LETTER TO THE EDITOR

As someone who has always enjoyed the pleasures of a good conversation, I am both frustrated and amazed by the relatively recent appearance of a growing sub-genus of mankind to whom I have come to refer as the "chronically distracted" and/or the "conversationally impaired". I ascribe the appearance of these to the development and prevalence of hand-held communication devices, many of which combine the attributes of the simple cell phone with the ability to text and to have general Internet access. These seem to have helped to create a new form of addictive behavior.

Casual observation confirms, for instance, that the number of drivers who cannot lay aside their hand-held devices while they are on the road is alarmingly large and increasing. We have all seen instances of their poor driving due to their inability to concentrate fully on operating their vehicles. Some of them are accidents waiting to happen.

The morbid fascination displayed by many as to the sometimes imprudent up-tothe minute Internet reporting by themselves and others of nearly every facet of their everyday lives, perhaps with the suggestion of commensurate undertones of narcissism and voyeurism, is disturbing. For shut-ins, the lonely, and those who are far away in military service or otherwise, such resources as Facebook, My Space, Twitter, texting, and e-mailing can be comforting and even therapeutic, but such participation should not, in my judgment, be allowed to replace or interfere with normal telephonic or face-to-face conversations and discussions. Nothing says: "I am not really interested in you or what

you think" as effectively as someone who is visibly more interested in texting, making and receiving calls, or surfing the Web while ostensibly visiting with you one-on-one. Unless one is deliberately attempting to get rid of someone who bores them (it is still rudeness), one should not act as a conversational dilettante. The attempt by some to flippantly excuse such inconsiderate behavior by praising themselves for their ability to "multi-task" is lame at best.

Cherish those among your friends and acquaintances who will still extend to you the courtesy of engaging their full interest and attention in conversing with you. As their numbers gradually decrease you may learn to value them very highly indeed.

RECIPES FROM A GREAT-GRANDMA

This recipe is one of Angel Steiner's. She shared it with us at a fellowship dinner out at church one Sunday. It makes a wonderful appetizer or is great with a salad for a light lunch.

Creamy Pesto Pinwheels

8 slices whole wheat bread 1 brick cream cheese

1 jar pesto (can be found in

the pasta sauce aisle OR make yourself, recipe below)

1. Cut the crusts off bread and roll until slice is thin

2. Spread cream cheese on bread

3. Spread pesto on cream cheese

4. Roll bread up and wrap with a piece of plastic wrap (to hold together)

5. Put rolls in fridge so cream cheese can harden, this will keep the roll shape (minimum 1 hour)

6. Unwrap rolls and slice into about 1/2" pieces

Homemade Pesto

2 c packed fresh basil

2 cloves garlic

¹/₄ c pine nuts

²/₃ c extra virgin olive oil, divided

salt and pepper to taste ½ c grated Pecorino cheese Combine basil, garlic and pine nuts in food processor and pulse until coarsely chopped. Add ½ cup of the oil and process until fully incorporated and smooth. Season with salt and pepper. If using immediately add all the remaining oil and pulse until smooth. Mix in cheese.

He current serves as the Assistant Dean and Director at the Indiana University School of Medicine, Fort Wayne, where he also serves as Professor of Neurology.

Dr. Chang received his PhD and MD degrees from the University of Illinois, and completed his Neurology Residency at the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minnesota.

The StrokeCareNow Network (SCNN) is the first network of its kind in Indiana. The physicians of the SCCN provide 24/7 remote diagnosis for stroke and vascular diseases of the brain for pa-

> The timing of treatment for stroke victims is crucial; the sooner a patient receives treatment, the more likely it is to have a favorable outcome. Using telemedicine, the SCNN makes the expertise of the physicians of the Fort Wayne Neurological Center (FWNC) available to all stroke patients in real-time to assist local emergency physicians in determining whether the patient is appropriate for the clot-busting medication, tPA, or other treatments.

The StrokeCareNow Network has quickly grown to 21 hospitals, including Community Memorial Hospital. The network hospitals have been specially trained in the detection and management of acute stroke and use the same treatment protocols as the hub hospitals (Parkview Hospital and Lutheran Hospital). 
Dorothy Saxton and her daughter, LaDonna Yoder are avid gardeners and have a steadfast flair for all things sewing. The Chapel will also fea-

The voice didn't sound right. So the thief asked again, "Anybody HOME?" a little louder.

By this time the burglar knew something was up. He shined his flashlight at the voice, but relaxed with relief to see a parrot on a perch.

"Whew! Just a stupid bird. That thing about gave me heart failure," the crook mumbled to himself. Convinced his night's work could start, the thief switched on the lights.

Health Department records include birth and death records after 1908 to present.

GINORMOUS BOOK SALE PLANNED AT PAULDING LIBRARY

The Paulding County Carnegie Library has recently undertaken a massive weeding project in the non-fiction collection. The result is thousands of titles now available for sale. The weeding process for any public library is an ongoing event; the main library in Paulding periodically undertakes a weeding that is larger in scope. Library collections are weeded for many reasons, including removing older, outdated, inaccurate, musty, worn, torn, or unused items.

The weeding process also serves the perhaps more important, underlying purpose of relieving weight on the upper level floor in the north wing. This wing was originally designed in 1915 as a reading room and books were only $% \left({{{\mathbf{x}}_{i}}} \right)$ shelved along the wall. With the additional weight on the shelves there is added pressure on the wood flooring.

In addition, we are making room for a leisure reading area in the library complete with electrical plugs for those using laptops. When the reading area is finished, patrons will be able to relax, work on their laptops and access the library's wireless internet service. This was a goal of the Board of Trustees' Strategic Planning Session held in October of 2011.

The book sale will include titles covering every imaginable subject, from World War II to the Civil War to home crafts, quilting, sports and poetry. Almost every area of the Dewey Decimal system has been reviewed. There will also be a number of fiction, paperback romances, magazines and books recorded on cassette available.

What will be left on the shelves are newer, more accurate and updated titles. The shelves will not be packed as tight and no book will be shelved on the bottom shelf, which makes it very difficult to read the book spine. Many titles will be placed "jacket out" and displayed. Patrons will find it easier to find the book they are looking for or to simply "browse" the collection.

The three day sale will take place on May 17-19. On Thursday and Friday, the sale will run from 9:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. On Saturday the sale will run from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon. All items are sold for "donation only" and proceeds benefit the main library's book budget. The sale will be held



She said, "I know it and I don't look any better in blue either." See ya!

LIVERING THE BLANKETS

It is the usual hot weather that you get in Nebraska Territory in the summer. We are a train of three wagons. Callie and I in the first wagon, the other wagons are carrying the blankets and supplies from Fort Kearney to the Lakota people. The third wagon was of the engineer squad and they are back at camp building a bridge over the creek.

We got into the camp in the middle of the afternoon with the usual talking and making welcome and a couple rounds of smoking the peace pipe.

I sat down with White Elk and Limping Buffalo and told them why we came and the contents of the wagons. We have 164 blankets, one for each and every person in the camp. I would like to have Little Beaver to help with the registering of everyone and them receiving the blankets.

White Elk said he didn't think he would help and to let Little Beaver take his place. He said he was getting too old and he doesn't feel like it either. White Elk's color does not look good. We set all of the plans and instructions of the issuing of the blankets and requested for mid-morn-

Then Callie and I ate supper with the four soldiers, and Î asked the boys if it would be alright for Little Beaver to eat with us. I want him to learn all he can about us and as soon as he can. He wants to be a Shaman like his father, Limping Buffalo.

We ate some of the Army Stew that the Mess Sergeant had sent along with some peaches.

We talked long into the night and knew we had a pretty good plan for tomorrow. It was a nice warm June evening and the time passed very quickly.

About 10:00 a.m. or midmorning, everyone was lined up to the table where Limping Buffalo called each Indian's name in their dialect. Then Little Beaver called and wrote down each one's name that he was known by such as Limping Buffalo and Little Beaver. It is almost impossible to pronounce some of those Indian names.

They were very glad to get a new blanket. This was their first from the U.S. government. We asked each lady if they would like a sewing kit. We also gave each a first aid kit. It took about three hours to give out the blankets. We worked right through the noon time.

Our soldier boys went down and helped with the garden as they had nothing to do.

White Elk spoke quite a bit through the interpreter, Little Beaver. "We are mighty grateful to the White Man leader for the blankets and other gifts."

He was really grateful but all the excitement wore him out.

We loaded up the two wagons and after a fashion we got started for home. Moe had ridden his horse over here and I gave him permission to go on ahead and ride home alone. With a steady lope he can be back at the agency and have supper with the Mess Sergeant.

We bounced along with Limping Buffalo and his son, Little Beaver, in one wagon on the return trail headed south to the agency. It was a nice day and rode right up to supper time.

After supper we all sat around and talked about how the natives liked their blankets. They don't have many blankets, they only had deer skins and buffalo hides.

We left the camp we had at the river crossing and rode right on home to the agency.





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CAN YOU TURN "BE A MILLIONAIRE DAY" INTO REALITY?

If you look hard enough, you can find many obscure holidays, but few of them can instantly capture people's interest as much as Be a Millionaire Day, which is "celebrated" on May 20. THE YELLOW WEED

In years past, mustard had the reputation of turning fields yellow; however, a cressleaf groundsel, also known as butterweed, is showing up in many fields throughout the area. Prior to 1990, this weed species was recorded in only four Ohio counties. Since that time, cressleaf groundsel has spread northward from southern Ohio.

Cressleaf groundsel is often confused with a mustard species called yellow rocket. Yellow rocket, has four petals and sepals per flower and reach a maximum height of about 24 inches. Cressleaf groundsel has an aster-type flower with 7 to 12 petal like rays, a purplish, hollow stem, and reaches a height of 20 to 36 inches. It grows best in cool wet conditions and will die out in periods of hot, dry weather, as is often found in an Ohio summer.

Cressleaf groundsel can be seen in full flower this time of year, primarily in no-till fields that were not treated with herbicides last fall or earlier this spring. These plants should be controlled as soon as possible to prevent seed production, which will occur soon and will be the source of a new infestation this fall. Seeds of cressleaf groundsel are dispersed by wind, so that seed production can affect neighboring fields as well as the field where the infestation is currently found.

Cressleaf groundsel belongs to a group of plants that are considered toxic to cattle and horses. The toxins are found in the plant highest when the plant is bud to flower stage. Fortunately, cressleaf groundsel is not very palatable and under typical grazing conditions, it is unlikely that animals will consume amounts to cause poisoning. The toxins are still present in the making of hay. To control the spread of cressleaf groundsel, you need to keep the plant from going to seed. For homeowners, it can be easily managed by hand-pulling prior to seed production. The application of 2,4-D ester in late October/early November or in late March/early April is effective when applied to small plants not more than several inches in diameter. Control of larger plants will require a mixture of 2,4-D with glyphosate. For more herbicide options on controlling cressleaf groundsel, contact your local Extension Office or chemical dealer.

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



KEYS OF THE KINGDOM: MATTHEW 16:19 LESSON #1



"And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." Before this verse we see Jesus asking his disciples the question, "Whom do men say that I, the Son of man, am?" And then he brings the question directly to the disciples, "But whom say ye that I am?" And out-spoken Peter announced that, "Thou art Christ, the Son of the living God." Then Jesus tells Peter how that flesh and blood did not reveal it to him, "but my Father in heaven." And how and who Christ church would be built? Upon this "ROCK", who is Christ himself. Jesus was directing these things to Peter because he was the first to speak up. But in reality, Jeas they started toward their goal of running a marathon in honor of all people battling cancer, and especially a current staff member at Wayne Trace that is battling cancer. Let's look at these keys. What are keys used for? They are used to lock, or unlock a door; they bind, or loosen a door. These keys cannot be applied in the physical sense, but only in the spiritual sense. Before Jesus ascended into heaven, he commissioned his apostles to do something. What was that? Mark 16:15, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." The apostles were to preach the WORD to all. But Jesus knew that this was not the only thing they needed to do. He told them to tarry at Jerusalem, and they shall be "endued with power from on high." Luke 24:49. And on the day of Pentecost they were filled with the SPIRIT of God. Those two words that I capitalized are the keys that were given to the apostles. The WORD and the SPIRIT, these are the two witnesses. The apostles could not preach

Verse 14 says, "Then said he, These are the two anointed ones, that stand by the Lord of the whole earth." This candle stick represents the church as a whole,

and the two witnesses, (Word and Spirit) are the ones who governs and direct the body of Christ, (church) and guides us into ALL TRUTH. There can be no salvation to one without these two witnesses, the Word tells us that we have all sinned and come short of the glory of God, and with God's Spirit, he convicts the sinner. John 16:8 "And when he is come, he will reprove the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment." They both work in unison and agree with the other.

Today there are many standing behind the pulpit that are not equipped with the Keys of the kingdom of God. They are not called, nor were they sent from God. It is through the Word and the Spirit that the kingdom of God is opened, it is opened (loosed) to us by our receiving Christ as our Lord and Saviour, by being obedient to him, and it is closed (bound) to them who reject Christ and are disobedient to him. "and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." These two are the government and discipline of the Church. We will continue next time on the Keys of the kingdom. May God guide you in your study.



LATTA VOTES FOR SMALL **BUSINESS TAX CUT**

Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) voted to help small businesses owners save, spend and reinvest more of their income by supporting the Small Business Tax Cut Act, H.R. 9. The legislation would provide small businesses with fewer than 500 employees a 20 percent tax cut. The legislation passed by a vote of 235 to 173.

"The Small Business Tax Cut Act is important for allowing business owners the ability to invest more of their own hard-earned money on their companies and workforce, rather than handing that hard-earned money to Washington," said Rep. Latta. "Cutting taxes will give companies the opportunity to expand and hire more employees. It's estimated that the bill will benefit over 22 million small business owners across the country, including hundreds of thousands in Ohio, reducing their taxes by almost \$46 billion."

"Regardless of the benefits this bill offers, President Obama has issued a veto threat denying any help to small businesses in Ohio who are in need of much needed tax relief. His approach hurts business competitiveness and American workers," added Latta.

There were two principles that caused the early church to stumble and become corrupt: its "ministers" and "doctrine." There is a disposition in the human heart to depart from the true and living God, and that is carnality. Man has that tendency to want power and rule over his fellow man. In the third Epistle of John verse 9, we see, "Diotrephes who loveth to have the preeminence among them, receiveth us not." Whenever man takes charge like Diotrephes and takes control of the congregation, the Word and the Spirit is killed, they are pushed aside and they leave. Corrupt ministers bring forth a corrupt doctrine.

During the third century the simplicity of the gospel was lost, amidst this pomp and splendor, and people were led to trust in empty forms, without the power of vital godliness. The clergy became corrupt, lived lives of ease and pleasure, and oppressed the people. The Gospel was not preached in its purity; the spirit of the Lord forsook the church; and error, impiety and vice prevailed. When men are left to themselves, it is not possible to think of anything too bad for them to do. Only the name of Christianity was left, and the church was like a beautiful shell, filled with vipers and reptiles and all manner of abominations.

When the Word and the Spirit is not preeminence in the church, then the church becomes a worldly church. It is no different now than it was back then. Worldliness is creeping in, and the Word and the Spirit are be-ing kicked out. The keys that Jesus gave the apostles are just as important today as it was back then. God has not changed his way of doing things, it is still the same way. There is no other way that God will accept man. We are saved by the preaching of the Word, not by programs, or belonging to some society, or having our name applied to a membership roster. Man has a deep problem inside him that these outward doings cannot touch. SIN must be eradicated by the blood of Christ, and that is acknowledging that I have sinned, repenting of that sin, and trust-
