PAYNE'S DOWNTOWN ABOUT TO UNDERGO MORE CHANGE



In December, 2008, the Antwerp Exchange Bank expanded into Payne opening its Payne Banking Center branch at 119 N. Main Street in a building owned by the Chamber of Commerce that the Chamber had purchased just one year prior. This was the bank's first branch location and the bank was committed to taking up more permanent residence, with drive thru lanes, etc. in the

On March 31, 2011, First Financial Bank closed its Payne Branch which occupied its company-owned building (built with green bricks), the only bank building that most present day residents know. As a consequence, the Antwerp Exchange Bank made inquiry into purchasing that building but learned that First Financial Bank was not interested in selling it (their building) to a competing financial institution and instead, had sold its building to the Williamson Crop Insurance Agency of Paulding. It's a tremendous new addition to Payne's downtown.

During the summer of 2011, realizing that the Antwerp Exchange Bank would not be purchasing the former bank building (green brick) and that they, (Antwerp Exchange Bank) might be preparing to break ground for the new Payne Banking Center on vacant ground at the north edge of town, (purchased some months prior for this purpose) the Payne Chamber of Commerce initiated efforts to try and keep the Antwerp Exchange's Bank Payne Banking Center downtown

(rather than at the north edge of town) and offered its willingness (and financial resources) to try and find an area in the downtown where the Antwerp Exchange Bank could be encouraged to build its new, stand alone Payne Banking Center branch building.

After discussing the idea with Payne's Village Officials and the Antwerp Bank Board, the three groups agreed to work together cooperatively to try and procure a section of Payne's older buildings downtown that had fallen into a state of disrepair as a possible future Payne Banking Center site. One positive thing led to another and by late December 2011, the Payne Chamber of Commerce, Inc. had purchased the northeast corner of the 100 block of Payne's North Main Street down-

Concurrently with the above sale, to help with the purchase, demolition, and land fill costs, the Chamber of Commerce sold its 119 N.

It's important to note, that as part of the sale agreement, former building owners Hacker and Sheila Combs of Paulding will maintain full and complete possession of the buildings until March 1st and may remove anything and everything from the property that they desire. On March 1st, the Chamber takes possession of the buildings, and shortly thereafter, the buildings are scheduled to be torn down and the vacant lot then sold to the Antwerp Exchange Bank... paving the way for construction in the future of its new Payne Banking Center complete with drive-thru lanes, ATM and off-street parking.




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

The Paulding and Van Wert County Extension offices are co-hosting an Agronomy Day Program on Friday January 27, 2012 in the Paulding County Extension Building. Registration begins at 8:00 a.m. and the program is scheduled from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The program will provide local agency updates from the SWCD, the Natural Resources Conservation Service, and the Farm Service Agency. The remaining morning sessions will feature Pierce Paul, Extension Specialist Plant Pathology, discussing "Wheat Head Scab" and Andy Michel, Extension Specialist Entomology, reviewing "Insect Concerns for 2012." After lunch Harold Watters, Agronomy Field Specialist, will look at "The Basics and Stretch to Get Beyond Average Yields," Greg LaBarge, Agronomy Field Specialist, will look at "Phosphorous Fertilization and . HOME FIRE SAFETY PLAN-

Studies have shown the number of deaths and injuries from fire have decreased greatly in recent years in part due to smoke detectors and other home fire prevention efforts. Yet, fire is the second leading cause of accidental death in the United States. Some simple safety measures can reduce your chance of death or injury.

How simple can safety measures be? They can be as simple as discussing a fire evacuation plan with family members and as basic as regularly changing a smoke detector battery. Fire produces poisonous gasses that make people disoriented and drowsy. Without the sound of a smoke alarm, it's possible to sleep through a fire. Fire also spreads quickly, engulfing whole rooms in seconds and a home in as little as five minutes. This leaves no time to safely grab valuables or make

a phone call. It is important to have a plan to safely exit your home in case of a fire because when disaster strikes, you will not have time to come up with one. The basis for a fire escape plan is simple: GET OUT! Seconds count. If you have a plan, you won't waste precious moments trying several unsuccessful escape routes.

The National Fire Protection Association has prepared an exit emergency plan called E.D.I.T.H. All family members should become acquainted with the "Exit Drills in the Home" to help you quickly plan your family's escape.

The basics for a good home escape plan are to plan at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Arrange a home fire alert signal to make

sure everyone is awake. Have everyone sleep with bedroom doors closed to hold back smoke, heat and flame. This provides occupants extra time to escape by alternate routes. It a window is the only alternate escape route, be sure it opens easily. Have an escape rope or ladder from up-

per floors. Once outside have a designated gathering location well away from the house where all household members will meet. Be sure everyone understands that the house must not be reentered for any purpose. Notify the fire department but not from a phone inside your own burn-

ing house. Each family member must know where to go and what to do in case of fire. Escape by walking down the hallway and out the front door may be impossible. By having plans for the worst possible conditions, your life and the lives of your family may be saved.

On the stage coach going east, I drove Chuckwallas' stage into Independence, Missouri at Independence Hotel. I walked down to the hotel here for a room and a couple meals. I have been here with the 3M Wagon Train a number of times.

Those folks were glad to see me, after they knew who I was with my Army uniform on. I told them about all that's happened, where the other boys are, where I'm going now and all about Sam being an Indian Agent. I had a good breakfast and then we talked awhile. The stage didn't leave until 10:00 a.m. so I had plenty of time to talk and still get the animals ready to go.

Well, I did all that. We got into Odessa in good time. It was just another day of traveling. I was up on top and one lady passenger inside.

After we left Odessa, I was just a passenger and rode inside for most of the morning. I rode up top with the driver for the rest of the day. The ground here is flat and a pretty smooth ride. There was a lot of traffic here, going both

The next station was the Black Water Station. It was pretty modern and up to date. A good kitchen and pretty good beds. I guess this is still part of the Oregon Trail. This runs almost straight east out of Kansas City through Independence, Columbia and straight into St. Louis. It is a pretty good road with a lot of wagons going each way.

It will be about three more

days on the stage coach and we will be in Columbia.

I haven't written for awhile. We have been here in Columbia for a few days. This is August 29.

This is part of a letter to my mom in Oregon:

"I have walked around town quite a bit and out to the university, just getting a little acclimated. I have walked around the school and out around the barns and horse corrals. The place is pretty big and well taken care of. I have been a student here for a week now and I am getting used to the routine. We have breakfast at 7:00 a.m. but that is after we have had one hour of drilling and one and a half hour of exercise. Classes start at 8:30 and continue until 11:30. We have an hour break for lunch and study.

"Weather permitting, we use the first part of the afternoon for training with horses as this basically will be a cavalry outfit, although there is some infantry.

'Several boys take infantry, some cavalry, some supply, some intelligence, some take the basics for artillery but no big guns here. Myself and a few other boys are in the Veterinary School. There are some subjects that I don't care for, but I still enjoy working with the animals and that part of the school.

Some of the professors are Army officers, few are civilian folks. But I get along good with all of them. We must study a lot, but we get

"Everyone here is aware of my good luck charm given to me by Limping Buffalo and White Elk, Chief of the Lakotas. Our commanding officer here is Martin Morgan, a Bird Colonel. He says if a soldier is given an award by a foreign country you can wear it on your uniform. Then he reasoned that my good luck charm was a reward from the Lakota nation, and therefore, I could wear it on my uni-

"Mom, I will write when I can. It will take the Pony Express and the Wells Fargo stage line about a month to get a letter to you. I guess it is about \$5.00 for an ounce and a quarter, but that is a bargain, as I have been all over that area. I will write when ever I can.'

Well, friends and readers, that is the end of Billy Metzger's Journal. We wanted him to grow up and to become a Veterinarian. His three years with the 3M Wagon Train probably was very good experience in every way. The men on the wagon train had very high morals and that was needed for a boy from 15-18 years in age. I feel assured that Billy will graduate as a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine in 1855 and he will be an Army officer.

In the next few issues of the WBN, we will bring you a character sketch of all the people that we encountered on the Oregon Trail and maybe a look into the future.

We want to you stay with us in the settling of the west in the era of the 1850's. Soon we will bring you the adventures of El Paso Sam as he marries Callie out there in North Platte and he becomes the Indian Agent for the Lakota nation, a new and very important step for all.

DRAWING NEW CONGRES-SIONAL LINES IN OHIO

The criticism constantly swirling around the redistricting process over the past couple of months has certainly worked to the Democrats' favor. From the beginning of the process, they apparently were only interested in obstructing the process and standing in the way of the legislative lines being drawn. At the beginning of the

process, Republicans and Democrats were given equal amounts of public money. The purpose of this money was to conduct research and generate new congressional maps. Only after seeing each map could the two sides come together and make revisions and concessions. Republicans used their resources for the intended purposes—drawing a new map. Meanwhile, however, Democrats were using their money to hire Innovation Ohio, a liberal think tank designed to help the party with matters that they obviously believed were more important, such as generating a negative PR campaign against Republicans and assessing possible violations.

Knowing this, it is not surprising that at the time the first map was to be debated on the House floor, Democrats were unable to offer a map of their own. In fact, the only map they ever introduced came from a Republican state legislator in

That Democrats have criticized the congressional map is fair. Voicing concerns and opinions in a public setting is what being a legislator is all about. But for them to continually sling rocks and arrows at Republicans, without submitting a map of their own is irresponsible and, frankly, unfair to the taxpayers they represent. Despite the highly conten-

tious atmosphere generated by the drawing of new district lines, I am happy with the final product. House Bill 369, which established the new boundaries, passed through both the House and Senate with vast bipartisan support. Because of Ohio's slowing population growth over the past decade, the state has lost two seats in Congress. We took a bipartisan approach to cutting these seats, including drawing two Republicans into a primary and two Democrats into a primary.


It repealed the provision in the previous redistricting bill that established two primary dates, rightfully restoring a single primary date. The bill also addresses the contempt and anger that many people have against this process by establishing an eight-member, bipartisan panel of legislators that will propose ideas for how district lines should be drawn in Ohio. Those meetings are already underway.

My goal is that, by the next time these lines need to be drawn, legislators will be forced to add two congressional seats, as opposed to subtracting them. For that to happen, we must remain committed to our primary goal in the legislature: bringing jobs back to Ohio. We are off to a good start, and I expect more good things to come.

PAULDING HIGH SCHOOL ANNOUNCES ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

Paulding High School will hold its 16th induction ceremony of the Paulding High School Athletic Hall of Fame in between the junior varsity and varsity basketball games against Ottoville on Saturday, January 28. Two individuals and the first ever team will be inducted on this night. The individuals are Ryan Collins, a 1994 Paulding graduate, and Jerry DeLong, a 1960 Paulding graduate. The first team ever to be inducted into the Hall of Fame will be the 1978 Paulding High School football team.

Ryan Collins graduated from Paulding High School in 1994, where he earned two letters in football and four letters in wrestling.

During his football career, Ryan earned those two varsity letters while also serving as a captain his senior year. During his senior year, he earned 2nd team Northwest Conference and Honorable Mention All-District honors as an offensive lineman. It was on the wrestling mat

as a heavyweight where Ryan really excelled during his high school athletic career. His freshman year he was the 2nd place finisher at the Sectional Tournament, which moved him on to the District Tournament. He finished his freshman year with a record of 25-6. Ryan went another step farther along the tournament trail his sophomore year as he was the Sectional Champion and placed 5th at the District Tournament. By doing this, he was a 1992 State Tournament Alternate. Ryan completed his sophomore year of wrestling with a 26-5 record.

Ryan's junior wrestling season was an outstanding one. He posted a 26-2 record while also defending his Sectional Championship. Ryan finished 3rd at the District Tournament to qualify for his first State Wrestling appearance. He became the first Paulding wrestler to earn a place at the State Wrestling tournament as he finished 2nd. During his junior year, he also was named to the Lima Area All Star Team and finished 7th at the Junior AAU National Tournament.

Ryan followed that season with an even better one his senior year. He won the Sectional Championship for the third straight year and backed that up by also winning the District Championship. Ryan took an undefeated record to the State Wrestling tournament and came away with his second straight runner-up finish. He finished the season with a record of 34-1, became the first two-time state placer in Paulding history and earned the 1994 Crescent-News Wrestler of the Year. Ryan finished his high school wrestling career by finishing 4th at the High School Senior National Wrestling Tourna-

Ryan went on to college and wrestled at Capital Uni-

versity, where he became an NAIA All American and finished 5th at the National Tournament. Ryan currently resides in Columbus, Ohio and works

as an Activity Therapist for the Ohio Department of Cor-**Jerry DeLong** graduated from Paulding High School four each in football, basketball, and baseball, and three in track. During his basketball ca-

reer, Jerry was the leading rebounder and leading free throw shooter for the team his senior year. Also as a senior baseball player, Jerry batted .504 with 18 stolen bases for the District runner-up baseball team. Football would end up

being the sport that Jerry excelled in the most during his time at Paulding. He was three year starter on teams that went a combined 21-4-1 and won two conference championships. Jerry was the starting quarterback his sophomore year and finished it scoring eight touchdowns on an 8-0 football team. As a junior, he scored eight more touchdowns and earned not only the team Most Valuable Player Award, but also 2nd Team All State. Jerry's senior season

proved to be his best as he rushed for 1234 yards and scored 134 points for a team that finished 8-1. His rushing and points totals were the most in Northwest Ohio. He was a co-captain that season and earned 1st Team All State. As a defensive player, Jerry recorded 18 or more tackles in three consecutive games, with two of those totals being over 20.

After high school, Jerry went to Defiance College and later became employed at Dana Corporation, where he worked for 39 years and retired in 2000.

The 1978 Paulding High School Football Team will become the first team to be inducted into the Paulding High School Hall of Fame.

The 1978 Football Team finished the season with a perfect 10-0 record, which was the first undefeated season for Paulding High School since 1957. This team won the second straight outright Northwest Conference Championship and their ten wins set the school record for most wins in a season.

Some of the highlights from the season include:

-Finished rated #7 in the state by the UPI and #10 in the state by the AP.

—Continued winning streaks of 14 straight games and 12 straight Northwest Conference games, including ten straight road wins.

The defense recorded an astounding seven shutouts and only gave up 20 points the entire season.

-The defense ranked first in the Defiance (34 teams) and Lima (51 teams) areas.

-The team average ma gin of victory was 20 points per game.

The team ranked first in defense and second in offense in the Northwest Conference.

-Ten Panthers earned 1st Team Northwest Conference honors with five more earning Honorable Mention.

Five players earned All-Ohio recognition with one 2nd Team and one 3rd Team recipients. Also had a player par-

ticipate in the Ohio North-South All Star game. The head coach of the team was Steve Clark. He was assisted by varsity assistants Bill Shugars, Dale Nienberg

OHSAA BOARD OF DIREC-TORS MEETING HIGH-**LIGHTS – JANUARY 12,** 2012

The Ohio High School Athletic Association Board of Directors met Thursday morning at the OHSAA office in Columbus for its regularly scheduled January meeting. The following are highlights from the meeting. The complete set of meeting minutes will be posted at OHSAA.org in the near future.

The Board approved a memorandum of understanding with The Ohio State University to extend the contract for the Jerome Schottenstein Center to host the OHSAA's wrestling, girls basketball and boys basketball state tournaments through 2015.

The Board approved the initial list of referendum items that will go to the membership for vote during the annual referendum voting process in May. The initial list is now posted at OHSAA.org and includes one constitution

item and three bylaw items. The Board unanimously approved a motion to continue to support the work of the OHSAA's Competitive Balance Committee, which meets again January 31. The motion was in response to a letter received from an Ohio public school superintendent that requested the Board of Directors immediately create a referendum item to go to the membership this spring that would place public and nonpublic schools into separate tournaments.

The Board approved the OHSAA to conduct an an-OHSAA-sponsored cross country invitational at National Trail Raceway (site of the state championships) in August prior to the start of the regular season. Participation in the event would not count toward a team's allotted total of 16 regular-season contests. Junior high teams will also likely be permitted to compete in the event. Details will be released as they are finalized.

The Board reviewed a list of recent infractions and penalties involving four member schools. Details will be included in the complete set of meeting minutes posted at OHSAA.org, but media may request the information in advance via email from Tim Stried, OHSAA Director of Information Services.

The OHSAA Foundation will sponsor three student leadership conferences in March, including March

12 at the Columbus Zoo and Aquarium, March 27 at Wright State University and March 28 at Kent State University-Stark County Cam-

The Board heard proposals from three fall sports and will take action on each proposal at its April meeting. The proposals include:

The cross coaches association made a proposal that would allow disabled student-athletes who compete at Special Olympics or Paralympics during the interscholastic season to return to their high school team and compete.

-The volleyball coaches association made a proposal that during OHSAA tournament contests, line judges be certified to perform that duty by the Professional Association of Volleyball Officials or an equivalent licensing organization.

The field hockey coaches association made a proposal that the start date of their 2012 season be changed from August 25 to August 18 so that it coincides with soccer.

—The soccer coaches association deferred its proposal until February.

—The Board approved Paul White from the Southeast District and Dale Creamer from the Southwest District as the OHSAA's designated honorees on behalf of a contribution to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. They will be honored during the boys basketball state tournament.




UNDEFEATED WRESTLING TEAMS SQUARE OFF

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

ODOT OUTLINES LOOMING FINANCIAL CRISIS

After a year of discussing the looming transportation financial crisis facing Ohio, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) released funding projections that could result in pushing back by decades some of the state's largest construction projects.

ODOT staff made the recommendations during a presentation to the Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC), a bi-partisan group responsible for approving funding for the State's largest transportation projects.

"Unfortunately, this is Ohio's new reality. For far too long, previous administrations have added more and more to the list of TRAC projects knowing that there were more projects than funds available," said ODOT Director and TRAC Chairman Jerry Wray. "Their poor planning has put us in the position of making the tough decisions and delivering the bad news to many communities throughout the state that there simply is not enough money to fund their proj-

The TRAC is wrapping up a year-long process of receiving and reviewing applications for transportation funding projects throughout the state. The TRAC received 72 applications in 2011 for new transportation projects totaling nearly \$10 billion. Planning, design and construction of various phases of additional projects totaling \$2 billion is already underway. However, ODOT only has roughly \$100 million per year to spend on new construction.

ODOT is funded completely with state and federal motor fuel tax and has seen that revenue shrink over the past several years. As vehicles become more fuel efficient and fuel consumption decreases, so does the amount of revenue generated to pay for Ohio's infrastructure and create jobs.

"We know transportation is the lifeblood of Ohio's economy and we cannot sit back and do nothing about this dire situation," said Wray. "We are going to be looking at new and innovative ways to reduce costs and generate ad-

ditional transportation fund-



The TRAC now faces the daunting task of rejecting a portion of the applications for new funding, while ODOT must consider innovative or alternative funding sources to pay for the state's growing infrastructure. The nine-member Trans-

portation Review Advisory Council was established by the Ohio Revised Code in 1997 and provides guidance for developing a project selection process for ODOT's largest investments of more than \$12 million.

LATTA STATEMENT ON SOPA AND PIPA

Congressman Bob Latta (R-Bowling Green) issued the following statement regarding Stop Online Piracy Act (SOPA) and Protect IP Act (PIPA):



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DELAY IN INVESTING COULD PROVE COSTLY

You've no doubt heard that "time is money." While this expression may be applicable in many areas of life, it's especially relevant for investors — because the more time you spend not investing, the less money you are likely to have when you really need it, such as during your retirement. That's why it's essential that you don't wait to start saving for your days as a retiree.

Many people think it won't make much difference if they delay investing for a few years. As you know, time flies, and before you know it, "a few years" turns into a decade — and a decade's postponement in saving for retirement can make an enormous difference in your

How big a difference? Suppose you plan to retire at age 65. If at age 25, you began putting \$200 a month into a tax-deferred vehicle, such as a traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA), and your investments inside that IRA hypothetically earned on average 7% a year, you would accumulate about \$512,000 after 40 years. However, if you had waited until you were age 30 to start saving for retirement, with all else being equal, you'd end up with only about \$355,000 when you reached 65 — \$157,000 less — due to that five-year delay. And if you waited 10 years, until you were 35, you'd end up with about \$243,000 — far less than half of what you would have accumulated had you started saving at 25. (Keep in mind that you will eventually have to pay taxes on these accumulations, and the actual figures don't reflect fees, commissions or

Clearly, the cost of delay can be considerable — which is why you should consider taking these steps:

**Develop a strategy with your financial advisor. It's easier to stick to a strategy if you know where you're going. Your financial advisor can help you determine how much you need to save to reach the type of retirement you've envisioned.

**If you haven't started saving, begin now. If you wait until you feel more financially comfortable before you invest for retirement, you may never begin. Even if you can put away only a small amount, such as \$50 per month, you'll have made

**To make it easier on yourself, set up your accounts to automatically move a set amount each month into your IRA. As the above examples show, the best way to build substantial savings is to start early, but even if you're in your 30s or 40s, you can catch up — although you'll need to save more to potentially get to the same level.

**Increase your investments when your income rises. Every time you get a salary increase, boost your contributions to your IRA and your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement

**Don't take a "timeout" from investing. Keep on investing, whether the "news of the day" is positive or negative. The best investors are those who follow a consistent strategy and continue investing, year in and year

In short, save early, save often — and keep investing.

CONGRESSMAN LATTA ANNOUNCES NEW LAW THAT ALLOWS SCHOOLS **TO DONATE LEFTOVER FOOD TO CHARITIES AND PANTRIES**

Congressman Latta (R-Bowling Green) announces that a new provision in the Department of Agriculture's annual spending bill will allow public schools to donate excess food to charities and pantries. The new provision by Representative Frank Wolf (R-VA) now ensures schools are covered under the Good Samaritan Act, which protects donors who give to food banks in good faith from all liability. Previously, many school districts didn't donate food out of concern that they weren't covered under the Good Sa-

"As a result of this clarification, each school and local educational agency participating in the school lunch program may donate any food not consumed under the school lunch program to eligible local food banks or charitable organizations," said Rep. Latta. "This long overdue, common-sense change will allow schools to boost the inventory of food pantries at a time when donations are greatly needed,"

Congressman Latta has sent school principals and food bank directors across the Finn Congressional District a letter informing them of the new change.

FSA REMINDS PRODUC-ERS THAT SIGN-UP FOR DCP AND ACRE PRO-GRAM ENROLLMENT BEGINS TODAY

USDA Ohio Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Steven Maurer, reminds producers that enrollment for the 2012 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) and the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program begins today, and continues through June 1, 2012.

"New contracts are required annually for each of these programs and all signatures must be obtained by the deadline", said Maurer. "We encourage producers to call their local county office and set up an appointment to begin the enrollment process as soon as possible. This will allow adequate time to obtain all necessary signatures before the June 1st deadline."

The 2008 Farm Bill states that no 2012 advance direct payments for DCP and ACRE will be issued. Direct payments are paid at a rate established by statute and are expected to be made in October 2012.



LATTA DENOUNCES PRESI-DENT OBAMA'S DECISION ON CONTRACEPTIVE COV-ERAGE MANDATE

Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH) made a statement after the Obama Administration announced that it will

not expand the exemption for religious employers from the requirement that all health plans cover contraceptives approved by the FDA:

The rule requires organizations like religious schools and Catholic hospitals to offer contraceptive coverage to employees covered by their health plans - even if doing so violates their faith. The new rule dramatically alters the federal framework for conscience protection and has far-reaching impacts on patients, employers, providers and faith based-institutions. The Administration will grant organizations 1-year waivers to come into compliance with the mandate.

Note: H.R. 1179, introduced by Representative Jeff Fortenberry (R-NE) would allow religious organizations to decline coverage of specific items and services that are contrary to their religious beliefs. Latta sits on the Health Subcommittee of the House Energy & Commerce Committee, which held a hearing on this issue on November 2,
