## PAULDING H.S. HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES



Paulding High School held its $16^{\text {th }}$ induction ceremony of the Hall of Fame Saturday, January 28.
The 1978 Paulding High School Football Team will become the first team to be inducted into the Paulding High School Hall of Fame. The 1978 Football Team finished the season with a perfect $10-0$ record, which was the first undefeated season for Paulding High School since 1957. This team won the second straight outright Northwest Conference Championship and their ten wins set the school record for most wins in a season. Some of the highlights from the season include
-Finished rated \#7 in the state by the UPI and \#10 in the state by the AP.

-Ten Panthers earned $1{ }^{\text {st }}$ Team Northwest Conference honors with five more earning Honorable Mention.
-Five players earned All-Ohio recognition with one $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team and one $3^{\text {rd }}$ Team recipients. Also had a player participate in the Ohio North-South All Star game.

The head coach of the team was Steve Clark. He was assisted by varsity assistants Bill Shugars, Dale Nienberg and Mark Burton. Randy Short and Ted Wunderle served as freshmen coaches that season.

Many of you may know me in real life, but many of you probably just know me through these articles I write here in the West Bend News. Whatever the case, I am thankful that you take time out to read what I have to say. This week's article is different than most of my articles. ent than most of my articles.
Today, I am writing to share with you a great opportunity that God has blessed me with and to ask you to partner with me in watering the thirsty Last summer, Riverside Christian Church put on the Rock 4 Water, a music festival in the Riverside Park in Antwerp, to raise funds for Hope 2 Liberia. When I originally had the idea to raise money through a concert to provide safe drinking water for people in Africa, I had no idea where that money would go to. Through the recommendation of friends, I eventually found myself sitting in ally found myself sitting in
an office in Muncie, Indiana, with two guys, Sam Wrisley and Dave Rawls, who have an amazing passion for our Lord and His work. They shared with me the idea behind Hope 2 Liberia.
It's Hope 2 Liberia's vision "to provide safe and living water for the nation of Liberia, resulting in better health, available education and stronger leaders; all culmistronger leaders, all sense of hope." They do this through establishing Hope Centers. A Hope Center provides safe drinking water and a place for the local church to meet. If you are interesting in learning more, you can read about Hope 2 Liberia at www.hope2liberia.org.

This is where the opportunity that I have been blessed with comes in. I have been asked to go to Liberia and teach at a conference for the new church leaders in the area. The work that Hope 2 fruit, both spiritually and fruit, both spiritually and physically. People are receiv-
ing the Word of the Lord and receiving safe drinking water. What is being done right now will impact the Kingdom of God in Liberia for generaGod ins.
tions.

Liberia is a small country in West Africa with a population of 3.3 million. Each year over 65,000 Liberians die from malaria alone. Many more die from dysentery, cholera, tyfrom dysentery, cholera, ty-
phoid and infectious hepatitis due to compromised water.

One out of four children under the age of five dies due to water-borne illnesses. Unsafe drinking water is the cause of the majority of discause of the majority of dis-
ease in Liberia. Having reease in Liberia. Having re-
cently emerged from a 14 year civil war, Liberia's infrastructure has been destroyed, and hundreds of thousands of its citizens were killed, maimed

and displaced due to this devastating conflict.

With little infrastructure in place, an unemployment rate over $85 \%$ and a lagging economy, the people of Liberia are in need of help. It is time to take a stand, make a choice, and help end the needless deaths of innocent Liberian People.

Although this is a trip that will include teaching at a conference of local church leaders, I will also spend the rest of my time serving to estab lish more safe sources of water for the people of Liberia.
Will you serve with me? Your help will assist in providing training for church leaders and safe drinking water to the people of Liberia. It might be cliché, but honestly, together, we can make a difference.

First, I ask that you would pray for me and the three other guys going on this trip It is a small group with a focused mission. We plan on getting a lot done through the conference and working on providing additional sources of clean drinking water.

Second, I ask that you would consider supporting me financially. Without the help of people like you, I will not be able to afford to go and help the people of Liberia. Hope 2 Liberia is pay ing half of the costs for my trip because they want me to teach, but I have to raise $\$ 1900$ on my own. If I raise more than that, it will just go to buy more water systems and increase the blessing. I you choose to financially support me, you can send a check

There is not a day that I can remember when I didn't make him laugh-either from me acting goofy or me telling him a story. Whatever it was, I know he was at least happy to have me around. And in those six years, every time I walked through the door, he knew through the door, he knew
me. It was not a question. He me. It was not a question. He
loved to come watch me ride my dirt bike; before he came to live with us he would come to the track and watch for hours. Then when he came to live with us, he continued to live with us, he continued
to watch. He absolutely loved it. He also enjoyed watching me run track. He only came to a few meets, but the few that he did come to I was so happy to have him there. I took him on a few runs with me in his wheelchair during the summer time which he enjoyed.
Over the six years we did talk about his children. We talked about my father and mother, and we talked about the "good" and the "bad" children in his words. He was grateful for my mother and father for taking him in. He was grateful to go to work with my father and feel like he was needed. He was grateful when I would come home and spend time with him, even if it meant him dozing off in his chair. He was grateful for me putting a marshmallow on his head and then laughing about it,
or all the other silly jokes I would play on him. When he was at my wedding and was able to dance with his daughter, he looked like he was the happiest man on the earth. They twirled around

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and laughed. I will always cherish that moment and the
pictures I have to look back on

ones. Out of nowhere I said, "Let's have Christmas tonight." So we all agreed. My wife and I drove to Defiance and got the presents, and my sister-in-law went to their sister-in-law went to their

We have stopped at North Platte, Scott's Bluff and into Wyoming Territory and then into Fort Laramie.

We miss Billy Metzger because he always took care of the animals and wagons. We stopped at the same livery stable and got all of those things done. The man there asked about Billy and we explained where he was and how the 3M Wagon Train would soon be disbanding after we get to sutter's Mill.
We told Mom at the restaurant where Billy was and how he liked her food. We also ate there all the time we were in Fort Laramie.

Not much to tell about, we went by Douglas, Glenrock and Casper. We turned south here and followed the North Platte River to where it originates. We traveled west at Alcova past Devil Gate, Split Rock and Martin's Cave.
There ain't anybody along here. A few hills, lots of rocks and Aquino Mountains. This is a rough part of the trail.

We went into a big forest and it carried all the way to Idaho. All there is are trees or rocks and more rocks.
I haven't made any notes for a couple weeks. I don't know how Billy did so well. We are now nearing Twin Falls. Sam says we turn south here into Nevada.
We left Twin Falls and finally got down into Nevada. We repaired everything at Winnemucca and then on south, nothing but all over nothing. We bounce along and we finally get into Truck-
Now we are on our last leg into Sutter's Mill location of the gold strike. It is now August $3^{\text {rd }}$ and Sam and I want to leave California by the $15^{\text {th }}$.
We emptied the wagons like the other times and had a sale, a good sale. All those
oil stoves went the first day. I guess the ships bring in kerosene now. Yes, oil is no problem now.

The gold strike is three years old now and the miners don't find the gold as easy as
before. It is sort of petering before. It is sort of petering
out. Well, the sale went fine and what didn't sell we moved into the big hardware store. We all met in the big dining room of the hotel last night and discussed the future.
Big Chief Yellow Pencil Hiram is leaving the 3 M Wagon Train here in California. Hiram is going to stay with the
Brannan Brothers for awhile until he can find an office building in Sacramento. He
is starting his own business of accounting and will do the

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brothers' books.
We told them all that Sam was going to get married when he gets back to North Platte. Well, Issue Wee, our Chinese friend, really likes El Paso Sam so he gave him a pound of gold dust for a wedding gift, that is around $\$ 320.00$. He can really use that when they get settled down.

The Brannan's sold the wagon that Hiram had to Sam for $\$ 50.00$ for the wagon and $\$ 30.00$ for the team. He needs that wagon because he didn't have one of his own and he will need one to bring his new wife and furniture from North Platte to the Indian Agency.
I will travel by himself, but will be a part of a 2 wagon train. After they arrive at Fort Kearney, Sam and his new bride will leave the trail there, but I will go on alone all the way back to Moline, Illinois and work for the John Deere company.

Sam and I left Sutter's Mill about the middle of August with 2 wagons. We pushed the teams right along on about the only load they had was feed for the animals and themselves. We hated to leave Hiram and all the Brannan's and the gold strike area. Once in awhile we mentioned how much they missed Billy Metzger. But we know he is better off going to college and building his future and to take care of his natural ability.
Stan's note: This is all
Billy Metzger's Journal for awhile. I wanted to show you about how things were back in 1848 in the wagon train day-how the people train day-how the people got along as best they could.
Their characteristics and high morals were top-notch. It was the time before the Civil War. The whites had not caused trouble with the Indians. The Lakotas were not a warring people, they grew some vegetables and hunted for meat.
I am going to write about El Paso Sam River's becoming an Indian Agent. I am going to do it in the first person category. That is like I did in the egory. That is iike Idid
story on Billy Metzger.
I enjoyed doing that story and I certainly appreciate you folks reading it and your comments.

So please hang in there and next week we will get Sam and Callie married there in North Platte, Nebraska Territory.

## TECH. SERGEANT DORCY

 WATERSBy: Stan Jordan
The following information about the death and return of his body to Antwerp Cemetery has been given to
me by Mary Ellen (Waters) me by Mary Ellen (Waters)
Holbrook a relative of Dorcy and she lives in Paulding. I am very pleased to receive and pass on that information about Sgt. Waters.
We were neighbors on East
Canal Street. In September of 1930 Dorcy carried me on his shoulder to my first day of school. I had stepped on a of school. T had stepped on a
black thorn and couldn't walk very well.

Right across the street was the home of Glenn and Anna Belle Sudlow. Glenn was a sailor in the U.S. Navy and went down with his ship 'The Noel' in the Battle of Iron Bottom Bay in 1943 in the South West Pacific in the area of the Solomon Islands.

This is two of Antwerp's five heroes of Antwerp's Ca-
nal Street who gave their lives

Dorcy Wayne Waters was a technical sergeant in the $339^{\text {th }}$ Bomber Squadron of the $96^{\text {th }}$ Bomber Group during WWII. He was top target gunner on a $\mathrm{B}-17$ with the gunner on a B-17 with the
$413^{\text {th }}$ that was shot down on May 12, 1944 over The Main River close to Frankfurt, Germany. He was born May 28, 1913 in Antwerp, OH and lived on Canal Street with his parents Ray and Anna Waparents Ray and Anna Wa-
ters; brother, Ray and sister, Zeletta. He enlisted in the Army on September 15, 1942 at Camp Perry, OH.

On May 12, 1944 the $96^{\text {th }}$ Bombardment Group's mission was to attack the marshaling yards of Zwickau, Germany or an alternate site of the oil industry at Brux, Czechoslovakia.

The following is one of the reports filed by returning airman who was a navigator. "When we arrived in the vicinity of Frankfurt, we were attacked by about 45 enemy single-engine fighters. They single-engine fighters. They
made about five passes and made about five passes and
knocked out all but five of us. We joined the lead group as a low squadron and followed them. Because both pathfinders had been knocked out in the lead group they decided to follow the $4^{\text {th }}$ Combat Wing and drop on the same target. We dropped our bombs at 1340 on the marshaling yards at Zwickau." reported by Horace S. Winslow, $1^{\text {st }} \mathrm{Lt}$. by Horace S . Winslow, ${ }^{\text {tr }}$ Lt.
Air Corps, Lead Navigator.

Commanding Officer, Major Morrison Ulman also stated, "Each attack lasted from 3 to 4 minutes and was very intense... The aggressiveness of enemy aircraft can't be over stated in today's operations and attests to the ability of their pilots."

On May 26, 1944, Dorcy's mother, Anna, (his father was deceased) received the telegram that stated, "Regret to inform you your son Technical Sergeant Dorcy W. Waters has been reported missing in action since twelve May over Germany. Further report states he had returned to duty on three May from wounds received in action twentynine April. If further details or other information are re ceived you will be promptly notified." A year later his status was changed to presumed dead.
In a letter to Anna Waters dated November 13, 1945, a Mrs. Helderman wrote about information she received from the Bishop's Office at Patterson, New Jersey. It contained the following details from a German priest. "On May 12, 1944, an air combat took place over my native town of Camberg, where I am now living. Twenty-seven combat. They were buried in the cemetery of Camberg. I could only identify seventeen airmen who were killed, some of them as Catholics. Please advise Mrs. Helderman of the death of her son... all have been buried in a common grave with a cross and inscription, 'Here lies twentyseven American airmen who fell down in an air combat in fell down in an air combat in
the community of Camberg May 12, 1944.' Next day after the combat I said Mass for all twenty seven without exception of faith. I gave the grave side benediction and since side benediction and since
in every daily mass I have in every daily mass I have
remembered them in the, remembered them in the,
'Mememto pro defunctis." Mrs. Helderman also wrote,
your dear son lies buried with my dear boy." A Report of In vestigation on September 7 1945 states that the grave had a "Wooden Cross-Marked as follows 'Heir Liegen 27 Amerikanishe Soldaten Die Am 12 Mai 1944 Im Bezirk Kamberg Abstrutzten."
On November 19, 1945, Anna sent a letter to the Adjutant General's Office ques tioning if the government was checking this grave 'of our Boys who gave their lives' Eventually the twenty-seven men were disinterred from the Camberg cemetery and on March 6, 1946, Dorcy had a military burial at the United States Military Cemetery at Margraten, Holland.

On April $23^{\text {rd }}, 1946$, Dor cy's mother sent a letter to The Memorial Division requesting that her son be 'returned to his home here at Antwerp, Ohio.' The official request doesn't appear to have been filed until December 5, 1947.
Finally on February 1 1949, Dorcy W. Waters ar rived home by train with a military escort and was met by an honor squad from the

Groundhog Day is a holiday celebrated on February 2 in the United States and Canada. According to folklore, if it is cloudy when a groundhog emerges from its burrow on this day, the groundhog will this day, the groundhog will
leave the burrow, signifying that winter will soon end. If on the other hand, it is sunny, the groundhog will supposedly "see its shadow" and retreat back into its burrow, and winter will continue for six more weeks.

Groundhog Day has been around for centuries, its origins clouded in the mists of time with ethnic cultures and animals awakening on specific dates. Myths such as this cific dates. Myths such as this
tie our present to the distant tie our present to the distant
past when nature did, indeed, influence our lives.

February 2 falls about halfway between the winter solstice in December and the vernal equinox in March, and is celebrated in some cultures is celebrated in some cultures
as the midpoint of winter. It's as the midpoint of winter. It's
not far from the time many not far from the time many
groundhogs end their hibernation around the second week of February.
The tradition of Groundhog Day in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania dates back to 1887. Pennsylvania's earliest settlers were Germans who brought the tradition with them. Legend has listed bears and hedgehogs as part to the tradition before the groundhog.

 same family as squirrels. the groundhog is known by several other names, such as the woodchuck and whistle-pig. The name whistle-pig comes from the loud, shrill whistle groundhogs sound when groundhogs sound whenfrightened. Additionally, they are fierce fighters when necessary. There are reports of groundhogs fighting off dogs as big as collies.
Groundhogs have two burrows, one for summer and one for winter. Generally they are solitary animals, but may share a burrow. The summer burrow is usually located in the middle of a meadow or pasture, near grass and other plants used for food. The winter den is typically located in a wooded or brushy area near the summer den.

The burrows have one main entrance, as well as other tunnels used as lookouts for enemies. Although predators are rare, the most common are humans and red foxes. In their winter burrows,
groundhogs go into deep higroundhogs go into deep hi-
bernation. Their metabolic rates and heart rates drop as low as 5-15 beats per minute, as well as their internal temperature as low as 38-40 degrees Fahrenheit.
Punxsutawney Phil is not the only weather-predicting groundhog! Atlanta has General Beauregard Lee, New
York has Staten Island Chuck, York has Staten Island Chuck,
and Ontario has Wiarton Willie. However, Phil is the oldest, the original, and by far the most popular of the weather-predicting groundhogs!

At Vantage Career Center, there are nine different Trade and Industrial programs offered to high school students in the Industrial and Engineering Systems cluster. Here is a brief look at those programs.

In the Ag Diesel Mechanics program, students learn the techniques for the maintenance, service and repair of industrial diesel and agricultural equipment and engines. Students in Ag Diesel Mechanics belong to the Vantage FFA Chapter.

Auto Body students learn the basic skills of collision repair and refinishing, as well as auto body and shop management skills. Performing agement skills. Performing
repairs to plastic and fiberrepairs to plastic and fiber-
glass components are unique skills of this trade.

The two-year Auto Technology program provides hands-on experience in the areas of hydraulic brake systems, automotive engines and suspension systems. Students learn the skills required to inspect, repair and adjust today's highly computerized todays

In the Precision Machining Technology program, students learn to operate and use lathes, grinders, mills and computer numerical controlled (CNC) machines to shape metal into useable tools shape metal into useable tools
and parts. Blueprint reading, computer aided drafting (CAD) and manufacturing processes are emphasized throughout the program.

The Vantage Welding program is a nationally recognized AWS (American Welding Society) training and testing facility. Students have the opportunity to earn industry certifications in plate and pipe welding. This program has earned the National Exemplary designation in ca reer technical education. Industrial Mechanics stu-
dents learn how to perform preventive and corrective maintenance and the set up
and adjustment of plant machinery. Students learn the basics of welding, electricity, machining, metal fabrication, residential and industrial plumbing, heating and air conditioning.

The Electricity program provides entry-level training ranging from residential wiring to industrial electrical applications. Students learn how to install, maintain and troubleshoot a variety of electrical systems, including the installation of coaxial or fiber optic cable for computers and other telecommunications equipment. Seniors also use their residential wiring skills to wire the Vantage Carpentry House project each year.

In the Building and Grounds Maintenance program, students are introduced to a wide variety of skills necessary to keep buildings and their surrounding areas in good condition. Students learn basic plumbing, installation of concrete and masonry walls, landscaping, painting and light carpentry skills. This year, they are using their skills to help renovate a home into office space for the Van Wert Historical Museum.
Build a house while still in high school? That's just what Vantage Carpentry students do. Carpentry students learn the skills required for residen-
tial construction, including blueprint-reading, computer ized house design, framing, roofing, drywall, cabinetry stairs and outside finish work. The ballot must be applied for in writing or in person for each election that you wish to cast an Absent Voter's Ballot. You may, but are not required to, use the application form prescribed by the Ohio Secretary of State (form 11- A). Your request must contain ALL of the following information:
-Your name;
-Your signature;
-The address at which you are registered to vote;
-Your date of birth;
-ONE of the following: (a) Your Ohio driver's license or state ID number; or (b) The last four digits of your Social Security number; or (c) A copy of your current and valid photo ID, military ID, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck,
or other government document that shows your name and current address. (Note: You cannot use as proof of
identification a identification a notice that the board of elections mailed to you.)
-A statement identifying the election for which you are requesting an absentee voter's ballot; -A statement th
-If you want the ballot mailed to you, you will need to include the address to which you want it mailed. An application by mail must be received by the Board of Elections office by NOON on Saturday, March $3^{\text {rd }}$. The deadline for absentee voting deadline for absentee voting
