As a courtesy to the residents of the Village of Payne on Saturday, June 9, 2012 from 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. the Village will be holding a cleanup and recycling day for the residents of the Village.

The Village will supply roll off waste containers for bulky items plus a separate container for steel only and recycle bins for paper, cardboard, plastic #1 and #2, Steel and aluminum cans, glass bottles and computer components. Batteries will be taken. Car, semi and light truck tires will be taken at a cost.

Normal bulky waste that can be brought to the site would be considered anything that a person would take when moving from house to house. Carpet must be cut 6 ft. wide pieces, rolled and tied in a bundle. Appliances such as washer/dryers, stoves and refrigerators will be taken.

Unacceptable and/or prohibited items include:

paint cans in liquid form, propane tanks, building materials, toilets, windows, construction debris, concrete, dirt, yard waste, trees, shrubs, hazardous waste, septic waste, animal remains, parts of infectious waste, motor oil, cutting oil solvents, explosives, acids, drug caustic poisons and ashes. 

JUNE IS NATIONAL CATA-RACT AWARENESS MONTH

lin, Grabill Eye Center June is National Cataract Awareness Month. Cataracts are one of the most common eye health issues that eye doctors get questions about from patients, and it's likely because cataracts are quite common in many older adults. Most everyone knows someone that has had them surgically removed. I usually say, "If you're lucky to live long enough, you're bound to get some degree of

Cataracts are opacities, or cloudy areas, in the natural lens of the eye. This lens sits behind the colored part of the eye, the iris. The lens is responsible for focusing light coming in through the pupil onto the retina. In younger people, this lens is flexible and adjusts to focus from distance to near objects. Aging causes it to harden and the eye loses this ability to see things well up close. Usually by a person's mid-forties bifocal lenses or reading glasses are necessary to compensate for this condition called presbyopia. Cataracts occur in this same area of the eye. According to Prevent

Blindness America, "Cataracts affect nearly 20.5 million Americans age 40 and older," and age is a big factor in the onset of cataracts. Most people even in their fifties are starting to show signs of the most common type, Nuclear Sclerosis, which is a yellowing or browning of the lens. Cortical cataracts, which are cloudy spokes that often start at the edge of the lens and grow toward the center, are also more common the older one gets. Cortical and many other types can also happen in younger patients, and it is possible to have more than one type of cataract at a time. Risk factors that can lead to cataracts at a younger age include: exposure to UV rays from the sun, smoking, diabetes, eye injuries, and history of eye inflammation or other health conditions that have required long term use of steroids in any form, pills, eye drops, or inhalers.

The most common symptoms of early cataracts are blurry or cloudy vision, not seeing as well as before even in your best glasses, needing more light to read, and glare or haloes around lights, especially after dark. Unfortunately, there is no cure for cataracts, and outside of avoiding the risk factors mentioned above, there are no vitamins, drops, or eye exercises that improve the condition. They never get better on their own, but can often stay the same for a many years. Initially, the cataracts can change your glasses prescription, and symptoms can often be lessened by having the most up-to-date lenses and anti-reflective coatings in your glasses. The only real treatment is to have the cloudy lens surgically removed; however, most surgeons and insurances, including Medicare, will not cover the surgery until the cataracts are advanced enough to warrant it. This can sometimes create a frustrating period for patients, even many years, where the vision is not as good as a patient may like, but is still not bad enough for the procedure. Your eye doctor can help you determine when you are ready for surgery. In many parts of the world

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where surgery is not readily available, cataracts are the leading cause of blindness. In our country, we are lucky enough to have many skilled surgeons and the surgery has become a fairly quick out-patient procedure. Currently there is no laser treatment for cataracts, but instead they are most commonly removed by something called phacoemulsification. This is a fancy way of saying that they are broken up by ultrasonic waves. This is done with a small probe that is inserted through a small incision in the front of the eye while the patient is under light anesthesia. Once the old lens and cataract is broken up, it is vacuumed out and replaced with a new implant called an intra-ocular lens (IOL). This implant is held in place in the original sac that was holding the old lens, and it prevents the need for very thick glasses after the procedure. The actual process of removing a standard cataract only takes about fifteen minutes. "Fewer than 5% of cases have complications" following cataract surgery, according to Prevent Blindness America, and recovery time is quick. Most patients are seeing better and doing many normal activities even the next day. Patients are on drops to control for infection and in-

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flammation for about a month afterwards, and the surgeon or regular optometrist schedules post-op appointments to monitor the healing process.

The good news is that once the cataract is removed, it cannot grow back; however, the sac along the back side of the IOL can get cloudy months or years later and it can feel like the cataract is returning because the symptoms are similar. This is the most common complication following cataract surgery. It is called posterior capsular opacification (PCO), or secondary cataract, and is treated with a laser in an office setting if it becomes bad enough. Decreased vision from PCO is reported to occur in 20% to 40% of patients 2 to 5 years after surgery as stated by the American Medical Association.

If you feel you are experiencing the symptoms of cataracts, or if you are in your fifties or older and it has been more than a couple years since last eye exam, schedule an appointment with an eye doctor. Your optometrist can evaluate your vision and level of cataract, monitor them over time, and can refer you to an eve surgeon for cataract removal when you are ready. Visits to monitor for cataracts are often covered by your major medical insurance, even if you do not have eye or vision insurance. Check first to see that your eye doctor is a participating provider. You can also visit preventblindness.org or allaboutvision.com for more information on cataracts or other eye diseases.

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Thanks to Dr. Yost's report concerning EACS, the local newspapers have finally awakened to the inept and cloaked management of the EACS School Board and Administration. Unfortunately a JG editorial called Dr. Yost's report "flawed" (May 18). It's really sad that some of the television stations had nothing but a "crawl". The people

of New Haven have been protesting long and loudly for changes in the board operations and in equalizing board representation. We have long been portrayed as malcontents and troublemakers by the EACS system and the media. As it turns out, I feel we have been vindicated and have every right to be protesting and doing it loudly.

If our Mayor had not had

an excellent alternate plan, then we would have been like many others who complain without a reasonable plan or solution. Mayor Terry Mc-Donald has an excellent plan and was willing to adjust and compromise, but the EACS and Superintendent Green ignored any of the plans and at times even refused to meet with the Mayor or his representatives to discuss the plan or any type of compromise. All efforts made by anyone from New Haven were ignored or rebuffed. On January 14, 2011 in the News-Sentinel, Dr. Green states "We will not negotiate its decision to move forward with its plan." The EACS plan is not a major redesign plan, but simply a feeble deception of one.

Mayor McDonald has done an excellent job with the finances for our city without sacrifice of services to his constituents. I am sure his expertise in financial planning would be of great value to the EACS Board, whether they think they need it or not. This dysfunctional organization running EACS obviously needs a qualified financial planner along with other more qualified people.

Let's look at the EACS Board individuals. One member is missing in action 90% of the time because of a new job. Her next appearance won't be until July on her vacation time. Superintendent Green has stated in the past that she is keeping her updated. My question would be who works for whom?

We have another New Haven at Large member who moved to the Leo area several months ago and has had interests there for a long time. Where were her interests?

We have yet another member who is the Lead Administrator of Blackhawk Christian Schools. Where do his interests lie? Remember

vouchers? Is there a conflict of interest?

Now we come to another board member who is on the board of the Timothy Johnson Charter School. Again, remember vouchers and conflict of interest? Finally, the Board Presi-

dent campaigned and was

elected on the promise of

not closing any Monroeville

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schools. What is his position now?

It is truly interesting that the Board for EACS received Dr. Yost's report in April, yet did not release its content until after the May election. I assume they were hoping against hope that their \$89 million referendum would

pass, knowing it really had

no chance.

In the editorial in the Journal Gazette (May 18) "Another EACS Misstep" there is this statement; "But East Allen's relationship with its faculty and staff is strong," did they read Dr. Yost's report? Do they mean they have a stranglehold on the faculty and staff? How can they say this when their employees are afraid to say anything for fear of some kind of retribution? 750 employees were interviewed and the result was an employee feeling of mistrust, undue pressure and fear. It took one retiring school principal's letter of resignation to be published for all this to come to light. I praise him for his loyalty to his fellow workers and for speaking up for them.

Let's talk about representation for the citizens of East Allen County on the school board.

The President, Neil Revnolds, paints a pretty picture of equality for the Harding area back in 1998. Others see it as the districts of lesser population taking advantage of the higher tax contributors by taking away their voting power. At that time the Adams Twp.-New Haven area contributed approximately 50% of the funding for EACS. The way the school board members were elected was passed in 1998 is the only one of its kind in Indiana and is not based on population. There are five other State-approved ways to select School Board members, yet Mr. Reynolds has stated he has no interest in changing the election process. Hmmm, wonder why. Could it be because he has a

low tax base in his district?

I wonder why the Woodlan and Heritage projects got passed with just a board vote and petitions. An attorney affiliated with the State

in his opinion, the process of the separation of projects, while legal, was definitely unethical. The ethical process would have been to lump all projects together for a vote by all. By the way, they completely left out the Leo-Cedarville area in monies for future projects in that area. Their buildings are aging too. I don't think their board member has mentioned anything about that publicly. The referendum numbers show clearly the discontent with the school system. The results of 2902 YES votes to 5139 No votes clearly shows the dissatisfaction of the majority of the entire community with the EACS School Board decisions. Then in a response to the results of this referendum Supt. Green states "*We're disappointed (by the results), but encouraged by the fact we received 3,000 yes votes," she said Tuesday night. "We'll find out where the support is and capitalize on that support." She doesn't seem to worry about the 70% of the population. *Posted on Wed. May. 09, 2012 - 01:15 am EDT EACS disappointed by referendum failure.

Board of Education stated,

I say she knows exactly where the support is.

Sometimes some of us may miss the contribution we can make to our local church family, the body of Christ.

In one of his books, Charles Stanley tells a story about a young woman named Sammi. More than one person who knew Sammi said to her, "Sammi, you have a real heart for God. I believe God is raising you up to lead praise and worship at our church." But there was one

problem with this prediction—Sammi wasn't a good singer. If you've watched American Idol, you know how dangerous it is to tell a young person she's a gifted singer when she's not. This was one of those times.

When Sammi auditioned for the worship team, she learned a hard lesson. She was used to singing in the congregation where she could belt out notes with reckless abandon. But singing in front of others was different. She sang horribly off key. The audition was a disaster!

When her audition mercifully came to an end, the worship pastor asked Sammi to stay behind while the rest of the worship team packed up the equipment. He asked her what she liked doing and asked her about her relationship with Christ. As they talked, she joked with him about how, when she was younger, her grandfather taught her to play the accordion. She loved playing it, but it was pretty old-fashioned; there weren't many opportunities to play it anyway. Then, the worship pastor said something unexpected, "Have you ever thought of playing it in praise to God?" he asked.

"No," she said. The thought hadn't really entered her mind.

"Bring your accordion to church next Sunday and, after the service, play me a song."

So she did, and when she did, the worship pastor was blown away. No more stage fright. No more anxiety-induced paralysis. But, freedom and, yes, sweet music played perfectly. She played the accordion better than anyone he'd ever heard.

The next week, the worship team added its first ever accordionist to its praise set. The week after that, Stanley writes, "Sammi brought down the house with her rendition of 'We're Marching to Zion,' a classic gospel hymn" familiar to older church members.

So, it turns out the adults in the church who made prophetic predictions about Sammi were right after all. She may not have been gifted in the ways they thought, but she was gifted. All she needed was to find out how her particular gifts could be used in the right way in the right place at the right time.

Regarding the importance of each one finding a place to serve in the body of Christ, the Apostle Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 12:24-27 (NIV), "But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honor to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other.



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ME, STAN JORDAN

Every once in a while, someone will say, "Why don't you interview yourself? Tell your own story." Well, I guess I do have a story. You don't live 87 years and not pile up some memories.

I was born in Antwerp on Wentworth Road, June 27, 1924. My parents were William and Dolly Woods Jordan. There were three boys for a while—James, Garner (Jack), and I; Grace and Ruby came along in '32 and '34.

We moved down on East Canal Street in 1928. I was four, but I can remember some of those days before the Depression. We had nice neighbors: Grandparents Jordan, Everett Carr, Ann Waters, Kay Fisher, Sam Anderson, Jim Barnhart, Sally Billman, Tom Reeb, and a lot more.

We had a light bulb hanging from the ceiling in each room. The kitchen stove had a reservoir with the warm water on one end. We had soft water in the house from a cistern, but no city water yet. Antwerp didn't get a water system until 1930. I watched them put in the water system and watched them pave U.S. 24 in 1931. I went to school at AHS, starting in 1930, and graduated in 1942.

When I was in the eighth grade, the room was large and it was the homeroom for the seventh and eighth grade. Well, there was a pretty brown haired, brown eyed girl that sat across from me and she was in the seventh grade and I liked her. We dated all through high school and we got married in 1944. I came home on a ten-day furlough

at that time. The war started in December 1941 and everyone

worked somewhere. My father died of peritonitis in 1939. My brother, Jack, quit school and worked at the Pennsylvania railroad at 62 and a half cents an hour and kept the family

I got a job at the Doering & Long Grocery Store for six dollars a week until I graduated from high school in 1942. I worked for the SF Bowser company on Creighton Avenue in Fort Wayne, making 20 millimeter shells. The going wage at that time was 50 cents an hour, working seven days a week.

My brother Jim was called to service with "A" Company of the 37th Division in 1940. Brother Jack was drafted in September of 1942. I enlisted in the army in November

I asked for the Coast Artillery Corps and I ended up in the anti-aircraft division of the same group that was part of the Coast Artillery.

I got 13 weeks of basic training at Fort Eustis, Virginia. When that was finished, I stayed over as part of

We gave 13 weeks of basic training to the brand new boys out of civilian life. I liked Virginia and it was full of history. I guess that is what put me on the hunt for more history.

The people of Virginia were very nice and kind to service men, even though it was crowded with army and navy personnel. Jamestown, Yorktown, Williamburg, Newport News, Norfolk, Richmond, and the man on the radio station called it the old dominion and I loved ev-

I got a leave home, and Pauline and I were married by Pastor Mallott at the Methodist Manse in Hicksville on January 12, 1944.

I returned to Fort Eustis and we were sent to Camp Stewart, Georgia in the sum-

Pauline was working at the GE plant in Fort Wayne, but her father needed help on

the farm and couldn't find any. So, she stayed with her folks and she was a good farm hand, as she could run anything accept the corn picker, a two row mounted IHC.

She and I lived in Denbigh, Virginia for a while, then I was sent to Camp Stewart, Georgia for a while, she came and we lived together, then I was sent to Camp Gordon, which was near Augusta. We stayed there for a few weeks.

She and a few other wives got a job at one of the Lance plants, and if you remember they took small crackers and spread cheese or peanut butter on them and that company is still in business. The pay was 32 cents an hour.

We really enjoyed those visits and time together. I got some advanced infantry training there. By now it was December of 1944, and the Battle of the Bulge was on and we got alerted. Pauline took a bus home to Ohio and I got a few days at home and then went to Camp George G. Meade in Maryland.

In looking back, we had a common, good growing up childhood just like any one in a small town at that time during the 1930's. I'm sure grateful for that, I've seen some hard times and alot of good

The Antwerp Veterans Memorial Park was about one quarter of a mile north of us. We three boys would walk down to the Cinder Road out to the park. This is now called Kroos Drive.

We could play in the park, as we took our cane fishing poles and went down and fished from the bank in the Maumee. Now there were alot of boys on the south and east side of it that did that also.

The local ball diamond was in the field over by the railroad at the end of Stone Street just behind our house.

We played ball, we went to the park, we fished alot, but we obeyed Mom-we understood if there was a train on the tracks, you waited for him to leave, you didn't crawl under the train you waited till he moved out.

By the time I was 10, Jim was 13 and Jack was 12. Yes, I was the gaffer, but they looked after me, and I learned alot

I don't have enough paper to tell you about all the good times we had fishing.

We would take the lantern and a coffee can and catch a bunch of night crawlers for bait. Or we would use crawfish scrapers to get some bait. A soft-shelled crawfish for catching fish is like a T-bone steak to a hobo. But we didn't waste anything, we ate all of the carp, bullheads, catfish. bass, rock bass, crappies and the wildlife the same thing.

Jim and Jack both were in the Civilian Conservation Corps out in the west for an enlistment. That was in the later 1930's.

I guess that brings us up to the early 1941's.

Next week, a little more on going to Europe.

FACTS ON JOHN J. SHIR-

Dear friends and readers, I have a correction to make. Over these seven years, I have told you that Antwerp's John Shirley mapped and laid out Shirley City. This name was changed after a disastrous fire

to Woodburn. I think there was some pros and cons on Well, this past week, Mrs.

Loretta McCann, a fine lady from Woodburn Road on the state line came over to our office and had an arm load of facts and figures on this subject. She told me all about the John Shirley over here in the old cemetery. He was born in 1825 and died in 1872. He was born in the Defiance area to David and Mary Clifton Shirley and they had three children. He was a big pioneer for the Antwerp area. He was a captain of the Ohio National Guard during the Civil War. John was married to Lucinda Peffley in 1848. She came out of Virginia and they had four children. There was only one of their children buried here in Antwerp, their son Franklin or Frank (1852-1874).

The man who laid out the town of Shirley City or Woodburn was Robert Shirley, his nephew. He was born in the Delaware Bend of the Defiance area. He was 18 years old and stayed with his uncle John and worked in his grocery store in downtown Antwerp. More on Robert later, but first a little more from Loretta McCann about John James Shirley.

This John James Shirley had a grocery store in Antwerp, before the big fire that took out most of the south block of Antwerp in 1888. Then he started to build the only three-story building in town, but he died before the building was finished. He also had some other achievements but I want to tell you the true story about his wife and her strength and energy.

Mr. Shirley went to the Civil War as a captain of the Ohio National Guard. I don't think he was injured but he was in a government hospital in Fort Monroe, Virginia. I think it was a sickness.

His wife contacted everyone she knew and even the Secretary of War E. M. Stanton to see if she could take her sick husband home and nurse him back to health. Well, she was granted that request. So this lady took a team and a buck board all the way to Virginia, loaded $him\ up\ and\ brought\ him\ back$ to Antwerp! Now you think about that. A trip six hundred miles each way through rain or shine. That was one momentous trip. A buck board has no springs of any kind. Just bounce! Bounce! Bounce! Well, she did nurse him back

to health in Antwerp. In 1868, he opened a new grocery store in Antwerp, about where the Keystone Salon building is. He was also half owner of a stave factory. at this time, known as Shirley and Harris.

John started to build the tall three story building in Antwerp, but he died before it was finished. He died in 1872. The funeral was so big, lots of people could not get in the M.E. Church. His tall monument was erected by Masonic Lodge #335 in October of 1873. His wife later married a Charles Hoag of Toledo. They were married for 20 years and she died in 1893. They had no children. Lucinda and Charles are both buried here in Antwerp on the Shirley lot, but no headstones were ever erected. Next week, I will have an

article on Robert Shirley.

Lewis women's volleyball senior right-side hitter Hannah Koeneman (New Haven, Ind./Woodlan) has earned 2011 All-America Third Team accolades by the American Volleyball Coaches Association. Senior middle hitter Danielle Mount (Crest Hill, Ill./Lockport) received honorable mention accolades from the AVCA.

Koeneman led Lewis with 299 kills (2.88 per set) while adding 91 blocks (0.88 blocks per set). She ranks eighth in career block assists at Lewis with 202. Koeneman recorded a career-high 31 kills in the 2011 GLVC Championship. This is Koeneman's first national honor of her career.

Mount recorded 296 kills (2.77 per set) for the Flyers. She ranked ninth in the nation in blocks per set with 1.31. Mount ranks third alltime in block assists (292) and fifth in total blocks (376) at Lewis. Her career .320 attack percentage is the highest in school history for any Flyer with a minimum of 1,500 attempts. This is also Mount's first career national accolade.

"I feel very lucky to have had the opportunity to coach both Hannah and Danielle," Lewis head coach Lorelee Smith said. "They were able to motivate their teammates and elevate the entire team's potential; and that is how I define an All-American. We will miss both of them for their work ethic, personality and of course their amazing

It's the third consecutive season a pair of Flyers have earned AVCA All-America honors. Koeneman and Mount are the seventh and eighth Flyers to earn such distinction in program his-

The Flyers finished the 2011 season 25-7 overall and with a share of the regular season Great Lakes Valley Conference title. Lewis has won 25 matches in six consecutive seasons and have appeared in six straight GLVC Championship matches.

We all stood and watched the cloud of dust, but it was still over a mile away. I could have stayed another few minutes with Callie.

I said, "Moe, why don't you get the little stove and make a pot of coffee."

Of course, he did that and brought out a few cups also. We drank that pot and Moe made another, as the horsemen were still a distance Well, the chatter ran

high, about who it could be. It looked like about a half a dozen riders. As they approached, you could see there was six of them, all natives—no arms, just bows and arrows, all on their backs. They stopped a short distance away, and gave the peace sign. We gave the peace sign back, and I waved them to come closer. We looked each other over, and Moe went into the store and brought our totem. When their leader, looked our totem over, he broke out into a frenzy of Lakota dialect. The rest of the natives grinned and nodded and said, White Elk." They recognized the Lakota beads and feathers. There was a lot of jabbering and each side could tell all was peaceful.

Moe brought out the peace pipe and fixed it up, and we passed it around to all, even

We sat around awhile and Callie called Moe into the house. He returned with more cups, cookies, and honey. He gave coffee to all the Indians and two cookies each, along with honey for their coffee. Indians like coffee, but almost all put honey in it.

Nearly everyone was talking to each other now, even the soldiers could understand some of it. Their chief, Soaring Eagle, of the Calamus River tribe, and their shaman, Rapid River, and Limping Buffalo, and his son Little Beaver, and I were in one group, and we talked a lot.

What they were interested in, was joining our Indian agency and getting help from the U.S. Government. So I called the Lieutenant of the engineers and Moe over and had them sit in and listen to all the proceedings, so when they went back to Fort Kearney, they would report all they heard and understood,

because I don't have the authority to promise them anything, but I would except the tribe into our agency, if General Kearney says to.

We all talked about a lot of items, and it was getting late in the afternoon, and the mess sergeant was still here. I told the natives to plan on the evening meal and they could go home tomorrow. Sarg made two kettles of soup. You could have stew with buffalo meat or stew with venison. Either way, there was a lot of both soups. Then he made sheet type of apple pie. We all put the pie in our empty soup bowls and ate it with our spoons.

The mess sergeant became a hero again. He shows off every once and awhile, and he is a really good cook. We all sat around the fire and talked about the big day.

Upon submitting an application his was sent through a subdistrict and district evaluation process. Finally in mid-March, his application was forwarded to the State level. An evaluation process of the application continued at the State level with a committee of Agricultural Education teachers, business individuals and past FFA members.

In March, Jacob found out he was one of the final four applications in this area in the State. Jacob then had to

submit additional pictures, complete a display board and await an interview process with a panel of judges during the State FFA Convention. State interviews were conducted for Ohio's Proficiency Award State Finalists on Thursday, May 3, 2012 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon. Jacob's display board was kept in the Hall of Stars during the Ohio FFA Convention.

Upon being named the state winner at the 84th Ohio FFA Convention in Columbus in the Celeste Center, Jacob's received a check for \$250 and a plaque. His award was sponsored by the Ohio Soybean Council.

Jacob's application will be forwarded to the National Level after receiving a critique by other Agricultural Education Instructors of state winning proficiency applications. He will have a chance to make corrections to the application before sending it onto the National Level.

SOME FACTS ABOUT CA-NAL DAYS

New Haven is gearing up for their annual Canal Days on June 5-9. Included in the activities are a car show, Karaoke, Teen Glow Dance, Quilt show, Janice Dyson Dancers, Rick Curran/Renegade, Senior Picnic, UMC Quilt Show, Heidi and Robbie, the Sweet Beats, Corn Hole Tournament, Kid's Day, Touch-a-Truck, Alumni Band/Parade Awards, Chad Beach, Spike and the Bulldogs, Midway, Food, Arts/Crafts, Merchant, and a 1 mile and 5 K run and much more.

New Haven has some pretty interesting history behind it, being located by what was the Wabash & Erie Canal. The historical Grounauer Lock was unearthed while I-469 was constructed in the 1980's. When the railroads came, New Haven was served by the Wabash and New York, Chicago & St. Louis Railroad and

the Nickle Plate Railroad. Nowadays the Norfolk

Southern Railroads run through New Haven serving the city. Route 24, US 24 and US 30 (The historic Lincoln Highway which, back in the day was the only highway to run across country. You can still travel the route today although the route is hard to find in some places.) and I-469 runs through New Haven. Soon the new US 24 will take the place of the old US 24.

The New Haven Historical Society has restored a Nickel Plate steam locomotive. The locomotive and restored Craigville Depot are housed on the New Haven site.

Interurban electric trains of the Fort Wayne, Van Wert and Lima Traction company also served New Haven.

Harry Burgess platted New Haven and the town was incorporated in 1865. It became incorporated as a city

Several of the Burgess family homes remain in New Haven. The Burgess home on Summit Street in the oldest brick structure in Jefferson Township. E.W. Green, Henry Burgess's son-in-law built a large frame Greek Revival house on the hill above what is now the Central Lutheran School, Another Burgess structure remains at the corner of Summit and Eben The French Settlement of

Besancon is on the eastern edge of New Haven along the Lincoln Highway. The St. Louis Catholic Church at Besancon is on the National Register of Historic Press.

Wow, what we don't know is really interesting! I am ready to go to the New Haven Library and dig up some more history.

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POND WEED CONTROL; KNOW THE RISKS!

The warm spring has created above normal pond water temperatures. Many pond owners are experiencing higher than desired levels of unwanted plants due to the warmer than normal springtime weather. Pond owners are looking for options to keep the weed problem from becoming worse. But you need to know - What Are the Risks? The risk of a major fish kill associated with controlling too much aquatic vegetation too quickly increases as the water temperature rises. When confronted with

an overabundance of aquatic vegetation, many pond owners know the importance of choosing the correct herbicide or algaecide to use and calculating the correct application rate. Product labels provide the needed information to accomplish this. However, pond owners need to seriously consider when to apply the selected product so as to maximize effectiveness and decrease potential risks associated with its use.

Chemical effectiveness is greatly enhanced by treating a plant problem early, before it reaches serious nuisance levels. Cattails and largeleafed floating vegetation are best controlled just after flowering when roots are weakest and the plant begins to send nutrients down to the root system. Submerged plants, such as duckweed, watermeal, and algae, should be initially treated in late spring, before high biomass levels are attained. In the case of algae, additional treatments may be necessary throughout the summer as re-blooms are quite com-

The main problem associated with mid and late season treatment of dense areas of the submerged plants duckweed, watermeal, and algae, is the increased risk of causing a fish kill. Decomposition of dying plant residue requires large amounts of oxygen at a time when oxygen production in the pond has been reduced due to the elimination of living green plants. This risk is greatest during hot weather because warmer water naturally contains less oxygen. After mid-June, the pond owner should consider spot-treating portions of the pond rather than performing a whole pond treatment. Control of emergent vegetation throughout the summer rarely causes a fish kill because it only grows in the shallowest water, decreasing the amount of dy-

ing vegetation in the pond. While spot treatments can be done with liquid formulations, most pond owners find it much easier to spot treat with granular products. Once we get to late-August, spot treatment can be discontinued as natural die-off of aquatic plants will begin shortly.

When applied at the correct time, using aquatic herbicides and algaecides can be done in a cost-effective manner with little risk of a fish kill. Many product labels provide important information related to when to apply herbicides and algaecides. These labels should be read

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

CITY OF NEW HAVEN SIREN ACTIVATION POLICY

Public safety officials from the City of New Haven would like to ensure that all residents understand the policy for initiating the City of New Haven Outdoor Emergency Warning System.

When you hear the outdoor sirens you should turn to a local television or radio station for further news and instructions. Please do not call New Haven Police, Fire, or 911 to inquire if there is an emergency occurring. Phone lines need to be free to handle calls regarding the dangerous situations and life-threatening conditions unfolding should an emergency be in progress. It is appropriate however to call in cases of an actual emergency, when witnessing a rotating funnel cloud or actual tornado on

the ground. The City of New Haven

follows National Weather Service (NWS) guidelines for alerting and as of October 1, 2007 alerts the public using STORM-BASED WARN-INGS (SBW) which are more specific so NOT to alert an entire county when only a portion may be affected. This SBW approach is designed to improve the specificity and accuracy of warnings.

Some residents have misconceptions about how and when the outdoor warning system is activated. Please be aware of the following:

- The outdoor warning system is designed only to inform those who are outside in the open areas, of a tornado warning issued for the area. The system is NOT designed to warn residents within the confines of a residential, commercial, educational or other occupancy. The City of New Haven highly encourages it's residents to purchase weather monitors as well as other means of emergency warning such a notification via cell phone or other electronic
- The warning system is in place to warn residents of tornados. The system will be activated once per warning period as determined by the National Weather Service
- The outdoor warning sirens are activated by the New Haven 911 Communications Center.
- In the event of an actual sighting of a tornado in the area, observed prior to a warning issued by the NWS, law enforcement, fire service or emergency management agency can have the sirens activated.
- The system is NOT activated for thunderstorms, other severe weather conditions or perceived imminent hazards after the initial tornado warning activation has been made.
- The warning sirens will NOT be activated to signal an "all clear."
- In the event that a previously issued tornado warning expires, and the NWS issues a new tornado warning for the area, the warning system will be activated again in response to the new warning.
- The sirens are tested once a month on the first Wednesday of the month, at noon to insure proper operation. The cycle is they will "wind-up",

then stay at a steady blast for approximately three minutes. There is no "up and down"



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1812 BICENTEN-NIAL TRAILS 2012 - FORT

Fort Brown is located on the Auglaize River at the mouth of the Little Auglaize River in Paulding County. This War of 1812 fort was to be a small supply post and was occupied for a short time. The fort was named in honor of Captain Brown, who built and commanded the fort for General William Henry Harrison's Army. According to tradition, Captain Brown and several other soldiers are buried there but they are in unmarked graves.

The Native Americans used the Auglaize River as they traveled between the Ohio River and the Great Lakes. Portage trails were used to traverse from one stream to another. The French, British and the Americans came into the land to subdue it. In the Indian Wars, General "Mad" Anthony Wayne drove the Indians from the land and conquered it for the Americans. The Ohio Lands were soon opened up for settle-

Fort Brown was one of a chain of forts built by the orders of General William Henry Harrison along the Auglaize River in his campaign to drive the British and Indian alliance out of Ohio in the War of 1812. Fort Amanda was the southernmost fort on the Auglaize River (Auglaize County), Fort Jennings (Putnam County), Fort Brown (Paulding County), and Fort Winchester on the north (Defiance County), where the Auglaize empties into the Maumee River. These forts were supply forts for Fort Meigs (Lucas County), and to guard that supply route. In 1813, Gen. Greene Clay's Kentucky Militia, forming the left wing of Harrison's army, passed this site in boats, on their way to relieve besieged Fort Meigs. The right wing would move up the Sandusky River Valley, the center wing would follow the military road made by General Hull's army. General Harrison ordered a road to be built which would ultimately connect Piqua to Fort Defiance. Much of the road ended up being built along the western bank of the Aug-

laize River. In The History of Maumee Valley by Knapp, he records that he saw some of the pickets of this small stockade were still standing, as he paddled down the Auglaize River in 1825. The township in this area was named after the fort and settlement came shortly after the war's end.

Today, a large monument placed there in 1953 marks the spot where Fort Brown stood. Bronze markers stand on either side of a granite shaft, giving a history of early life along the Auglaize River and Fort Brown. This is a peaceful site with a beautiful view of the Auglaize River, and the Little Auglaize flowing into it. Fort Brown is on County Road 171, a mile and a quarter north of Melrose, Oĥio.

LATTA STATEMENT OF MAY JOB NUMBERS

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
