east side of the Ohio. We will deliver up that land for money that has been paid to some individuals for land of the west side of the Ohio." In conclusion he said, "We

will lay the bloody tomahawk aside until we hear from the President of the United States and when that message comes we'll send it to all nations.' See ya!

SAM RIVERS, INDIAN **AGENT CHAPTER 6: AT THE AGENCY**

It was at mid-afternoon when we arrived at the agency. I pulled the wagon loaded with Callie's furniture around the our side of the building so we wouldn't have so far to carry those pieces.

I kept two of the soldier boys to help me unload the wagon. I told one of the other boys to take care of the animals. The other boy was to cut and gather in enough wood for the fireplace for a couple

We unloaded Callie's furniture first because the opposite end of the house would be our bedroom and Callie told us where to put each piece. She arranged them and made the bed and we carried the stuff in. So far... a double bed, a night stand, a chest of drawers, a wardrobe, a dry sink and the pieces that go with it. Callie had all this furniture when she worked at the hotel back in North Platte. Actually she was sort of picky or par-

We had a fire going in the fireplace and enough wood for all night and tomorrow.

I had the boys carry in our two burner oil stove and filled it with kerosene and sat it on its wooden case and checked it out. It worked fine.

The boys brought in the kitchen table and four chairs and a bench that will seat at least two people, plus her old stand by rocking chair. The boys brought in all the carpets and rag rugs that Callie had and the wagon was about empty of big stuff. A lady in North Platte had a loom and she made throw rugs out of clean rags.

Callie had put the pot of Army stew on the burner. She remarked about how thoughtful that mess sergeant was to send enough stew for a second meal.

The boy who took care of the horses brought in two buckets of water from the creek. We had warm water to wash with and enough for coffee and the dishes and for breakfast also. Callie had baked two pans of corn muffins so we had Army stew, corn muffins with butter and apple butter, and coffee. All of the bowls were clean and the youngest soldier scraped the stew pot clean. All six of us sat around

the table and talked about the days activities. The youngest soldier, Junior, said that Mom always made him do the supper dishes when he was back home so He would do them now. So he washed them in one dish pan and rinsed them in another. Callie came and dried the dishes because she was a little nervous about her china. After awhile I ran a num-

ber 9 wire from wall to wall and hung a sheet on it and that made our bedroom more private. The boys had put their bedrolls on the floor in front of the fireplace and after a while it was quiet with everyone having a tiring day. It was the youngest's job to take

Everyone was accustomed to getting up early so it was still dark when I lit the lantern and said, "Okay boys, get up and roll up your bed rolls because we need the room to get breakfast."

I continued by saying, "We are going to have pancakes and I can make two at a time, so some will have to wait a little bit."

Things went smooth and Callie and I were the last to eat. By now it was daylight outside and I said, "Well, fellows, let's get with it."

We had left the wagon with the lumber in it just outside the door to the store side of the building. I asked which one is the best hunter of the four. The boy from Tennessee said he was the best shot. So I told him to go get a deer for the next couple days' meals. I also told him to shoot the deer or elk in the head. That 45/70 will make a big hole in the body of an animal.

Two of the soldiers and I started to work on our side of the building. First we built a movable counter about 10 feet long; then a number of shelves on the inside wall; then some skids or platforms to keep the blankets off the floor. On the west wall were places to hang tools or lean against the wall (like shovels and hoes), ropes and fencing and smaller tools, pots, pans and buckets. The shelves were for small stuff like beads, needles, thread, twine and a lot of Indian necessities, and some small medicine items like bottles of camphor, arts, salve, iodine and first aid items. This and a lot of other things were supplied by the government as per the treaty. There was a commotion

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outside with horses coming in from the north. We all went out to see and by golly it was Limping Buffalo and six other riders. After all the signals, I exclaimed, "I'm surely glad to see you, come on it!"





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

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DAIRY PRODUCERS RE-MINDED OF MILC PRO-

Steve Maurer, the Ohio Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director, would like to remind dairy producers of some important program eligibility requirements for payment under the Milk Income Loss Contract program (MILC). Maurer says dairy prices may authorize potential MILC payments, but all dairy producers need to be aware of the program requirements should those conditions

Dairy operators currently enrolled in MILC, need to notify the local county office if there have been any changes to their dairy operation.

If a payment rate is announced, dairy producers enrolled in the MILC program will need to provide their local FSA office with documentation showing the eligible milk production and commercial milk marketing for the months with a MILC payment rate in effect.

When producers enroll in MILC, a payment start month is selected. This month remains the same through all program years, unless a change is requested by the dairy. Dairy producers are allowed to change their start month an unlimited number of times throughout their enrollment in MILC provided that the changes are requested timely.

MILC program participants are also required to comply with FSA's Adjusted Gross Income requirements each fiscal year. This certification, on a CCC-931, must be completed prior to a payment being disbursed.

New dairies that have not previously participated in the MILC program will need to fill out the CCC-580, Milk Income Loss Contract.

OHIO FSA & RMA STREAMLINES COMMON ACREAGE REPORTING DATES

Steve Maurer, the Ohio Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director, would like to announce that FSA and the Risk Management Agency (RMA) have established common acreage reporting dates for producers participating in FSA and RMA programs. "For Ohio producers, this means the number of acreage reporting dates will decrease from five to four, stated Maurer."

Beginning in 2012, burley tobacco, spring cabbage (planted 3/15-5/31), corn, grain sorghum, hybrid corn seed, spring oats, popcorn, potatoes, soybeans, sugar beets, tomatoes, and all other crops not listed elsewhere will have a July 15 acreage reporting date. Summer cabbage (planted 6/01-7/20) will have an August 15 acreage reporting date.

Beginning in 2013, January 15 will be the acreage reporting date for apples and grapes. December 15 will be the acreage reporting date for fall barley, fall wheat, and any other fall-seeded small grains.

"These common dates between FSA and RMA will reduce some of the reporting burden on producers and allow USDA agencies to share similar data. This change does not reduce or modify the programs or services that RMA or FSA provides, but will enable most crop insurance agents and FSA County office staff to collect information in a more uniform and efficient manner,
