
BLOWIN' IN THE WIND



On Tuesday, April 24th at about 1:00 p.m. a windmill southwest of Payne, Ohio broke two blades. The event is under investigation now as to the cause of this accident that scattered large and small debris 500 feet and further throughout the field off of Country Rd. 70.

The wind turbine is operated by a company out of Houston, Texas known as EDP Renewables. Currently there are three companies operating high powered windmills in Paulding County. EDP Renewables operates 55 such wind turbines around the Payne area.

The wind mills, also



known as wind power plants, are produced by Vestas, a world leader in hightech wind power. Each tower is capable of producing 1.8 megawatts (1,800,000 watts) for a total of 99 megawatts from 55 operating wind towers. This much power is effective for powering up to 27,000 average usage homes. The rotor diameter is 328 feet and the hub height is 312 feet above the ground. Each of the 3 turbine blades are 162 feet long. The foundation is 8' deep and a diameter of nearly 58' depending on the structure. The operating wind speed is 6.7 MPH to 45 MPH.





Mercy Missions, partnering with First Friends Church, will be celebrating their 25th Single Moms & Widows Free Auto Clinic Anniversary on Saturday, May 12th.

Mercy Missions planned their first Free Auto Clinic in the spring of 1987 in Payne. It was to be for single moms only, with the goal being able to do ten oil changes, since this was the first time anyone had offered this type of free help to those in need. An ad was placed in the local paper. The Free Auto Clinic consisted of a free oil change and filter with a multipoint inspection and single moms had to be pre-registered by Friday, so the volunteer workers could have the right filters and supplies to install the next day.

Mercy Missions was well on its way by Tuesday morning that first year, four single moms had pre-registered. But God had a different plan. Tuesday evening, Pastor Paul received a call from an elderly woman requesting if they could help her with a free oil change. Her husband had passed away and she was in her 80s and only drove her car to get her hair done on Saturdays. Pastor Paul's first thought in the back of his mind was, that she was too old to be driving. Now you must remember Pastor Paul was a young pastor in his early 30s, and 80s seemed ancient to him at that time. As he is now in his late 50s, 80s are no longer ancient.

But the Holy Spirit rebuked him and told him to help the little widow lady. That day

he learned to trust and obey, when God spoke to him to help anyone who called if possible. By that coming Friday, he had 34 single moms and one widow pre-registered, but had only enough money and workers to do ten oil changes. He prayed and called everyone he knew for help. Somehow by the grace of God, a tired but happy group of volunteers finished the last car. Pastor Paul believed, as it says in Matthew chapter 25, verse 31-46, when we minister to the least of these, we minister to Jesus and as it says in James chapter 1 verse 27, 'This is pure and defiled religion in the sight of our God and Father, to minister unto orphans and widows in their times of need." So, since that first Free Auto Clinic, it has always been single moms and widows.

In 25 years, never have they been rained out, though a couple of years ago it came close. They start at 9:00 a.m. They do the oil changes in the parking lot of the church, starting with the first car at 9:00 a.m. It was pouring down rain that day, so they gathered together and prayed that the Lord would stop the rain by noon. God heard their prayers and again a tired but happy group of volunteers finished the last car after dark, that day. Single moms and widows have saved tens of thousands of dollars by help from the Free Auto Clinic over 25 years.

This year's Single Moms & Widows Free Auto Clinic will be on May 12th at First Friends Church located at the corner of East Central and South Franklin St. in Van Wert. All single moms and widows must be pre-registered by

RUNNING FOR THE LORD

In college, Wesley Korir started running at Murray State before transferring to the Louisville Cardinals. He had a good but not stellar college career. He was Conference USA Freshman runner of the year in 2004 and earned All-Region honors in 2005 & 2006.

Growing up in Sudan, Korir he would run twenty miles every day for school. Five miles to school. Ten miles for lunch and back. And then five more back home.

In 2007, Korir needed to renew his Visa. During his stay in Sudan, they had elections and things went crazy. Riots and killings. In one of the mobs Korir was caught up in, he saw one of Kenyans Olympians, Lucas Sang, killed. He eventually fled to Uganda.

Back in the States, he worked as a maintenance man at the University of Louisville. His former college coach encouraged him to run in the 2008 Chicago Marathon. In the Chicago marathon, like most major marathons, they have an official marathon with the elite runners (in this case twenty runners) and then they let everyone else who wants to participate run behind them. Korir had to run in the pack with all the normal runners, yet caught up with and passed fifteen of the elite runners finishing fourth overall and winning the non-elite marathon. A few months later, he

went to Los Angeles and ran in the Los Angeles marathon, which he won in the fastest time in Los Angeles marathon history: 2 hours 8 minutes 24 seconds. Then in 2010, he won again becoming the first backto-back winner. And in just last week, Korir won the Boston Marathon.

How I love the story of Korir rising from the poverty of Sudan to an above average college runner to the best runner in the world. If only we could bottle whatever he drinks and consume that same thing in our life. Maybe we can.

Most of the elite runners have specially made laboratory concoctions designed specifically for them to nourish their body during the run. Korir only drinks water. He claims, "I don't want my strength to come from any concoction; I want it to come from the Lord."

Oh, how we long for a magical concoction rather than continually striving every moment to be who God wants us to be. The Lord's Supper is a reminder that we want to survive on the Lord, but it isn't a magical potion.

Transformation isn't that easy. We can't just drink something and change; it takes time. The Lord's Supper isn't a magical serum that will make us more like Jesus. It's like a reset button that puts our life back into perspective. Being like Jesus takes work. It takes dedication. It's not a quick fix. We come and take the Lord's Supper every week, but if we don't mean it - if we are just going through the physical motions, then it is meaningless.

HOW OFTEN DOES YOUR FAMILY EAT TOGETHER?

Winning the Battle for a Generation by: Rick Jones, Defiance Area YFC

The highlight for my wife and I raising our three sons often took place over the times we shared meals together. Meal time is absolutely one of the most vital family times that take place according to some recent research.

The Council of Economic Advisers to the President reported, "The largest federally funded study of American teenagers found a strong association between regular family meals (five or more dinners per week with a parent) and academic success, psychological adjustment, and lower rates of alcohol use, drug use, early sexual behavior, and suicidal risks."

In addition to the social and psychological benefits, the research shows that children ages nine to fourteen who have regular dinners with their parents "have more healthful dietary patterns, including more fruits and vegetables, less saturated and trans fat, fewer fried foods and sodas, and more vitamins and other micronutrients."

More and more research is showing that family meals also may be one of the most important protective factors in preventing childhood obesity. A study by The Ohio State University found that "pre-school aged children are likely to have a lower risk of obesity if they engage regularly in one or more of ... specific household routines," and the first routine mentioned was eating dinner together as a family. Regarding doing the right things with our families, including spending time together, especially meal time; the scriptures remind us in Matthew 6:33 (NIV), "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness..." 

SAM RIVERS, INDIAN AGENT CHAPTER 13: YEL-LOW FLOWER COMES TO THE AGENCY

We got back to the agency and everything is alright. We all rested the rest of the day out in the cook out area. We had fine deer steaks and biscuits. That really hit the spot.

This morning was Thursday and we were a little slow getting around. The soldier boys cleaned up all their gear and loaded the wagons for the trip back to Fort Kearney. They would have rather stayed and worked for us rather than going back to soldiering and I am glad for the help.

I wrote a letter to General Kearney and told him all that we did back here and at the Lakota Camp. I know that the tribe trusts us and are learning the white man's way and language.

I also asked the General if in the fall when cold weather comes could these four boys help with killing some buffalo and deer for the winter meat. Farmer would like to take that new plow and plow out all of the potato crop, ours and the Indians.

Callie made the boys some biscuits and deer meat for

their supper along the road back to camp. It's going to be lonesome here for awhile.

Callie and I sat outdoors a lot and waited for the garden to grow. We made a lot of plans and talked about what we have already accomplished.

We love it here at the agency. Things are slow right now, Callie even had me carry her rocking chair out under the shade trees.

The garden is up pretty good now and we spend a lot of mornings working there. This is June 1852 and the days get pretty warm.


One of those times that Limping Buffalo and I talked around the fire, he liked to tell me about another Lakota Tribe off to the northeast. He said about the same size as his tribe was. He said he knew they were farmers and hunters and loved to live in peace. But he said some Lakota tribes to the west liked the armed conflict and he hoped they would stay away.

He said his tribe didn't even have rifles, I guess I already knew that.

Boy, it ain't lonesome here anymore. A couple days ago a team and wagon came in from Lakota County. It contained four men and Limping Buffalo and three squaws to help work in the garden. Callie and I were sure glad for the help. We have plenty of tools and the Indians are a working bunch. They do know gardening.

Limping Buffalo and his squaw, Yellow Flower, spent a lot of time with us in the shade. This is the first time she ever visited the agency or was ever around us much.

But she wants to learn the language and our ways and



anything else we can teach

Well, Callie said, "We will have class right after supper while the men talk and smoke."

One of the men wanted to attend these classes. He is Little Beaver, the son of Limping Buffalo and Yellow Flower. Little Beaver wants to learn all he can on all subjects because he wants to follow his father's footsteps and become a tribal Shaman.

Boy, this tickles all of us and we will help all we can. He is a bright young warrior and he will make a good Shaman, but it will take time and effort. He knows that and is ready to start. So, I started him right in on the Little Jim Dandy one burner oil stove. I showed him how it works and how to make coffee. He was excited right away on using the white man's tools.

One of the other natives was Half Moon, the main gardener from the Lakota Camp. He gave a pretty good report on the garden and what else he expected to do while he was here.

It was a warm night with a touch of rain in the air. We all talked until way late in the night. The natives all like the new coffee drink, but most put in a bit of sugar.

The school classes stopped at dark, but we all kept repeating the other fellow's work. I want to learn their language as much as they do mine. See ya!

But the catch here is that when Pastor Grimes caught those big catfish he didn't really turn them back in the river. What I hear is he put them on about a 20 foot piece of window sash rope and tied them to a willow tree.

Now I understand he is going to harness these river monsters and have them pull his raft in the big race. Well, there is no doubt that they can pull his raft, catfish are very strong and can pull hard. When you catch one they can tug like dead weight.

I have sat in on a couple rules and regulations meetings concerning the big race and there is no rule about harnessing a pair of shovelheaded catfish. Who would have imagined that would come up?

Well, so far that wouldn't be illegal or against any rules but it isn't ethical. This predicament will have to come up at the next rules and regulations meeting.





WHAT SHOULD YOU DO WITH A 401(K) WHEN LEAVING A JOB?

In the past, many people stayed at one job, or at least one company, for almost their entire working lives. When they retired, they could typically count on a pension, the value of which was based on their years of service and earnings. But today, workers can expect to hold several different jobs in their lifetime, and to a great extent, pensions have been replaced by 401(k) plans, which place much of the funding responsibility on employees. So, assuming you will change jobs

at some point, and you do have a 401(k), what should you do with it?

Here are your basic choic-

**Cash out your plan. If you cash out your plan, your company will likely pay you 80% of your account value, withholding the rest for federal taxes. And if you're younger than age 591/2, you may well be slapped with a 10% IRS tax penalty. Even worse, you'll have lost a key source of your retirement income. Still, if you are leaving your employer involuntarily, and you need the money, cashing out your 401(k) is an option you may need to consider.

**Keep the money in your company's plan. When you leave a company, your employer may allow you to keep your money in your existing 401(k). You may want to choose this route if you like the investment choices available in your plan. However, you might be caught by surprise if the company decides to change investment options. Furthermore, some employers may charge former employees fees to maintain their 401(k) plans.

**Move the money into your new employer's plan. If your new employer has a 401(k) and allows transfers,

**Roll the money over to an IRA. You may find several advantages to rolling your 401(k) over to an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). First, your money will still have the potential to grow on a tax-deferred basis. Second, you can invest your funds in virtually any investment you choose - stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs), etc. Third, if you own more than one $401(\dot{k})$ account, you could find it advantageous to consolidate them into a single IRA, thereby making it easier to allocate and monitor your retirement assets. And fourth, IRAs may give you greater flexibility if you plan to pass money to your children. In fact, if your child inherits your IRA, he or she has the option of stretching withdrawals over the child's entire lifetime, rather than taking the money as a lump sum. (If you do transfer funds from your old 401(k) to an IRA, be sure to use a "direct rollover" to avoid the possibility of triggering unwanted taxes.)

Before making any moves with your 401(k), consult with your tax and financial advisors. By looking closely at your options, and by getting professional guidance, you can make the choice that's right for you.



The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) announces that the driving lane in both directions on I-469, for a 3-mile stretch between Exit 0 (I-69) and Exit 6 (SR 1), are restricted for approximately three weeks as concrete rehabilitation work takes place.

The speed limit along I-469 has been reduced to 55 mph, with flashers imposing temporary speed limits of 45 mph when workers are present. The lane will have a 24hour restriction.

Once work in this area is complete, a different 3-mile stretch will be restricted. These 3-mile restrictions will continue as the project progresses.

The work should be complete by late summer, weather permitting. Arrow boards, cones and flaggers will direct traffic as needed while the work is in progress. FATAL WORK ZONE CRASHES SPIKE IN 2011

With fatal work zone crashes up 70 percent from 2010 to 2011, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Director Jerry Wray reminds motorists to drive smart and "Don't Barrel through Work Zones" as part of National Work Zone Safety Awareness Week April 23-27.

"Reducing fatal crashes in work zones begins with motorists," said Director Wray. "The consequences for driving carelessly, especially in work zones, can be deadly for both drivers and workers."

Locally, National Work Zone Awareness Week was observed with a media event on Interstate 75 at Ohio 65 in Lima where the bridge and guardrail work units with the Ohio Department of Transportation District 1 were working.

"Motorists need to remember to remain alert when approaching or traveling through a work zone. Driver attentiveness is needed because of the changes in conditions and travel patterns which are often seen within highway work zones," said Kirk Slusher, Ohio Department of Transportation District 1 deputy director.

A ten year analysis of work zone crashes in Ohio revealed fatal crashes in work zones have decreased until recently. The study showed a 70 percent jump in fatal work zone crashes from 10 in 2010 to 17 in 2011.

Locally, 132 work zone crashes were recorded within the eight-county area of ODOT District 1, up from 81 the year before.

Further analysis shows of the more than 5,000 work zone crashes annually on Ohio roads, 33 percent are from drivers following too closely.

"Although ODOT continues to use new ways to improve work zone safety, the statistics are clear; motorist error is the number one cause of work zone crashes. If drivers give their full attention, obey reduced speed limits and don't tailgate, we can make work zones safer for everyone," said Wray.

In recent years the department has been working to make work zones safer by increasing visibility of vehicles, making near realtime safety enhancements to existing work zones and improving work zone access for heavy equipment.

Wray said, "We can't do it alone. Safety is everyone's business. Remember, 'Don't Barrel through Work Zones."

ANTWERP PARKS

Antwerp boasts one of the prettiest parks in Paulding County. Riverside Park (officially The Veterans Memorial Park) was purchased from Judge O.S. Latty in 1888. At that time the park was called The Grove. Riverside Park has come a long way since then.

A lot of shade trees grace the park that is situated by the Maumee River. There are steps going down to the river if you want to explore. An old cemetery borders the west side for those people

who are interested in genealogy. There are quite a few Civil War veterans in the old cemetery. The cement picnic tables were built by men working for the WPA in the post Great Depression era. The workers earned about 32 cents an hour.

More recently, a group of energetic citizens raised money for the playground equipment-much to the delight of the children. The park also has horse shoe courts. Around three years ago a local women's group had a vision, and from that

came the Veteran's Memorial. This memorial has the names of the Veterans of the Antwerp Local School district area. The beautiful stone tablets are guarded by the Civil War soldier that has guarded the park since the late 1800's. The park also has many pavilions for those family reunions. Rest rooms and a place to play basketball also round out Riverside Park.
